These will all be either Pfizer or Moderna vaccines.





Dear Friends,

I hope you have all had a peaceful and blessed Easter time. We now enter the month of May, and we prepare for all the excitement it brings. Spring is in full force, the days are getting longer, and flowers burst into life all around us (including Forget-me-nots, which are probably my favourite flower!) Winter feels well and truly behind us, and we look ahead to the optimism of Summer.

But May also reminds us of the power of ordinary things, and ordinary people. For every Sunday in the season of Easter, and therefore every Sunday in May, most churches around the world use a reading from the book of Acts as one of the readings in their Sunday services. Indeed, the instruction to use a reading from the book of Acts lasts all the way to the middle of June!

It might seem like a strange thing that we have to do, until we have another look at Acts, and realise the significance of what the book is describing.

Tradition holds that it was written by Luke, the same Luke who wrote the Gospel bearing his name, and it begins straight after the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. It's almost like a 'Luke part 2'. We hear about the first days and weeks of the growth of Christianity, from a small group of Jesus' followers to churches planted in towns and cities throughout the Roman world. We hear stories of bravery, sacrifice, oppression, imprisonment, and courage. We hear dramatic accounts of visions, great speeches, sermons, prison breaks and even shipwrecks! But we also hear vivid descriptions of how God's Holy Spirit was at work through the lives of people; ordinary people.

As we work our way through the book, we encounter this more and more. God using normal people to do extraordinary things. And then we soon reach an amazing conclusion: that the church we know and love, the church in our villages and towns, the church all over the world, the church that has been there for us in those big and important times in our lives, owes its existence to ordinary people. People like you and me. People chosen by God to be extraordinary.

And this then leads us to an amazing thought. God uses us too. We too are part of God's amazing plan. As ordinary people. Extraordinary in the eyes of God.






The Honeypot Book Reviews

The GIORDANO BRUNO SERIES of seven historical fiction books by S.J. Parris. I may be biased but as an ardent fan of historical fiction, this series, to me, is one of the best.

The author, S.J. Parris, is the pen name of Stephanie Merrett who read English Literature at Cambridge University and whilst there became fascinated by the rich history of Tudor England. The main character is based on Dr Giordano Bruno, a former Dominican friar in Italy, excommunicated by the Catholic hierarchy for publishing books not Heresy: approved by the church. He was a real person. After he came to England he was recruited as a spy by Queen Elizabeth Ist's spymaster, Francis Walsingham. Many fictional mystery adventures ensue and can be enjoyed by

Shrewsbury below street level

A history lecturer at the Gateway, in Shrewsbury, (who was delivering one of the courses of the then Birmingham University School of Continuing Studies), once recommended that his students should always be sure to peer into a hole in the ground, for what it might contain! So, walking up Castle Gates one day then I did just that, and there, very close to the old cinema which is now a bingo hall, were the unmistakable massive stone foundations of the original castle gate to the town. Within a few days they were concealed again as work ended and the hole was filled in, but wait to be re-discovered one day.

Years later, mid COVID19 pandemic, an opportunity for an unusual peer into the past presented itself.

On a mid-summer evening and just at the end of the first lockdown, a dozen or so two-man canoes were launched from the ramps near the Frankwell car park for a river level exploration of the town's history along the river loop. Among them was a pair of novice canoeists, me and my daughter Jenny, and with Dr. Nigel Baker leading the way and showing us the points of interest from this completely new aspect.

If you look across the river from Theatre Severn you can see that the Smithfield Road carriageway has been extended out over the river. It was under here that we made our first stop, being shown the outlets of huge drains that used to tip animal waste, blood and assorted mess from the livestock market at the Smithfield – now the site of the bus station – into the river.

Just imagine the stink!

After the Norman conquest monastic orders were given permission to establish friaries, not only for religious purposes but also for the support of the poor and sick. In Shrewsbury the Dominican, Benedictine, Franciscan and Augustinian orders all set up their friaries, and underneath that upmarket eatery 'The Armoury' are still the remains of part of the Augustinian, or Austin, friars' priory. (Not far away is Priory School – remains have also been found there). It was not to last: much later the decaying remnants of the priory tower overlooking the river were to become a tannery, making its own vile contribution to the filth pouring down Shrewsbury streets from yet more tanneries, and Butcher Row itself, all to be disgorged into the Severn.

