Fill Ethical Laundry liquid (£ 0.55/100ml), Washing up liquid(£0.35/100ml), Rinse Aid (£0.35/100ml), Bathroom Cleaner(£0.35/100ml), Steel and Glass cleaner (£0.35/100ml)

Faith in Nature Shower Gel (£0.90/100ml), Shampoo (£1/100ml) and Conditioner (£1/100ml)

Virunga Park chocolate milk and dark (£3.80/100g bar) – more expensive but profits directly support the Virunga National Park Bean to Bar project, which employs many of the widows of rangers killed in the protection of wildlife.

Serious Tissues Loo roll (£ 0.80/roll) As far as we know the only recycled loo roll that is made in England and for every roll sold, **Serious Tissues** plants a tree!

All liquids come as refills so please either bring your own containers or pay a deposit and use one of our containers.

Closure of the Village Shop in Grafty Green

An Extraordinary Parish Council Meeting was held on the 11th October in the village hall. 44 residents attended the meeting and there was a clear majority in favour of taking community action to explore all options for a shop/post office in the village. It was decided to establish a community committee to take this work forward. It was also decided that a questionnaire would be distributed to collect residents views to inform the discussions of the committee. The Parish council would like to thank those who attended the meeting and also thanks to everyone who returned the completed questionnaires we will publish the results and progress of the negotiations to find replacements in the December issue.

Grafty Green Stores And Post Office

In the aftermath of our announcement of the shop closure and the Parish Council meeting a number of questions, comments and opinions have arisen and I thought it helpful to take this opportunity to provide further information which I hope will allow people to better understand both our actions and the challenges facing any future shop.

In part, it appears that much emphasis has been placed on the personal reasons for closure and not enough on the financial. The personal reasons relate to why we are having to take action now but having decided that we need to change our circumstances, it is the financial position of the shop that means that we have chosen the closure route rather than other options that the public, and indeed we, would have preferred.

The long-term trend is that most shopping is done with a supermarket and only small intermediary purchases are made more locally. This convenience trade, even coupled with the Post Office trade, is not sufficient in a village of approximately 400 people to support a shop operating commercially (The Post Office does not pay a full salary). That is why very few villages the size of Grafty Green have shops. It is only because some have chosen to spend more and that not all hours worked have been paid, that the shop has survived as long as it has.

The decline in number of people in this category along with other uncertainties such as future government subsidy of the Post Office mean that a shop in the Grafty Green position does not make for an appealing investment. If we were to sell as a business the likely outcome would therefore be that the purchaser will be a developer. The idea of separating the shop from the house suffers from the same problem - a lot of investment would be required with a significant chance of failure and little reward for success.

Both the pandemic and the reduction in open hours that it precipitated do not change that position fundamentally. Without this flexibility the shop may well have closed sooner not only because of staffing but as the shop is more profitable thereby. The boost in trade at the start of the pandemic was short lived.

Whilst we feel sympathy for those who are concerned about a future without a shop in the village, especially the few who have been supporting it at a level that might have made it sustainable, this must be balanced with our other considerations. Even when staffed by volunteers, a small shop will have great difficulties with viability due to wastage without sufficient turnover. A shop in a small community will not be able to offer the same range and prices as elsewhere. Those who try to organise a shop for the future undertake a challenging task -- it will not succeed unless it is supported, and supported at a level probably greater than picking up convenience purchases forgotten at the supermarket.





59 BUS SERVICE

On and from Monday 1st November, the 59-bus service will be operated by Nuventure under contract to Kent County Council, rather than by Arriva. However, on schooldays only, Arriva will continue to operate the 0643 89 service from Grafty Green to Maidstone and the 1612 return 59 service from Maidstone.

The timetable is basically unchanged which means it is still primarily a feeder service to and from Sutton Road, Morrisons, requiring a change of buses to travel to and from Maidstone Town Centre. One significant alteration is the retiming of the Mondays to Fridays 0925 service to now depart from Grafty Green at 0930, thus ensuring that Senior Citizens passes can be used.

There has also been a significant reduction in adult and child day return fares for travel from the communities only served by the 59, which means that, for example, the adult day return fare from Grafty Green to Maidstone will now be £4-90. The through ticketing arrangements to and from Maidstone Town Centre will continue despite two operators being involved.

The service will be under constant review but comments I have already received suggest a strong preference for reverting to a through service to the town centre. Any comments are welcome at any time – they can be sent to wjcollins@btinternet.com – but the next meeting of the East of Maidstone Transport Group, on which I represent Boughton Malherbe Parish Council, has been called for 22nd November so any comments before that date would be particularly useful.

Apart from the impact of any road closures, something that is outside the operator's control, I am very confident that the new operator will generally provide a much more reliable service.

As with most things, of course, the message is **use it or lose it**, so why not at least try it out!

