# **NOTES FROM THE MAY 2022 PARISH COUNCIL AGM**

Present – all Parish Councillors and Clerk, three members of the public. Apologies from Ward and County Councillors and PCSO Andy Jones.

**Chairman 2022-23** Alan Tyler was re-elected unanimously.

**Neighbourhood Plan Update** The Pre-submission (Regulation 14) Consultation is complete. All responses will be carefully considered and the Consultant will be instructed to assist with the preparation of the Submission Plan to BDBC (Regulation 15).

**Local Plan Update** – housing numbers. Agreed the Parish Council supports proposals to achieve overall reduction in housing numbers.

**Pond update** HCC contractors have completed silt clearing, a good job, the remaining tonnes of silt have been removed from around the margins. Thanks have been formally given to HCC and Cllr Juliet Henderson.

Pavement on Farleigh Road from Village to footbridge – narrowed by encroaching vegetation and debris. Request for path to be cleared has been logged, with photos, on the HCC website. The Parish Lengthsman can't take on the task as their green waste carrier won't take the roadside debris.

**Proposal to replace road name signs** in the Village agreed by BDBC providing at Parish Council expense.

**Verge Cultivation Licence** – application to be submitted to HCC for Station Road verges and around corner bank into Hackwood Lane to the Village Hall entrance road.

**Year end accounts and audit** forms completed and signed.

Budget agreed for village road signage plus additional funding for consultants to complete submission draft of Neighbourhood Plan if needed.

Councillor Code of Conduct On 24 March 2022 BDBC approved a new Code of Conduct for Councillors – in turn based on the LGA Model Code of Conduct – which will be implemented following the local elections as from 9 May 2022. Legislation does not require Parish Councils to adopt the Code of Conduct of their principal authority but the Committee on Standards in Public Life 'acknowledges there are merits in achieving consistency'. Agreed unanimously to adopt the New Model Code of Conduct.

**Newsletter distribution** Discussed pros and cons of returning to paper copies for everyone. At present there

is a limited paper copy distribution. 'What we want to achieve is a service to the Parish but also a means of sharing information.' Agreed a question to put to the Parish Assembly.

Community resilience – Generator and community use of the Village Hall. The Village Hall Committee has agreed to the Parish Council undertaking a feasibility study on providing a generator for the Hall. Reasons against might be the considerable outlay and a generator would be used so rarely. To consider the reason for having a generator – to provide a 'community power hub' – warmth, light, company, and access to power to charge phones etc, in the event of a power cut in all parts of the Village.

A generator could power and run the oil heating for a part of the hall. Of course if – as during the February storms Eunice and Franklin – the Village Hall continues with power, the generator wouldn't be needed, but Community use could potentially work around bookings? Again agreed, a subject for the Parish Assembly.

# VILLAGE HALL MEETING WITH HAMPSHIRE POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER DONNA JONES

Meeting start 6pm. Simon Barker welcomed everyone to the meeting on behalf of the Parish Council. Introductions from County Cllr Juliet Henderson to Hampshire Police & Crime Commissioner Donna Jones, new PCC Deputy Terry Norton, Korine Bishop Strategic Rural Policing Inspector, PC Ross Holdsworth and PCSO Andy Jones. Approx 40 other attendees including public, former police officers, landowners and parish councillors.

Donna Jones was keen to say that she has pledged officer numbers over and above Hampshire's allocated share of new officers. Officer basic training is two years, so the batch of new officers recruited two years ago are now being deployed.

Concern raised from some Parish Councillors that officers now don't attend all Parish Council meetings as PC Reid used to. A counter argument was also put forward that as officers are not on call practically 24/7 – again as Andy Reid used to be – they are generally better employed out working than attending Parish Council meetings. An emailed update is appreciated.

That said, the personal touch is important, it is useful to have opportunities for discussion (such as the Parish Assembly) and for residents to meet their local community officer.