That priory tower had been built to guard a ford – this is before the artificially high river level created by the weir further downstream – but further crossings had to be by ferry before any bridges were built. Keeping to the right of the river below the Boathouse pub, Nigel showed us, on the opposite bank, a post which is the only remnant of one of the many chain ferries once used, and I suppose paid for, by those making the crossing. Paying to cross is still with us if we don't want to take a longer route, for next we passed under Kingsland Toll bridge, with the buildings that were the workhouse, now part of Shrewsbury School, high above us.

More paddling, not *much* arguing, but with increasingly aching hips (!), we passed under Greyfriars bridge, with the Franciscan friary walls still to be seen on the town side. Further along, a detour into the Rea Brook allowed us to see where there was once another little stream parallel to the main river, nearer to the Abbey.

This was the Benedictines' foundation, and successful in a way that all the others weren't, for de-

spite the machinations of Henry VIII we still have an abbey! The red sandstone used to build it was brought up river from Eyton on Severn, having been quarried from the river cliff.

The English Bridge was constructed from Grinshill stone, and although of exactly the same geological period as the abbey's red sandstone a quirk of plate tectonics or volcanic activity has altered the colour to a very pleasing creamy grey. Grinshill stone was also used for the Welsh Bridge, the Old Market Hall in the Square, the Column, the library (the original Shrewsbury School), the station and numerous other build-



ings and churches in the county and beyond. It was even used at Chequers and No.10!

At river level, to be seen by only a few, are some beautifully carved dolphins – how marvellous that someone had such pride and skill in their work to take so much trouble!

The last of the friaries, at Blackfriars - Dominicans – has also disappeared, again present in name only. St. Mary's water gate, just below, played a crucial role in our national history and that of the town, when Parliamentarian troops were let, traitorously, into the town through it, - and we have a local, modern connection to it: McMillan Masonry worked on the restoration a few years ago!

By now we had paddled in very nearly a complete circle around the town, yet here the distance between us and the start was only about 200 yards. With rising land it made a superb location for the castle and defence of the town. Next to it, the station platforms extend out over the river, resting on not one, but two bridges, which I'd never realised before.

Through the bridge and onward came what seemed to be loud traffic noise, but this was the sound of water rushing over the weir: our journeys end. Not a watery end though, for several people from the canoe hire company were strategically placed in canoes ready to catch us before we plunged over to who knows what kind of fate!

I had thought my poor old hips might never work again, sitting so long in a strange position, but as we walked back through Castlefields, still enjoying the late sun of mid-summer, we were thankful to have been 'unlocked' to enjoy this unique experience.

Church Stretton Medical Practice.

An Update from the Strettondale Patient Participation Group Committee. March 2022 The Medical Practice Manager recently met with a member of the PPG to clarify some arrangements for patients at Stretton's GP surgery. The aim being to increase patient understanding and encourage best service.

Shropshire has a lower density of population than many other counties and will benefit from the creation of Primary Care Networks (PCN), Church Stretton being a part of the South-West Shropshire PCN which enables practices to work together in order to provide patients with an enhanced service. Digital technology is used in all areas of life and increasingly, processes such as 'Patient Access' and 'e Consult' will become normal as methods of initiating contact with a GP via our mobile phones. A number of Church Stretton's patients already use this system. E-consult is a particularly useful tool if you have online access, as the Practice is contracted to reply within 48 hours, so this is quicker than waiting for a routine appointment.

For those who prefer, there is the telephone system for contacting our Medical Practice and as Covid 19 remains a problem, this is the preferred option. The Medical Practice is well-able to respond, even though NHS England guide-lines are regularly being amended which provides an additional challenge to them.

Church Stretton Practice is open Monday- Friday 8.30am – 6pm. Routine advice or appointments are available on Saturdays and evenings at one of the other practices in the South-West Primary Care Network. At the moment these are predominantly telephone appointments. However, if you are prepared to travel you could be seen in Ludlow, Craven Arms, Bishops Castle or Clun - an appointment is made through the Church Stretton Practice.

