Message from the Chair of The Parish Council

Hamble Parish Council has an enviable record of good housekeeping and a focus on keeping down costs whilst maintaining a wide range of assets; this approach has served us well but over time it has meant that a number of our assets now need to be replaced, and changes in the regulatory framework mean that we have had to review the way we do business.

Part of this has been to put residents at the heart of what we do and the WeRHamble survey helped to identify community priorities. This indicated that residents wanted high quality facilities and services that the whole village would be proud of.

We now have a list of projects for this year which will deliver new benches and street furniture in key areas, play equipment at Bartletts Fields and improved management in the dinghy park, allotments and at Westfield Common. Work is also progressing on plans to redevelop Mount Pleasant and make improvements to the Roy Underdown Pavilion.

The way the Council works has also been reviewed. One of the major changes is

that we have set up a Planning Committee to bring a greater focus and expertise to issues that you have said are of concern. This usually meets on the fourth Monday of every month. We have also changed the hours of opening for the office during year but from the start of May we will be opening Monday to Friday 10am to Midday and 2pm – 4pm. We hope that this will mean more of you can get to us when you need to but in any event staff can always be contacted by email at clerk@hamblepc.org.uk.

Office procedures and equipment have also been reviewed with the objective of ensuring that we comply with all the relevant legislation and that we are operating as effectively as possible. This has meant significant financial savings from such apparently mundane items as encouraging the use of electronic payments, increased use of electronic banking, replacing our photocopier and telephone contracts. We have also looked to increase our sources of income for example the cost of printing the magazine has been reduced and advertising income

increased. A win win for the parish.

There have also been efficiency savings from changes to the way we work. For example, we have used email and electronic banking to speed up the Dinghy Park allocation and the allotment administration. We are just about to embark on updating the parish council website. Once the update has taken place it will be cheaper to run and also be able to provide additional services such email alerts and a new planning application function. More about this soon.

The other area that we have been focusing on this year is working with other agencies like Highways England and Hampshire County Council to provide local knowledge, make them aware of our concerns and to try and find solutions to the problems of Hamble Lane.

Looking forward we will be facing new opportunities. The Parish Office will be taking over the day to day running of the

community hub. It has been agreed that it will be called "The Mercury" and will be the home of a model of the training ship, donated by the Mercury Old Boys Association. We expect to run a programme of activities for all of the community - not just those that like to read!

All these changes take time to achieve but we are focused on delivering your priorities and getting things right. This has taken extra money this year with an average increase in bills of £5.20 over the year, the first increase for a number of years. We will continue to look at options to raise money from a range of activities as well as adopting a user pay approach which is generally seen as a fairer way of paying for services.

We are proud of our village and know you are and hope we can harness that passion to get things right.

Council News

The Parish Council has appointed a new Administration Assistant and Jack Emerson-Heaney, who is the current editor of this magazine, will be undertaking this role. This new post has been necessary because of the increased work load in the Parish Office. With Jack's appointment the Council office will open every weekday, Monday to Friday, from 10am-midday and 2-4pm.

To add capacity to the work of the Council's grounds team it has been decided to use a local Community Payback team once a month to undertake tasks such as clearance of undergrowth, cleaning of street signage and furniture.

Progress has been made regarding the new library/community hub which will be known as 'The Mercury'. A working group has visited similar local establishments to view how they operate and to identify good practises and features that could be used in Hamble. It is anticipated that the volunteers that have put their names down to help run Hamble's new facility will visit one of these local facilities so they can see the range of opportunities and services that Hamble could offer. If you wish to volunteer to help please contact the Parish Office (asstclerk@hamblepc.org.uk). As part of improving the traffic flow by the new library/community hub the Borough Council is seeking 'no waiting' restrictions opposite the new building.

The new Planning Committee has been busy with a number of important matters. Residents from Kingfisher Close attended its last meeting to express their concerns regarding the impact the development at the Riverside Park was having on their

properties. Eastleigh Borough Council are looking at issues on the site and the Parish Council is supporting residents in making their concerns known. It is hoped that the situation can be improved.