A common theme from the floor was that austerity over years has left rural policing so under-resourced that organised criminals have been given the opportunity, effectively free rein, to move in. This organised crime is now established and requires a lot more police resources. It is not the experience of rural businesses that the police are available to protect them.


Speeding in rural villages was also mentioned. PC Ross Holdsworth suggested local officers may have some availability for speed checks.


Meeting ended c8pm with thanks to Village Hall Committee and the Ballet School as usual users for changing their plans to allow for the meeting.

# BDBC LOCAL PLAN UPDATE SITE SELECTION Basingstoke and Deane Local Plan Update

Policy SS3: Sites Allocated for Residential/Mixed Use Development

THE MAPS BELOW are taken from the published *Agenda Reports Pack* for EPH (Economic Planning & Housing Committee) for discussion at the Thursday 9th June meeting 6.30pm - 9.30pm.) Larger sites which continue in the development short list are Manydown South and Popham airfield.

'Policy SS3 [as proposed] allocates a number of sites for housing-led development, which include small, medium and large sites and also previously developed sites.

'The three largest allocations from the adopted Local Plan have been retained and updated as these will continue to be built out over the new Local Plan Period, ie Manydown North, Hounsome Fields and Basingstoke Golf Course.'

'5.1 A key role of the Plan is to outline the strategy for meeting the borough's housing needs over the Plan period and ensuring a five-year supply of deliverable sites. The Council does not support national Government's current approach to setting housing need figures and further work is being completed to consider what a suitable housing requirement for the borough may be, based on local circumstances. This will also include a review of the information from the 2021 Census, which will start to be published from the summer onwards, to assess whether there are local exceptional circumstances in terms of the housing needs figure.'

# THE GREENING CAMPAIGN



Report from the May 2022 Parish Assembly

Members of the Assembly were asked to raise their hands if they have children or grandchildren, many do. 'Are they concerned about Climate Change?' All are. The question: 'Is there anything we can do?'

So, yes there is. It is impossible to tackle the whole problem as one: but we can achieve in small 'bite-sized' pieces. Like revising for exams, the whole is daunting and cramming doesn't work long term. If we improve a bit at a time our confidence and effectiveness increases.

The Greening Campaign offers a strategy to achieve many small changes which can add up to a significant whole. It is about everyone coming together, about what each person, friends and family, can do together within the community.

Community-led action adds up. About 180 communities around the country have joined the Greening Campaign, the majority in Hampshire where it was started.

The first Phase is about engagement. Everyone receives a Green Card with eight challenges for changing little things of everyday life. If you're prepared to sign up to five of these challenges, put the card in your window to show your commitment.

These challenges are 'standard' to enable a simple calculation of how much overall the community has reduced carbon emissions.

BDBC will support by paying for the joining fee, HCC support by funding expertise, including from the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust to support further individual and community projects.

The Assembly agreed unanimously in favour of Cliddesden joining the Greening Campaign.

Re the Speed Camera Van, only have two vans and have to prioritise. Potential for local officers to allocate some time with hand held speed guns.

The Chairman asked to put on record our appreciation for the work Mark Ruffell has done as Ward Councillor over the last 20 years.

Thanks to PCSO Andy Jones for the work he does on our behalf.

Thanks to all Newsletter editors and distributors.

**Pond clearing** – Thanks to all who contributed to the effort to push for this work to be done – Parish Councillors, residents and County Councillor Juliet Henderson. Thanks have been conveyed to Hampshire County Council's 'Operation Resilience' and their contractors for a good job finally done.

**Neighbourhood Plan** Thanks to the team for their work, report will follow. **Welcome Pack** Thanks to residents for volunteering to put a welcome pack together, these apparently small things can make a big different to people.

**Speed in indicator devices** (SID) These definitely continue to slow people down but maybe for only a 100 yards or so. Thanks to Andy Fewster for downloading and compiling the speed data.

