Message from the Chairman

I am very pleased to write that a Marketing and Town Development Officer has been appointed. One of the first tasks will be to revamp the Town Council's website to make it easier to search and navigate. The M&TD Officer will be working closely with the Council to help us to communicate more effectively with residents, including seeking residents' opinions on Council matters. The main duties also include marketing the Council services and facilities and promoting tourism.

Councillors have held several Council Awareness events to seek opinions and promote the Council's services and facilities. The main problems in Battle continue to be parking and congestion. Hopefully congestion will decrease next year when illegal parking in the town is addressed through Civil Parking Enforcement.



The Council hosted the first Town Forum in November. Representatives from local voluntary organisations, representatives and service providers were invited to consider Battle's strengths and weaknesses. Friendliness was on the list of strengths. I am so pleased that the town is frequently described as friendly. The list of strengths is very encouraging, but we will acknowledge and work to minimise the weaknesses. Of course, parking and congestion cropped up in the weaknesses. It is hoped that the next forum will consider actions that could boost the High Street.

In September, Council made a unanimous decision to move the Almonry project forward to invite tenders for the repair and refurbishment of the Almonry and the rebuilding of the south wing. This process is subject to reassessment at appropriate financial stages, prior to going to tender as well as after the tenders have been received. The Council will then have all the information needed to progress to a public consultation next year.



The new Christmas lights were chosen and funded by Battle Town Council – we very much hope you like them. Mike Robertson Associates Ltd kindly sponsored the has Christmas trees in the town.

Fire Safety Tips

Ensure you have a working smoke alarm installed on all levels of your home. It can give you vital time to escape a fire. Test your alarms regularly and never remove batteries to power presents!

Never leave cooking unattended. Avoid cooking whilst under the influence of alcohol and always turn off kitchen appliances when you have finished cooking.

Don't overload sockets – ensure only one plug per socket. Always turn off plugs when they are not in use, unless they are designed to be left on, like freezers.

Check that your Christmas tree lights conform to the British Standard (BS EN 60598). Always use an RCD on your outdoor electrical equipment. This device can save lives by instantly switching off the power if there is a fault and can be found in any DIY store.



Make sure that everyone in your home knows what to do if there is a fire: get out, stay out and call 999.

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Service of Remembrance

Members of Battle Town Council felt very proud to be joined by service veterans, emergency service representatives and uniformed youth groups who marched through the town from the Market Road to the Parish Church of St Mary the Virgin for the Service of Remembrance. Residents lined the streets to watch and the church bells rang out to welcome us.

In silence, the young people marched and walked behind their flags, respectful and aware of the significance of the 100th anniversary of the first



Armistice parade. We may no longer have veterans from WW1 marching with us, but our gratitude to service personnel is as strong now as it was 100 years ago.





Dean Lee led the service with impeccable timing and ATC cadets read out the names of service men and



women from Battle who died in the World Wars in clear measured tones. Councillor Caroline Would, a retired RAF Officer, read the lesson. Many of those who were inside the church commented on the volume of confident voices from the children as they joined in the Lord's prayer.

The wreath laying followed the service, before the march back to enjoy refreshments at Café 10, provided through generous donations from Battle Rotary Club, Jempsons, Tiger Tees Ltd and Battle Abbey School.

The Council would also like to express their thanks to Matthew Wickerson for marshalling the parade and to Battel Bonfire Boyes for manning the road closures.

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Battle Civil Parish Neighbourhood Plan

The steering group of the Battle Civil Parish Neighbourhood Plan is preparing for the first major presentation of the plan, which is known as "Regulation 14". In this, we present large documents to Rother District Council for a six week consultation period. This is likely to take place from 6th January (so avoiding the inevitable "shut-down" over the Christmas/New Year break).

The Steering Group has been consolidating many pieces of information and altering some aspects because the goalposts have been moved. We had prepared a list of areas we wanted to protect from future development and these were called "Strategic Gaps". We were advised by Rother District Council that this was not entirely appropriate, and that these areas should be called "Green Gaps". Rother's own Strategic Gap along the A2100 would remain in place, to prevent ribbon development between Battle and Hastings.

