

Remembrance

In November we recognise those who have given their lives in numerous conflicts, fighting for good. Many men from Hothfield died during the two World Wars some of whom have no known grave, and many more were injured. Hothfield's churchyard contains two soldiers and we mark their graves with small crosses with poppies to remember them particularly at this time. It is disappointing that this year one of those small crosses was removed from the last resting place of Private Stanley Cresswell who died while based here and had no family to claim his body.



Postcard and Photo Album from the Manor – an update

In October I reported that we had been loaned an album of photos and postcards that had been rescued from Hothfield Place (the old manor) before it was demolished. Many of the postcards had been sent to maids Rose Tyrrell or Agnes Kerr 'care of Lady Hothfield' at Hothfield Place, and one of them had been sent to a Percy Luckhurst care of Lord Hothfield. We have found Agnes on several census in the early 1900s as staff of the 'Hothfields'. Percy was a senior stablehand looking after the Lord and Lady's horses.

Just before our history exhibition at the end of September I had been contacted by a lady, Vicky, who is researching the Luckhurst family who lived at Rippers Cross, Hothfield. She is related to the family by marriage and is the step-great-niece of Percy Luckhurst. She came to the exhibition with a family photograph album, and I showed her the original postcard that had been sent to Percy in 1913 – she was pleased to hold it in her hand knowing that her great-uncle had held it over 100years before, and to be sitting in the same church where he probably had been expected to worship when working with the Lord and Lady at Hothfield.





Vicky showed me the family pictures in her album which included two men in fireman's uniforms – but these were Canadian firemen. Vicky knew that one of her relatives, George, had gone to Canada for a while and worked as a fireman there after serving in the First World War where he was injured. The exact same photograph was also in the album that had come from Hothfield Place! George Luckhurst had clearly sent the photo from Canada to his brother Percy when he was working at Hothfield. It seems that the two different albums from two different places had at least one common thread, united briefly during the exhibition.

Vicky is researching her family and will update us in due course. There seem to have been many Luckhursts at Hothfield but it looks like they were not all related. Agnes Kerr had married a Percy Luckhurst at Hothfield – but not the same Percy Luckhurst. Confused? Me too! It seems that Agnes worked at the manor with one Percy Luckhurst while being married to another Percy Luckhurst. Percy was the last of Vicky's Luckhurst family to live in Hothfield, whilst George and his wife Myrtle are buried in the grave-yard with three other relatives.

Vicky kindly donated two photographs of the children at Hothfield School in 1905, and she will be providing scanned copies of pictures from her family album so that we may also have them in the village archive. The school

photo of the Infants includes a teacher Miss Edith Luckhurst, who is also mentioned in the school log books around that time. But is she one of Vicky's relatives? There were at least two Edith Luckhursts at around the same time, as well as two Percys.

History Society publications

We now have available a new batch of the paperback book of "Hothfield in the 20th Century" with pictures, stories and maps of the village's life during the 1900s. This was published in 1999 by the History Society and it complements extensive research by the Reverend Harry Russell who wrote the history of Hothfield and many of its notable families from as far back as he could up to 1902. We have electronic versions (Word for Windows and .pdf) of both publications. The Rev.Russell's work extends over 400 pages of text (sadly no maps or photographs). The 20th Century book is available for £10 in paperback (comb-bound) or £5 on USB or CD; Harry Russell's work is available for £10 on USB or CD. Could You Help Us Find a Home for a Village Defibrillator?

The Parish Council is very keen to install a defibrillator in the village. These devices are proven to save lives and are an invaluable resource in an emergency, but at present, we don't have one.

The challenge we face is that defibrillators must be housed in a secure, heated cabinet, which requires an electric supply. So far, we have been unable to find a suitable, accessible location in the village where one could be installed.

We are therefore reaching out to residents: would you be willing to have a defibrillator cabinet installed on an outside wall of your property? The Parish Council would meet the costs associated with installation, including the provision of an electrical supply.

An Open Letter to Residents – Keeping Our Footpaths Clear

Hothfield Parish Council has recently been in discussion with KCC Highways about the condition of footways in the village. A number of our pavements are currently obstructed by overhanging vegetation from private properties. In some places, this is reducing the width of the footway to the extent that pedestrians are forced to step into the road.