The Council does not only consider planning matters in the parish but also those outside of it that affect Hamble. The Planning Committee objected to an application by Deacons Boatyard that would reconfigure its pontoons so a safe passage for small craft would be lost for Hamble residents who wish to go up river. Following a recent closure of Hamble Lane and the diversion route which resulted in traffic chaos, the Clerk has been asked to contact Hampshire County Council's Highways to establish a Hamble Lane designated diversion route and to ensure any future work on Hamble Lane would if possible be outside rush hours and if traffic control signals were required that they are manned.

The planning appeal regarding the refusal of planning permission for a 64-bedroom dementia care unit adjacent to the Blackthorn Health Centre has been dismissed. GE Aviation has undertaken another public consultation regarding its development proposals on its sports field after making changes to its original plans as the result of feedback from its first consultation.

The local policing team has given recent crime statistics to the Council and informed it that PC Robin Tebb is Hamble's new dedicated police officer. Hedge End is our fully operational police station with police officers working out of it 24/7 although it is not open to the public. The crime recorded

in Hamble remains low compared to other areas and for the months of December to February there has been a fall in total crime compared to the same period last year.

A grant has been made to Friends of

Hamble Primary School to support its initiative to give boating/sailing experience to all its Year 5 pupils which will be provided by Hamble River Sailing Club. The two safety ladders on the Southern Quay are to be replaced to make them easier to use in an emergency.

HAMBLE RIVER RAID 2018

The Hamble River Raid was initially created to raise funds for the Hamble Sea Scouts. It has subsequently grown to be a major local spectacle, held annually, uniting the immediate community and those from further afield in healthy fun on the River Hamble.

Over the years we have been supported by many inspiring members of our community who have started the race and helped to run the event. Because of this, the event has evolved with computers and GPS to enhance the time keeping and a loud speaker system to keep spectators and competitors informed. This year a new time keeping system will be used to provide faster results.

There is a Hog Roast and refreshments available for all. We continue to have the support of Hall & Woodhouse and The Jolly Sailor donated the beer as they have done over many years. As one competitor said, "The Hamble River Raid has become a serious sporting event supported and put on by the local community without losing the element of fun that embraces all ages and skills."

In addition to Rowing boats we welcome a good mix of craft - be they paddlers or rowers such as OC6's (six man outrigger



canoes), Stand up paddlers and an increased fleet of Kayaks and Canoes. A real celebration of paddling in all forms!

NEW DRIVE TO GET MORE WOMEN INVOLVED IN PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

As part of the national This Girl Can campaign developed by Sport England, Eastleigh Borough Council has launched This Girl Can Eastleigh, a celebration of active women doing their thing no matter how well they do it, how they look or even how much their body jiggles in the process.

This Girl Can Eastleigh aims to help women to overcome the barriers that may be stopping them from participating in exercise; Feelings of self-doubt and insecurity, a fear of being ridiculed or judged, just some of the reasons women often find it difficult to embark on a journey to a more healthy and active lifestyle.

To showcase what's achievable This Girl Can Eastleigh has recruited a handful of local champions, ordinary women who in the past year have changed their lives through exercise, which it is hoped will inspire other women in Eastleigh to get out there and get involved in more physical activity.


One of the champions, Sarah Floyd, knew she needed to take control of her life. The 42-year-old from Hedge End was unfit and struggling with her weight. A year ago she joined a Couch to 5K course, set up by Eastleigh Borough Council's SportWorks programme, and she hasn't looked back. She has dropped five dress sizes but most critically, her health and wellbeing have dramatically improved.



To help more women in Hamble get active, Eastleigh Borough Council have teamed up with Hamble Sports Complex and local clubs in the area to offer free taster sessions in a host of different sports and activities. Activities available to try include Aquacise, Yoga, Walking Netball, Tennis, Zumba and more. There will also be a beginner Ladies Badminton course available at Hamble Sports Complex this summer.

THE HISTORY OF TRAINING SHIP MERCURY

Fifty years ago this July, the Training Ship Mercury finally closed its doors after 77 years, during which it played an important role in the more recent history of Hamble-le-Rice. In fact, the school began life in 1885 on the sailing ship Illovo moored off Binstead on the Isle of Wight, but moved to its Hamble home in 1892. During those years, it trained over 5,000 boys, most of whom went on to the Royal and Merchant Navies.

