February Report – Cllr Marcus Hartnell, Seaton & Colyton Division

## **Budget 2023/24**

The County Council budget for 2023/24 has been considered by the three scrutiny committees and will go onto Cabinet and then Full Council on the 16<sup>th</sup> February. I attended the full day Corporate Scrutiny Meeting on the 30<sup>th</sup> January.

Through my reports you will be aware of the financial challenges facing Devon County Council (DCC). The two biggest challenges are inflation and demand for services, particularly within the Integrated Adult Social Care & Childrens & Young Peoples Futures service areas. The table below gives an overview of the service budgets.

The approved service revenue budget targets for the 2023/24 financial year are set out in the table below.

You will see that the investment required to cover inflation and National Living Wage increase is £51.5 million and a further £63.8 million to cover service demand pressures. All services have found savings or additional income as part of ongoing efforts to control budgets. Overall, the revenue budget will increase by 10.5% with the focus of additional investment for those who need help most, including vulnerable adults and young people.

By way of contrast, the highways capital budget for maintenance & potholes is £52.8 Million, which is part of a 3-year settlement from the Department of Transport ending in 2024/25. This settlement was agreed before inflation took hold, and therefore has not increased to allow for inflation, meaning the council is grappling with meeting rising costs with a fixed income. At the scrutiny meeting I proposed that Government be lobbied to fund DCC more to address the pressures faced with our deteriorating road network. This was agreed unanimously.

#### Cut price bus fares are being offered to help passengers save money.

Bus passengers in Devon can take advantage of a cap on single bus fares as part of the Department for Transport's new fares initiative, through the Government's Help for Households campaign. Bus users will pay no more than £2 for a single journey when boarding the bus anytime in January, February and March. With people up and down the country facing the impacts of the cost-of-living crisis, many can save money whilst choosing a more sustainable method of transport. A recent report by Stagecoach found that motorists replacing some journeys by bus and active travel could save up to £6,000 a year. In addition, the report found that having the right measures in place to encourage people to make the switch, including cheaper fares, could help remove one billion miles of car journeys each week and cut CO2 by nearly 400,000 tonnes per week.

## A3052 Resurfacing update.

Good progress is being made resurfacing sections of the A3052 between Branscombe Cross and Seaton Tower, with works scheduled to finish a day later than planned on Tuesday 7th February.

## Highways update.

As we go about our daily business it is apparent that our highways are taking a severe battering because of recent cold and wet weather. Safety Defects (largely potholes) are being reported at an alarming rate with Highways gangs prioritising Aroads. Some gangs have been redeployed from routine maintenance to dealing with safety defects, and as a result the planned work at Hooperhayne Lane/Downhayne Road Colyton has been postponed. I continue to work closely with the local Highways Officer to ensure reported defects are in the system and dealt with as quickly as possible. #### Cost of Living Help & Advice.

The number of households in Devon unable to access or afford the food that they need to ensure that they and their families stay healthy has increased by 70 per cent in 18 months. And more than a third of households say that that they plan to switch off their heating altogether this winter to help make ends meet.

DCC are working with local partners, including District Councils, the NHS, and the voluntary and community sector, on ways to support communities, and there are a variety of schemes on offer depending on people's circumstances. ## Levelling up funding announced for projects in Devon.

Multi-million-pound schemes to improve transport links in Exmouth and Okehampton are among more than 100 projects receiving a share of £2.1 billion through the Government's latest round of Levelling Up funding.

DCC have been awarded £15.7 million to complete the Dinan Way link in Exmouth, and West Devon Borough Council has successfully received £13.4 million to develop a new railway station on the eastern edge of Okehampton.

The funding for the Destination Exmouth project will enable the completion of Dinan Way link road, helping to tackle congestion and remove traffic from the town centre. The project, which is also supported by East Devon District Council, will improve walking and cycling routes as well as enhancing the town's transport hub. The West Devon Transport Hub will build on the successful reinstatement of the Dartmoor Line in November 2021. As well as a new station on the outskirts of Okehampton, the scheme will also include cycle facilities and electric vehicle charging points to promote active travel and green travel.

## **Budget 2023/24**

The County Council budget for 2023/24 was approved at a lengthy full council meeting on 16<sup>th</sup> February. The budget sees significant increases in spending on services that support vulnerable children, young people, and adults in response to rising demand for those services. A band D householder will see the DCC proportion of their council tax increase by £1.49 per week.

The fact is though, the council tax rise, plus funding we receive from the Government, will not balance our budget book. Spending this much on priority services to meet growing demand means having to make savings in the region of £47.5 million from elsewhere to balance the books. We need to make the most of every pound we spend.

Most of those savings are earmarked to come from adult social care, and last week we launched consultations, putting forward proposals on ways that we could make savings in some specific services. We're contacting the people who used those services directly, to ask them what they think.

## Seaton to Colyford Multi use trail

A report is being presented to cabinet next week (8 March) recommending approval to construct the new off-road section of the multi-use trail (stop line way) from the rear of properties at The Saltings, following the field boundaries and then connecting to Marsh Lane and onto the Wetlands.