**NEWSLETTER** – A question for the Assembly. The majority of *Newsletter* distribution was moved to email during Covid – for all those who submitted their email address and requested a pdf copy. It was felt to be the right way forward at the time. We'd now like to review this. Would you prefer hard copy? Assembly discussion & comments

- Many people say they don't see the *Newsletter*, they forget it's on there on their phones.
- Would be good to know how many people do read it.
- Receive the email copy and then print it out, prefer to read on paper.
- Receive 90-odd emails in a day, one easily gets lost, or filed and forgotten
- Is a paper copy any different? Easily discarded. If on your phone, always there when you get a minute to read it.
- It is more expensive and more energy use overall if people are printing individually rather than using a professional print run
- A much bigger task for volunteer distributors to deliver to everyone.

**EMERGENCY POWER** – Question put to the Assembly. Is there value in an emergency plan for the village? For provision in the event of a major power cut for somewhere, like here, always with heat and light? Somewhere the Village can go to other than to hotels or relatives. Such emergencies will increasingly happen. The Parish Council is looking for feedback. Comments

- The Village Hall was recently on the half grid that retained power, historically it has not suffered from power cuts.
- It's good to have a place people can come in the event of a major power failure. Good particularly for older people to know there is somewhere with power and also company.
- To consider issues: one is feasibility circuitry, generator
- Another, is to decide what triggers an emergency
- And how does the Hall prioritise bookings versus community?
- If the Hall is without power, the insurance would cover compensation.
- Would take a very big generator to power all the Hall for a function.
- A generator could power and run the oil heating for a part of the hall to provide a 'community power hub' – hot drinks and food and to power to charge phones etc.

ASSEMBLY AGREED UNANIMOUSLY to a feasibility study for a generator.

**THE PARISH COUNCIL** meets six times per year, it would be good to see more people. This is your village, your Parish Council really need to see and hear from you and the wider community.

# ARMED FORCES DAY CONVOY 25 June 2022

Charity fundraising event for the RBL Riders Branch based on the D-Day 75th anniversary convey.

Convoy departs Southwick House, Southwick Park, 10am, arriving Milestones at approximately noon. We expect to pass the junction of the Farleigh Road Cliddesden and the A339 at 11.50am

Organised by volunteers on behalf of the Royal British Legion Riders Branch. We hope villagers will be able to turn out to watch this special event.

A 'welcome convoy' event will be open at Milestones (event field adjacent – free admission) from 9am to 5pm with various activities.

Route and convoy information

The convoy will depart Southwick PO17 6EJ at 10am. The Lord Lieutenant of Hampshire will preside at the official start event.

Two motorcycle outriders will travel five minutes ahead of the convoy.

A Ford Ranger safety vehicle will lead the sixty-vehicle convoy. The lead vehicle will be followed by two Dodge Command Cars, from which Salutes will be given. Salutes will be acknowledged by Dignitaries at Wickham, West Meon, and Alton. A coach carrying veterans and guests will drive behind the Command Cars.

At the rear of the convoy a contingent of Falklands Veterans will be riding as members of the Royal British Legion Riders Branch.

From Southwick the convoy will travel via the B2177 to Wickham, along the A32 through Droxford, Corhampton, and Warnford, to arrive in West Meon at approximately 10.25am.

The journey continues to Privett, East Tisted and Farringdon to arrive at the A31 Alton at approximately 10.45am. The convoy will continue along The Butts in Alton, then to the B3349 to Lasham Airfield where it will stop over untill 11.40am. Then departing on the A339 for Milestones for a noon arrival.

This is a free public event, organised by Royal British Legion volunteers to coincide with Falklands 40th and HM the Queens Platinum Jubilee Year.

# POLICE UPDATE FROM PCSO ANDY JONES

Cooking oil has been stolen from local licensed premises – this particular crime is at the moment is prevalent nationwide. Cooking oil once filtered is used as diesel equivalent. Police have been given some good CCTV footage, we have descriptions of vehicles as well as indexes and know where the vehicles are registered (out of county).

Offenders have visited relevant business addresses early in the morning or during the business day, wearing a high visibility tabard to look official – though with incorrect spelling of the name of the company they claim to represent!

