THE VILLAGE DRAINAGE/SEWAGE SYSTEM

As many of you may already know, our village drainage system suffers constant problems. Blockages occur regularly, causing water to rise up into manholes and flood the road, not just water but sewage too, sometimes backing up into properties and overflowing into gardens.

On 3rd June 2010 Southern Water sent a special vehicle to remove blockages that normal jetting could not shift. This resulted in the removal of large lumps of congealed fat.

Regular maintenance may reduce the problem but the best solution is for us not to put fat down the sink. This is easier said than done, but what some residents are doing is using kitchen paper towels to soak up small quantities and putting larger amounts into a container and leaving it to solidify before putting it into the rubbish bin.

In the meantime please try not to put fat down the sink; it congeals with other waste to cause major blockages. You may not be affected but your actions could affect your neighbours without you realising it.

'Liverton Hill 30mph Campaign Group'

Residents of Liverton Hill are campaigning to extend the 30mph speed limit from Grafty Green through Liverton Hill to Platts Heath. Traffic over the years has increased and the narrow lanes make travelling at speed, hazardous for all road users, and causing many accidents on the hill itself.

Two meetings have been held to date with an aim of bringing a report to KCC to reflect the views of residents regarding the 30 mph speed limit. Council and Parish Council representatives are aware of the campaign and support is growing daily.

The area has a number of specific features which hopefully will ensure the success of the campaign. Some of the features add to the interest of the area but also increase the dangers for those unaware of them. Examples include natural springs running down the hill causing slippery surfaces particularly in winter, six public footpaths opening onto the road way with part of the roadway as a KCC promoted route for walkers and variable road widths with many bends.

There are approximately 32 households in Liverton Hill, nearly all having driveways opening directly onto the road. Pulling out onto the road where the geographical features make it difficult to see, along with natural vegetation and parked cars must make this the right time to promote a reduction in speed in order to ensure the safety of not only residents but also visitors and through traffic.

Speedwatch

Speedwatch has now started in Grafty Green so you might find a few words about it useful. The scheme is aimed at encouraging drivers to observe speed limits in rural areas, and for our community the 30 mph through Grafty Green. It is a scheme operated by trained volunteers organised under the auspice of Kent Police, Kent County Council and Boughton Malherbe Parish Council. Strict guidelines are in place and the volunteers have no authority whatsoever, they merely monitor results and when necessary pass details to the Police.

For vehicles travelling at less than 35 mph they may see their speed displayed on a monitor but that's it. For vehicles travelling at 35 mph and above details of the speed and vehicle will be logged, and if the log over a twelve month period reveals two infringements an advisory letter will be sent by the Police. If a third infringement is noted a further letter will be sent and the vehicle will become part of a 'pro-active' Police list. Additionally any significant infringement of the 30 mph limit will be passed to the Police for immediate follow up.

I re-iterate the emphasis is very much about getting drivers to acknowledge and respect speed limits for safer communities and that the start of this scheme will be seen as something very positive for the village.

Always take a small magnet on your Holiday; they come in handy at the end of your stay !!.

HOTEL KEY CARDS

Ever wonder what is on your magnetic Key card? Answer:

- a. Customer's name
- b. Customer's partial home address
- c. Hotel room number
- d. Check-in date and out dates
- e. Customer's credit card number and expiration date!

When you turn them in to the front desk your personal information is there for any employee to access by simply scanning the card in the hotel scanner. An employee can take a hand full of cards home and using the scanning device, access the information onto a laptop computer and go shopping on your expense.

Simply put, hotels do not erase the information on these cards until an employee reissues the card to the next hotel guest. At that time, the new guest's information is electronically 'overwritten' on the card and the previous guest's information is erased in the overwriting process.

But until the card is rewritten for the next guest, it usually is kept in a drawer at the front desk with YOUR INFORMATION ON IT!

The bottom line is: Keep the cards, take them home with you, or destroy them. NEVER leave them behind in the room or room wastebasket, and NEVER turn them into the front desk when you check out of a room. They will not charge you for the card, it's illegal, and you'll be sure you are not leaving a lot of valuable personal information on it that could be easily lifted off with any simple scanning device card reader.