The school site, off Satchell Lane, is now occupied by Mercury Gardens, St Agathas Road and Fry Close. Here were the classrooms, mess hall, parade ground, sports field, offices and staff housing. Little remains today except the old slipway and a path leading to our pier, whose slowly rotting wooden piles are still visible. From there, we embarked into boats to sleep aboard a wooden walled hulk of a former naval sloop, which had had her masts removed and an extra deck added. That deck was clad in corrugated iron to protect the boys sleeping in their hammocks. The ship's hull was painted black initially with grey topsides. Post World War II the topsides were painted white with a red roof giving her the appearance of Noah's Ark! Today she has been restored to her former glory as HMS Gannet and is on permanent display in Chatham Historic Dockyard.

Mercury began life due to the philanthropic efforts of Charles Hoare, a member of the Hoare's merchant banking family (who continue to run the bank today). Charles' intention was to train 1,000 boys, from poorer backgrounds, ahead of joining the Royal or Merchant Navies. Prior to this, he had attracted widespread media attention when he went to court for having an extramarital affair with an underage girl - Beattie Sumner. Charles, an amateur yachtsman, immediately became captain. Bizarrely, although remaining married, he installed Beattie (now an adult) in the school and she played a major part in its

history until the mid 1940's. In the latter years, Mercury became a fee paying school with some boys being supported by grants from their local authorities.

Throughout the life of Mercury the United Kingdom had one of the world's largest Royal and Merchant Navies and establishments such as this provided a steady stream of young, well trained, recruits. Boys originally stayed for two years, later extended to three, when we were instilled with a sense of duty, discipline, respect for others and a sound knowledge of seamanship and navigation, all of which were highly valued by both navies.

In 1908 Charles Hoare died. Ten years earlier Beattie married C.B. Fry, one on England's finest cricketers and all round sportsmen. C.B. nominally succeeded Charles as captain but, in reality, spent little time at the school as his sporting and business interests led him to travel extensively. Beattie (known as 'Ma' Fry) effectively ran the school and became an increasingly formidable woman, ruling with a rod of iron. Whether summer or winter, boys went bare foot! Discipline was harsh and often quite brutal. Following her death in 1946, C.B. continued as captain until 1950 but passed much of the responsibility to his step-daughter Sybil Hoare (whose father was Charles!). Sybil was reportedly just as much a tyrant as her mother. When CB retired an ex naval officer, Commander

Matthew Bradby was appointed captain and he was succeeded by Commander Ronald Hoyle in 1960. During those years, things began to change with improvements to educational standards and life in general. The school closed in 1968 due to a combination of reducing numbers and concerns by the authorities about the standards of the accommodation - it was no longer considered acceptable for young boys to sleep in hammocks in such austere conditions (in winter months the decks often froze overnight!). Notwithstanding Mercury was always unique compared with other schools of its day and a "character-building" experience, I believe in a very positive way.

CB Fry's influence brought about visits by people such as The Prince Of Wales (the future King George VI) and Sir Winston Churchill, as well as numerous well known sporting friends. CB, who died in 1956, was well liked by the boys and had a somewhat softer character than Ma and Sybil. The last President was Earl Mountbatten of Burma and he presided over the closing ceremony.

Some boys reached very senior positions in the Royal and Merchant Navies. Inevitably, many sacrificed their lives in the two World Wars and their memorial stands at the entrance to St Andrews Church. Notwithstanding the last surviving serviceman of World War I, Claude Choules, began as a Mercury cadet and served in the Royal Navy in World War I and the Royal Australian Navy in World II. He died in Australia as recently as 2009 and this was widely reported in the media, often pictured wearing his Mercury hat. Of those who did not go to sea, many joined the Royal Marines, Army or RAF, some entering as bandsmen as Mercury always had a fine band. Among the old boys was a young airman, who was one of the 'Great Escapers' (a mass prison camp breakout in 1944) from Stalag Luft III. Sadly, like many other escapers, he was caught and murdered by the Gestapo.

