IMPORTANT BIN COLLECTION UPDATE FROM BASINGSTOKE AND DEANE -

We are currently experiencing high levels of waste collection staff self-isolating due to COVID-19. There are two additional bubble crews in place to aid Covid related absences, but the number of staff-isolating is high, and we want to prepare residents for the possibility that they could face disruptions to services, such as a delay in collections. As always, our priority is to protect the safety of our key worker staff and the residents and we are working hard to ensure our bin crews are tested quickly to enable them to return to work if their results are negative. If we need to suspend non-essential services such as garden waste or bulky waste collections, we will post this information via our website and social media in the first instance.

In the meantime, we thank residents for their understanding and patience during this difficult period and ask them to help keep our crews and themselves safe by wiping down bin handles when putting out their bins and bringing them back in again. ADVICE ON ACCESSING GREEN SPACES SAFELY -

The government has updated the guidance for using green spaces safely to reflect the new national restrictions that came into force in England on 6 January. Members of the public should minimise the time spent outside their home but can leave their home to exercise. This should be limited to once per day, and they should not travel outside their local area. You can exercise in a public outdoor place: by yourself; with the people you live with; with your support bubble (if you are legally permitted to form one); in a childcare bubble when providing childcare; or, when on your own, with one person from another household.

FREE ONLINE EXERCISE CLASSES AVAILABLE DURING LOCKDOWN -

Residents can sign up for free online exercise classes from Basingstoke and Deane Community Leisure Trust to support their physical and mental wellbeing during the current lockdown. MAY ELECTIONS UPDATE –

The Government has confirmed that elections will take place this year on Thursday 6 May and will see residents in Kingsclere voting on who will represent them on the borough council, county council and as Police and Crime Commissioner.

Elections will be run in accordance with the electoral commission's guidance and work began at Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council last year to prepare for running a safe election in May. This includes putting arrangements in place to help keep staff and voters safe at polling stations and counts. Residents are reminded that they have the option to vote by post or proxy, applying to do this is very simple and it is advised to do this early. The Fieldgate Centre is run by Kingsclere Community Association, a charity (No 1168366). All residents of Kingsclere over 18 are automatically members of the association, an organisation that relies on volunteers to run it. Be part of it, your support makes a difference.

Over the past year we have continued to refurbish the facilities at the Fieldgate Centre to ensure it can continue to function for years to come as our community centre. Our most recent work has been to the heating system. We have plans now to upgrade the electrical system. None of this capital work would be possible without significant grants from various organisations. We have a matched funding grant from Greenham Trust for the improvement work. We would like to thank the Editors and Committee of the Tower for their generous donation of £1000 which has been matched by Greenham Trust making this in effect a £2000 donation. Several private donations have also been made through this route. Other funders include Hampshire County Council and Basingstoke and Deane BC.

We have been able to welcome the NHS Health Visitor team to the community centre where a regular clinic for mothers and children has been set up. Activity is minimal at present so it is good to see the centre used for these clinics.

The community association is always looking at how we can deliver more for the community with the Meet Up @ The Fieldgate and the Playdays over the summer holidays being examples. If you have an idea for a community activity or service that could be run working with the association please get in touch.

As with most community organisations we rely on volunteers. Volunteering can be satisfying in a range of ways and can provide benefits to you that can be transferred to other areas including the world of employment. Working with us can allow you to help other people, gain work experience, improve your skills, make you more employable, make new friends, increase your confidence and allow you to help make Kingsclere an even stronger community. As a community business that needs to generate income to cover its operating costs we have a range of roles; desk based, facility based or activity-based work. Census 2021: Sunday 21st March 2021

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that records the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales.

The Census Engagement Manager across North Hampshire and West Berkshire is tasked by the Office for National Statistics to engage with all parishes in the area to alert the council to the forthcoming census and ensure that all residents have the support they need to enable them to complete the census.

Census 2021 will be a 'Digital First' census with everyone where possible being encouraged to complete the survey online. Between **3-8 March**, a pack containing a letter, a response envelope and information around data protection will arrive through the letterbox. The letter will include a box with the Unique Access Code for each household. The letter will give the householder instructions as to how to access their Census form online but will also give the number of the Census Contact Centre to call if the residents would prefer to access the survey via a household and/or individual paper forms. These will then be posted to the householder direct from the Contact Centre. The initial pack will NOT automatically contain a paper census questionnaire.