For the same reason, if you arrive at the airport and discover you still have the card key in your pocket, do not toss it in an airport trash basket. Take it home and destroy it by cutting it up, especially through the electronic information strip!

If you have a small magnet, pass it across the magnetic strip several times. Then try it in the door, it will not work. It erases everything on the card.

The Grafty Gourmet

This is a great but simple Summer recipe. All we need to go with it, is a Summer. It is great served with New Potatoes and Asparagus. Be sure to use fresh Dill in the sauce, as this really makes a difference.

Salmon Parcels with Dill Sauce

For 2 Servings

Salmon Parcels 2 x 4-5oz salmon fillets 4 x sheets filo pastry 1 oz butter Zest and juice of 1 lime 1 tsp grated ginger 1 spring onion (finely chopped) 1 clove garlic (pressed) 1 Tbsp fresh coriander (finely chopped) Salt and pepper <u>Dill Sauce</u> 2 shallots, finely chopped 2 tablespoons butter 1/2 cup white wine 3 tablespoons chopped fresh dill 1 cup crème fraîche 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard Salt and pepper

1. For the Dill sauce, melt the butter on low heat in a small sauce pan. Add the shallots and cook, stirring frequently, for five minutes. Be sure not to brown the shallots, otherwise they will turn hard and bitter. Pour in the wine and add half of the chopped dill. Turn up the heat to medium and boil the liquid until reduced to about half. Take off the heat and stir in the crème fraîche and mustard. Warm through just before serving and season to taste with salt and pepper. and stir in the remaining dill.

2. For the Salmon Parcels, mix together lime zest and juice, garlic, spring onion, ginger and coriander.

3. Melt the butter on a slow heat in a pan. Lay out 1 sheet of filo pastry, and brush with the melted butter. Lay second sheet on top, brush with more butter. Lay a salmon fillet about 2-3 inches from short side of pastry, season with a pinch of salt and pepper and put half of lime mixture on top.

4. Fold short end of pastry over salmon, then fold in the 2 long sides. Fold the salmon over twice more, (3 times in total), and cut off any remaining pastry. Do the same with the other fillet.

5. Put the parcels on a well-greased baking sheet, and just before baking brush with the remaining butter. Cook at about 170 degrees for 20-25 minutes, until brown and crispy.

The July Night Sky

At the start of July the Sun is in the constellation of Gemini, and moves into Cancer on Tuesday 20^{th} . On Tuesday 6^{th} July, the Earth is at 'aphelion' – its furthest distance from the Sun.

New Moon occurs on Sunday 11th July, and will be visible in the western sky at sunset. Full Moon occurs on Monday 26th July, in the constellation of Capricornus.

It will not be possible to see Mercury this month, as it sets only a few minutes after sunset. Again this month Venus is visible in the western sky as soon as it starts to get dark, and sets in the northwest in late evening. The "Evening Star" is so brilliant, it can even be seen in the twilight sky.

Mars is in the western sky at dusk and sets in the northwest shortly before midnight. At the start of July, Mars lies almost midway between brilliant Venus to its lower right, and slightly brighter Saturn to its upper left. Again this month the "Red Planet" appears about the same brightness as Regulus, but shines with a steadier more orange light.

Jupiter rises in the east around midnight, and is clearly visible in the southeast at dawn. The giant planet is less brilliant than Venus, but can still be seen even against a brightening sky. With binoculars Jupiter's four major moons can easily be seen. Saturn is in the western sky at dusk and sets around midnight. Relative to the stars Saturn is moving very slowly south-eastwards in Virgo. Again the famous rings can only be seen through a telescope.

In the biggest survey conducted using the Hubble Space telescope, astronomers studied 446,000 galaxies to see how matter was distributed. They found that the universe was growing faster and faster with time, as predicted by Einstein, whose theory of general relativity claimed that space and time were a geometrical structure that could be changed by the behaviour of the matter inside it.