The Mercury Old Boys Association was

established in 1978, 10 years after the closure. Sadly, with ever decreasing numbers able to attend reunions and serve the committee, we are formally winding up the Association and our last reunion will be in September. A major part of this will be an event in Hamble on Saturday 22nd of September. This will begin at around 11am when we will march through the village to St Andrews Church accompanied by the local scouting organisations and Hamble Pipe Band. After a short memorial service, we will formally present our model of the ship, as she was in our times, to the village to be displayed in your new Community Hub and Library. We are hugely proud to learn that this building will be named after Mercury. After our reunion, we will be presenting our cups, trophies and bass drum to Hamble Sea Scouts. Importantly Lord Baden Powell, a friend of C B Fry, launched the Sea Scout movement at Mercury in 1909 and your local troop retains the name Mercury.

All of us are hugely proud of our old school and have a lot of affection for its spiritual home, Hamble. On behalf of the Association, I would like to use this opportunity to thank the Parish Council, Mercury Gardens Residents Association, Fr Graham Whiting and the many residents of the village who continue to take so much interest in our old school and support what we do.

Matthew Whitfield came along in March to talk to us about his career as a Royal Navy Fighter Pilot flying Sea Harriers and serving on Aircraft Carriers.

Matthew told us about the job he loved, saying he was living his dream serving as a pilot for 20 years cutting his teeth against the Russians although he never went to war. He showed us slides of him taking off and landing on the aircraft carriers flying in squadrons of six and said that he trusted the engineers on board with his life and still to this day they are his trusted friends. One of the biggest challenges of his career was night flying, taking off and landing at dusk and also in the dark.

We were shown his supersonic helmet he wore which was green for camouflage and also showed us a control column (stick) from a Sea Harrier and demonstrated how to use the controls.

Matthew gave us a very interesting insight into the career of a Fighter Pilot in the Royal Navy which started here in Hamble when he was just a young boy, playing on the airfield he would watch the planes taking off and landing. He was proud to tell us that he had flown over Hamble in 2009 in a Sea Vixen - how wonderful that must have been for him.

On leaving the Navy Matthew flew spy planes for the MI5 for a while and was also a pilot for big corporate companies. He now teaches life skills but is still proud to have his flying licence. Another enjoyable evening.

In April Rachel Hampton from Mayfield Nurseries came along once again to give us an update on the work being done at the nursery as well giving us a demonstration of how to make a hanging basket.

Mayfield Nurseries which is situated in Mayfield Park, Weston Lane is a plant nursery selling a range of award winning

plants at affordable prices. Every penny raised is ploughed back into helping people with mental health issues. The Nurseries have now been running for 22 years and has proved a great success in improving the lives of people it helps. Over the years they have widened the help they give to other groups of people including to veterans suffering from combat stress and dementia groups. Some of the people that go along to the nurseries are referred by their doctors for gardening therapy. They also are supported by Southampton City Council to go out to housing estates helping and encouraging residents to improve the areas they live in which has proved to be very successful.

The Nurseries rely on donations and raising money through the selling of their plants to the public but, needing to raise more money, have now started selling their plants to landscape companies too. They have various open days throughout the year when you can go and watch hanging basket demonstrations, join in a BBQ and refreshments with activities for children and of course buy some of their lovely plants.

Public support is very important so that they can continue to do the amazing work they do in helping people with mental health issues. Rachel and her colleague brought along a selection of plants for sale and many of our members were happy to part with their money.

HAMBLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The room was full when Ian Underdown took those present at the Society's last meeting for a trip up the Hamble River in 1910 showing the views and villages at that time over a hundred years ago. Ian started at the mouth of the river at Hamble Point buoy and took the tide to its tidal limit. How different were the scenes compared to today with a rural open river devoted to just yachtsmen and fishermen. The most noticeable thing seen on the river trip was the large number of hards giving residents access to the river over the mudland.

The first place to be viewed was Luke's winter slips at Hamble Point with open sided sheds and boats ashore. The boats were hauled up by hand winches on wooden greasy way slipways and logs. Then over to Warsash to discover the crab and lobster trade. They were imported mostly from the West Country & Ireland, carried alive in the wells of coastal schooners and kept in ponds ashore or wooden boxes in the river called 'carbs' until they were required.

