LOWER HALSTOW PRIMARY SCHOOL

We've only completed 2 weeks of Term 4 but it has been jam packed with learning and several special events! We recognised the special date of 22.2.22 by having a 'Twos day - Choose day' where children were allowed to break the school rules, for example, by



coming to school in non-uniform, wearing make-up and nail varnish or bringing in an unhealthy snack for break-time. The children paid 50p for each rule that was broken and all monies went to our PTA ready to put towards a tyre play area for the school which is their current fundraising project.

This term saw the start of Year 5 swimming lessons as part of the key stage 2 national curriculum. There were a few nerves initially, however now the children look forward to their trip to the swimming baths each Wednesday. Hopefully when they get assessed later on in the swimming course there will be certificates heading their way. We aim to have all our pupils complete self-rescue as well as swim the minimum 25 metres due to the village's proximity to water.

To celebrate Shrove Tuesday, we held our annual pancake races. Unfortunately, the weather was not kind to us this year and we had to move the races indoors. Good fun was still had by everyone, with Rochester House being crowned as this year's champion pancake runners and flippers! Lots of pupil also took part in a sponsored flip at home.

One of the most exciting events so far this term was Book Week. The children took part in a variety of activities that culminated in a class book quiz on the Friday. Other activities included the Masked Reader competition where school staff recorded themselves reading excerpts from books and poems and the children had to guess which voice belonged to which member of staff. There was also a book swap where children exchanged books from home with other second hand books brought in by their classmates. There was also lots of time for relaxing and enjoying a good book. The week wouldn't have been complete without the traditional dressing up on World Book Day; there were some amazing, creative costumes including traditional fairy tale characters along with some more contemporary book characters. There are still lots more events planned for this term including a visit from an artist, the official opening of our school art gallery, Comic Relief Day and a visit from Kent Search and Rescue.

PASTORAL LETTER

Easter Hope

We have been living in unprecedented times which none of us have ever experienced before. As I write, I am very conscious of the reality and depth of human suffering – both on an international scale with Russia's invasion of Ukraine and the coronavirus which has claimed thousands of lives around the world. This has raised the question as to where God is in it all. I mean if God is so closely involved in creation, how are viruses, earthquakes and wars possible? Why does God allow suffering?

For people who are involved in terrible suffering, there is really no answer and all one can do is to share their pain in the context of belief in a loving God who holds them in His arms. Ultimately the question of human suffering is a divine mystery which will become clear after death when we will no longer see it through humanities tinted glasses but see clearly face to face.

However, for those of us not so personally involved and who struggle to justify our faith with family and friends, there are several things to be said.

Firstly, I firmly believe that God does NOT make people sick; and God does NOT want people to suffer. We can see this by looking at the life of Jesus. He healed the sick. He Cured people. He did not make them sick! But why, then, are so many in pain?

There is no good or easy answer when tragedies occur. But to try and understand, we must step back and look at the big picture. In that God gave humans free will and unfortunately people will choose to do bad things. God is not into controlling people's lives. If God was merely to control everyone's actions, feelings and responses that would take away our rights as individuals. He had to allow us the freedom to sin. Yet, on the other hand God does not want us to conform to the patterns of this world instead he wants to renew our minds by the Holy Spirit. As our minds are transformed into the likeness of Christ, the more the ways of the world behaviour and thought are pushed out of us.

Whilst God may not interfere with free will he does not leave us to suffer on our own, He is fully involved in His world and, I believe, fully suffers with each human person. That involvement is supremely seen in Jesus – God actually became a suffering human being with us and, although he was an innocent and righteous man, he suffered more than anyone else who ever lived, dying for humanities sin upon the cross. So in answer to the question, where is God in all the suffering? Well right at the heart of it, holding the hand of the person crushed by the falling rumble. Wiping away the tears of those who are grieving.

These thoughts I have shared with you I have believed for a long time and is the only way I can cope with devastating natural disasters, the death or suffering of Children and the pain of bereavement. However, as I have listened to people and read many articles in the last few years, I have come to a further insight. That as people turn to God in their suffering, He can work with them to transform the suffering and to bring new life and hope out of what seemed to be death and desolation. This is what Christian hope is rooted in, the death and resurrection of Jesus. Real hope is found in Easter because after every Good Friday there is always an Easter and Easter is about hope and restoration. The last two years has reminded us of how fragile and fleeting life is. But hope reminds us that we will one day be reunited with those we love. Death does not last forever. Jesus has conquered death and the grave! And through this it gives us HOPE for better things.

Easter is also a glimpse of eternity. Though this world is no longer perfect, as God intended it to be; He will create a perfect world for us in heaven where there will no longer be any tears, pain, or suffering; and "death will be swallowed up in victory." Why? Because God will ultimately get rid of everything that is not HIS. Suffering, sin, pain, tears and death are not HIS

We may not know what our earthly future holds but we have HOPE that all suffering will be relieved when we go to spend eternity with God.
