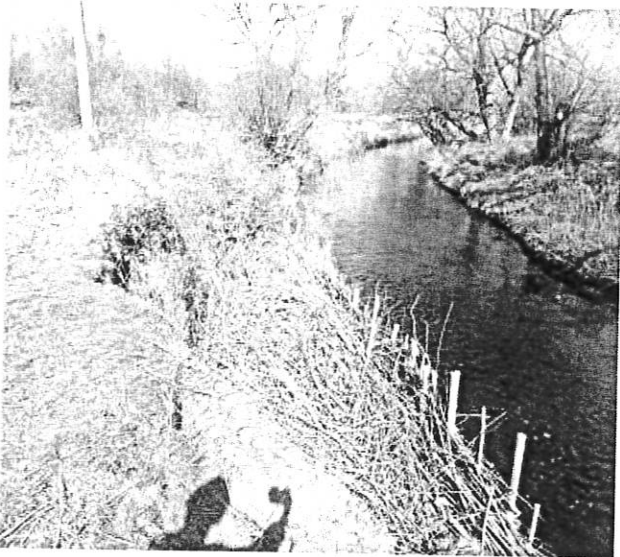

Subject: RE: Erosion at Balderton Lake



Hi Karen,

We have installed spiling along our bank of the River Idle at the Idle Valley NR where erosion has occurred. Willow posts are driven into the river along the original line of the bank. Willow is then woven between the posts to create a living barrier and the space behind the barrier is back-filled with brash (see attached)



I am unable to find recent photos, but willows have grown along this section. The structure required significant maintenance after around 4-5 years and so it is realistically a short-term solution. The other issue is you state that people like the views across the lake and feed the wildfowl from that area which wouldn't be possible if a living barrier was established.

Has consideration been given to a floating boom barrier? Depending on the material/structure of the boom it could provide safe loafing areas for wildfowl, gulls and terns.

A combination of hard engineering, boulders for example, and coir rolls could be a viable solution that would also create habitat for a range of wildlife. The boulders create a shoreline where birds can forage.