Next, passing the large steam yacht owned by Mr Shenley of Warsash House and then the Hamble-Warsash Ferry, a wooden rowing boat operated by Adonijah Bevis. Ian then took a short walk around Hamble village showing the main features at that time. Interestingly he said in 1910 the Parish Council was concerned about the practice of people throwing their old pots, tins and kettles on the foreshore which gave visitors a bad impression of the place. It was agreed that people should deposit this rubbish at low water mark.

Rowing up river past Luke's boatyard, one of the major employers in the village, to the Training Ship Mercury to visit its shore

establishment. That year Mercury boy and scout Martin Enrick was awarded the first Silver Cross in the scouts for saving a boy from drowning. Off Badnam Creek was a large battleship mast sunk in the mud and ship hulks which were part of the Boom Defence. They were to be used to connect up dolphins across the entrance of Southampton Water with wires, nets and booms for protection against enemy attack.

Moving on further up river to Swanwick and Bursledon with a large sailing collier moored off the Jolly Sailor pub with coal for these villages and then to be taken by small barges up to Botley. Ian then stayed for the annual regatta and showed the events that took place. Under the old wooden toll bridge and the railway bridge and on the right was Bursledon Brickworks with a barge loading to take the bricks away to local harbours. The bricks were transported from the brickworks to its quay by an aerial ropeway.

On the way up to Botley there was a large wreck believed to be a Viking ship from which local people had taken away wood until stopped by the Admiralty. In the last century Mr Crawshay and the Moodys from the local boatyard undertook a survey of this wreck using 'dynamite' to remove the mud with little success. (In 1933 it was found to be the Grace Dieu, built in 1418, the largest ship ever built at that time and for the next 200 years.)

Taking the left fork of the river to Botley, Fairthorne Manor could be seen which was owned by a wealthy coal mine family who were very generous to the local community. Next passed Pinkmead Cottage reputed to be a smuggling haunt in by-gone days and once a pub called the Blue Anchor. Before

Botley was a boatshed hiring out rowing boats and on reaching Botley there were wharfs on the left to supply the village with essential goods. At the tidal limit was Botley Mills that dates back to the Domesday Book.

Ian retraced the route back to the fork of

the river and then took the right fork up the River Cur to the Horse & Jockey pub which was journey's end where refreshments could be taken!

Comments at the end of the meeting included what amazing pictures and scenes. I never knew that! Overall a very good talk and everyone enjoyed it.

... From ex Councillor Mr W. Allen enclosing plan and drawing attention of the Council to a piece of Common Land previously a duck pond in front of Admirals Court, and now included in that property. He had been given to understand that was originally Common Land, at which time a gravel pit was dug there and the owners of the adjoining property wired it off to protect children from falling in ...

MAY 1968

50 YEARS AGO - Cul-de-Sac off Sydney Avenue

Proposing that that the road of the new estate be known as Sydney Gardens ... opposed the suggestion ... put forward the following alternative proposals ... Flowers Gardens or Flowers Close to commemorate the late Mr A. Flowers on whose land the estate is being built.

MAY 1968

25 YEARS AGO - Public Landing Facility

The new public pontoon, landing stage was fixed in place on 21st May 1993.

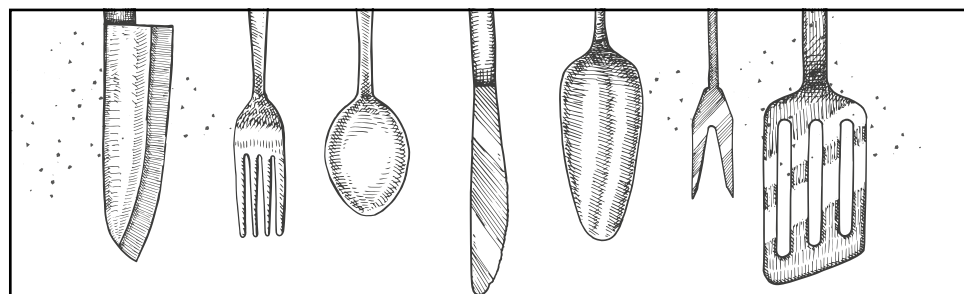