**Plant machinery** is being targeted and in the last month three machines have been stolen from Weston Patrick and one from Upton Grey. Police have descriptions and part registration numbers of vehicles potentially involved, enquiries are ongoing.

Country Watch officers are issuing warnings that dogs should be kept on leads in rural areas. This follows a number of incidents of dogs chasing and in some cases attacking sheep; sheep can die of stress as well as injury. The owner or person in control of the dog can be prosecuted, and the dog can be shot by the farmer to end an attack.

## **Reporting to the Police**

**999** For when a Crime is Happening now. For example: 'Offenders are on the scene... / just left in a vehicle heading in direction... / make and colour of car is...' Units will be deployed on 'blues & twos'.

**101** For non-emergency, where nothing is lost by not having an immediate response. Example: 'Overnight my garage was broken into. Offenders are not on site.'

**Online** This way you can report in your own time without waiting on the phone; also photographs and other documents can be uploaded. # **BOB KEW (1928-2021)**

# A LIFE IN CLIDDESDEN

When Bob's family asked me to write a few words about his role in the life of Cliddesden, I thought that should be easy enough. I had after all known Bob for many years and worked with him on many village events. However, when I started to do some research I realised I didn't know the half of it. His involvement in village life was truly remarkable.

I'll start with the parish of St Leonard, because he was involved in the care and running of this church for so many years and influential in all aspects of church life. He was churchwarden from the late 1980s, ending with his retirement in 2002. For the later part of this period Margaret acted with him and one of their finest achievements was to devise and lead what became very popular family services. That was a real innovation.

He was always practical and hands on, doing maintenance and other work personally, beyond the call of duty. For example, he made the two noticeboards in the porch. He also made the high stool Ross Palmer uses when he plays guitar at services.

He pretty well singlehandedly organised the attendance of priests to take our services during the interregnum in 1994 and before the appointment of John Hamilton the following year. This is a really onerous job, finding a priest for every service!

It was Bob who was responsible for turning the greater part of the churchyard into a nature reserve, and for negotiating its designation as an official Site of Importance for Nature Conservation, or SINC. This was a great achievement and an enduring legacy for Bob A noticeboard explaining the SINC is going to be put up in the churchyard, hopefully in the near future.

An interest nearly as great as the church was gardening. He was a real expert, grew masses of produce in his large garden, and took a great interest in the Three Villages Horticultural Society, initially as a triumphant exhibitor at the annual flower and vegetable shows and later in various roles on the Society's committee.

He also wrote articles about gardening in the village Newsletter which are still interesting to read, showing his deep knowledge. He wrote these articles under the pen name TREBOR, which probably didn't fool many people!

Speaking of the Newsletter, Bob was its second Editor when the founding Editor Wally Hatcher died in 1978. I think he was stepping into the breach to keep it going. His interesting editorials suggest he enjoyed the job, but he gave it up after only a couple of years to be succeeded by my wife, Shirley. Those were pioneering days for the Newsletter and Bob



played an important part in getting it established as the village institution we enjoy today. Another legacy.

I must also mention the football club, which he revived in the 1970s with the help of his friend Ralph Gates and which he kept going for some years through sheer persistence. I have been told he was manager, coach and referee! He wrote regular match reports in the Newsletter recording triumphs and disasters on the field. One year they missed promotion by a whisker and in another they were sadly relegated. My friend Brian Ballard, also closely involved, tells me that a real problem was that latterly they lost their pitch in Cliddesden and had to play on the public pitches in the Memorial Park and so lost village support and the club closed again in the 1980s.

Something I had forgotten about was that he got elected to the Cliddesden Parish Council in 1976, coming top of the poll in a rare election. Usually there are the same number of candidates as there are vacancies.

At about the same time Bob joined the Board of Managers at Cliddesden Primary school. He resigned from both after four years. Did even he feel he was taking on too much? I'm afraid I can't offer more information about these two activities, but there he is again, getting involved in yet more important village duties.

