News from St. Nicholas Church - April 2024

I remember writing in the February edition, that the church calendar was pushing us on to Easter at an alarming rate, having only just celebrated Christmas. So here we are in Holy Week with Good Friday and Easter Sunday only a few days away.

We have still managed the solemn and thoughtful events that lead us gently through this season of Lent, weekly Lent courses, Lent Lunches each week in the Village Hall, Mothering Sunday (with my very first attempt at making a Simnel cake!), Palm Sunday benefice service in Lenham yesterday, evening talks taking place around the benefice this week, Maundy Thursday service with 'washing of feet' in Harrietsham, 'An hour at the Cross' on Good Friday, Easter Sunday Daybreak outdoor service 6am at St. Nicholas and Easter Morning Service. Quite a full calendar! Hope you have enjoyed some of these events.

Reminders

The church porch is open at all times. Make use of the tea/coffee and soft drink options as you enjoy its peace and rural outlook. A joy to see and hear the new lambs in the field. There is paper and envelopes if you would like to leave a prayer request, or contact Rev.John Huggins or the churchwardens at any time. Any prayers will be read in Monday morning prayer time or in private if you wish. A small food bank is there if you need, though there is a larger food bank in St. Mary's in Lenham, open daily from 10-4.00pm.

The main church building is open for cleaning, services, meetings etc. Please contact the churchwardens for a key if you wish to visit at other times.

Church service times are on the noticeboards by the roadside and by the porch, also outside the Village Hall in Grafty Green.

Celtic Morning Prayer is said in the side chapel each Monday morning 9-9.30am. This is an informal time, with short bible readings and time for prayer, spoken, or in silence, for people, events, problems or worries. Sharing can be helpful.

Village Coffee Morning takes place each Tuesday 11.30am-2pm in the Village Hall in Grafty Green. The Post Office is usually open 12.45-2.15pm. There are often items for sale, eg. Honey and free-range eggs, Pluckley teas, eco-household products, handmade cards, jams and marmalade. All donations received are shared equally between the church and a charity chosen by the 'regulars'.

Lent Lunches. Very many thanks for the generosity of those who have come to share in these bread and soup lunches. Also, thanks to those who made the soups and Kenneth who kindly made all the breads. These times have been special, being held on Tuesdays, joining the coffee regulars. Possible to start with coffee and cake, followed by soup and bread and finishing off with more coffee and cake! All proceeds have been donated to the work of Christian Aid for its unstinting work for those in need worldwide, never more necessary than in these troubled times. The total raised this year was £326.16p. This sum has already been passed on to the charity.

Monthly Meditations continue at 2pm on the first Saturday of each month, for just half an hour, led by Rev.John Huggins. A time of silence and thoughtfulness. So rare an opportunity in this busy world. A time to talk over coffee/tea afterwards can be useful.

Wedding plans for Laura and Ollie's wedding at the end of April are progressing and we continue our prayers for them.

Hoping everyone has enjoyed a happy and blessed Easter and is feeling the joy of new beginnings and opportunities with warmer weather and gardens and fields bursting with precious new growth and vigour. A very brief personal message to the residents of Boughton Malherbe. On behalf of Ron Galton, Robert Turner, Barry Adams and Tracey Andrews.

It is not by or on behalf of Boughton Malherbe Parish Council

If you have not read the article by Nicholas Eastwood published in the March Edition of the Malherbe Monthly, please do. It is a personal attack on the integrity and character of Ron, Robert, Barry and Tracey together with the Clerk, and it is believed to be a libel that also alludes to confidential information that cannot be disclosed. It breaks the strict rules by which parish councils and councillors must abide in several ways, and is thought to break the law upon which those rules are based, but that would be for a court to decide.

An apology has been requested but none received

The article contains more than 30 references that in the opinion of Ron, Robert, Barry and Tracey can be successfully challenged. The article was also published without giving them the opportunity to reply. However, that was not necessary because Ron, Robert, Barry, and Tracey believe that all right-thinking fair-minded readers will see the author and the article in their true light for what they really are.

