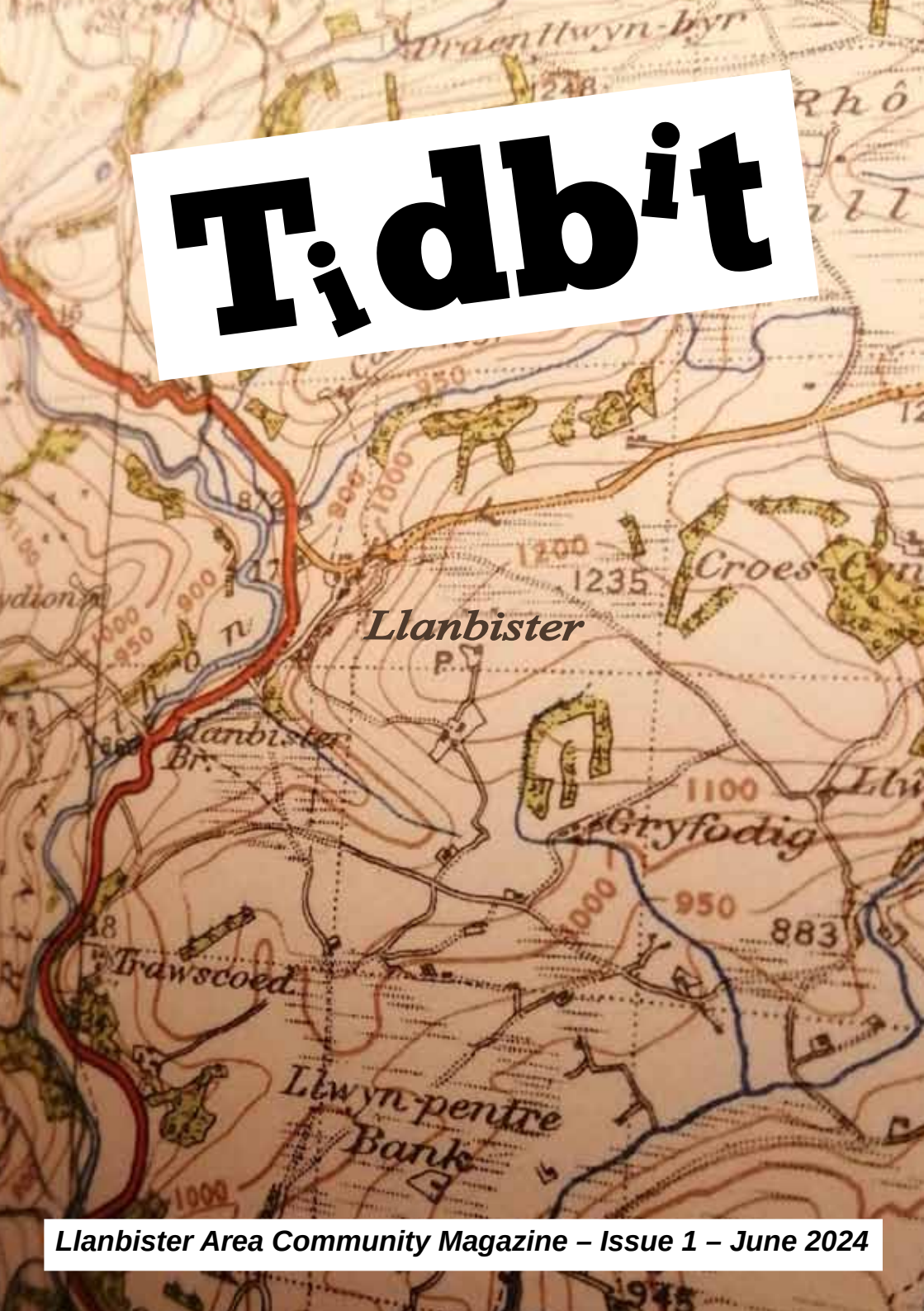

I would like to take this opportunity to thank them both as I wouldn't have done it by myself It was an experience I will never forget.