Naturally he was less active in his later years, although deep into old age and until not that many years ago, he could be seen in all weathers helping Ken with the maintenance of the grounds at the village hall, to be rewarded by tea and cake and a chat at Pat and Ken's. I think that is a good image on which to close.

## Horticultural Society News for June 2022

### Hello from Claire!

I had an amazing experience the other day – stepping outside at around 630 in the morning, a young stag was on the bank in the garden. We stared at each other for a few seconds, then he bounded away.

My first thought was 'WOW, what a great way to start the day!' My second thought was 'I hope he wasn't munching on my roses!' I love all the wild creatures around us, however sometimes.......

Just because Mother Nature is taking care of the wildlife, flora and fauna, it doesn't mean she can do everything by herself. Here are the top tips from the RHS about activities to enjoy in our gardens this month.

- 1: Position summer hanging baskets and containers outside
- 2: Be water-wise, especially in drought affected areas
- 3: Pinch out side shoots on tomatoes

- 4: Harvest lettuce, radish, other salads and early potatoes
- 5: Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds
- 6: Mow lawns at least once a week however consider leaving some areas uncut for wildlife
- 7: Plant our summer bedding
- 8: Stake tall or floppy plants
- 9: Prune many spring-flowering shrubs
- 10: Shade greenhouses to keep them cool and prevent scorch

# **Beggarwood Surgery**

**News from the PPG (Patients Participation Group)** email: beggarwood.surgeryppg@btinternet.com

**Update May 2022** As you are all aware our surgery is now being operated by the Operose Group of companies. This is the same group that operate the Camrose, Gillies and Hackwood (CGH) surgeries around our area. The transition from our former operator (NHUC) seems to have gone reasonably well with a couple of exceptions due not to Operose but NHS England. Obviously, the plan from Operose is to maximise their operation and we will eventually become fully absorbed into CGH partnership. This will have some benefits to the Beggarwood patients in that we can gain access to a broader range of services and holiday cover will be less traumatic etc. We, the Beggarwood PPG, are now aware of plans that Operose would like our PPG to join the larger CGH PPG and we are seeking your views on this proposal. This might mean that our 'voice' within Operose could become diminished but on a more positive note the CGH PPG could add extra weight to any problems that arise.

What are your views on this? Please give this some thought and use the Beggarwood email address given above and below to let us know your thoughts.

Good news in that staffing levels at Beggarwood, both in the number of doctors, nurses and support staff, are fully up to plan with any necessary temporary shortfalls either occupied by locums or from the wider Operose group.

**Scams** It has come to our attention that a particular scam involving Covid and the need to take a PCR test is being propagated via a NHS type text either sent supposedly from the surgery or NHS England. This fake text asks you to pay for the PCR test and requests your bank details. Be aware that NHS will NEVER ask you for payment in a text or an email.

**Any Complaints?** If you feel that you have not been dealt with correctly by the surgery or perhaps not had a good experience in dealing with either the surgery or a member of staff you can make a formal complaint. In Beggarwood's case the correct email address is:

NHCCG.BEGGARWOODSURGERY@NHS.NET or by phoning or visiting the surgery and asking for a formal complaint form. The surgery then has a set number of days to investigate the situation and respond to your complaint/comment. If you feel after receiving the reply that it did not meet your expectations or did not correctly respond to you then you can then escalate the problem to the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) again via email: NHCCG.COMPLAINTS@NHS.NET or NHCCG.ENQUIRIES@NHS.NET. The CCG will carry out its own investigation and report back to you.

**PPG email address** To gather a wider patient view of Beggarwood Surgery we have decided to publish a NON-MEDICAL email address that will be viewed by the PPG team so that we can correlate your views into our regular meetings with the practice. Suggestions for input might be:

- The ease of booking an appointment or call back
- The surgery waiting area environment
- Helpful suggestions for improvements within practice
- Feedback on the reception and medical staff.

We look forward to receiving your comments.

Once again, we stress this is for Non-Medical feedback as we are not medically trained and the email address will only be monitored on an irregular basis.
