Moulsford Allotments

Some of you may not be aware, but Moulsford has its own allotments *, even if some of them are a little overgrown!

After protracted discussions with South Oxfordshire District Council we are about to renew our lease and can now focus on getting things in order.

There are several allotments which are unlet and we expect there may be one or two more that come free shortly.

We would like to have the majority of allotments let for this season.

We would like to have the majority of allotments let for this season, so we are offering these allotments first to the village.

However, if we do not get take up within the next two to three weeks (i.e. by mid May), we will be advertising in Streatley and Cholsey, as both villages currently have waiting lists for allotments.

Plots are rented on an annual basis, with fees payable in January.

The exact cost will vary according to size;

typically around £30/year for a smaller plot and £40-60/year for one of the larger ones.

In addition, as the unlet allotments will require some work to clear and dig over, the Parish Council are open to offering the first year rent free in return for returning the plot taken to a state of cultivation within the first season of taking it over.

Water is available on the plot for a small additional charge.

Making sure that crime doesn't pay

I recently spent some time sifting through grant applications for my Community Fund. Each year we provide around half a million pounds to good causes in Thames Valley by taking money from criminals. Some of the money comes through the courts, when judges can make orders under the Proceeds of Crime Act; and in cases where stolen goods are recovered but cannot be reunited with their rightful owner, they are sold and the money goes into this fund.

Any local group can apply; they don't need to be registered charities, but the money does need to go towards crime prevention in some way.

Amongst a wide range of applications received this year, we've tried to focus on schemes to tackle anti-social behaviour and vehicle crime. This has included CCTV systems, knife crime prevention and support for victims of crime.

By law, we cannot put this money straight back into police budgets, so it is great to work with the community on crime reduction. Preventing crime in the first place is, after all, better than catching criminals afterwards. Locally some of the organisations that have benefited include The Sinodun Players in Wallingford, with a project to reduce anti-social behaviour; Didcot Army Cadets; Be Free Young Carers; and Youth Challenge Oxfordshire. SOFEA - the fantastic Didcot-based charity working with young people - also received funding for their work across Thames Valley to support young people transitioning between primary and secondary school.

As well as the regular funding available to local groups, the cash taken from criminals is also used to support other organisations. I have set up ongoing funding arrangements with Neighbourhood Watch across Thames Valley to help support their crime prevention work. We support Street Pastors, volunteers from local churches who give up their time to make sure that people can get home safely after a night out. Recently Business Crime Reduction Partnerships have started to benefit from this money to help them in the fight against shoplifting and retail crime. As well as supporting our counties' High Sheriffs in their charitable work, one of the most important partnerships that this money enables is with our volunteer search and rescue teams who do so much to help those missing and in distress.

Dear Friends,

Remembering VE Day – 80 years on

80 years ago, on 8th May 1945, VE Day took place – marking Victory in Europe at the end of World War 2. It was celebrated as a public holiday, and came exactly a week after German radio announced the death in action of Adolf Hitler.

In reality, Hitler had committed suicide on 30th April. His successor, Grand Admiral Karl Dönitz, quickly negotiated an end to the war with the Allies – at the same time trying with some success to prevent as many Germans as possible from falling into Soviet hands.

Field Marshal Montgomery accepted the unconditional surrender of German forces in the Netherlands, north-west Germany and Denmark at a ceremony near Hamburg on 4th May. All German forces then surrendered to Supreme Allied Commander General Eisenhower on 7th May at Reims, France. Soviet leader Josef Stalin had his own ceremony, in Berlin.

The announcement that the war had ended in Europe was broadcast to the British people by the BBC late on 7th May. It was decreed that there would be a national holiday the next day, and the stage was set for huge celebrations. Prime Minister Churchill had been assured that there was enough beer in the capital, and commemorative items, including VE Day mugs, were quickly produced.

St Paul's Cathedral held ten consecutive services giving thanks for peace, each one attended by thousands of people, and churches throughout the country rang their bells. The Royal Family played a central role, appearing eight times on the balcony of Buckingham Palace while huge numbers of people flocked down The Mall.

In the United States, VE Day coincided with President Harry S Truman's 61st birthday: he dedicated the victory to the memory of his predecessor, Franklin D Roosevelt, who had died of a stroke less than a month earlier. But both Truman and Churchill pointed out that the war against Japan had not yet been won. That final victory was still more than three months away.

This year as we celebrate 80 years since VE day, we pray for those who still are in the throes of war, battling injustice and fighting for freedom. We pray for wisdom and peacemakers that diplomacy and lasting peace may be found.


Cholsey Repair Café





Wallingford Accessible Boat Club Sets Sail for a Record-Breaking Year

Wallingford Accessible Boat Club (WABC), the much-loved local charity providing free river trips for disabled and less mobile people in Oxfordshire, is gearing up for its biggest season yet — and it promises to be a landmark year.

Now in its fifth year of operation, the entirely volunteer-run club is celebrating a wave of good news: more volunteers have joined over the winter, more trips than ever are planned and their specially adapted Wheelyboat WOW-one is about to return to the River Thames. Most exciting of all, WABC's new home in central Wallingford is nearing completion, with full use expected by June.

Chairman John Jenkins MBE shared his excitement:

"We're aiming to welcome 500 passengers this year, thanks to our amazing volunteers and extended schedule — we are hoping to operate seven days a week. We now have access to beautiful new sections of the river downstream from Wallingford, and that means even more chances for people to experience the joy and calm that being on the water brings."

WABC is inviting elderly and disabled residents to book a trip and enjoy the freedom of the river.

"If you or someone you know would enjoy a trip, visit www.wabc.org.uk and watch our short video," Jenkins added. "It's free and easy to book — and unforgettable once you're out on the water. Keep an eye on it for information about the start of bookings."