In March I voted against the Council Tax rise as I feel we are not getting a fair deal - the cuts are all coming off the one side of the cake.

LLANBISTER SHOW 2024

RAIN DOESN'T STOP PLAY!

Intermittent rain failed to dampen spirits at our Show on Bank Holiday Monday where a large number turned out to enjoy displays such as the Wye Valley Axemen and Wye Valley Falconry and the traditional attractions. Carriage Driving and a few stalls cancelled but all the regular activities like Crafts, Cookery, Produce, Art and Photography, Horse Show, Jumping, Dog, Sheep and Pig Shows, Children's Athletics, Vintage and Custom Vehicles wide variety of trade and community stalls went ahead as usual and poultry were welcome in the Fur'n Feather competition after several years of avian flu restrictions. The raffle organised by Margaret Grieve proved popular as ever, helped by some exceptionally generous prize donations from local businesses and individuals.

Cantal YFC excelled themselves with a barbecue and impressive range of cakes and sandwiches in the tea tent, a welcome refuge from the elements. The usual Car Treasure Hunt with fiendish clues by Geoff Morgan and a Speed Shearing competition at Llanbister Hall took place the day before.

We are grateful to visitors for co-operating with the new regulations which require all organisations, including even small shows, to sort and recycle all waste, and Powys County Council for providing bins, so the litter-picking and sorting was minimal.

Whilst the day passed off very well in the end, we still struggle with an overall shortage of helpers. Run entirely by volunteers, not only are hands needed on the day but it takes a huge amount of forward planning every year so we always need practical and organisational help, from putting up marquees, stewarding, litter-picking to admin support and many other tasks. The financial outcome looks fairly tight but when possible the Show donates surplus funds to local causes after annual expenses are covered and a sufficient reserve remains for the following year.

The committee records thanks to everyone who contributed to getting the event off the ground but especially to James Grieve who has stood down after many years as Treasurer and to Gerri Hughes who is handing over the Sheep Show. We were pleased to have had some good local press coverage (trusting that some people still read the newspapers!)

Meetings are open to anyone interested and usually held monthly from September to May/June. The Annual General meeting will be on Wednesday 16th October 7.30pm but there may be a special 'Meet the Gang' gathering in September for new volunteers and to celebrate the 102nd year of the Show!

Jude's (Rock House) gardening tips.

From Soggy Spring to Flaming June – we hope?

Flaming June brings summer colour and many plants are doing their best to out bloom each other, even in Radnorshire where we are often way behind more temperate places. If you happen to find yourself with a few moments to spare on a beautiful sunny day, take some time to sit and appreciate the garden that you and nature have produced together. Plants like roses, phlox and aquilegia will be trying to out do each other with glorious displays of colour and many flowers will be producing the most glorious scents - some will be stronger in the evening as dusk descends like Jasmine, Philadelphus (mock orange) or the aptly named Evening Primrose – great for planting around a garden bench.

If you're anything like me though, that activity will last all of 5 minutes because seeing a weed somewhere will distract you and before you know it you'll be down on your knees grafting away! If that's you, here's some things to keep you busy at this time of year - **dead heading** and **mulching**.

Dead heading is simply cutting off flowers that have finished before they turn

into seed pods. This directs the plant's energy into strong growth. In some cases it promotes the production of new flowers and prevents seeds forming which may spread a plant where you don't want it. Roses, pelargoniums (geraniums) and hanging basket plants will all benefit from dead heading however some plants produce seed heads that provide food for bird through the winter so are best NOT deadheaded. For example, ornamental thistle, teasel and miscanthus (ornamental grass).

Mulching means covering the soil with organic matter (grass clippings, bark, wood chips or leaves) to deter weeds, retain water and improve the condition of the soil. As our summers becomes drier, mulching plants can help roots stay cool and prevent excessive water evaporation. If mulching is to primarily prevent weed growth, try putting a layer of carboard (all tape removed first) on the soil first, then cover that with bark chips or garden shreadings. Grass mowings can be used in the same way at the back of borders or under shrubs, where its less easily seen, taking care to leave shrub stems clear to allow air to circulate.

