

### Avian flu reminder for bird keepers

Bird keepers are reminded of the restrictions that remain in place to minimise the risk of avian flu. An Avian Influenza Prevention Zone came into force across the country in November, making it a legal requirement for all bird keepers across the UK (whether they have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) to keep their birds indoors and follow strict measures.

It is the largest ever outbreak of bird flu in the UK, with identified across the country, including the neighbouring counties of Warwickshire and Leicestershire.

While the risk to people is very low, the disease is highly contagious among birds and often proves fatal. Wild birds migrating to the UK from mainland Europe during the winter months help spread the disease, so West Northamptonshire Council is reminding all bird keepers to follow the biosecurity measures needed to keep their birds safe and help stop the spread. Poultry keepers must:

- House or net all poultry and captive birds to keep them separate from wild birds
- Clean and disinfect clothing, footwear, equipment and vehicles before and after contact with poultry and captive birds – if practical, use disposable protective clothing
- Reduce the movement of people, vehicles or equipment to and from areas where poultry and captive birds are kept, to minimise contamination from manure, slurry and other products, and use effective vermin control
- Thoroughly clean and disinfect housing on a continuous basis
- Keep fresh disinfectant at the right concentration at all farm and poultry housing entry and exit points
- Minimise direct and indirect contact between poultry and captive birds and wild birds, including making sure all feed and water is not accessible to wild birds.

If you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey, you should report them to the Defra helpline on 03459 33 55 77. Do not touch or pick up any dead or visibly sick birds that you find.

### News from St Mary's

### What are you worth?

I'm not talking about your worth as a person but what it would cost to make you physically?! It



takes 59 different elements to make you. 99% of you is made of oxygen, hydrogen, calcium, phosphorus, nitrogen and carbon. The nitrogen would cost just 30p, the oxygen £9 and the hydrogen £ 16; but the carbon would cost £45,000 and the calcium a further £47,000. We would need some tin but only 4p worth, and some Zirconium for just 21p. Altogether we would need £96, 500 plus VAT to make you. Thankfully one of the most important thing you would need is actually free – bacterial microbes. You need trillions and trillions of them but the only cost would come if you got rid of them from your body – you'd be dead within the day.

It was St Paul who took Jesus' teaching across the western world and established it. He wrote his quite famous comparison between the human body and the church, and by extension, society and the world. He explained that, just as the human body needs every single part in order to survive, and every part is therefore of equal worth - especially the microbes - so society needs people of all kinds, and therefore they are of equal worth too, whatever their status, abilities, race and religion or none; St Paul declared that God does not discriminate and intends the world to be as

Jesus spent much of his life going round healing those who were hurting in their body, or mind, or both; however, he is no longer physically on earth and so, in the words of the prayer of St Theresa of Avila, 'ours are the eyes through which Christ looks with compassion on the world, ours the feet by which he must go about doing good, ours the hands by which he can bless his people.

Then, every second Sunday at 11am in the village hall we shall hold Messy Church which is an informal hour of fun, making things, singing a song and having some food. In March it will be about Noah's ark so we can make our own boats, animals and then - set them afloat!

### Did you know?

Martin Rowling has now published his book on the turret clock which adorns the gable end of The Forge which details the steps taken and the materials used to make this masterpiece. It is a rare confluence of skills to have the design and manufacturing knowhow to make a clock and also the literary capability to be able to write a book on it. The clock was made in the mode of an 18th century blacksmith whose tools were hammer and chisel. Martin has mirrored that by not using any electrical aids in the process, even extending as far as using wooden rather than metal scaffolding during its erection.

The book is available in hardback from Forge Coffee at £15. Reviews of it are in Antiquarian Horological Journal March 2022 edition and British Horological Institute March 2022 magazine.

1. Introduction

The Farthinghoe Recycling Centre was operated by the former South Northamptonshire Council from 2002 and is now part of the waste collection systems operating within West Northamptonshire Council.

Because of its history as an SNC service, this recycling centre is operated separately from the Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC) contract, which provides a further 5 recycling centres within WNC. The Farthinghoe recycling centre recycles around 800 tonnes of material as well as providing a reuse shop for

items such as furniture, books, crockery, bicycles and toys.

There are 2 contracts associated with the operation of the site:

- A contract for the running and management of the site has been held by Day Recycling Limited since 2002 and was due for renewal in 2021;
- 2. A contract for haulage of different materials from the site to treatment locations. This is held by Dial-A-Bin.

For personal reasons Day Recycling has given notice to WNC and consequently, their contract will expire on 31 Jan 2022.

2. Options for Replacement Arrangements
Due to the short timescales to secure alternative
arrangements, waste officers took advice from the
procurement team to consider the options which may
enable continued operation of the site.

The 3 primary options which were considered were:

- i. Including Farthinghoe recycling centre within the HWRC contract. This was not a preferred option for the following reasons:
- A variation to the HWRC contract would need to be negotiated and it is not anticipated that this would be good value for money;
- The HWRC contract is hosted by NNC until its natural expiry in 2025 and therefore WNC would lose the direct control of the services provided at Farthinghoe.
- ii. Bringing the operation of the recycling centre 'in house' as part of the South Waste services. This was not a preferred option, since to continue to offer a reuse service, the site staff would need to handle cash. Note that the service had been contracted out prior to the formation of WNC and there is no compelling reason to change this approach.
- iii. Procurement of alternative arrangements. This was option was further investigated via 'soft market testing' to ensure that there was sufficient market interest.

Following further consideration and discussion with the Portfolio Holder and Director, it was agreed that a competitive procurement process would commence with a view to implementing option 3.