Grafty Gourmet

This pork dish is guaranteed to be juicy and tender. A great roast for a Sunday or for those cold nights. Serve with potatoes & vegetables of your choice.

Roast Pork Loin with Apples

For the pork:

1 boneless pork loin roast (approx. 1.5kg)

4 cloves of garlic

2 teaspoons of salt

½ teaspoon of freshly ground black pepper

2 tablespoons of olive oil

2 Granny Smith apples, quartered

1 large onion, cut into eighths

2 tablespoons of unsalted butter, cut into small pieces

2 fresh rosemary sprigs

2 fresh sage sprigs

1/4 cup of maple syrup

For the green apple sauce:

1 medium Granny Smith apple, cored and quartered

½ teaspoon of freshly grated lemon zest

1 tablespoon of freshly squeezed lemon juice

1 small garlic clove, grated

3/4 teaspoon of finely chopped fresh mint leaves

3/4 teaspoon of finely chopped fresh sage leaves

½ teaspoon of finely chopped fresh parsley leaves

½ teaspoon of finely chopped fresh rosemary leaves

1/4 teaspoon of salt

1/4 cup of olive oil

- 1. Heat the oven to 180 degrees. Make garlic paste:- Cut off the stem end of the garlic cloves. Coarsely chop the garlic, then sprinkle with the salt. Hold the blunt side of the knife with both hands, to flatten. Use the knife to create a small garlic and salt pile, then press again. Repeat this process a few more times until you have a smooth paste. Sprinkle the pepper over the paste.
- **2.** Score the pork skin and rub the garlic paste evenly all over. Set aside at room temperature for half an hour.
- **3.** Brown the pork loin on all sides:- Heat the oil in a 10- to 12-inch pan over a medium-high heat until shimmering. Add the pork and sear on all sides until it's deep golden-brown and easily releases from the pan, 4 to 6 minutes per side. Once all sides have browned, transfer the pork loin to a plate.
- **4.** Add the butter, onion, apples, and herbs to the pan. Turn off the heat, but keep the pan on the stove. Transfer to a roasting dish and scatter the apples, onion, butter, rosemary, and sage. Drizzle with the maple syrup. Add the pork loin and any juices to the roasting dish. Nestle the browned pork loin on top of the onion, apples, and herbs, and pour in any accumulated juices from the plate. Roast the pork loin for 1 hour.
- **5.** Make the green apple sauce while the pork roasts. Place the Granny Smith apple, lemon zest, lemon juice, garlic, mint, sage, parsley, rosemary, and salt in the bowl of a food processor fitted with the blade attachment. Pulse until finely chopped, 12 to 14 pulses, scraping down the sides of the bowl when necessary. Drizzle in the olive oil and pulse again until well mixed.
- **6.** Check that the pork has cooked through and rest for 20 minutes. Slice the pork loin crosswise into ³/₄ inch thick slices. Serve the sliced pork with the onion and apple pieces. Drizzle with some of the pan drippings and the green apple sauce.



Christian Message November 2021

Ancient church buildings abound in Kentish villages. Almost all of them are dedicated to one saint or another. Here in the Len Valley were are reminded of Mary in Lenham, John the Baptist at Harrietsham and Nicholas at Boughton Malherbe.

As a child I was confirmed in Graveney church which is dedicated to All Saints as is Ulcombe in the Len Valley. On November 1st the great hymn, 'For all the saints', will be sung in many churches.

What is a saint? According to the Oxford English Dictionary it is a word which is, among other things, used to describe a holy person; someone who is very virtuous; a member of the company of heaven. The saints are usually thought of as especially outstanding Christians; those who have put their trust in Jesus Christ.

I have no idea where the idea of calling a church building St John's or St Peter's came from or when the tradition began. If you do know PLEASE tell me! In his letters of teaching about faith the apostle Paul described Church members as SAINTS. Here are 2 examples. In Romans chapter 1 verse 7 and in his first letter to the Corinthian church he described them as 'God's holy people.' Similar words are used to open his letter to the church in Ephesus. Paul's letter to the Philippian believers begins, 'To all God's holy people in Christ Jesus at Philippi.

Words change their meaning over the years and modern translations of the Bible tend to begin: 'to the church at'

Words may change but the original meaning of them does not vary much. Those who have put their trust in Jesus Christ are essentially the same as those to whom the apostle wrote many years ago. Many of our joys and sorrows are similar; our heartaches are the same and there is in all of us, I believe, the same desire to be faithful to the one who died for us and to obey his teaching.

So here, in the Len Valley churches WE are the Saints, all of us, God's holy people.

So here is a suggestion. Let's on November 1st pray in our homes for our fellow worshippers in the Benefice and for the growth of the Church in our nation. Paul's words from 2 Thessalonians 3:16 are relevant: *Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times and in every way. The Lord be with you.*