Whatever you get up to, enjoy your garden!

After a 16 year absence, the Enduro World Championship returns to its home of Mid Wales. The EnduroGP of Wales will be run by Rhayader Motor Club and Saintswell Events and will start at Cwmythig Hill near Rhayader and use the Abbey woods to link in with Saintswell Enduro Centre.

“Its amazing to be bringing the event back to the UK and to Mid Wales, we have British world champions in the Men’s, Women’s and Junior categories and it seemed crazy that there wasn’t a round in the UK.

The event stands to bring in the region of 1 million pounds to Mid Wales with hotels, holiday lets and camp sites all filling up for the event as well visitors using local pubs, restaurants, shops and local attractions.” Adam Rees – EnduroGP of Wales, Event Director

The Event will consist of three days of racing starting with the SuperTest on Friday evening at Cwmythig Hill.

- The funding through the Arts Council for Wales meant continued visits and workshops from upbeat Dave, who is a real favourite with the children!
- The whole school visited St Fagans, as part of their topic of time travellers. The trip was supported by Governor Darren Rogers. The children each attended a workshop during the visit and had the opportunity to explore changes in Wales through time.
- The school held their annual Eisteddfod on 1st March. The children completed lots of art, singing and craft activities and it was well attended by parents.
- Children in years 5/6 have had a visit from Kathryn Vaughn (Year 7 Head of Year in Ysgol Calon Cymru). Kathryn was accompanied by some of last year's leavers and the children got to chat and ask questions, all in readiness for transition to high school.
- Two year 5 pupils have completed their Bronze young Ambassador training virtually on 7th February and the children also celebrated world book day by dressing up as their favourite characters.
- Debbie Cornelius has visited to school and met with Miss Powell to review progress in Welsh. The school is beginning to work towards the silver award for Siater Iaith.

School Improvement and monitoring has continued, and staff conducted a book look in Maths as part of their self-evaluation process. Following this, governor visits commenced with Rebekah Meredith and Tina Samuel (who oversee Maths and Numeracy) enjoying a learning walk, where they got to chat with learners of all ages, discuss their work and celebrate their success. Matthew Williams also spent a day in school with the staff and children, which was enjoyed by all and assisted Matthew in beginning his journey as a new parent governor.

Tina Samuel and Rachel Powell have also completed their Additional Learning Needs termly monitoring visit with Abi Powell, the school ALNCO, to ensure provision is in place for all learners, whatever their need.

The *staff* at the school are always looking for ways in which they can train to support learners further.

- Miss Wilson attended a creative circus course in January, so watch this space for new circus skills!
- Miss Hughes attended the final workshop with careers Wales in producing a resource for practitioners around Entrepreneurial learning. This will be shared across Wales during Careers week in March branded with the school's name. A brilliant way of showcasing our small village primary school.
- Miss Wilson and Miss Powell have started their training with Skip Cymru. This is an accredited course with the UWTSO and they have two more sessions to attend in the future. This course is fully funded by Powys Sports team.
- Miss Wilson also attended a sports games training session with Bach a Lach on 27th February.
- Miss Hammond continues to keep up with her supervisions that enable her to carry out her role as an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant (ELSA).

Llanbister School – pre-1927

In the early to mid-1920s my father Jack Wilding and his brother Arthur, and sisters Edith, Hester and Gladys attended the old Llanbister School, on the site where the Vicarage now stands, which is now a private house. There was one large room divided into 2 by a curtain screen. Mr. George Bennett taught the older children who could be up to the age of 14, and his wife taught the younger children. There was a larger unfenced gravel playground in the front, and the outside toilets were out at the back. The children had an hour for dinnertime. They spent their time jumping over the Dorddu Brook which at one time was full of trout, the little children often falling in. They also played hopscotch, marbles, and a game with 7 stones. A popular game was Fox and Hounds. The boys were hounds and barked like dogs and the girls were the foxes. They would chase the girls over the fields below the Methodist Chapel, and were often late back for afternoon school. When they were late back, they had the cane, mostly on their hands.

