



Sully - Miracle On The Hudson November 15th 2025


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
Storyline:

The scheme is run by the Borderlands Rural Chaplaincy, which serves the agricultural community in Herefordshire, Shropshire and eastern Powys. It is an opportunity for farmers to meet and hear what is going on in other areas. Holding the gatherings on farms means people can turn up in their work clothes. If the meetings were in village halls where people felt the need to dress up, far fewer would come.

Llanfair Waterdine Community Trust

Over the past few months, Llanfair Waterdine Community Trust, alongside committed volunteers and community partners, has been working quietly but effectively behind the scenes to improve, maintain and plan for the long-term sustainability of the village's assets and services.

One key infrastructure upgrade completed recently is the installation of power points around the community field, a significant improvement that will support future outdoor events, catering, and activities. This, along with the successful hosting of multiple events at the Community Pavilion, highlights a renewed energy around village gatherings and social life.

The Trust also continues to take its responsibilities seriously when it comes to safety and compliance, with annual fire safety checks carried out and an ongoing review of panic alarms to ensure that vulnerable residents remain supported long-term. The AED project remains a vital community initiative, ensuring life-saving defibrillator access across the parish. Support for this project continues to be a top priority.

In addition to community safety, the Trust has been looking to the environment, working in partnership with local volunteers — Janet, Jane, John, Sue and Mel — to develop projects that enhance and protect the village's green spaces.

Financial oversight also remains a core part of the Trust's work. While the last quarter saw a more significant spending, it has highlighted the balance of investment and income involved in maintaining such a range of community services. As part of its forward planning, the Trust is reviewing the need to reinvest in local community assets, notably the three key land parcels — Turbary, Hordy and Gravels — to ensure they remain beneficial to the parish both now and into the future.

Insurance costs have, once again, been a significant annual outlay, but are essential to safeguard the community's assets. Looking ahead,

the Trust is identifying additional maintenance works required to keep the facilities in good order for future generations.

Finally, with the winter months approaching, residents are warmly reminded that the weekly social evening at the Pavilion continues every Friday from 7pm — a perfect opportunity to stay connected and enjoy some company through the colder season.

LLANFAIR WATERDINE - August 9, 2025

Hundreds flocked to the Llanfair Waterdine Community Pavilion and Field for this year's Llanfair Waterdine Community Fun Day, a heartwarming afternoon of games, music, and local generosity — all in support of Papyrus, the UK charity dedicated to preventing young suicide. Organised by the Llanfair Waterdine Community Trust and an army of dedicated volunteers from all village groups & organisations, the event raised an incredible £3,778.15, with every penny going to Papyrus's vital work.



The event was packed with activities for all ages. Children (and a few brave adults) took on the rodeo bull and inflatable obstacle courses and games, while others tried their luck at traditional games like skittles, guess the weight of the cake, name the teddy, guess the weight of the lamb and the crowd-favourite, splat the rat.

A raffle draw added excitement to the day, featuring an array of prizes including big-ticket items like an iPhone and laptop generously donated by Chiltern Air. A special thank you to all local businesses who provided a prize for the day. It has contributed to us reaching a fantastic total for a great charity. Hungry visitors were well-fed thanks to local food vendors including RJ Smoke Shack, Pizza Girls, and Lou's Baked Treats, with teas & coffees provided by Everest Hall and a fully licensed bar available the latter expertly run by Steve Chainey and David Beavan (among a few other brave volunteers) of the Pavilion Management Committee. We would also like to recognise the Cocktail Shack manned by Iwan and Lily Waters, which provided another option for visitors throughout the day.



Live music set the tone throughout the day, with performances from MoJam, Paul Marriott-Lodge (who also acted as a charismatic compère), and DJ Dave (Dave ID), who kept spirits high well into the night.

We are aware that this news will be a big disappointment, not least since it will mean an extension to the vacancy. Archdeacon Fiona will be working in the coming weeks to find new dates for a second round of advertising and interviews.