Some right-thinking fair-minded residents have already expressed their horror and disgust at what was written and offered their support for Ron, Robert, Barry and Tracey, who are extremely grateful. Thank you.

After consideration, and taking advice, the risk is clear that to reply fully in detail to the article could be breaking the same rules as were broken by Nicholas, and disclose information in such a way that it would be breaking confidentiality within the council and externally with others, thus making a bad situation much worse. Consequently Ron, Robert, Barry and Tracey are unable to respond to the article beyond what is in this message either as councillors or otherwise, because confidential information obtained from within the council as councillors cannot be revealed.

The Parish Council, under the former chairmanship of Robert, and then Ron, has achieved many substantial benefits for our residents. It is heartbreaking to think of the possible damage to its reputation inflicted by the article. The rules are clear, and a councillor must never act alone on behalf of his council, or divulge confidential information held by the council, before or after leaving office. Nicholas has broken the rules, and acted alone, purporting to act on behalf of the council by giving his Parish Council Email address to which he invites responses.

Regardless of its content, please ask yourselves, would you write such an article, or like it if someone was to write such an article about you?

Please do not be influenced by uninformed opinion about the article. No one outside the Parish Council was witness to the events referred to by Nicholas.

In conclusion, please vote for your choice of candidates if Parish Council seats are contested at the election on the 2nd May 2024.

Parish Council Elections on 2nd May 2024 A hope for the future from Ron Galton.

I assume you have seen an editorial in the March 2024 Malherbe Monthly about the forthcoming Parish elections, because I am standing for election if seats are contested. Please consider what the Parish Council has achieved and I hope will achieve if you will allow me to remain as a Parish Councillor to continue serving your best interests.

I have now served for the last 20 years as a member of the Boughton Malherbe Parish Council. From the beginning I have acted variously as Chair of the Planning Committee, Vice Chair, and Chair of the Council. I have also been responsible for developing and administering the Parish Emergency Plan and have attended countless seminars and training courses, and I feel able to claim that I am the most experienced Councillor at the present time, except Robert Turner. In fact I have more experience in years of service than all the other councillors put together, except of course Robert, who is standing down after 36 years.

To promote and achieve anything, a councillor needs the backing of the council and its clerk, and with that majority backing I have been directly involved in the Parish Council achieving the following major successes among the many:

- *The grant of £100,000 from Quinn Estates, the developer of Boughton Park.
- *The controversial Traffic Calming Scheme at an installation cost of under £20.000 after the late removal of granite sets due to the potential for loud rumbling noise keeping residents awake at night that could not be overcome.
- *The retention of the 59 bus to Maidstone once a week after KCC withdrew financial support for many rural bus services, including the 59.
- *A lottery Fund grant and a KCC grant to enable the 59 bus to be fully funded for another two years. The bus is a lifeline and well used by elderly residents with bus passes from Grafty Green and other Parishes that co-operated to promote the service.
- *The improvements to road signage at the junction of Crumps Lane and Headcorn Road, a past accident black spot.
- *The improvements to our footpaths with the replacement of stiles with stock proof gates to benefit those who cannot easily climb over stiles.
- *The securing of the Kings Head pub including the Village Green, as an asset of community interest, so that should it be put up for sale, we have time to put a bid together if that is what our community want.
- *The initial negotiations with the Royal Mail to facilitate the Village Hall to host a pop-up post office every Tuesday morning that has now become a social occasion.
- *The employment of our Lengthsman to keep the Village Green tended, rubbish cleared from our roadsides, and our fire hydrants kept clear for use.
- * Funding, sponsoring, and contributing towards many local good causes and events.