On a lighter note, we carried out a survey among the youth of the Parish (those aged 11 – 18), to see how they envisaged their future in Battle. Survey forms were distributed to Claverham College, Battle and Langton School, Netherfield School and Battle Abbey School. For example, at least 50% of those students who completed the survey hoped/expected to remain in Battle in ten years time. If they moved away, it was because of university or employment elsewhere. Positive "like" was the natural surroundings, good community feeling, youth groups. Dislikes were the lack of a swimming pool, poor facilities at night and in winter. A major gripe is poor broadband, mobile phone connections and lack of public transport in Netherfield. Rail transport on the other hand was appreciated by reason of the many towns within reach. Additionally there were some wishful comments, such as "Can Battle station be moved closer to town" and "Can new houses be pink?"

Community Focus

The Association of Carers

The Association of Carers, a charity that supports unpaid carers throughout East Sussex, is looking for more volunteers. Their main service is a free respite service, where a volunteer visits a family once a week and spends time with a person with support needs, enabling their carer to have a break. A volunteer might spend time chatting over tea, playing games or listening to music with the person they support. Or they may simply sit whilst someone sleeps, keeping them safe whilst the carer gets some time to themselves. Volunteers can also teach a carer basic computer skills, enabling them to do online shopping or banking, or keep in touch with family. These seemingly simple tasks make a carer's life a bit easier, and help them feel less isolated.

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Jane Caley, who works for the charity, says volunteers would ideally commit regular time for a minimum of one year. This gives people time to settle into a routine and build strong relationships. However, even if you couldn't commit for this long, they would still love to hear from you. The charity can be very flexible and work around people's lives.

Jane said: "Anyone over 18 is invited to volunteer with us. Many of our volunteers are slightly older, often retired, or people who have themselves been in caring roles. We'd love to recruit some younger people, and provide opportunities to build rewarding intergenerational relationships. We understand that work and family life can make volunteering difficult, but it might suit people who work part-time, or parents whose children are at school during the day."

The charity supports volunteers every step of the way, and volunteers are not required to carry out any personal care – the role is simply about providing company and keeping someone safe.

Battle Photographic Society

Battle Photographic Society and its predecessors, was formed in 1962 and aims to provide an informal, social atmosphere in which members can enjoy their photography and exchange experiences, ideas and views in the company of other photographers. The Society also encourages and supports members who wish to achieve external distinctions, such as those offered by the Royal Photographic Society.

The new season got off to a great start at the beginning of September with a Members' Evening, when seven new members were welcomed. Membership now totals 67. A series of lectures and a workshop were followed by the first Projected Digital Image competition, which the new members were encouraged to enter.



Members of BPS contributed prints and gave assistance to Battle Wildflower Meadows Group, in conjunction with Crowhurst Environment Group to create a photographic display of insects and wildflowers in the Library throughout Battle Festival in October and particularly at Dr. John Feltwell's well-attended lecture "Turning the Clock Back – Restoring Meadows" on 3rd October. Also displayed were photographs and an explanation of the ongoing work to "Rethink, Rewild and Restore" our wildflower meadows. Thanks are due to everyone who helped with this project.

More lectures and competitions will continue throughout the winter. Non-members may attend lectures for a nominal fee. One highlight will be the Christmas Social Evening in December. Humorous prints will be judged by all those present.

Some of the best speakers in the area have been booked; there will be competitions for prints and projected digital images and workshops on various aspects of photography to increase members' knowledge. Informal outdoor photoshoots are organised frequently. Meetings are held on most Mondays in the Shephard Room at the Memorial Hall, starting at 7:30pm.

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Battle and District Historical Society

On Thursday 5 December 2019, TV historian and author Dr Robert Hutchinson will talk about 'Henry VIII's Gangster' – the person who did all the dirty work for the king. His books include works on Henry VIII, Thomas Cromwell, the Spanish Armada and Colonel Blood.

Professor David Bates will talk on 'Writing a Biography of William the Conqueror' on Thursday 16th January 2020. Professor Bates, the new President of the Society, is a renowned historian of Britain and France from the 10th to the 13th century. His most recent book is a radical revision of the life of William the Conqueror.

Both meetings will take place in the Wynne Room of the Memorial Hall at 7.30 pm.

Battle Museum



Volunteers will be busy over the winter, getting the displays ready for the 2020 season which begins on 1st April. Next season's special exhibition will be about rare books of Battle. All the 800 odd displays have to be cleaned in order to maintain the standards remarked upon by the 12-13,000 visitors a year and by the Arts Council England. Their stocks of useful heritage leaflets for visitors eg Hidden History of the High Street, have to be re-edited and reprinted.