In the meantime, please continue to pray that God will guide us to the right person at the right time to lead the parishes of the Middle Marches Benefice forward in this next phase of your life and ministry.

This comes with the assurance of our prayers for all in the parishes, particularly the Churchwardens, the retired clergy and the lay leaders who have extra responsibilities at this time".

North Aisle

There have been many positive comments about the changes to the North Aisle. There is now much more space for social meetings after services and the extension of services into that area with a table and chairs for all-age worship and discussion. Writing and drawing is possible as is breaking into small groups. There is also a well-used children's area. When needed for services with large congregations the space can accommodate our plastic chairs as well as our being able to utilise the original pews which have been re-sited against the wall. The whole church feels much more spacious and welcoming as a result of the work. We were granted a temporary licence to undertake this work by the Diocese and we now are applying for a Faculty from the Diocese to make the changes permanent.

Repairs Update - The last phase - we hope! Robert Taylor writes: It is somewhat strange that the last phase of repairs should involve sorting out the roof and ensuring that the building is waterproof, during a period when there has been a noticeable lack of rain. Apart from some little bits of finishing off, this work on the roof and walls is now complete and with it the bulk of the repairs listed in last year's quinquennial report. The original slate roof was replaced with a tiled roof over a waterproof filament and insulation in the nineteen seventies and despite all that our weather had thrown at it, things were basically sound and just needed tiles and ridge tiles replacing and repairing. This has been done along with work on the lead flashings. The building is now in good repair, and we give thanks for the skills and integrity of the craftsmen who have done the work.

Thanks to a healthy bank balance and the grant we received from the diocese we have been able to pay for this work without breaking into our fabric fund. However, we need to look to replenish our bank balance so that we can continue with the internal re-ordering to give us the facilities we need, such as a WC and a kitchen.

Earlier this year representatives of the PCC met with the Parish Council at their invitation to discuss possible cooperation. We agreed to work with their newly set up Nature Recovery Group to look at ways of making the wide diversity of plants and birds that live in the churchyard more accessible. We held a site meeting and invited the group to submit proposals for improving access and increasing the diversity of the space. This process is ongoing and the hope is to start work on the first phase in the near future. The churchyard is a quiet peaceful area and offers scope for enhancingthe variety of plants living there and hopefully improving the numbers of birds and animals living and moving through it. At a second meeting it was decided that the NRG would first work on 'greening' the rough area along the East wall.

Parish Giving

Thirty-three people now make regular payments to the Scheme. Information and application forms are available in the church porch. Please contact me if you would like any further information. A new facet of the scheme is that by clicking on a QR code with your 'i phone' you can make a 'one-off' or regular donation. There is an A4 size QR code in the church. As our church does not have access to the Internet, there are also bookmarks in the church with the QR code on the top, which visitors to the church can take away and access later.

Church Stalls

The stall outside the church gates and the bookstall in the porch continue to provide additional funds for the church. Thanks to all who donate eggs, produce, preserves and saleable goods and to all who buy!

My Tour du Mont Blanc Trip September 2025



I love to run on the trails around the Shropshire hills with my noble steed Ron (who is very well known in the Llanfair parish) at my side but I was after a more challenging adventure so on 1st September I set off on a six-day trail-running trip along the Tour du Mont Blanc (TMB) trail which is a famous trail circling Mont Blanc passing through France, Italy and Switzerland. This Alps adventure covered the rugged mountainous terrain running from hut to hut, through mountain villages and at the end of each day we would rest up and carb up and get our heads down in mountain refuges, hostels and one hotel when in Courmayeur (Italy). We power-hiked the steep ascents and then ran the downhills and the flats and every moment was truly amazing. The terrain was technical in places but that was all part of the fun and the views were out of this world. Seeing the iconic Mont Blanc from all sides was breath-taking, running through cattle fields and hearing the iconic cattle bells set the scene: this was a trip of a lifetime.

One stand-out moment for me was after the spicy climb up to the Col de la Seigne and the border from France into Italy. I was blown away by the view and the depth of the Mont Blanc Masiff. It was like nothing I had ever seen before and will stay with me forever.

