

Keeping Tortoises - Part Two Keeping Tortoises

Tortoises are from the family *chelonina*, of which there are over 250 species. The following article will discuss briefly how to keep tortoises which hibernate, i.e. the Horsfield's, Mediterranean Spur-Thighed and Hermann's tortoises.

Housing - The Vivarium

The tortoise owner must create an environment as near to the tortoise's natural one as possible, and this can be done using a vivarium - a wooden, ventilated 'box' with glass sliding front doors. Without the correct temperature they will not eat sufficiently nor digest the food that they do eat, leading to poor growth, ill health and eventually an early death.

A **basking bulb** at one end of the vivarium will provide light and heat (80-85 degrees F under the bulb). A **heat mat** secured to the back of the vivarium will supplement this.

A **UVB tube** provides the essential 'sunlight' which enables your tortoise to produce vitamin D, and therefore absorb the necessary calcium in its food. The tube should be no higher than 15 inches from your tortoise. All lights should be on for 8-12 hours every day, and switched off at night time. Your tortoise should have somewhere to hide both at the warmer and cooler end of the vivarium. A thermometer at both ends is essential.



On very warm, summer days, your tortoise will greatly enjoy roaming around your garden. However, your garden must be secure! Tortoises can climb and dig, and remember that dogs may attack your tortoise.

Feeding Your Tortoise

Tortoises require a low fat, high fibre, low protein diet. They thrive on dandelions, chickweed, groundsel, plaintain, sow thistle, bindweed and clover. Fed along with spring greens, cabbage, grated carrots and watercress, these foodstuffs should make up 90% of their diet. The remaining 10% can be apples, pears, cucumbers, squash, tomatoes, melon, mango, red and green peppers and courgettes. Too much fruit can lead to serious digestive upsets. A vitamin and mineral supplement should be added to the food 2-3 times a week, e.g. *Nutrabat*, and a cuttle fish bone is also appreciated.

Tortoises also need bathing in warm water 3-4 times a week, and will often drink before toileting in the water. This should be done more frequently if unwell, after hibernation or in very hot weather.

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PCSO Report for Headcorn Ward

I have written this report to give you a brief outline about my work during my second year as PCSO for the Headcorn Ward. I have tried to work more closely with the communities that make up the area. As your local PCSO representing Kent Police my goal is to be a familiar, friendly and professional officer.

I have increased my visibility and police presence by supporting Headcorn Primary School giving inputs to the students, attending the school gates and meeting with the headmistress. Visiting local organisations and giving speeches to various clubs is a great way for local people to ask questions and speak to me about issues that concern them. So if you would like me to visit your club don't hesitate to contact me. I have given a speech to Eldercare, met with the members of the Scouts, and discussed local issues with Headcorn Book Club. I gave the local Girl Guides bright pink personal attack alarms and had a chat with them about being safe and smart.

When young people in Headcorn village set up their Youth Forum, they mentioned that they were bored in the evenings so I helped to arrange for a bus to take local Headcorn youths up to Lenham Youth Centre, and escorted them to and from the club.

Headcorn Day was held in August 2010, for this I arranged for a Police Corner where locals could meet the local PC, Firearms officers and the dog handlers gave a demonstration. I took part Summer Fayre in Ulcombe Primary School, which was a great opportunity to engage with locals. I will be attending both events this year so feel free to stop and chat.

As part of my job I offer support and reassurance to victims of crime & Anti Social Behaviour, this involves carrying out numerous home visits to ensure that victims are happy with all police action, answer their questions and when appropriate give them updates & feedback on local NPU action taken to improve their situations. If you ever have any issue that you would like my advise on please contact me on 01622 604390.

Throughout the year, farmers have told me they are worried about poachers and tractor thefts. In order to help tackle the issue of rural crime and to support the farmers I arranged for a meeting of 30+ farmers from all over my ward to have the opportunity to meet a variety of police officers, Smartwater, Mech lock, FarmWatch and the members of the Maidstone Community Safety Unit.


One of the main purposes of the meeting was to establish a solid network of farmers who could assist Kent Police with local intelligence and for us in turn to keep them informed of what the police are up to in our daily business.

Since this meeting there has been a significant increase in Intel from the farmers and during my daily high visibility patrols to the farming community, feedback from them has been very positive. I will continue to expand on this and hope to hold a similar meeting for homeowners. If you would like to get involved contact me on 01622 604390.

I am a strong believer that prevention is better than cure and hope to work with local newsletters editors to start publishing security hints and tips. Keeping the community aware of crime in their area is important and I will work to ensure this information is available.