The Battle at War exhibition in the Library resulted in many new leads about the photos and, most importantly, a member of the public walked into the Museum with a photo of Battle's Violet Akehurst, 490th Heavy Anti Aircraft Battery. She died in November 1941, aged just over 16, the youngest woman to die in military service on the Allied side in the Second World War. Her photo is shown. A wreath will be laid at her grave in the Lower Cemetery in Battle Cemetery.

If you would like to volunteer to work in the Museum, you will find a friendly crowd, dedicated to promoting the town and its heritage. Usually the work involves being on duty half a day a week, 10-1 pm or 1pm to 4.30. There is a wide range of jobs to be done, including community and educational work, but being comfortable interacting with the public is essential. Full training is given. Beautiful Battle

Beautiful Battle celebrates its 15th anniversary this autumn. Its origins began in 2004, when a resident suggested planting 3000 daffodil bulbs. Tony Perkins funded a plan, which, with local help, he executed with military precision. Station Road in Battle was selected to be the first beneficiary of the 'Beautiful Battle touch' to enhance a main entry to the town for visitors.

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Over the years, Beautiful Battle continued to take on neglected areas of Battle and transform them into small floral gardens. Containers, tubs and hanging baskets were added. After a bumpy start, due to its guerrilla gardening approach, Beautiful Battle forged a lasting bond with Battle Town Council and now works closely with the BTC ground staff and the Town Clerk's Office.

The Town Council enters Battle into the Royal Horticultural Society's South & South East in Bloom competition and BB has managed the entries, winning nine Gold and eleven Silver Gilt awards since 2004 in the Town and Small Parks categories.

In 2009, Beautiful Battle was awarded the Queen's Award for Volunteers by the Lord Lieutenant. BB created a new garden to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012. In the same year, the group started the mammoth task of clearing the overgrown area in front of the library.

Beautiful Battle has over 100 members and around 15 dedicated volunteer gardeners. Their work is sponsored by 50 local businesses and Battle Town Council is the major contributor for the management of the Almonry and Abbey Green.

Congratulations to Battle Air Cadets



Many congratulations to 88 (Battle) Squadron, who have recently received the Marshall Trophy for the most improved Air Cadets Squadron in the UK. They were awarded the trophy for sustained improvement over a three year period and beat 360 other squadrons across the UK to win this highly acclaimed award.

Commandant Air Cadets, Air Commodore Dawn McCafferty, made the long trip down from Cadets HQ in Lincolnshire to present the award. As the final judge of the award, she said she was highly impressed by the increased numbers of cadets joining the Squadron, their recent successes in regional competitions, for example in flying, sport and drill, their presence in local parades and town events and the outstanding levels of leadership shown across staff and cadets alike. She was particularly blown away that all this was achieved without the Squadron having a stand alone facility of their own.

Battle Memorial Hall

The late summer and early autumn has, once again, been a busy period for the Hall. Apart from providing a service to the many groups, organisations and private individuals who regularly hire the variety of spaces available, the Management Committee had to wrestle with the problem of a leaky roof above the main hall area. On inspection, it was discovered that previous repairs had simply masked the problem and that a more substantial project would be required in order to provide a long term solution. How to deal with the asbestos covering the roof was a critical issue. To remove it would have been very expensive and require the closure of the whole building for a limited period. Working closely with a specialist contractor, the Hall Committee therefore opted for a solution involving the formation of a new spread roof over the entire area. The asbestos was left in situ as a sandwich, with rafters to form a vented cavity, the whole then being covered with single ply roofing and multi-foil insulation.

The Hall Committee was able to meet the cost thanks to the balance of a recent legacy, but such large expenditure has compromised the ability to implement another priority – the replacement of ageing cinema equipment. This was purchased some time ago as part of a scheme to provide tiered seating. Although this was successful and the project completed, the popularity of the monthly films was such that requests were made to continue with them. Audiences continue to grow with films specifically for children now being shown and organisations such as the Battle Festival taking advantage of the equipment. However, it is reaching the end of its natural life and about £8,000 is required to replace it. Having committed the bulk of its reserves to the roofing project, the Hall Committee is looking elsewhere for funds and is grateful to both the Battle Muffin and Rotary Clubs who have already made donations as well as a grant from the Town Council. An application has also been made to the District Council for a grant from its Community Fund, which, if successful, should enable the new equipment to be installed early in the New Year.



As mentioned above, the Hall continues to attract hirers for a wide variety of events and activities, large and small. Most recently the Wynne Room was used for a 70th Birthday Party and was dressed in a way which demonstrated just how much potential the space offers for private parties, functions, receptions etc.