School finished at 3.30. When the family lived at Glanrafon they and other children walked to school. Other children walking with them were those from Treboith, Bwlch, Tynypant, Goitre and the Porth. The younger boys were allowed to hitch lifts by hanging on to the back of coal wagons coming up the road from Penybont Station.

Later the Wilding family lived at Grevodig. The five children walked to school across the fields via Llwynitch and Shop Farm. Walking with them were the Bricks from New House, and the Mills from Ffoesyffin. At Llwynitch there was a pool with geese and a gander who tried to attack them.

By the time they got to Shop Farm they could hear Mrs. Price milking the cows.

The girls' dresses were made by a dressmaker, who lived in a house on the side of road going up Llanbister Pitch. The house was demolished a long time ago.

Memories of a Distant and Smokey Past

The ghosts and memories of Llanbister Road Railway Station were given a welcoming reprise of yesteryear on Saturday Lunchtime of 20th April 2024 and the event that stirred the spirits of the past can be summed up in one word. That word is STEAM!



The Railway Touring Company UK had organised a spectacular 9 day tour of the UK entitled "The Great Britain XV1." The journey from Liverpool Lime Street Station passing through Central Wales via the Heart of Wales Line to Swansea was Day 5 of this event.

The excursion was double headed by two Ex LMS Stanier Class 5, 4-6-0, locomotives. Commonly known as the *Black Five's*. Introduced by locomotive engineer Sir William Stanier and built between 1934 and 1951.

In the early days the locomotives were known as the "*Black Staniers*" from their black livery in contrast to Staniers other class of 4-6-0, the LMS "*Jubilee Class*" which were painted crimson. Time passing, the nickname of the former became "*Black Five*", the number referring to the power classification. This from 1940 was shown on cab sides as the simple figure 5.

The locomotives resplendent in their black livery and pulling an 11 "*West Coast Railways*" coaching stock in crimson livery, were numbered **44871** (unnamed built March 1945) and **45407** "*The Lancashire Fusilier*" (Built September 1937)

The train was an amazing and exhilarating sight, as it literally thundered through the pretty, but sleepy Llanbister Road railway station, to the delight of the numerous individuals and families who had gathered on the platform and over bridge to watch, video and photograph the event. The memories of Llanbister Road must have been delighted to see so many persons upon the platform, even though the train did not stop! In the space of about 50 seconds it was all over, the echoes of the train bouncing back from the over bridge and surrounding hills as the train sped upon its journey towards Llandrindod Wells and Swansea. I witnessed some very happy children and adults reluctantly returning to their cars in the aftermath of the event.

Delicious Summer Dessert Recipe

Sherry Log

Ingredients

Sweet sherry

2 packs of chocolate chip cookies

600ml double cream

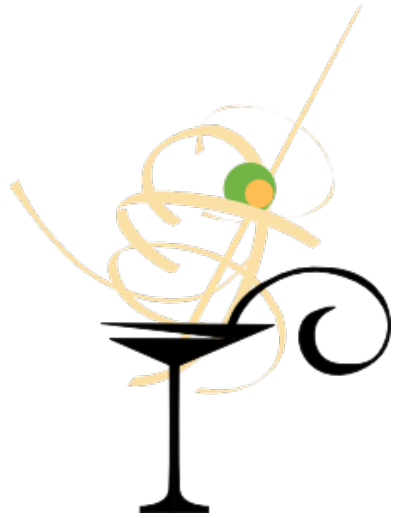
Flake

Instructions

Whip the cream to stiff peaks. Pour a little sherry into a shallow saucer. Dip a cookie into the sherry and spread with a little whipped cream. Repeat this process and sandwich the two biscuits together with one layer of cream on the outside. Stand on their side. Repeat with another cookie and add it to your row of biscuits.