It is said that the universe is made up of normal matter, dark matter and an unknown energy referred to as "dark energy", which causes the universe to expand. The astronomers confirmed that there is an unknown source of energy in the universe, which is causing the cosmic expansion to speed up, exactly as predicted by Einstein.

Neighbourhood Watch Message

This is a joint crime and community message from Maidstone & District Neighbourhood Watch and Mid Kent Maidstone Police. We would like to inform you of the following information for your area.

Police are advising anyone who owns a garden shed to protect their property following a number of shed break-ins in Maidstone recently.

Sheds and garages often contain expensive tools that, if stolen, can be used to break into the rest of the house. As a result, residents lose thousands of pounds worth of equipment because items of value are kept outside, without proper security.

Police in Maidstone are advising households in both rural and urban areas to follow precautions to prevent your shed from becoming an easy target for criminals.

- Never leave the shed unlocked. In addition, fit strong padlocks to the shed door and ensure that the door is solid enough not to be kicked in.
- Lock items such as ladders inside your shed to prevent burglars from using them to break into your house.
- Mark your property with a UV marking pen, which you can get from the front counter of Maidstone Police Station in Palace Avenue
- Purchase lockable steel boxes or anchor posts to store tools and various equipment.
- Fit alarms or security lighting to your shed.
- Make a note of the make, model, serial number and any distinguishing marks of tools and machines. The police can use these as a reference if property is stolen. Keep these details in a safe place.

The Neighbourhood Watch Office at Maidstone Police station on Palace Avenue sells various shed security equipment. For more information, please contact Neighbourhood Watch Liaison Officer, Lorraine Hemphrey on 01622 604395.

Jo intends completing another ride in September, it is not too late to make a donation if you wish to.



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

Christian Message July 2010

Recently, an ordinary day at work began in an extraordinary and tragic way. As I sat at my desk, switching on my computer a colleague came in and told me of the sudden and unexpected death of a member of staff. My first reaction was disbelief. He had been fine the day before. I had seen him in the school playground on duty and at lunch in the Dining Room. I knew that, like all other teachers, he had been working hard to ensure that final examination preparations were being completed and deadlines met. Speaking to his wife by telephone and hearing the manner of his passing confirmed that sense of amazement. Andy had arrived home, tired from the day, his wife cooked a meal and, whilst watching the television, he had passed away peacefully.

As the news spread through the school and as I spoke first to staff and then to students there was a sense of loss, of astonishment and of shock. Close colleagues and students who knew him well were in shock. There were others who felt differently – the girl who was devastated because she had been rude to him the day before, a boy who had not turned up for a detention, even colleagues who had said things that were less than generous about him – they felt guilty and remorseful. The school was awash with these mixed emotions and I wondered how the reactions would develop on that first day.

I need not have been concerned. Ours is a Church of England school with a strong Christian ethos and the power of the faith of the whole community saw us through the day's grief.

Many, many students and staff visited the School Chapel to write and say prayers; they lit candles, were supported by our Chaplain and each other and, although they did not understand, were comforted through their belief in God. Students wrote messages and taped them to the door of his classroom – and, when there was no room left, wrote on the door. Every single one of the hundreds of messages was of hope and thanks for the life of their teacher. Flowers were laid at the foot of the school cross by others, including past students now at University.

A few days later, his daughter and elderly father of the teacher visited the school to be greeted by these memorials and, in the depths of their unhappiness, felt the power of the Christian love that moved our community to honour Andy in these ways. The classroom doors have been preserved exactly as they were left and the cards and prayers and Book of Remembrance are with the family.

The famous verses from Ecclesiastes (Chapter 3 vv. 1 - 8) gave us a focus for this period.

"Everything that happens in this world happens at the time God chooses" $\left(v.1\right)$

"He sets the time for sorrow and the time for joy''(v.4)

And

"He sets the time for finding and the time for losing" (v.6)

Although we lost an admired and loved colleague and teacher – we also found a renewed faith and sense of community. I can't imagine how we would have coped without knowing that Andy was resting in peace in everlasting glory.
