PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - THURSDAY 8TH DECEMBER AT 19:30

Present: Andrew Paris (in the Chair), Sarah Godfrey, David Herbert, Glenys Herbert, Janet Simmonds Apologies: Simon Bust & Chris Bevans

Affordable Housing: (Simon Bust is attendance) A presentation was given by the District Council regarding affordable homes – "Local homes for Local People". It was agreed that a housing needs survey should be carried out for the village. A letter to Halam residents from the Parish Council Chairman will be circulated early in the new year.

Matters Arising: Trees on School Lane – the County Council have done some work. The situation will be monitored. Village Hall: Chris Bevans would like to use PayPal to take payments for the village hall hire. It was agreed that Chris should report back on the feasibility/security of accepting payments while not being able to make them and the costs (commission) involved in using PayPal. Heating use & costs are being monitored – the electricity cost and just about being covered by current hiring income. Glenys Herbert & Marina Thompson are to find out the costs of improving the heating in the storeroom and getting the other heaters working in the hall before problems/damage occurs as the weather gets colder. It was agreed that the prices for these urgent works should to be submitted to Simon Bust & Andrew Paris for approval

Open Meeting: Matters discussed – 1) Village grit bin – Clerk to progress with County Cllr Andy Stewart

Correspondence: The Parish Council have received information about a scam from a company called Parcel Delivery Service. A card is put through a houses letterbox claiming that PDS were unable to deliver package; the card has an 0906 telephone

number to call to contact PDS – do NOT call this number as you will be immediately billed for £315 for the phone call. This is a scam originating from Belize. If you receive a delivery card through your letterbox which you do not believe is genuine and which asks you to dial a premium rate number, you can contact PhonepayPlus on 0800 500 212 (Mon-Fri, 9am-5pm) for further guidance.

Finance: Unanimously agreed to pay for the village hall fire safety check. A budget analysis was circulated as the Parish Precept will need to be set at the next Parish Council

Date of Next Meeting: Thursday 12th January 2012, 7.30pm in the village hall.

TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD

At about the middle of November I became aware that I did not need to fill up the bird seed feeders in the garden very often. Usually this was a daily duty wild bird seed, niger seeds and peanuts. Then I noticed that when I approached the feeding stations, instead of a mighty flurry of wings as birds took flight there was an unsettling silence. PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - THURSDAY 12TH JANUARY AT 8PM

Present. Simon Bust, Janet Simmonds, Sarah Godfrey, Glenys Herbert, David Herbert, Chris Bevans, **Apologies**. Andrew Paris **Village Hall**. Chris Bevans reported that if he sets up a PayPal account for payment of hall bookings, it will cost 3% per transaction and no monthly running costs. Money can only be transferred out of the account into the parish council account. There is no charge if the account is dormant for any length of time. The PayPal account could not be used for deposits as these could not be refunded back to the bookers. Also the PC would be out of pocket by the 3% transaction charge. Only Chris and the Treasurer will have access to the account. The proposal to open a PayPal account for village hall bookings was accepted unanimously. **Village Hall Heating**. Although the emergency repairs have not been carried out yet, an electrician was due to go to the hall to give a quote on the 13th January. Gill and Taylor have declined to quote for the work. **Precept**. It was unanimously agreed to keep the precept at £7,500.

New police non emergency number is 101

Footpaths. Sarah Godfrey raised the issue that one of the footpaths in the village has been fenced off. Simon Bust said that the council were due to come and install a style.

Open Meeting. Mr Denyer raised the issue of the affordable housing survey. The council explained that this survey is being undertaken at no cost to the village, to get the views of the residents. It will aim to see if there is a <u>need</u> for affordable housing. This means people who cannot afford to live in the village unless some cheaper accommodation becomes available. It only applies to current residents or people who work here. This is proving to be a very contentious issue and the parish council wants to stress that they do not support or oppose any potential development. The idea of the survey is to find out if there is a need or not. Please fill out your survey form and let us know your views — it is your village!