Finally please come and visit me in Headcorn Library on Tuesday 12th July at 2.00pm to 3.00 pm or alternatively on Tuesday 16th August 2.30pm to 3.30pm in Ulcombe – I will be at the school. I will be there if you want to speak to me about any concerns you have about local policing and to find out what is happening in your village.

Roads Around Grafty Green

As you will have read in last month's magazine on 27th May I met with Director of Kent Highways, John Burr, and County Councillor Jenny Whittle to tour some of our local 'hot spots'. I have an interest in highways and transport which has included several years as vice chairman of Ashford Borough Highways Committee. Consequently when dog walking and driving our area daily I observe many anomalies. The KM has reported on 'roads and pot holes' extensively in recent months plus press statements (many defensive) from KCC and the Leader Paul Carter.

To give you the background to the meeting, I have from time to time reported 'pot holes' or problems to Kent Highways and if necessary (i.e. slow, no or poor action) further actioned whatever with Jenny Whittle. I was of the opinion many 'pot hole' repairs were of poor standard and in the case of Lenham Road by Woodsden Hall un-repaired for months, then done so poorly as it remains writing this on 18th June. We have to appreciate money for roads spending is dire and we have to accept standards will probably never again be as good as we would like, consequently this sets a precedent that what money is spent needs to be well spent, this being questionable.

I prepared a detailed report including photographs for the meeting and can give you a small snapshot of the meeting which I believe proved to be invaluable and informative and hopefully will lead to some improvements. If anybody has any queries I would be happy to try and provide an answer.

Our tour focused on two main topics 'pot holes' and Lenham Road. In John Burr's words 'pot holes' should be cut and cleaned out before being filled to a good standard. Occasionally emergency repairs would be done crudely, known as 'splat and pat', but such repairs would be temporary and need proper repair within a few days. We visited several 'splat and pat' repairs of long standing (those near the bottom of Liverton Hill for example). We then visited Eastwood Road between Pye Corner and Ulcombe Hill where there are more filled pot holes than original road where two gangs recently spent ten days filling even more pot holes ~ surely a section of road way beyond any economic repair and a section which was mysteriously omitted from the major re-surfacing of the rest, and seemingly much better condition of Eastwood Road about two years ago.

Lenham Road, most I am sure will recall, was resurfaced between Crumps Lane (Garden Centre) and Headcorn, a three mile stretch, at a cost approaching £500,000 last September. Within weeks the patch opposite Woodsden Hall broke up - a state it remained in for many more weeks before having some very crude patching 'big splats and even bigger pats!' which has remained for months since. Many other defects became evident ranging from varying size cracks, crazing and a host of cracks ~ walking the road you get a true perspective of the extent of problems, there are many. There can be no doubt the 'life expectancy' of the resurfacing is much diminished and who foots the bill? Other issues of a safety nature are prevalent

whereby the bad deep cambers have been eliminated but in places caused the surface to be many inches higher than the verges, very narrow verges in places edging deep ditches and with the road being narrow a big risk if you get forced to the carriageway edge by an on-coming vehicle. Then there is the question why about a third of the road has a centre white line and the remainder does not. Then there are the dilapidated edge marker post and bend arrows, and places with nothing where surely there should be.

John Burr will be looking into a number of issues whilst on others he was sympathetic to our viewpoints, 'official' stance or statistics proved otherwise or practical resolution was not economically viable i.e. eliminating the edge dangers with the surface being higher than the verge. On Lenham Road the surface laid was SMA (stone mastic asphalt), a very cost effective 'thin coat' surfacing which is very hard and durable (lot of information on the web) but one which is not 'flexible' like previous methods thus has to be laid on a very solid and stable foundation (narrow verges, ditches, clay, narrow lanes subject to HGV's necessarily travelling on the carriageway edge) does this provides a layman's answer?

We can do no more now than monitor our roads and hopefully witness some improvements. In this connection I am intending to keep a 'map' covering the Lenham, Headcorn, Chegworth (A20) triangle, noting road defects, safety issues, accidents etc irrespective of it covering three Parishes and would appreciate any information as a 'duplicate' of what you may do elsewhere, e.g. notifying Kent Highways, a Parish Clerk etc. I have been appalled at the hitherto complacency regarding Lenham Road and believe an independent form of scrutiny such as proposed is necessary. I finish with some questions posed in my report and thank John Burr and Jenny Whittle sincerely for their time and commitment and usefulness of our meeting.

Are highways inspectors doing a meticulous job in recognising necessary work?

Are works properly scrutinised and checked on completion?

Are inspector's reports given due consideration and action by management?

Are managers active in the field or computer and desk bound?

Is there careful consideration of short term / longer term cost implications?

Is there proper evaluation of technical criteria and subjective usage?

Is there evaluation of safety criteria?

Please let me have any information regarding our roads whenever it occurs be it in the next few days or in the months ahead.

