

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Dear friends

"Where were you when you heard? Do you remember what you were doing?" This was one of those moments we remember forever. During the Thursday evening news, Buckingham Palace came onto the screen and Jenny exclaimed "Isn't the flag at half-mast?" A moment later, BBC presenter Huw Edwards gave us the news that we had come both to fear and expect, as Her Majesty's health had recently seemed to be failing.

We wondered how it was that, only two days earlier, she had received Liz Truss, inviting her to be the 15th prime minister to form a government during her 70-year reign. Then a thought occurred to me:



It was her well known devotion to the duties of her position. This validation of the very process of government was basic to her role and she was determined to carry it out one more time. It was as though she thought that she must not leave the country she had served without a clearly authorised government in charge.

In her tribute to the Queen, Bishop Rose of Dover recalled the poem the young Elizabeth had recited to her father when she was 13: '... put your hand into the hand if God; that shall be to you better than light, and safer than a known way.' And that faith and trust sustained Queen Elizabeth herself through all the years and trials of her own long reign.



And one of the dozen US presidents whom she met during that reign, President Joseph R Biden, recalled her letter to the American people in condolence after the 9/11 tragedy. She had shared these words: 'Grief is the price we pay for love.' And now we grieve, joined by many around the world, because she was loved, and we love her still.

M2 JUNCTION 5 STOCKBURY ROUNDABOUT

Statement from National Highways in early September 2022: We'll soon be starting work on the new slip roads, and to do this safely, we'll be closing the eastbound (coastbound) entry and exit slips between the M2 and A249 from 12 September 2022 until 13 January 2023.

This means you will not be able to access Stockbury roundabout from the M2 eastbound or join the M2 eastbound from Stockbury roundabout.

We know there's never a good time to complete this kind of work at a busy junction like this, and understand these closures will cause disruption to journeys, for which we apologise. We've been working closely with the local authorities and emergency services to plan how we do this work, and we'll be avoiding the main summer holiday peak. Closing the slip roads is the safest approach and causes least disruption, as it reduces the amount of time traffic management will be in place to compete this work and decreases the risk of incidents.

In January 2023, both slip roads will re-open. Access from the M2 eastbound to the A249 northbound (towards Sittingbourne) will temporarily be via the Stockbury roundabout, until the dedicated slip opens in Spring 2023.

Diversion routes

To join the M2 eastbound during the closures, use the M2 westbound from Stockbury roundabout to travel to junction 4 and return. This will add approximately 10-12 minutes onto the journey time.

Lower Halstow Village News - October 2022

Drivers travelling eastbound (towards the coast) will need to leave the M2 at junction 3 and use the A229, M20 and A249 to reach the Stockbury roundabout. This will add approximately 15 minutes onto the journey time. If you miss junction 3, they can travel to junction 6 and return to junction 5 from the west, which will add a further 25 minutes.

We'll be working with the local authorities and emergency services to monitor the impact these closures have on the surrounding roads so we can make any necessary changes.

Oad Street

We'll also be reclosing Oad Street between the A249 and Woodgate Lane from 5 September until Monday 10 October, to finish our widening work started in the earlier this year.

We've reviewed how we complete the remainder of our work and have reduced this closure to five weeks, minimising the impact to drivers and the community. Drivers travelling on the A249 northbound from Maidstone will need to cross the Stockbury roundabout, continue north on the A249, use Key Street roundabout, take the exit for the A2, and use Borden Lane to access Oad Street.

To access the A249 southbound from Oad Street or Pett Lane will need to use the same route in reverse to access the A249 south of Stockbury roundabout. There will be no through access to the A249 from Oad Street or Pett Lane.

The businesses on Oad Street, such as the café and the butchers, will remain open as usual.

LOWER HALSTOW PARISH COUNCIL UPDATES 20mph Zone Update

The Parish Council have met with the Highways team, virtually, to discuss the Highways Improvement Plan, as the original team that agreed to it some time ago have now been replaced with a new team. There is, unfortunately, some disagreement as to where the 40, 30 and 20mph limits will start in Breach Lane and the road markings and signage have not been finalised. The Parish Council continues to negotiate with KCC Highways and would hope that the Highways team will visit the site for a more accurate understanding of the requirements.

Seawall Update

The Parish Council have received an email from the Environment Agency which is very disappointing, as they had previously said that work to repair the seawall would commence in September. They now want to carry out further work to understand the extent of the proposed defence works for Lower Halstow village and the detailed impacts of implementing the No Active Intervention policy (NAI) at the Brickfields. As this section of defence is at imminent risk of collapse, the Medway Estuary and Swale programme board has decided to proceed with a short-term "rip rap" (armourstone) repair to the Brickfields frontage to give them time to carry out these investigations. They currently anticipate that the Environment Agency will assess this whole frontage again in more detail from 2025 onwards. The short-term repairs are not a permanent fix and the NAI policy is likely to be implemented in the future, depending on the results of future investigations. They now estimate that the short term repairs will begin in November. The Parish Council will continue to communicate with the Environment Agency on behalf of the residents.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Tuesday 4 October 2022.