Planning: Wagon and Horses roof. Retrospective application to replace natural slates tiles to front elevation and clay pantiles to the rear, with double interlocking concrete roof tiles. It was unanimously agreed that whilst we did not object to the roof itself, we could not support the application as it would set a precedent. **Maythorne House, 5 Manor Fields**. Erection of a greenhouse. This was supported unanimously. **Norwood Park Golf Club**. Display advertising banners on timber frames, which are within the ground of the boundary ownership. **Denilldoit, Radley Road**. Erection of a new dwelling in substitution of approved dwelling under planning permission 10/01082/FUL. This was supported unanimously. **Church Farm House, Radley Road**. This application for an extension was refused by Newark and Sherwood. The parish council had previously supported this proposal.

TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD

Here in Halam we must remain thankful that the metal thieves have not tried to remove any more lead from the church roof. We certainly had our fair share of troubles in the village with the loss of lead from amongst others, The Church, Halam School and Church Cottage.

This thought was uppermost in my mind as I wandered up to the church porch last Sunday morning. – then I let my mind wander and wonder as to the origin of lightning conductors on tall buildings. In 1769 lightning struck the church of San Nazaro in Brescia in Italy with catastrophic results. Brescia was a town governed by the republic of Venice and 90 tons of gunpowder had been stored in the church vaults for safe keeping! The result of the lightning struke was an enormous explosion. One quarter of the town was destroyed and 3000 people were killed. Why hadn't the church been fitted with a lightning conductor ? Such a conductor had been invented by Benjamin Franklin 19 years before.

Churches refused to install lightning conductors because the conductor was considered a 'heretical rod'. For centuries the Church believed that lightning and thunder were signs of divine anger and it was sinful to make any form of direct intervention. Instead churches tried to ward off such strikes by ringing their bells and even today many church bells are inscribed "Fulgura frango" – meaning 'I break up lightning flashes'. This adherence to such doctrinal dictat carried however a terrible toll on bell ringers

In Germany in the 18th century 120 bell ringers were killed by lightning strikes - by the very strikes they were trying to ward off. Despite the scientific veracity of lightning rods, prejudice against them was very widespread and many lightning rods or conductors were torn down from churches and buildings - even in Franklin's native America a Boston Pastor blamed the lightning rod for an earthquake that damaged hundreds of buildings in that city in 1755!

In the aftermath of the French revolution a decree was signed in 1786 outlawing the custom of ringing the church bells during thunderstorms on account of the many deaths caused. I assume that our 'heretical rod' has been in place for many hundreds of years and as a village we must all hope and pray that this always be the case and that it does not end up in a skip in a scrap yard in Newark. The Church has always moved away from accepted dogma with caution, but in the case of 'heretical rods' it was right to do so. We must remain vigilant as a village against such thefts

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING NOTES - 9TH FEBRUARY 2012 AT 7.30PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL.

Village Hall: Chris Bevans reported that the village hall website was under construction –

www.halamvillagehall.org.uk Links between this site and the current village website will be set up as soon as possible. A quote for the remedial electrical work was discussed and authorised unanimously

Trees: dangerous and overhanging trees – as County Councillor Andy Stewart was absent the Clerk will contact him to progress

Drains: work on the main drains under The Turnpike is imminent – road works and traffic lights should be in place this month. Water at the top (Oxton Road) end of Radley Road – to be discussed further with Cllr Stewart. Missing drain cover by water works – this is still marked by a post and has not been replaced. Clerk will progress this matter. Grit Bin: still awaiting the promised grit bin (for the Radley Road/Gray Lane junction). To be progressed again with Cllr Stewart. There is still a small quantity of grit/salt available from the Parish Clerk in case of emergency need – contact Patrick Rickett

Open Meeting: Matters discussed: 1) state of Radley Road – to be monitored, 2) Queen's Jubilee: proposals received from the village hall committee - supported in principle, 3) Queen's Jubilee: mugs for children in Halam - Simon Bust to arrange, 4) footpath behind Strickland Farm – Clerk to contact County Council Footpaths Officer

Correspondence: A letter was read out which suggested that **a**) householders should be encouraged to clear the snow away from the pavements, at least in front of their own house (BBC solicitor stated that householders are very unlikely to be sued for clearing snow), b) snow should be cleared away from any road drains and gulleys - this allows thawing water to drain away and not lie on roads to freeze over-night, c) during bad weather, please check on vulnerable neighbours in the village – are they coping with the cold weather, do they need provisions, or even some company

Finance: Unanimously agreed to pay - NALC subscription and the entry fee for Best Kept Village competition. The section of the Financial Regulations dealing with the getting of quotes was reviewed. TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD

When I think of March my thoughts automatically turn to my homeland (hiraeth), the squally winds and rain, and the daffodils that carpet the hedgerows and broken wood glades, and of course St David's Day!