The Grafty Gourmet

I love eating alfresco, with a good bottle of wine. It makes you feel like you are on holiday. So for a taste of summer I thought I would do a tasty salad this month. You do not have to be a salad lover to enjoy this. The flavours are delicious and it is great served with most things, including jacket potatoes, chips or just on its own with some fresh bread. All you chicken lovers should try it.

Chicken Salad with Walnuts & Pecans - Serves 2

2 chicken breasts. with skin on
1 ½ Tablespoons of Olive oil
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
1/2 cup pecan halves
1/2 cup walnuts halves
1/2 cup good mayonnaise
1/2 cup sour cream

1 tablespoon chopped fresh tarragon
leaves. divided into 2 portions
1 cup green grapes, cut in halves
Lettuce leaves, for serving

1. Preheat the oven to 180 degrees C.
2. Place the chicken breasts, skin side up, on a baking sheet and rub them with olive oil. Sprinkle with salt and black pepper. Roast for 30 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked through. Set aside until cool.
3. When the chicken is cool, remove the skin. Cut the chicken into a 3/4-inch pieces. Place the pecans and walnuts on a separate sheet or tray and toast in the oven for 7 to 8 minutes until golden. Set aside to cool.
4. For the dressing, mix together the mayonnaise, sour cream, add salt and black pepper to taste. Fold in half of the chopped tarragon leaves.
5. Place the diced chicken in a bowl, add the pecans, walnuts and grapes. Pour the dressing over the chicken and mix well. Serve on a bed of lettuce leaves and sprinkle the remaining chopped tarragon on top.

Grafty Geeks - Computer Tip of the Month



Compressed Files (WinZip) by request

About Compressed Files (zip files)

Compressed files take up less storage space and can be transferred to other computers more quickly than uncompressed files. You can work with compressed files and folders in the same way that you work with uncompressed files and folders. You can also combine several files into a single compressed folder. This makes it easier to share a group of files.

To compress (or zip) a file or folder

- Locate the file(s) or folder(s) that you want to compress.
- Right-click the file or folder, point to Send to, and then click Compressed (zipped) folder.
- A new compressed folder is created in the same location.
- To rename it, right-click the folder, click Rename, and then type the new name.

To extract (or unzip) files or folders from a compressed folder

- Locate the compressed folder that you want to extract files or folders from (this may be a saved document you have received in an email)

Do one of the following:

- To extract a single file or folder, double-click the compressed folder to open it. Then, drag the file or folder from the compressed folder to a new location.
- To extract the entire contents of the compressed folder, right-click the folder, click Extract All, and then follow the instructions.

When do I use Compressed Files?

Apart from the reasons already mentioned there are other times when you will need to know about Compressed Files for example:

- When you receive an email from someone that is zipped
- When you download more than one file from an email (in some cases they will become automatically compressed (zipped))
- When you download documents or applications from a website

(There are other times when compressed files are used, but at least you now know how to extract them)

Notes:

- If you add encrypted files to a compressed folder, the files will be unencrypted when extracted, which might result in unintentional disclosure of personal or sensitive information. For that reason, you should avoid compressing encrypted files.

- Some types of files, like JPEG pictures, are already highly compressed. If you compress several JPEG pictures into a folder, the total size of the folder will be about the same as the original collection of pictures.

About WinZip

Most computers come with an in-built File Compressor now, however if your computer doesn't, it may use an Application called WinZip©. This application works exactly the same as the compressed file function shown above, BUT you may be asked to agree to a licence, this is because you have not purchased this application. It offers you a 30 day trail which will then mean you can extract (unzip) any files you have been sent in the zipped format. The Icon that will appear in your emails will look like this.

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News from Maidstone Council

Tackle Nuisance Noise

Maidstone Borough Council received 779 neighbour related noise complaints last year. Complaints received included loud music (50%) and barking dogs (44%).

Maidstone Borough Council and its partners will help with unwanted noise, but sometimes there are a few steps you should try first.

Building up a relationship with your neighbour followed by a quiet word about the problem can help. Failing this, explaining the noise's impact upon yourself and your family may bring the point home to them.

Noise in a housing association property should first be reported to that particular association's housing officers as tenants of these properties may have signed a tenancy agreement which they are breaching if they cause nuisance to neighbouring tenants. This applies to privately rented properties as well.

As a last resort or for further advice you can contact Maidstone Borough Council noise team on 01622 602202.

To make a valid complaint, the noise must be affecting you at home or work. It must happen quite frequently or be very disruptive. For example, if you're woken by loud music late at night, or being disrupted by loud music throughout the day. Investigations can be made at homes and work places.

