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#### Do your bit to reduce plastic waste

Around 5 million tonnes of plastic is used every year in the UK, almost half of which is packaging. Most of this packaging cannot be recycled. We have all seen the horrific pictures of plastic in the stomachs of marine life but it often doesn't seem there is any alternative to buying food packaged in it. To help combat this, supermarkets Co-op, Sainsbury's and Tesco are offering soft plastic collection points in store. Soft plastic includes crisp packets, bread bags, salad bags, frozen food packaging and packaging for products like rice, pasta and biscuits.

A good test for whether something is soft plastic or not is to scrunch it up and see if it bounces back or not, if it does then it is soft plastic. Just clean any food residue off the packaging and drop off at your next visit to one of the above supermarkets where they are recycled into new packaging.

If you live in Kelham but don't visit one of these supermarkets or utilize the lockdown phenomenon of shopping delivery, we will be happy to take it in for you. When I come round for my next Bramley round on the weekend beginning 12<sup>th</sup> November, leave any soft plastic you have collected in a bag outside your door and we will take it to a recycling point at one of these supermarkets.

We hope you help us make small changes to recycle the plastic that we do use. At this stage the scheme will unfortunately only be able to run for Kelham.


#### Afternoon Tea at Averham Church 10th November 2021 2pm to 4pm

- *A Silent Patient,* Alex Michaelides. Psychological thriller—not a long book but has a great twist, very well written.

# **Gardening and Social Club News**

# (Two Talks and What's Coming Next)

#### AGM and Talk: 28th September 2021

The Club finally successfully convened in the Robin Hood Theatre Averham for our first AGM in 30 months! There was a good attendance, including several new members.

Committee members Nigel, Janet and John chaired the AGM (apologies from Mick who was away). Nigel as outgoing chairman summarised the restricted Club activities over the preceding period and thanked the Committee. John gave the Treasurer's report.

The new officers were then voted in as follows:-

Chair - Janet Emeny Secretary - Nigel Britton Treasurer - Steve Emeny Ordinary Members: Margaret Harvey, Rosanna Galley, John Clifton, Janet Clifton and Heather Wolfenden.

After a break for refreshments Nigel gave his demonstration '*Planting up your* Baskets for Winter Colour and Interest'.

The hanging basket Nigel chose was an unusual inverted cone shape. Normal loam based compost with very little peat (John Innes number 3) was used as the planting medium; Nigel said he has not found peat-free to be successful. He was backed by an artillery of plants which he selected from for shape and colour, which gave a very pleasing final appearance. Nigel generously donated the completed hanging basket as a raffle prize.

Next up was planting a stone coloured concrete planter. Concrete can be preferable to clay in winter as it is less prone to freezing and cracking. If using a clay planter, then use a traditional 'flowerpot man' shape rather than a vase shape, as this allows unrestricted expansion of freezing water and thus less likelihood of cracking.

In the last part of the presentation we were shown a selection of must-have

plants for the wintertime garden, ranging from the ever popular pansies and violas for colour through to Skimmia Rubella, Nandina Firepower and Dryopteris ferns for evergreen and 'architectural' interest.

For the benefit of the new attendees, Nigel reminded us that, post-covid, Southwell Garden Centre is again offering a 10% discount to ASK Garden Club members.

After the talk Janet Emeny thanked Nigel for all his work on behalf of the club during his term as Chair and also for all his advice and knowledge he has freely

given. Members were then given the opportunity to

purchase autumn and winter plants brought over from Southwell Garden Centre.

The hanging basket donated by Nigel was won by Heather, and there was a second prize of a chocolate cake made by Lee was won by John Clifton.

Thanks to Judith for managing the raffle tickets and to Janet, Margaret and Jenny for organising refreshments and washing up.

#### The diary of a new gardener: Tuesday 19 October

Daryl Fletcher confessed that his first loves are planes, trains and automobiles—particularly classic ones. Moving to Kelham in 2009 he 'inherited' what appears to have been a productive vegetable patch and he had good intentions of 'growing his own'. But after a while, this idea became far less attractive, especially when his first attempts at planting were unsuccessful.

Following a chance meeting with Janet Emeny, he was persuaded to join the Gardening Club in 2019. That first year he learned a lot and had found the visit to Southwell particularly memorable.

At one meeting he was presented with a bucket and a seed potato for the Club's annual potato and bean growing competition. As the first thing he had grown, Daryl treated the plant with love and care. Checking daily he fed it with Miracle gro and carefully topped up the compost.

On returning from a short holiday, he was extremely upset to discover that the plant was brown and withered—little did he know!

Despite his disappointment, Daryl took his entry along to the September 'Fuddle' for judging.