#### 3. Procurement

Procurement of a new contract to replace the Day Recycling contract is currently 'live' and tenders are due back in mid January.

The new contract will be co-terminus with the HWRC contract (ending 31 March 2025) which will enable a full review of these Recycling Centre services in advance of decisions regarding the strategy for provision of these services from 1 April 2026. Following receipt of tenders in mid January, they will be evaluated, a preferred bidder selected and with the Portfolio Holder and Director's agreement, a new contract will be awarded. The timing is such that the new contractor will not be able to commence on 1 February 2022.

4. Temporary Closure of Farthinghoe Recycling Centre

Due to the timing of the procurement and award of contract outlined in section 3 above, it will unfortunately be necessary to temporarily close the Farthinghoe Recycling Centre for approximately one month (i.e. during February). A reopening date will be confirmed as soon as the new contractor is appointed. During this temporary closure, the site will be cleared of all waste and we will take the opportunity to complete some refurbishment work.

We are working with our colleagues in the communications team to ensure that residents are aware of the temporary closure and we will emphasise

### Cabinet agrees changes to garden waste collections

the reopening date.

Waste collection services across West Northamptonshire will be harmonised from April 2022, when all residents of the area will receive the same service at the same cost.

For some residents of the area this will mean important changes to their current garden waste service from April, when plans for a fair, equitable and consistent collection service across West Northamptonshire are implemented.

At its meeting this week (Tuesday, 18 January), West Northamptonshire Council's Cabinet approved plans to introduce chargeable garden waste collections to homes in the former South Northants Council area, to harmonise the service for all households.

Harmonisation is a requirement set by Government in establishing the new Council, which inherited three different garden waste schemes from the old district and borough councils it replaced last spring.

The changes, which will be introduced to collections from 4 April this year, will bring households in the former South Northants Council area in line with residents in the former Daventry District and Northampton Borough areas, who have chosen whether or not to subscribe to paid-for garden waste collections since 2018 and 2020 respectively.

The annual subscription charge for all West Northamptonshire residents who opt in to use the service will be set at £42 per year per bin for 2022/3. All residents also have the option of purchasing a discounted home compost bin for £10 or using the network of 6 recycling centres across the area that accept garden waste for free.

Work is now underway by the Council to ensure all arrangements are in place ahead of the service launch in April, and residents will be able to sign up to the scheme from the middle of February via the council's website. Information on how to subscribe will be sent to all homes across West Northamptonshire next month.

At their meeting, Cabinet members considered the findings of a recent review by the Council's Place Overview and Scrutiny Committee and, taking into account all related issues including the council's current financial position, decided to proceed with the proposals, whilst also making additional recommendations for introducing discounts and instalment payments in future years for people on low incomes.

Councillor Phil Larratt, WNC's Portfolio Holder for Climate, Transport, Highways and Waste, said: "With the Government requiring us to harmonise the services we inherited from the old councils, it's important we address the great disparity in how our residents currently receive garden waste collections to ensure the same, equal service for everyone.

"Although really valued by some people, others don't need or use these collections, so giving everyone the same choice of whether or not they wish to receive them makes the service fairer for all.

"The chargeable garden waste service is already well established for residents in the Daventry and Northampton areas, but we realise that introducing this in the south area is a change from their current service arrangements, so we'll be doing everything we can to support, guide and inform residents in the runup to the service launch in April.

"We would encourage residents to visit our website or call the Council on 0300 126 7000 to find out more. Residents should also look out for some important communications being delivered to all households early next month containing the details everything they'll need to know about the changes, when they're happening and what they need to do."

### Birthday, Deaths and Marriages

Mary Whittingham died on Monday 24<sup>th</sup> January. She moved to Culworth just over 10 years from Herefordshire, a few years after the death of her husband Frank Whittingham. After a long and varied life as the wife of a Wing Commander and then training as a teacher, she had a wide variety of interests and expertise. A committed Christian and a woman of immense faith, St Mary's church has lost a dear friend. Those who knew her will miss her erudite, perceptive advice.

Our heartfelt condolences go to all her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Richard Murdin came to the Rectory, now the Old Rectory, as a tiny baby having been born in Peterborough, when his father became Rector of Culworth. He went to a small school in Brackley. His father took Richard and his older sister Felicity to catch the train at Culworth Station on the road to Moreton Pinkney in the morning but would come home with the coal man if the truck was being loaded getting his uniform slightly grubby against his mother's wishes.

He boarded at Swanbourne, St Edwards and Worcester College Oxford where he read Theology after leaving his Oxford entrance too late to apply for Classics. Whilst in Bristol doing his PGCE, Richard enlisted at Gloucestershire County Ground for an MCC cricket coaching course. After completing his training, he became a master at Winchester House School in Brackley in 1964 where he stayed until his retirement, teaching Classics, coaching sport especially cricket, taking children on Canal and camping trips, singing in the choir and playing a full part in the life of the school. He and his wife Valerie were houseparents at The Red House until Valerie started teaching at Slapton. He was a legend at the school.

Mr Murdin loved choral singing. More recently some of us will have appreciated his talents at Edgcote and other churches. Any reading he gave was delivered slowly with a careful enunciation of the words, an approach he gave as advice to all pupils performing in carol services and plays. Aside from teaching, sport and singing, Richard's other love was the countryside, particularly in the North of England.

His memorial service in St Peters Brackley on 13th January 2022 was attended by representatives of the choirs he sang with, members of staff from Winchester House, parents, family and friends. Donations in his memory were for Chance to Shine, a charity to promote cricket in all schools, and the Cathedral Music Trust.

It was a privilege to know him. His pupils developed the love of Classics and language.