Same day appointments are available each day if patients feel they have a problem that cannot wait for a routine appointment. In order to get a timely appointment with the most suitable clinician, patients need to clearly communicate with the receptionist what the problem is and they can consider seeing someone other than their registered GP, in order to possibly be seen sooner. The receptionists are fully trained to listen carefully to requests in full confidence and direct a patient to the most appropriate member of staff to deal with their problem or query. The GPs do not work every day, and also have responsibilities additional to seeing patients, so they may not always be available when you need to see them. This may result in a routine appointment being some time into the future should a patient ask to see a specific person. Each doctor has a specific area of interest: eg. diabetes, mental health, minor surgery, GP training, as well as responsibilities related to managing the Practice and this can also affect availability, although the Practice works hard to try and keep this to a minimum.

Patient's general health checks will be returning in the near future as part of the Practice routine and will be carried out by a nurse in the first instance.

Constructive comments from patients are much welcomed by the SPPG and are shared with the Practice Manager, so do make use of the comments box in the surgery. There is no obligation to include your name, however, should it involve a specific patient's need, a name is necessary so that the Practice can be told to whom it relates. Alternatively, the need can be mentioned to a receptionist upon arrival.

Our GP practice is a well-organised team of sympathetic, caring professionals who are committed to providing patients with the best service possible which, as patients become more aware of the system, can be increasingly successful. All patients are members of the Strettondale Patient Participation Group and therefore able to work through the SPPG committee to influence our GP service for the good of all.

Additional support for landowners with diseased trees and woodlands in the Shropshire Hills

With new and emerging tree diseases, the health of our local woodlands continues to be of some concern. Ash dieback, a disease caused by the fungal pathogen Hymenoscyphus fraxineus, is spreading across the UK and its impact is accelerating in the Shropshire Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

The loss of ash, along with the wildlife it supports, both at a woodland scale and as an individual tree will have a significant impact on the Shropshire Hills landscape. We hope to limit this by promoting sensitive management to safeguard remaining ash trees and woodlands.

A recently launched Forestry Commission tree health pilot grant scheme is providing additional support for landowners with disease affected trees and woodlands. The Shropshire Hills is one of four protected landscapes where this pilot is being run.

It is targeted within the AONB and where there may be risk to the public from diseased trees. Grants are specific to each species and rates vary dependent on whether trees are within or outside of a woodland setting. The following tree species are eligible:

Ash with dieback (Hymenoscyphus fraxineus)

Larch with Phytophthora ramorum

Sweet chestnut with blight (Cryphonectria parasitica) or Phytophthora ramorum

Dependent on species and woodland setting there is support for road closures, protected species surveys, restocking and maintenance, felling, chemical killing, Infrastructure/access and biosecurity. There is also funding for infrastructure to isolated and hard to reach woodlands.

These grants are in addition to the Countryside Stewardship Tree Health Scheme.

Lynn Cawley, Chief Officer of Healthwatch Shropshire, said "We know how difficult these conversations can be but we wanted to give the public the chance to find out how they might be supported, to ask questions about the services available and to hear about the practical and emotional steps we all need to take to be ready at the end of our lives.' Alison Massey, who leads on Palliative and End of Life Care for Shropshire Telford and Wrekin NHS Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "Death and dying affects us all but it's still a subject that we often struggle to talk about with our loved ones and properly plan for.

"Over the past year we have worked together with people with experience of end of life care services and both Shropshire and Telford and Wrekin Healthwatches to understand how we can grow a public conversation about death and dying. In the run up to this event we are also working with libraries across the county to offer information and support to people on planning future conversations.

"I really welcome this event and would encourage people to come along to find out what support is available and what we can all do to prepare ourselves and our loved ones. This will be a safe space to ask your questions and hear from people who specialise in caring for people at the end of their life."

Healthwatch Shropshire is the independent consumer champion for health and social care in Shropshire. It gathers the views and experiences of patients, service users, carers, and the general public about services including hospitals, GPs, mental health services, community health services, pharmacists, opticians, residential care and children's services.