There is still much more to do, and that is why I wish to continue for another 4 years serving you all as a councillor. In particular I want to promote more road improvements and continuation of the 59 bus beyond the current 2-year funding, because it is unlikely to ever be fully self-funding from fare revenue with so many elderly residents using bus passes. My hope is that I will be successful if the parish council election is contested, so please consider its record during my tenure, and my thoughts for its future.

'An update from your local MP Helen Whately

Where would we be without businesses? They grow our food, harness ideas that make our lives better, and generate the tax that pays for our public services – and that's just the start.

It's good news therefore that we now have over 5.6 million businesses across the country, an increase of nearly a quarter since 2010. Better still, we're lucky to have a thriving mix here in Faversham and Mid Kent.

From farms to foundries, health-tech to rocket manufacturers – we've got all kinds.

In fact, one of the only things they all have in common is how tough they've found the last few years. Covid and then the global fuel shock have given businesses plenty to think about besides expanding.

With unprecedented support we got business through the pandemic, and over the last year we've worked hard to halve inflation. If we want to keep funding our public services, it's now time to get businesses thinking about growing again.

When I was a minister in the Treasury, I spent a huge amount of time looking at what we can do to help small businesses grow. Taking that next step can be a challenge, and we have to support businesses by getting policy right.

That's why at last month's Budget the Chancellor introduced a host of new measures to support them, including raising the VAT threshold, freezing alcohol duty to support pubs, and cutting tax for the self-employed. These measures are on top of the £11billion investment incentive introduced back in the Autumn - the biggest business tax cut in modern British history.

But it's not just at a national level that we need to get things right. There are so many things we can do at a local level to help too, and I've made it one of my 5 priorities to help our local businesses grow - with support from councils and government ministers.

Just after the Budget I sent a survey out to all of Faversham's businesses asking them what more we could be doing to support them – like making sure the town's parking policy works for them.

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Maidstone Borough Councillor for Headcorn Ward

Hello again, This month I am writing to let you know what kind of things your Maidstone Borough

Councillors, Martin Round and I, get involved with personally. Martin has lived in Headcorn all his life and has a wealth of local knowledge which he is happy to share with me as and when the necessity arises. We are contacted on issues ranging from the emptying of bins, trimming of hedgerows, water supply problems, housing issues, planning problems and crime all the way through to licensed premises.

Local Borough Councillors are often seen as the face of politics generally and can get much to deal with whether they meet people in the street or at a local event like a Parish Council meeting or in emails. Certain issues are raised frequently on the same subject such as housing planning applications, but some are very individual like a housing need, Council Tax or health problem. Many issues that are raised with us are not part of Maidstone Borough Councils responsibility, but we can try to influence in those areas and/or pass the issue onto a relevant agency. We often work with our MPs, Kent County Council (KCC) or the Parish Councils and agencies like the Environment Agency and many others. It can be a minefield of uncertainty knowing who does what! But we always try to help and become involved in many areas of concern such as:

 Planning, Enforcement & Protection issues, including failure to comply with conditions and design specs, or with new contentious applications & sensitive landscapes. Headcorn is a Ward with many conservation and heritage concerns, and we frequently meet both residents and developers to ensure

- our countryside is protected at the same time as providing new residences. This means frequent interaction with MBC Officers and key agencies.
- The Ward has major "water issues" that stretch across the Green Sand Ridge with springs that turn roads into streams or even rivers during heavy rain and then it brings a flood risk in the clay basin of the Low Weald. The area has several tributaries that lead to the river Beult and then the Medway. The source of the river Stour also lies to the North /East. The Ward is one of the most central areas of the County and thus a major start of the Counties water issues that ultimately reach the sea. We have natural, geographical/geological and management issues as well as problems made by the Water utilities companies that include leaking broken pipes, periodic absence of supply, damage to roads and frequent road closures. For us the latter two items are a constant source of frustration and we often chase up KCC on them. I led the full Council motion to challenge the utilities services and Martin demanded the scrutiny of the key agencies.
- We continually lobby for local needs such as, affordable housing, pre-school, post school and early years nursery provision and sport and recreation facilities.
- Anti-Social Behaviour/Crime, speeding and localised vandalism/abuse like Fly-Tipping. This means meetings with the Police, alerting them to some potentially dangerous situations, liaising with Council Officers and Parish Councils and has included writing to the Chief Executive of Sainsburys for their lax interest in the prosecution of theft.
- Lobbying our MPs on matters they can influence like the need to have a fully accessible train station that is inclusive to those with disabilities.
- Supporting in many ways the Parishes and special community projects like the Heart of Headcorn Community Hub.
- Dealing with the 100s of emails that include individuals or groups of people
 with certain "case work" from road closures in a local area, excessively high
 estate management charges, or problems with Council Tax or rehousing.