While the TMB route was spectacular it has a fairly high footfall so when there was an opportunity to run along a less trodden path and along more rugged and untouched mountain trails we did – we ran along the Mountain Goat Trail which was rocky and rugged and perhaps not for the faint-hearted.

During this trip fuelling was vital: the fine French bread and pastries and iconic Blueberry tarts were devoured at every opportunity and don't forget the Pizza and gelato when we were on the Italian side of the mountains.

On the final day of the trip we climbed up from the Trient on the Swiss side and as we summited the Col and looking down the Chamonix valley we were greeted by a flock of sheep: they were un-phased by us runners and were more worried about the lush alpine grass. Many were blown away with these sheep but for me it was more of a busman's holiday and I confidently led the group through the sheep. However, these sheep were not alone and they were being guarded under the watchful eye of the Patou dogs who stay with the sheep to guard them from predators in the mountains. I was a tad wary of them. This was the day we completed our loop around Mont Blanc and ran back into Chamonix to finish our journey at the iconic Eglise Saint Michael, where there happened to be a local wedding happening at the time. Sadly, the church bells and well-dressed people weren't there to cheer for us. That final evening in Chamonix was full of reminiscing with the others, enjoying some fine French cuisine and having a well-deserved beer. If any hikers or trail runners fancy this trip I would highly recommend it: six days of running from A to B through amazing scenery with like minded people; grazing all day long without a care in the world. What more could you wish for?... now onto planning the next trip.


Eating In

Winter Warmers

A one-pot pulse-ating recipe to try out (with due acknowledgment to the excellent book 'One Pan Beans' by Claire Thomson)

Pork Belly with Butter Beans and Sage

Serves 4 with leftovers...



Ingredients

- 1.5k pork belly skin scored (ask Tom Pugh to do this for you, his knives are sharp!)
- 6 cloves of garlic 4 thinly sliced, 2 crushed
- 1 x large bunch of sage leaves picked and $\frac{1}{2}$ of them chopped
- 2 x tsp ground fennel seeds
- 2 x onions thinly sliced
- 2 x carrots thinly sliced
- 2 x leeks washed and thinly sliced
- 3 x ripe tomatoes roughly chopped (or a tin!)
- 2 x tbsp olive oil
- 100ml dry white wine
- 500g cooked butter beans
- 300ml chicken or veg stock
- Salt & pepper to season

Method

- Season the pork belly all over with salt, crushed garlic, chopped sage, ground fennel seeds, and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp ground black pepper. Leave to marinate for at least an hour in the fridge and remove 30 minutes before cooking.
- Pre-heat the oven to 200°C (180 °C fan)
- Mix all the vegetables, sliced garlic, tomatoes, olive oil and wine. Season with salt & pepper, set aside.
- In your casserole dish or deep roasting tin roast the pork in the hot oven for 30 mins until the skin is coloured and cracked. Remove it, tip in the veg mix, replace the pork on top, put the lid on or cover tightly with foil and slow roast at 160 °C (140 °C fan) for 1½-2 hours until the pork is easily pierced with a sharp knife.
- When the cooking time is up, remove the pork, skim off excess fat, add the beans remaining sage and stock, put back the pork on top, re-cover and cook for another 10 minutes or so until the beans are heated through.
- Remove from the oven and leave covered to rest for 20 minutes before carving and serving.

Personal note – we often don't get the crackling crispy enough so you can remove the skin during the final 20 minutes' resting period and whack it in a hot oven to crisp-up.

Beetroot and Lemon Hummus



Great Rollright is the place in Oxfordshire near

where the Rollright Stones can be found. These stones are reputed to be very old indeed. The oldest, the Whispering Knights dolmen is early Neolithic, dating from 3,800 – 3,500 B.C. Great Rollright was a happy place to go 'home' to during the holidays.

