In March, guest speaker, Richard Pullen, returned to give a presentation entitled "The First Tanks of 1916. A Prelude to Victory or a Wasted Opportunity?" This was an interesting, informative and often amusing tale of when tanks were first invented and entered battle. As most people know, tanks were first produced by Fosters in Lincoln though new information came to light last year and it turns out Robeys in Lincoln were making them also. There were many faults with the mark 1 which made it unsuitable for battle. The emergency door had a handle on the outside, so the Germans could open it and get inside the tank. The other doors opened outwards so again the enemy could shoot straight in if they were opened. The petrol tank was at the front, straight in the way of enemy fire. The metal was only 12mm thick. The guns on the sides made the tanks too wide to be taken by train so had to be removed. The tanks were then used to practice in so when it came to adding the guns back on, the metal had buckled making them difficult to fit. The steering wheels on the back were useless for such a large weight as a tank so were not used. Tank operators wore denim overalls and leather helmets so if they had to abandon the tank and run back to the British trenches, they were often mistaken as German soldiers and shot. All the training had been done on sandy soil so the swamp like no man's land was difficult to manoeuvre and many tanks were lost. Despite all this, every new tank was improved on based on the feedback from those who used them and by the time the mark 4 came out just a short time later, it worked well.

In April, a trip to RAF Scampton Heritage Centre was made by the group. Our guide took us to a large hangar that had now been converted to the Heritage Centre. Outside were 3 bombs, including one of the bouncing bombs from the Dambusters Mission and the grave of the dog belonging to Guy Gibson. Inside, we were first taken upstairs to see Gibson's office and the various meetings rooms used by 617 squadron. Our guide talked us through almost every item in each room, describing people events and trivia. He also pointed out how the true story of the Dambusters differed to the film. After the Dambusters part of the tour, we then went downstairs to more rooms used for meetings, a mock up serviceman quarters and a chapel. In these were treasures that illustrated the history of the formation of the RAF and RAF Scampton itself. Again, our guide talked us through almost every item in the room, including medals, maps, photos, paintings, uniforms, model aeroplanes and pieces of equipment including an ejector seat. There were pieces of the plane that Guy Gibson was in when it went down and he perished. There were also rooms dedicated to the Air Training Corps and the Red Arrows. This took about 3 hours and was thorough. I don't think any of us realised how much we would learn on this trip. At this point we were offered refreshments and given free time to look around the large area on the ground floor of the hanger that housed air and ground vehicles, including a Sopwith Camel and a Red Arrow.

Well, it's been a busy couple of months for the Parish Council with the Annual Parish Meeting in April, the new General Data Protection Regulations and year end activities in preparation for the publication of accounts, which is all keeping me on my toes.

The next thing for the Parish Council to do is encourage everyone to have a little tidy up around their property in preparation for the "Best Kept Village" competition. The judging takes place around the first two weeks of June, so still time for everyone to do a little bit to help. The judges last year made particular comment about weeds along gutters and pavements, as well as some gardens being a little untidy. Every little will help.

We have recently been notified of a blockage in the sewer system which has resulted in the Millfield Close pumping station being closed for some time and tankers being used to transfer the waste away until it could be cleared. Anglian Water are concerned about this and will be sending information notices to all households in the village to advise on what can and what cannot be flushed away. Please take the time to read this information and help to prevent the problem from occurring again.

The Annual Parish Council Meeting will follow the Ordinary Meeting on Thursday 31st May in the Village Hall Committee Room. This is where the Parish Council elects a Chair and Vice Chair for the coming year and reviews policies/procedures to ensure legislative obligations are being met.

THE ALLOTMENTEERS - Carol Dallamore

The spirit and camaraderie of Allotmenteering is evident in the airing and sharing of knowledge, skill and produce.