Much to his amazement, not only did he have potatoes but at 5½lbs (2.5kg) he

had the winning entry. (And, as it has not been possible to run the competition due to COVID he still claims to be the reigning champion though his modesty prevents him mentioning it too often! Just a few times!!)

Spurred on by this success, in 2020, Daryl dug out his neglected vegetable



bed but was plagued by insects so results were not always successful. The most important thing was that he enjoyed planting his veg, and watching them grow, and especially eating the results!



In 2021, using his engineering background, Daryl carefully designed raised beds. Originally six were planned but on advice from an experienced friend, only two were built to start with. Costs were managed by using scaffolding planks for the sides and acquiring some topsoil from a neighbour who was redesigning his

garden and from his brother. Initially, results were patchy, but the addition of polytunnels has not only improved performance, but add a 'professional' look to his efforts.

Crops grown this year include spinach, kale, tomatoes, a carrot (yes, only one!) and, of course potatoes—some from seed potatoes and some from some old spuds that had started to shoot. And, he's managed to grow some monster beetroot. Daryl confessed to being amazed at the size of some seeds—how can such big plants emerge from tiny specks?

Daryl concluded by saying that he loved watching things grow and was very happy coming home every day and spending a little time just pottering around in his garden—and eating the results.

With that, he shared some beetroot and chocolate brownies to accompany the tea and coffee, which were declared to be delicious.



# Report of the AKS Parish Council Meeting held on 27<sup>th</sup> September 2021

A discussion took place on the catchment area for The Minster School in Southwell. The Head is sympathetic to the plight of students in Averham, Kelham and Staythorpe but the school is already oversubscribed and any changes to the catchment area are the responsibility of the Head.

The footpath between the Rugby Club and Averham was also discussed. Via, which carries out maintenance on behalf of the County Council, has been made aware of the need to repairs and maintenance but the work will only be done when budget is available. Residents are encouraged to report where maintenance is needed either on the Notts County Council website or the My Notts app.

Tree Planting to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee next year was discussed and the idea of a tree in each of the villages was favourably received.

The bench at Fisherman's Hut is being repaired and will be ready to return to its usual place soon.

Newark and Sherwood District Council are providing two wheelie bins for waste

collected by community litter pickers. All waste MUST be bagged because it's collected by the Street Scene Team who have to lift each bag out and place it on their lorry. As soon as the bins are in place, we'll let you know where they are.

The members all agreed a vote of thanks to Jenny Cawkwell for her work as Clerk as this was her last meeting.

# Rev'd Georgie's Message to all in Averham, Kelham and Staythorpe Preparing for Winter

We are into those dark nights and mornings. A time to close the curtains and get all cosy and warm. I feel so lucky that I am warm and cosy and have someone to share the evenings with. I am aware that the long dark nights can be difficult.

November, the month of remembrance, is perhaps a time to look back and remember as the church year draws to a close. This year has been mixed. Covid restrictions at the start, vaccines and plans still disrupted. The joy of going away and enjoying our own country. The scary moments as restrictions are lifted. The uncertainty of how to live with this Covid. We are beginning to find a new way of living, with regular testing and the odd disruption when someone tests positive. So much to think about.

It's hard not to look back and to think of how things used to be. Harder to look forward at times because we are unsure of what may happen. The media inform us of so much, but not always helpful. As I write we have had problems with fuel and talk of shortages for Christmas.

Now in November we turn to winter. Are we prepared? What can we do to help us through what may appear to be a dark and gloomy time. A new interest or hobby to help through the long evenings. Coming out to the various coffee mornings and afternoons.

At harvest we are reminded that the workers are few but the harvest is plentiful. Well there is much we could 'harvest' in the winter months. Who needs help, who is lonely, what charity is struggling, who is cold and homeless

and as at harvest everyone gave generously to many organisations, who still need us to be generous in our giving.

The trees are bare, showing us their skeletons. These will bear new growth next spring. Sometimes our faith is stripped down to bare branches. Our father is the gardener and he prunes the vines to allow new growth. Read about this in John 15:1-7.

November's service on 28th. Just a note to everyone on the cleaning rota, whilst for the most part your cleaning 'duty' is generally just for the monthly service you will be asked to help out for any extra events e.g. funerals, weddings etc., but this is very infrequent.

Thanks to everyone who has joined the rota. We now have covered all the months.

#### A long time coming but well worth the wait

Finally there is a resurfaced public footpath to Averham Church, together with lighting that will allow us to use the church in the evenings.

The total cost is some £30,645. Included in this figure are the newly resurfaced path and lights, together with architect and archaeologist fees. Our church did not have this amount in reserves so we are very grateful to a former resident for a sizable donation and £15,000 from Notts County Council Local Improvement Scheme, together with other donations from The Kelham Estate which owns the land from the car park to the Lych gate and many other donations from villagers – thank you, it wouldn't have been possible without your help and support.




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
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