We also deal with "whole Borough" issues through Committees such as Audit, Licensing and Full Council. Added to this we have briefings and training sessions most of which occur during the evening. Between us we also try to attend all of the four Parish Council meetings which occur monthly or bi-monthly and assist with any MBC based topics.

Lastly we both try to get around to meet people and understand what our residents want and where they think improvements could be made. It's a very busy role!

Grafty Gourmet

The classic taste of a rhubarb crumble in the form of a muffin.

Rhubarb Crumble Muffins

Ingredients

For the muffin mix:-

175g of caster sugar
175gof rhubarb, halved lengthways then diced
2 tablespoons of sunflower oil
1 egg
1 teaspoon of vanilla extract
125ml of buttermilk
200g of plain flour
1 teaspoon of baking powder
1 teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda

For the crumble topping:-

50g of light muscovado sugar
50g of plain flour
25g of porridge oats
1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon
50g of butter

- 1. Heat oven to 220C/200C fan. Line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper muffin cases. Stir the sugar and rhubarb together and set aside while you make the crumble topping. Mix together the muscovado sugar with the flour, oats and cinnamon, then rub in the butter until clumpy with your fingertips.
- 2. Stir the oil and egg, vanilla and buttermilk into the sugary rhubarb (don't worry if it's a little bit juicy). Now, add the flour, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda and stir well.
- 3. Quickly spoon into the cases, then scatter each with a thick layer of the crumble mixture. Bake for 15-18 mins until golden and a cocktail stick poked into the centre of a muffin comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack.

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


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Christian Message April 2024

Hallelujah, Christ is risen!

When you read this, it will be somewhere around 1st April, or April Fool's Day when traditionally people play little but, hopefully not, unkind tricks on each other, up to mid-day at least.

More importantly, this year, 1st April will also be Easter Monday so celebration will be in the air, the taste of chocolate eggs may well be on our lips and Spring flowers will be brightening up the village, reminding us about new life and the Good News of Jesus' resurrection. Thoughts of Lent will be becoming a distant memory.

But as I write this, Lent is in full swing, I am half way through a Lent course, last night friends quizzed me about what I might have given up or taken on for the month, and this morning I attended a Lenten Reflection gathering at Canterbury Cathedral.

One of the Lent course exercises was a practice, devised by Ignatius of Loyola in the 16th century, to read a passage from the Bible and then reread it again taking on the character of one of the people in the story. One of the Lenten reflection exercises was Lectio Divina, a practice which began as far back as the 6th Century, where we read a passage and then slowly re-read it again, each time thinking of a poignant word or verse on which we could meditate, ponder and pray, enjoying being in the presence of God.

These are well known methods of helping us to look at, and dig deeper, into a Bible story in order to have a personal encounter with God and discover new insights.

The Easter Day Gospel reading this year is Mark 16 verses 1-8, where we read about the miraculous rising of our Lord from the grave and his appearance to Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, at the tomb, after they found that the stone had been rolled away. It is a beautiful, but well-known passage, which you may have heard about many times before so I would urge you to read it and then read it again, applying one of these techniques. I can't predict what you will experience but pray that it brings you joy and a little nearer to our Lord who sent his only son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ, to free the world from sin and offer us all eternal life.