It was a surprise, therefore, many years ago to find jumping out at me, sitting upstairs on a 159 bus in London, a recipe from Great Rollright for 'Hummus'. As with Llanfair, there were some very good cooks in Great Rollright, (population about the same as Llanfair) but it was quite something for a recipe from Great Rollright to be nationally recognised. It is right that it was and I have been making the recipe, with slight changes, ever since. One of the differences is nothing more than the addition of a packet of beetroot from the Co-op!

Ingredients

- 1 tin of chickpeas rinsed
- 2 tablespoons of tahini
- 2 peeled cloves of garlic
- 4 tablespoons of hot water
- 1 tablespoon of olive oil
- juice of 1 lemon
- Contents of 1 packet of prepared beetroot

Method

Put all in a blender and whizz.

Can be served as you like. It is good in little pastry cups, which you can buy online or in Ludlow Farm Shop, or with bread. Very good with a glass of 'The Real Wine Company' Red or White too.

Walking Llanfair Waterdine's footpaths and bridleways

Llanfair Waterdine is a big parish, as I've discovered since recently becoming Footpath Warden. It stretches from just outside Knighton in the south-east corner up to Quabbs in the north-west with the village roughly in the middle of the southern border. My job

is to walk and survey the paths and bridleways (rights of way) of the parish, recording where repairs need making to stiles and gates, and missing or unclear signage that needs replacing. And there are a lot of paths! My aim is to walk all of them in the parish – I don't know how many miles that is it total, but it will take some time! It's a great opportunity to get out into the countryside, up on top of the hills and experience the fantastic views across the parish and beyond.


As you may have noticed, we've made a start on the footpath leading up into the fields next to the church, replacing the broken stile with a gate supplied by Shropshire Council.



This path leads up through the fields towards Mount Pleasant, then into Long Wood where it becomes lost in fallen trees and undergrowth – it was originally used as a short-cut for those walking from outlying farms to the church and school in the village.

The path is the first section of one of five circular paths in the parish listed on Shropshire's Great Outdoors website – Circular Path 2* – which takes you up to Offa's Dyke, where some of the best-preserved sections can be seen, and back down past Black Hall Lodges to the village.

(www.shropshiresgreatoutdoors.co.uk)(approx. 5 miles, 2.5 hours – with some steep parts!). With the help of Shropshire Council's Rights of Way Officer, we will be undertaking further repairs to



the path to make sure it is open for use by all those who want a bit more of a challenge of walking up the slopes – the views, wildlife and woods are well worth it! We would welcome any volunteers for the next set of repairs and path clearing – please let me know if you are interested.

9.30pm (with a tea break!) in the Everest Hall – just come along. You'll be very welcome.


With Christmas and the New Year rapidly approaching, it just remains for me, along with the whole choir, to wish you a very happy and joyous Christmas and a wonderful 2026.








Parish Council

We have had a couple of PC meetings since the last Llanfair Times. In this time two new councillors have been co-opted to the Council; Gail Knowler and Richard Lewis. Richard has previously sat on the Council so it is good to have him back. They both bring a wide range of skills and experiences that will benefit the council and our wider community. We are now up to full strength with seven council members along with our clerk James McVicar.

At our last meeting the Shropshire Ward Councillor Sam Walmsley was able to give a fulsome report on wider issues in the County. These are summarised in the minutes from the 22nd September meeting and well worth a read.

Our Clerk presented a report on Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) which led to his recommendations being unanimously accepted by the Council. Some of the recommendations include: the Parish Council taking overall responsibility for the AEDs including maintenance and running costs; that an additional AED be installed at the Pavilion on the receipt of grants from the Llanfair Waterdine Community Trust; that the AED at Everest Hall be transferred to Council ownership and the provision of annual training on how to use an AED.

Our Footpath Warden was able to report the installation of a new gate on one of our footpaths. This was completed with help from Shropshire Council.

Finally, the members of the PC and clerk were able to meet informally to discuss and consider the needs of our community in the short and long term. This proved to be a very positive time together which has led to new agenda items for our next meeting on Monday 24th November at 6.30pm in The Pavilion. Remember, members of the public are welcome to attend.