Reminder letters will be sent if responses not received by 21 March, then in due course a Field Officer will call to your door to enquire if further help is required.

Kingsclere Duke of Edinburgh Open Centre Bronze Award Applications

The Kingsclere DofE Open Centre is inviting applicants to apply for a place on the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award Scheme starting this April. The Kingsclere Open Centre operates under Hampshire County Council DofE Centre rules. There is currently space in this first intake for **6 young persons** who are currently in School Years 9 or 10. Further Bronze intakes will happen later this year.

In applying for a place on the Bronze Award, a young person will need to commit to spending at least one hour of their time per week within three separate areas of “Skills”, “Volunteering” and “Physical” over a period of 3 months with an additional 3 months spent in one of those areas of their choice. In addition, they will also take part in an overnight expedition towards the end of the scheme.

There is a cost for a place on the scheme of £35 and there may be a small charge by the Kingsclere Open Centre to cover costs for the expedition. Grants may be available to assist with those costs.

How do we live life at the moment? It seems like we are always waiting for the next announcement, checking to see what's happening with the curve, hoping that things will get better. It's been a hard time for so many. Perhaps you feel a bit like you are clinging on, holding on, trying to live as you can until lockdown is eased.

What I've found is that the lockdown has stripped so much away that many of us relied on. It has infiltrated every part of our lives, almost, and it leaves us feeling perhaps empty, isolated, disappointed, and longing for times before. When I watch a television programme from before, perhaps someone eating in a restaurant, walking down a busy street, or enjoying a day at the beach, I'm longing to get back to it; wishing I'd appreciated it more.

Many things have been stripped away. My question then is what is God doing? Looking back at the ups & downs in my life, I can see He has always been working and that He has good plans. I know that He cares deeply for those suffering physically from the virus, those who've lost loved ones, and also those who find each day such a challenge emotionally and mentally.

As some of you will know, I had some time off over Christmas (not ideal when you're a vicar!) and as I ease back into day to day ministry, I'm finding many of the small routine things a challenge. But I hope I'm learning that when I feel overwhelmed, I just have to cling on, hold on, trust that the Lord will lead me through.

And we can trust Him because of Easter when we remember Jesus who came in much weakness, who felt overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death as He contemplated His humiliation and crucifixion, and yet One who persevered to the end, knowing that God had a good plan to bring hope to all who trust in Him.

As we cling on during this lockdown, let's pray for better days but let's also remember that when we feel weak, the Lord is strong. Jesus said, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness". Let's trust that and hold on.

Hampshire County Council Solar Together Scheme

Hampshire County Council declared a Climate Emergency in June 2019 and Cabinet approved the Hampshire County Council Climate Change Strategy and Action Plan in 2020. The Strategy is based upon two targets set by the County Council; to be Carbon neutral and to be resilient to a 2 degrees temperature increase by 2050, for both the County Council and the wider County area.

One key sector where the County Council is taking more action is on energy use within the residential sector. Last summer we announced four community projects that will focus on this area, one of which is Solar Together scheme which launched on 15th February.

The scheme, managed by iChoosr, independent experts in group buying schemes, seeks to increase the amount of renewable energy being generated at household level. Targeted to homeowners and SMEs, the scheme will give residents the opportunity to buy high quality solar panels and battery storage from reputable traders at a highly competitive price.

Approximately 170,000 targeted homeowners across Hampshire will receive a direct mail of the offer from the week commencing 1 March, although anyone can register their interest to join the scheme.

How does the scheme work?

- Registration is free and without obligation. Simply provide details about your roof, such as its size and orientation.
- A supplier ‘auction’ will be held on 23 March, when our approved solar suppliers will bid for the work. The supplier with the lowest price wins and it usually favours local suppliers too. The more people that register, the better the deal should be for each household!
- From 22nd April you will be contacted with a personal recommendation, costs, and specification based on the details provided.
- The decision is then yours as to whether you want to accept your recommendation. There is no obligation to continue.
- If you accept, the winning supplier will contact you to survey your roof and set an installation date. Installations are planned to be completed by the end of October 2021.