However, hearing sound in your home does not automatically make it a nuisance. Authorities cannot investigate noisy children playing or crying or people's day to day living noise like walking about in their homes, entering and leaving their home, flushing the toilet or arguments, and if you suspect domestic abuse is occurring you should tell the police.

Environmental Protection UK and the Noise Abatement Society asks everybody to:

- Consider the noise they make and the effect it has on others.
- Consider the noises that disturb them.
- Use practical solutions to everyday noise problems.

The July Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Gemini at beginning of July, and moves into Cancer on the 21st. On Monday 4th July, the Earth is at **aphelion** (its furthest distance from the Sun). We are approximately 2.5 million miles further from the Sun than we are when the Earth is at **perihelion** in early January. This makes very little difference owing to the longer sunlight hours and the higher altitude.

New Moon occurs on Friday 1st July, and is **New** again on Saturday 30th July. **Full Moon** is on Friday 15th July, in the constellation of Sagittarius.

Mercury appears very low on the horizon, so again it is unlikely we will be able to see this elusive planet this month.

Venus is also rising less than an hour before sunrise, so the "Morning Star" will again be almost impossible to see this month.

Mars is rising in the northeast in the early hours of the morning. It is still very difficult to see as it is on the far side of its orbit.

Jupiter rises in the east in the early hours of the morning, and by the end of the month it rises just before midnight, and is high in the eastern sky at dawn. You may be able to see some of Jupiter's four major moons through a telescope or binoculars.

Saturn is in the western sky at dusk, and sets around midnight. Relative to the stars it is moving very slowly south-eastwards in the constellation of Virgo. It is much brighter than the stars and shines with a steadier light. Its famous rings can only be seen through a telescope.

It has been reported that, at the Alpha facility at Cern, the European particle physics laboratory in Geneva, scientists have created and stored 300 atoms of "antihydrogen" (Antimatter) in a magnetic trap for more than a quarter of an hour.

Antimatter is an opposite of normal matter, with a negative proton and a positive electron, and being able to store antimatter for so long will enable scientist to find out whether it obeys the same laws of physics as normal matter. It may also get them nearer to solving one of the key problems of modern physics, i.e., what happened to all the original antimatter which they think was formed at the time of the Big Bang?

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Christian Message July 2011

"Go on, then, prove it!"

How often these words are spoken in an attempt to put us on the spot! Sometimes it is easy to answer the challenge with simple facts and an answer quickly silences the interrogator. At others the way in which it is asked provokes a sense of frustration and exasperation with the questioner's smug belief that they think it is not possible to provide the evidence that would convince them. It might even challenge our belief because it simply isn't in our power (for whatever reason) to express why we hold an opinion or belief. The evidence of sightings of the risen Christ amount to over 500 people but there is one which is so powerful that it is at the centre of my faith.

The author of the [Gospel of Luke](#), at [Luke 24:13-27](#), writes that [Jesus](#) appeared to two disciples who were walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus, (about 7 miles or 12 km), after his resurrection. The word 'Emmaus' means 'warm spring' in Hebrew.

[Luke](#) places the story on the evening of the day of Jesus' resurrection. The two disciples have heard the tomb of Jesus was found empty earlier that day. They are discussing the events of the past few days when a stranger asks them what they are discussing. "Their eyes were kept from recognizing him." He soon rebukes them for their unbelief and gives them a Bible study on prophecies about the Messiah. On reaching Emmaus, they ask the stranger to join them for the evening meal. When he breaks the bread "their eyes were opened" and they recognize him as the resurrected Jesus. Jesus immediately vanishes. They then hasten back to Jerusalem to carry the news to the other disciples, and arrive in time to proclaim to the eleven who were gathered together with others that Jesus truly is alive.

This account has many messages for us today. In joining the two men who are discussing the events of the recent past in an animated way Christ mirrors our busy existence. So often we are concerned with the here and now, the urgent rather than the important that we do not take the time to see that Christ is in our lives if only we look for him. Next, as they reach their destination they ask Him to eat with them. In accepting their invitation He teaches us that to ask is all that is required – and He will be at our table. It is during the meal, just as in the Upper Room, when Christ breaks the bread that they recognise him. This reminds us that whenever we celebrate Holy Communion that He is with us again – and again! At the end of the meal, the disciples [run](#) back to Jerusalem to tell the others that they have seen the risen Lord! What clearer message could there be for us to spread the news of His presence in our lives?

There is so much more – the journey of the men replicates a journey to faith – at first not knowing or accepting but reaching faith in the end; sudden revelation and gradual dawning are both contained as ways of accepting Jesus. Even those who do not look for Him find him on their journey through life. Finally, there is the clear testament that, whichever road we travel, however preoccupied or unseeing we are – that Christ is walking with us. All we have to do is look!