Seeds are the beginnings of all plants and generally easily available at the local garden centre or online. However, stores cannot stock everything and generally restock according to the previous year's demand. This means that a favourite flower or vegetable can, at times, be difficult to source. Keeping seed from one year's crop to replant the next year saves worry and money, but care must taken not to breed out some of the protective elements such as resistance to disease and in the case of sweetcorn, the shorter stem, small plots can quickly become a maze with giant plants!

Seeds in packets vary from a dozen or less to over a thousand - a field full. In general the allotment is used to provide just enough for personal use so we often share seed and plants and this in turn keeps cost and waste down.

Giant sunflowers and the dainty French Marigold saved from last year are already germinating to produce a sunny show this year. Marigolds confuse some of the insects that threaten food crops and both are good for the birds, with plenty to save and share. French dwarf beans and Mange tout peas saved from last year by Marion have been gratefully received and are already sprouting. Sadly she has moved to pastures new but plans to restart her Allotmenteering as soon as she can.

Taking over Marion's plot are Debbie and Karen. They are favouring flowers so we should be protected against some of the nasties and the bees venturing in for the nectar will help pollinate our vegetables as well.

Shirley helped by her husband, has taken on a half-plot in the other half of Harby Allotments near Harby Mill. New to the village she is keen to carry on a Family tradition in allotment keeping with home produced vegetables and fruit.

On starting the challenge of keeping an Allotment the first question is always 'What will grow best'? The answer is always – look around and see what others grow, read labels and plant what you fancy. If it doesn't grow, check back and see what you missed or plant something else next year. Even in a small area soil can alter by degrees from acid to alkali, loose to clay. Personally I love turnips, but they have been quite reluctant to grow consistently. This area is good for Brassicas, hence sugar beet and rape, so I will keep trying.



Wigsley news

A busy AGM in April saw Clive Thompson reelected as Chairman of Wigsley Parish Meeting for the next 12 months with Marion Goldacre continuing as Parish Clerk. In his update at the AGM, Clive reported another successful year for the village with the arrival of Fibre Broadband in December the highlight. Residents can now subscribe to the fastest broadband speeds available with some residents reporting download speeds of over 220Mbps!



Over the coming year, Clive will work with residents, our local Councillor and both District and County Councils to achieve more including:

- establishing a right of way over the path to the Sustrans Cycle Path 647 at Thorney bridge. A proposal is currently being considered by the landowner;
- relocating the village name signs as part of a wider traffic calming project the new locations have been agreed and,
- dedicating a commemorative plaque to Wigsley's former WW1 airfield in November 2018.

Spurred on by last years attempt in the Nottinghamshire Best Kept Village competition, Wigsley's entering the competition again this year and to get the village ready for judging, we're holding another Spring Community Clear Up on **Sunday 3rd June** followed by the first **Wigsley Meet 'n Eat** on the village green from **1pm** - an exciting fun-filled gathering for everyone in Wigsley!

Wigsley gets a First Responder!

In 2017 residents in Wigsley talked about getting a defibrillator for the village and the good news is that we now have one and more thanks to Marie Lowe who became a Level 2 Community First Responder in January 2018. If you call for an ambulance, it's likely Marie will be called out too and will probably be the first medic on the scene.

Marie was inspired to become a First Responder after coming across a serious accident near Drinsey Nook last year. What she witnessed reminded her of her own serious accident in November 1985 so she knows how important it is to get first aid as quickly as possible.

Since qualifying, Marie has been called out to a variety of calls from minor medical problems such as breathing difficulties, fainting and others requiring first aid to Road Traffic Accidents and critically ill patients. She trains once a month to keep up to date on emergency care techniques and procedures and is now attending emergencies with East Midlands ambulance service. Marie also works with the LIVES Community First Responder vehicle around the Gainsborough area and



is about to start training to become a Level 3 Community First Responder.

Volunteering for something like this isn't for everyone so we congratulate Marie on this wonderful achievement. It takes time and commitment and is an invaluable support for smaller communities like ours. Well done Marie!