Basingstoke & District Disability Forum

BDDF – your local disability charity wants to reach out to you and keep you connected if you do not have access to technology.



As with most charities and businesses, BBDF adapted quickly to the Covid pandemic in March 2020 by swiftly moving our services online and concentrating on fun and interactive activities. They are all free and enjoyed by our members who have the technology to access them. Our Lockdown One Members' survey reinforced that the 'digital divide' exists between 'the younger generation' and those of our members who are either 'older' and / or living with a disability. Fifty percent of respondents admit they lack confidence, and/ or don't have access to internet / technology.

With 75% of our respondents citing the biggest challenges they faced during lockdown 1.0 were around psychological distress, mental health, social isolation and loneliness, it supports our concerns that confidence and access to digital equipment is leading to increased feelings of isolation and mental health issues.

What we can offer:

- If the barrier is around confidence / know-how we can help you use your personal devices;
- Our newsletter can be posted out to you;
- A regular 'care call' to say hello and see how you are doing, with one of our volunteers;
- Disability signposting service, connecting you with what is out there to assist you with your queries;
- Face to face support groups / coffee mornings (again when allowed),
- Our weekly seated yoga class is currently available online.

March in the Garden



The clocks will be going forward later this month giving us relief from the short, dark days of winter. How lovely to see the garden come to life with a riot of colour from the spring bulbs, one of my favourites being the perfectly formed February Silver, not as easily found to purchase as February Gold, but well worth growing, although they may cost a little more.

The weather can still be inclement, and the daffodils don't look as if they will survive, but they manage to bounce back again when a warmer day comes along. There is plenty to be done in the garden now: mulching can be done around shrubs, young trees, and perennials. This helps to stop the soil from drying out later when the weather gets warmer and dryer. If you want to plant container grown shrubs, climbers, perennials etc they can be planted now, not forgetting to apply a slow release fertiliser to give them a good start.

Time to prune roses : the main aim is to stop them from getting out of hand and keeping a good shape. Over-crowding is a problem, no matter how they are pruned, they always grow back, so no need to worry about a mistake, but you do need to cut the very thin stems, those less than the thickness of a pencil are not worth retaining.

Prune Eucalyptus trees hard now: if left unpruned you will lose the pretty round leaves which have a silver glow, and they will become large trees with dull grey oval leaves. Cut back the stems of the Dogwood and Willow: the coloured stems have given a good show through the winter months but now is the time to give them a good prune to encourage new growth.

Also time to divide any hardy perennials that have become choked or too large - perhaps it would be good to give the perennials some support before they become too large and the job becomes more difficult.

The lawns will have been growing, so if possible start cutting, remembering to keep the mower blades high for the first few cuts to avoid damage to grass and machine. Prepare the vegetable plot for seed planting: parsnips and herbs can be sown now, early potatoes can be planted, and onion sets can go into the ground. Feed fruit trees and bushes with blood fish and bone, and as always enjoy your garden - and hope the pigeons keep at bay!

Last year's friendly robin has managed to retain his territory and looks in good condition. He has continued to politely announce his arrival for the two suet pellets he will accept, a third is refused at the time, maybe two fill his tiny crop. He has now learned to hover briefly at the fat ball feeder to snatch a snack.



Although goldfinches are not frequent on the niger feeder fourteen were perched in a nearby wild cherry tree – collectively a ‘charm’ of goldfinches.

On two occasions recently we have walked through a reedy, marshy paddock on days of early fog followed by sun. Under these conditions a species of grass – possibly a hair grass – looked magical as the clusters of tiny seed spikelets glittered when the sun caught the water droplets on them – a terrestrial Milky Way.

Our local stream was in full flow, water shining between its banks just short of breaching them. There was a sense of exuberance about it, almost as if to say, “yesterday I was puny, trickling around obstacles, but today I leap over them: I am a river!”

On the same walk we came across a hazel bush, leafless, but totally decorated with catkins, as though arranged by a careful hand. Their vivid lemon-yellow was highlighted by a weak sun emerging from the morning mist, and by a dark background of bramble leaves which were turning from green to purple. Other bushes bore catkins but nothing to rival the display of this one.
