If you don't have email or aren't on the "residents" email distribution list you may wonder what this article is all about, but bear with us.

The recent water problems brought about by the maintenance work at the Stanmore reservoir meant that we used email to:

- Alert everyone to know of individual problems

   which then meant that we knew the issue was probably village-wide
- Save several people driving round the village to see if there were water people working and hence causing the problem
- Communicate what action had been taken and the responses received
- Give us ammunition to argue when talking to the water and OFWAT people re communication (or lack of it)

Those who responded to the request for feedback - "are the emails a help or hindrance?" were one hundred percent positive, and thank you for your kind comments, we do sometimes need to know our efforts are appreciated, otherwise we'll stop!

The current system relies on us being at home and alert to new emails and being able to forward them in a timely fashion, so it can't be relied upon as the sole communication in an emergency. For the future we are looking into the possibility of using "group" emails which would be immediate and enable any member of the group to communicate to everyone else in the group – the concern we have though is that if not every household in the village joins the group it will still involve us in the same sort of checking and sweep-up work which we currently gladly do to ensure those who don't have email don't miss out on the WIN, so we're thinking hard about it. As can be seen preparations are well underway to prepare the ground and clubhouse for another season. Our Groundsman team of Alan Bloor, Jon Evans (Chopsey) and Doug Brown are the ones to thank for the immense effort they put into making the ground an absolute picture. On the playing side.....

- We have been running 6 indoor training sessions at Wantage for U15 and below. This has been well attended with over 20 players at each session. The training has been led by Tony Scriven supported by George Storton, Andy Parkes, Hugh Evans, Adrian Dray, Dave Bebbington, Chris Benning and Rob Lawson.
- The first league match is on 24<sup>th</sup> April (see Club website for calendar of events -<u>http://www.westilsleycricket.net</u>). We run 2 sides on Saturday and one on Sunday. We also play in a Wednesday league - ' bish/ bash/bosh' format. For those of you have played in the past and would like to play a relaxed and informal game of cricket – Sundays are ideal. You are very welcome!
- We are always looking for umpires and especially this season, so if you know the game a bit and would like the best seat in the house, we can introduce you to umpiring.
- Youth training at the ground will take place at the ground:

- Every Tuesday U9, U11, U13 and Girls STARTS 27<sup>th</sup> APRIL at 1800
- o Every Friday U15 & U17
- Fridays will once again be an opportunity for some fun games and an opportunity for the 'Minis' to be introduced to the game. A coach will be around to organise games. Parents are very welcome to join in with helping these sessions.

- Many will know that John Verney has been running the bar for many many years. In fact he was one of the founders of the club decades ago. The success of Friday evenings has meant we need help with the bar. Hence if you would like to help out, please let John know on a Friday.

- On club running issues....
- Redeveloping the clubhouse we have been seeking funding and raising money for a couple of years to rebuild the changing room and storage facilities. We are optimistic that by getting ECB Clubmark status (a quality mark for a well-run club) that we will get some funding from the ECB. Our plan is to commence work this winter. The plans are posted in the club.
- Pitch use based on feedback from the villagers, we have made sure that there are a number of Sundays during the season when cricket is not scheduled. We already have a number of villagers hiring the club / ground for parties etc. The volume of youth cricket has increased over the last 2 seasons. To mitigate the increase, Brightwalton CC have kindly offered use of their recreation ground.
- *Health and Safety* being granted Clubmark status means that we do and will continue to

manage health and safety to the highest level of effectiveness possible. At the last Parish Council, some concerns were raised about safety to passers by and neighbours of the Rec ground. We are in the process of planning further actions that can reduce risk of damage or hurt to property and, more importantly, people from cricket balls. Making passers by more aware, without being excessively obtrusive(!), is a straightforward We need your help in this matter, step. particularly if you have guests in the village who might not understand the nature of the game and could be made aware with a quiet word!

#### POLICE UPDATE FOR APRIL

Here is the latest neighbourhood update for Downlands from Neighbourhood Specialist Officer, PC Simon Easton

The latest anti-social behaviour and crime figures for the Downlands can be viewed at http://maps.police.uk/view/thames-vallev (opens new window). The facility allows you to view the crime statistics for various types of crime and also allows you to view the statistics for different areas of the force. Crime is up slightly by 10 per cent across the Downlands area when compared to the same three month period last year. Levels of antisocial behaviour have fallen by over 42 per cent which is very positive.

I'd like to start with a good news success story. Following a report from a local resident of a suspicious vehicle on Saturday 27 March, police units searched the area to locate the people involved after sending out a Rural Text Alert with details of the incident. A vigilant Text Alert member then saw the vehicle travelling behind him and immediately notified police. Due to his reactions, the vehicle was located and all occupants were stop checked by police. On this occasions there were no offences but if an offence had occurred, then the Text Alert scheme would have led to two arrests. Our top priority is currently hare coursing as it is still a problem in the Downlands area along the Ridgeway. The areas which appear to be targeted most are the Ilsleys, Catmore, Brightwalton, Farnborough, and Beedon. We are still actively patrolling these areas throughout the day and night with the view of disrupting and preventing any further coursing. However if you have any information or witness such activity please contact us. Please be vigilant and report any sightings of such activity immediately to increase our chances of catching the offenders before they leave the area. This problem is often also linked to other rural offences such as burglaries to sheds, outbuildings and garages (non-dwellings) and thefts, so our patrols are focused to stop suspicious vehicles in areas where offences have occurred.

The issue of anti-social behaviour in Leckhampstead appears to be decreasing as we have not received many reports in recent weeks. We are also currently reviewing the issue of speeding on Beedon Hill. The Beedon Parish Council meeting in March was a well-received opportunity to discuss the issue with local people. Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) Dominic Bartlett will also be using the Speed Indication Device (SID) across the area to raise awareness of speeding in the coming weeks. We recently conducted enforcement in Beedon during March and one driver was issued a Fixed Penalty Notice.

This month an 18-year-old man from Curridge has recieved a caution for possession of cannabis.