This month in deference to my fellow English villagers I write about the primrose and springtime; primroses in the churchyard conjure up a very English bucolic scene. Chaucer writes of 'Primerole' and 'Pryne rolles' which were names used in England at that time and derived from the Italian 'Fior di primavera' - or spring flower. Meanwhile in monastic texts we read of prima rosa - (first rose) - a name preferred by men of learning. By the 16th century all these ideas had hybridised and 'naturalised' as we gardeners say. and we obtained the single English name for this delightful flower - the primrose. The Latin name 'Primula Veris' means the first little one of spring.

Shakespeare used the flower's name eight times in his plays. We have never tired of this flower and even politicians utilised the flowers charms to ingratiate themselves with people that mattered - (nothing changes!). Whilst walking one day with Queen Victoria at Osborne House, Benjamin Disraeli told her how fond he was of these flowers and how they made him think of her - I don't think he meant short fat clumps, but tall graceful nodding sprays of loveliness. She never forgot the compliment and when he died in 1881 she sent a large wreath of primroses to his funeral. The Conservative party in 1882 named April 19th, the anniversary of his death, as 'Primrose day' and that was the date of the founding of the Primrose League, - a popular movement aimed at promoting Toryism across the social classes; Prime Minister David Cameron is simply using an old idea when he speaks of the 'Big Society'.

I seem to have waffled on at length, but I will end with a quote from Shakespeare's 'Midsummer Night's Dream' to encourage village folk to visit the churchyard!

'And in the wood where often you and I

Upon faint primrose beds were wont to lie.'

Do visit me in the churchyard in March and see the vast numbers of primroses there - I promise that you will enjoy it - and perhaps be inspired to lend a hand! **David Herbert**

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING NOTES - 8TH MARCH 2012 AT 7.30PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Present: S Bust, A Paris, C Bevans, S Godfrey, D Herbert, G Herbert, J Simmonds

Matters Arising: pot holes in roads – problems can reported online through the County Council's website or on 08449 80 80 80 Village Hall: a discussion was had regarding whether the hall should be sold; this isn't practicable at present because of outstanding mortgages. The lock on the disabled toilet needs attention. The village hall committee presented their three month report. It was unanimously agreed to buy new thermal blinds for the windows (from the funds raised at last year's harvest supper). The new village hall website is now live – www.halamvillagehall.org.uk Storage heaters – one or two should be left on at all times. Village hall committee to arrange notices regarding heating instructions.

Queen's Jubilee: village patchwork quilt is being organised.

TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD

I have begun to venture back into the churchyard now that warmer days are returning and I am delighted as always to see very many worm casts on the grass and many molehills - a sure sign of an abundance of juicy worms. Charles Darwin is known today as a revolutionary biologist who with his book 'On the Origin of Species' paved the way for our greater understanding of the natural world, Not many people know, however, that he wrote another book 'The Formation of Vegetable Mould Through the Action of Worms, With Observations on Their Habits', published in 1881, and it sold even better than 'On the Origin of Species' during Darwin's lifetime. When Darwin first started looking at worms no-one appreciated the key role they had in agriculture. In the mid 19th century most people thought earthworms were pests, but Darwin was convinced they were valuable for turning over the soil, in part by chewing it up and pooping it out.

The public perception of the worm as something of no importance or even a pest exists from the earliest of times The Romans had a word for the worm – 'vermis' and by the middle ages the term 'vermis' or 'verm' was applied to any creature that seemed unpleasant and especially worms as they were small wriggling creatures ugly to behold. With time the word 'vermin' became widely used and today is applied to a wide range of animals for which we have low regard. The Latin word vermis had its origin back in the Sanskrit of northern India from where the word 'kermes' developed from 'Krmi' meaning insect or worm. Kermes in turn gave rise to our word for crimson! Meanwhile the Italians had developed a word for a type of pasta – vermicelli, and the description of vermicelli (small worms) was given to the cochineal insects of South America by the Spaniards. This led to the naming of a dye from crushed Cochineal insects- namely vermilion.