For the safety and comfort of all residents especially children, parents with pushchairs, wheelchair users, and those with limited mobility—it is important that our footways remain clear and accessible.

As a general rule, there should always be a <u>minimum of 1 metre</u> <u>of unobstructed footway</u> available for pedestrians. We therefore kindly ask all residents to check the boundaries of their properties and ensure that hedges, trees, or plants are cut back so they do not encroach onto pavements or footways.

DECEMBER OF HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS



In the darkest weeks of the year the mosses and lichens on the reserve stand out well in low winter light, ranging from dark velvet in the woods to almost neon feathery green in the bogs.

The 1951 SSSI citation for Hothfield Heathlands includes twelve un-named Sphagnum moss species. It's the sphagnum mosses that modify the environment and create the bogs, the most important and one of the largest components of this habitat, so rare in Kent. In his 2021 Flora of Hothfield Heathland botanist Alex Lockton reports that fourteen species of sphagnum moss have been recorded here, although at least one has been lost. His detailed assessment concludes that *bog habitat has been well protected by the management*. For 'management' here read volunteers as well, so a Christmas shout-out to them all.



Sphagnum mosses on the surface absorb and filter over twenty times their weight in water, and slow its flow through the bogs. The wet peat below, half-rotted sphagnum in anaerobic conditions, is a huge carbon store. The plants are non-vascular so have no lignin or real roots to support tall growth. They are usually one cell thick, their complex feathery leaves 'about as big as a fingernail clipping' (Hope Jahren: Lab Girl) to maximise water capture and absorption into cells that balloon with moisture or shrink in drought, the small photosynthetic cells in between manufacturing food. With limited nutrients sucked up through the rhizoids and absorbed from rain, fog or snow, the mosses grow only a few centimetres a year, expel hydrogen molecules into the water, increasing the acidity thereby reducing the possibility of competition from larger or faster-growing plants.

The sphagnums on the reserve form complex communities with other plants, including other mosses such as *Aulacomnium palustre*, the combinations of bog-moss species varying as weather cycles and ground conditions change. Summarising Lockton, there are still sphagnum species in the drier bog 1 nearest Hothfield village. Bog no 2 with the plastic wood causeway has hummocks of *Sphagnum papillosum* (papillose bogmoss), often with *S. capillifolium* (red bog-moss) and

lawns of *Sphagnum fallax* (flat-topped bog-moss). The latter is also abundant in bogs 3 and 4, mostly forming lawns in wet parts of the bog and is perhaps the most important plant for the formation of the mire, because it acidifies the water and creates the substrate on which the more specialised bog plants can grow. It is known in only a few sites in East Kent. *Sphagnum squarrosum* (spiky bog-moss) and *Sphagnum palustre* (blunt-leaved bog-moss) prefer the slightly richer water on the edges of bog 4. Red bog moss often shows red and is also found in bog 3; both its sub-species *capillifolium* and *rubellum* occur in bog 2, the former makes very dense hummocks whereas the latter is more spreading. *Sphagnum subnitens* (lustrous b-m) is frequent in bogs 2 & 4, where it is the first species to form hummocks rising out of the *S. fallax* lawn. In the more acid parts of bog 2 it is replaced by *papillosum* and *capillifolium*. *Sphagnum auriculatum* (Cow-horn b-m) prefers the more acidic water in the centre of bog 3. The microscopic life teeming within the bog-moss hummocks and swards is another article. If you're wondering, clubmosses are an entirely separate family; like mosses they propagate by spores but are vascular. A few species grew here in the past but are no longer present.



Nine Oaks Vineyard – Sheep Grazing

We wanted to let walkers know that over the coming months we'll be grazing sheep in the vineyard as part of regenerative farming practices.



Using sheep helps us to naturally manage the grass and weeds between the vines, reduce the need for tractors and therefore increase soil health through less compaction, and encourage greater biodiversity across the vineyard.

This is something we have been aiming to do for many years, and now that this year we have finally completed the upgrade to our perimeter fence we are now in a position to do so.

The flock will most likely be made up of pregnant Romney Ewes. We ask that dog walkers take particular care as the new residents settle in.

During the Winter months when the vines are in dormancy there is a low risk of sheep causing damage to the vines. However, as the vines wake up in the Spring we will move the Ewes on to new pastures before lambing.