Vegetation is already being cleared with construction planned for summer 2023 and planting and landscaping taking place in October. Planning permission was granted for the improvements in 2011 and it has been the long-term ambition of DCC, (and numerous local members along the way!) to complete the route between Seaton &

Colyford to provide a safe and continuous trail that promotes walking, wheeling, and cycling as well as the wider benefits for local tourism and accessibility to the Wetlands. Link to full cabinet report below.

## Be prepared for the unexpected

Communities in Devon are being invited to apply for funding to help them be better prepared for emergencies or unexpected events.

Independent charity Devon Communities Together is working with DCC and the Environment Agency to provide the funding opportunities.

This latest programme is financed by DCC and the South West Regional Flood & Coastal Committee local levy funding, and is administered by Devon Communities Together as part of its role in the Devon Community Resilience Forum (DCRF), whose core mission is to help communities prepare for, and respond to, emergencies.

# Scheme 1 – up to £250 for communities that wish to develop their own Community Emergency Plan

The Devon Community Resilience Board (DCRB) wants to encourage more communities to produce a Community Emergency Plan (CEP).

A CEP is a document which helps guide a community to organise a response to a local emergency, from flooding or snow to the completely unexpected. They ideally need to be updated every three years, however some communities in Devon either don't have a plan in place or are not sure how to put together a support document for their community. The aim is that by providing this funding, many more communities across the county will be able to put plans in place to ensure their resilience in case anything happens within their community.

Once approved and completed, the DCRB will upload a completed CEP to a secure government gateway. This enables emergency responders to combine local knowledge with their expertise, allowing an effective place-based, joined-up response.

Devon's communities can bid for this fund to help form their own Community Emergency Planning group.

# Scheme 2 – up to £1,500 for small scale works and resilience equipment (once a CEP is in place)

Experience has shown that a wide range of small resilience measures can make a real difference to communities. This funding is available to communities to improve their own resilience with equipment and small scale works, and may range from the provision of sandbag stores and other flood protection equipment, road signs, tools and personal protective equipment, to one off small scale works to reduce risk.

DCRF recommends that a Community Emergency Response Team defines its own shopping list to meet local requirements. Examples of resilience measures can be provided by the DCRF, other communities, or Devon County Council to help a Community Emergency Planning Group consider what might be best for a particular area.

## Fairtrade – directly supporting food producers.

Devon has successfully renewed its Fairtrade status for each of the last 14 years, by promoting and encouraging people to choose Fairtrade goods and support food producers across the world.

Fairtrade is about better prices, decent working wages and conditions, local sustainability, and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers. More information can be found here: <a href="Home-Fairtrade-Foundation">Home-Fairtrade Foundation</a>

By requiring companies to pay sustainable prices to farmers and food producers, which must never fall lower than the market prices, Fairtrade enables the poorest and weakest producers to improve their position and have more control over their lives.

This year's Fairtrade Fortnight has begun and runs until Sunday 12 March. It is highlighting the urgent threat to the future of the foods we love and the livelihoods of the people who grow them, as they face the worst effects of the climate crisis.

According to the Fairtrade Foundation, food such as coffee, bananas and chocolate could become more difficult to buy due to climate change.

The current financial crisis is also taking a heavy toll on many people who are struggling to make ends meet, particularly so for smallholder farmers and workers, with the costs of fuel, fertiliser and food all increasing beyond what is affordable. Council Meeting Feb 23

1. The Budget-

Conservative councillors did not support the Budget on 2 grounds-

Car Parking Charges

Public Toilets, whilst recognising that this is not a mandatory service, they are a vital service in a tourist area like East Devon, and the Conservatives did not support the sweeping closures which had reduced the public toilets from 27 to 14.

As I reported previously, the Local Government Finance Settlement was higher than expected, and EDDC was allocated an additional £349,000.

However £85,000 had to be taken from the Reserve to balance the Budget.

The Council cannot continue to use Reserves to balance the Budget- it is unsustainable.

#### 2. Motion re Transgender Rights-

A motion re EDDC revising its Equalities policies to ensure Transgender rights were included, and Agreeing in principle to sign up to Stonewall's Diversity Champions Programme for employers, was passed by the Council.

I considered the Stonewall programme presented an issue of concern-Police Scotland is the latest public body to withdraw from the diversity scheme, following on from the BBC, House of Commons, Equalities and Human Rights Commission, the House of Lords and Ofcom. and Abstained as I could not support that part of the motion.

#### **Good Evening**

We would like to raise our concerns over the use of the agricultural land that is adjacent to ours at Wiscombe Linhay. Some years ago now this field had planning permission granted for a barn, which has more recently burnt down, since June 2022 the owner has been placing large metal shipping containers on his field. During a conversation with Chris (when there were 3 or 4 containers) the owner said that he was converting two so that he could spend occasional days there during the summer, even fitting a rainwater harvesting system for a shower. We are now almost 9 months later and there are 8 large multi-coloured metal shipping containers, a large caravan-style porta cabin (which arrived last week), a small towable caravan, and a large generator on the field; we are concerned that this could turn into a small village of inhabited shipping containers. It's also a real eyesore in our area of outstanding natural beauty.

We are unsure of what can be done but felt it should be brought to your attention and discussed at your meeting. Attached are a couple of pictures to give you an idea,