Wormwood is a daisy-like plant known as vermuth in Germany and from this plant we get the drinks of raki, absinthe, pernod and so on. The drink brings about amazing change in us and in the middle ages the English described this change as ver-mod- (Dutch courage) and we still use see this usage in werewolf and in the French liqueur Vermouth.

So the simple wiggly worm has been proved to be a vital blessing to gardeners, and agriculturists, as well as giving us the names of striking colours, stimulating drink and a favourite Italian dish. But our indebtedness does not stop there - surgeons talk of the vermiform appendix, the anatomist talks of the vermis lobe of part of the brain and many a young man is keen on worming his way into the heart and affections of a pretty girl. We should not use the expression 'he is a worm' - a derogatory phrase - in fact the humble worm is very important. An old playground song went like this:

Nobody loves me, everybody hates me, I think I'll go and eat worms Long fat curly ones, short fat wriggly ones, I bite their heads off I suck their bodies out ,I throw the skins away Nobody knows how well I thrive , On worms three times a day!

I am using this opportunity to write about the forthcoming Jubilee celebrations. What has this to do with the churchyard? - well our Queen is the Supreme Governor of the Church of England and I am one of the many thousands of gardeners who keep her churchyards tidy and hopefully, interesting.

This coming Diamond Jubilee celebration is a truly special occasion. To have reigned so long and with such dignity and devotion is a wonderful achievement. You may have thought that a diamond jubilee refers to the celebration of 75 years of an occasion - and that is true except for length of reign of a monarch, when the time span only has to be 60 years. Our Queen ascended the throne on the 6th Feb 1952 but did not get crowned until the 2nd June 1953. By the time of the Halam celebrations next month she will have reigned for 60 years and 90 days

Queen Victoria reigned 63 years and 216 days and our present Queen will be 89 years old if she reigns for that length of time - by the time of her platinum jubilee she will be 95 years old if she is spared. Her reign has indeed been long and only surpassed by Queen Victoria and by the claimed reign of the "Old Pretender" James Stuart whose pretence lasted 64 years.

Why are we having the proposed Jubilee celebration in June? It was picked by court officials as far back as 1952 when it was judged by meteorological experts that first week in June would fall right in the middle of the dreamy English summer, an ideal time for the Coronation fixed on exclusively for the convenience of everybody and in hope of good weather. In fact Coronation day 1953 was the wettest day of the year - most of the nation watched it on black and white TV, but colour would not have made any difference as the only colour on that day was grey, black and grey!!

When our Queen celebrated her silver jubilee, that June was the coldest and wettest June of the Twentieth Century and Jubilee day itself was a day of strong winds and violent heavy downpours. Her golden Jubilee was better as it remained dry, we had no wind and the sun shone most of the day. Queen Victoria's diamond jubilee on 24th June 1897 was a spectacle enjoyed in magnificent sunny weather - the heat was intense, many ladies fainted along the route and policemen handed out pails of water to the crowds to assuage thirst! The next day Queen Victoria went to Windsor where the gathering was entertained by the Kaiser's band, then suddenly at lunch time storm clouds gathered, the marquee was ripped apart by lightning and then it collapsed, a tornado struck Eton and Marlow and trees were uprooted and roofs were ripped off houses and by the late afternoon many streets were under 3 feet of water!

So what of our chances in Halam on this coming Jubilee weekend? I am sure we will all have a great time basking in sunshine, or wallowing in our wet T-shirts. Though, no matter what the weather, we will all have a fantastic excuse for a jolly time!! David Herbert

Without official backing there seems little point in continuing this scheme. Andrew Paris will find out more regarding the situation with the police and will report back. It may be a good idea to invite a police representative to a future parish council meeting **Chairman's Report**

• Last May saw some changes of parish councillors with three new members joining the council. The Chairman thanked Marina Thompson for her continued support through the village hall committee and the plans for the jubilee celebrations.

• After putting much work and effort into improving the village hall, the cold weather last year resulted in a burst pipe and the hall floor being ruined. However, the hall is now in better shape than it has been for quite a few years, bookings are being taken, and there is a new dedicated website for the village hall. This all bodes well for the future and, although the hall is unlikely to run at a profit, all efforts are being made to minimise the cost to the parish. Many thanks to the village hall committee, this has taken a lot of pressure off the parish council.

