Evelyn's Walks

On Monday 8th August, the forecast was for another hot day. I was quite surprised when I counted seventeen of us including a lady who had driven all the way from Launceston & two ladies who arrived on bicycles. We met at Clawton Village Hall & admired the beautiful flower display & new seating area which provided some much needed shade. We set off down the lane & it was noticeable how much the vegetation on the banks had shrivelled. Presumably, the mature trees were soaking up any moisture. We followed the footpath sign on the right. I hadn't walked what used to be a regular route since pre COVID.

Some years ago, DCC replaced several seriously challenging stiles with self-closing gates & I was keen to show them to everyone. I was somewhat surprised to see a polite notice on the second gate asking people not to follow the footpath. To be fair to the residents, this route goes straight through their gardens & very close to their houses so I could understand their concern during the lockdowns. However, since all restrictions have been removed apart from in medical settings, I decided to continue as planned bearing in mind that I made a point of being the only person to open & then close the gates as my fellow walkers passed through. I had done a Lateral Flow Test before leaving home & felt confident that we had managed any risk to health as much as possible.

It was interesting to note that further along the footpath, what had previously been a maize field has now

been returned to pasture. When we reached Higher Sellick, I offered the option of turning right & following the lane back to the Village Hall. It seemed sensible to offer a shorter route given that it was getting quite hot by this stage. The longer route also included a very steep climb up hill on the return. This did not deter the majority & we turned left along the bridle path. Initially it was a track that would have taken us to Fernhill but the PROW goes through a double galvanised gate on the left. We entered a large grassy field which took us down to the River Claw. We took a moment to enjoy the peace & tranquility in the shade, contemplating how the flow of



the river was reduced to a trickle & would have been easily navigable on foot. Ordinarily, anybody on foot would traverse the river using the magnificent bridge leaving horse riders to deal with the river crossing. We discussed the different possible routes back to our cars but opted for the shorter one on such a hot day. This meant retracing our steps back up the hill which was no mean feat. However, the extraordinarily clear day enabled us to enjoy far reaching views towards Bodmin whilst catching our breath.

The next walk will be on Monday 12th September. We will set off from Lower Tamar Lakes car park at 10am for a walk along the feeder arm of the Bude Canal. This will be a there & back walk as far as the picnic bench. If you would like to join me, you are welcome to bring a snack as we will stop for a brief

ROAD CLOSURE - FROM CORFCOTT GREEN TO HERDICOTT CROSS