• It has generally been a quiet year for the parish council with one meeting per month. The District Council decisions have generally been in accord with all planning recommendations of the PC.

• One real highlight of the year was the unveiling of the Lancaster Bomber Memorial on School Lane. It is a beautiful, peaceful spot and a real asset to the village. Thanks and congratulations to Andrew Paris & Tony Denyer for all their work in realising this memorial.

• The Harvest Supper last Autumn was well supported. The "traditional" format of a supper with socialising seemed to be enjoyed by the many people there. Another Games Night will be organised later in the year.

• There had been a few problems with the allotments due to one of the holders being unwell. The site has been cleared and tidied up, and there are now three allotments available (2 people already interested)

• There has been extensive work to the drains in the village and there have been some improvements, however there are still some ongoing problems. There is a dispute between E-ON and the County Council over responsibility for some damage to drains. It is hoped the remaining problems are sorted soon. The Chairman thanked the village hall committee, the parish clerk and Mandy Rickett, and all those who had helped the parish council over the past year. **Open Meeting:** 1. Did the parish council underwrite the Lancaster Memorial? – no, it was entirely underwritten by Andrew Paris 2. There is unlikely to be planning permission granted for any new dwellings in the village in the near future – changes to planning law and the fact that there are outstanding planning permissions for around ten new dwellings 3. The parish council was thanked for the work it had done over the past year – an unpaid and sometimes thank-less task 4. Bus shelter – alternative cleaning arrangements will be sought



TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD JUNE 2012

By the time you receive this newsletter we will be caught up in the excitement of the national Jubilee celebrations for Queen Elizabeth II. Celebration in June invariably means balmy, warm evenings and food and drink in garden - or more precisely the BARBEQUE season.

This word should only be applied to the actions of men, in general, who in summer are obsessed by the mistaken idea that they can cook on a barbeque; this desire has continued down through the centuries until now in the 21st century the art has been perfected - an art he reserves for special guests who would much prefer to take their charcoal in tablet form and their meat slightly on the cooked side. To help our individual celebrations I would like to include a few tips: 1) Guests should be chosen from acquaintances that you don't mind never seeing again - always choose people who have a fast car and sat nav so that they can get to the hospital quickly.

2) Charcoal is usually found in a split damp bag at the back of the garage where the cats usually visit. Lighter fuel is needed - usually 2 bottles and a gallon of paraffin. Matches - do yourself a favour and use a new box - if you use last year's they will be damp and fall to bits at the first strike.

3) Three implements are needed- any old fork, but chose the tweezers with care - most tweezers grasp the food then spin it uncontrollably into the air and onto the lawn. If this happens and you have pets make sure you wipe the food on your pinny.

4) Ingredients – I recommend sausages, thin ones, as these then fall through the grid and char beautifully; beef burgers - be careful to chose thin ones as otherwise they wont dry out and resemble a crisp; chicken - marinade in wine over the previous night to give a delicate flavour which you will then cook out of it in minutes. Lots of red and green peppery things are required to take away the taste of burning. Wine is essential to help your guests forget the whole thing. Sauce red or brown, and mustard in quantity will help overpower all sense of taste

5) One should always remember to ask guests how they like their meat cooked - it sounds as if you care - but you will have no chance of success.

6) Lighting the barbeque takes great skill and is often only mastered by a pyromaniac. Arrange damp charcoal on the grid, pour on the 2 bottles of lighter fuel and ask guests to go inside the house for a few minutes. Go upstairs and throw lit matches on to the pyre; when one hits the target it should be safe to return to the barbeque in about 10 minutes. Repeat these steps several time and when fire has started recall your guests.

7) State loudly to your friends: "I do hope we will have enough" Now drink more wine - this helps you to entertain your guests and detracts from the food. Turn the sausages until they are burnt outside and raw in the middle - as last year. The chicken may not be quite ready - serve the chicken after the pudding and the cheese and biscuits.

8) By the time the food is eaten the barbeque will be at the right temperature and you can all huddle around it for warmth - flap away the gnats and remember to remove the cat from off the grill.

In summary if you feel the impulsive desire to cook outside, keep it to yourself - remember the guests this year will not be the guests of last year.
