Parish Council News

All villagers welcome to attend in person or online, there is a public questions session in each meeting where questions can be asked, or issues raised.

New Housing Developments are not all bad news!

A Developer Community Contribution (S106) agreement is an agreement between a developer and a local planning authority about measures that the developer must take to reduce their impact on the community. The agreement aims to moderate the impact on the Community by obtaining concessions and contributions from the developer.

The content of the agreement was negotiated during the consultation period of the initial planning application. The parties to the Stanton Harcourt agreement are the landowners, West Oxfordshire District Council, Oxfordshire County Council and the planning officer. The agreement transfers to the developer when they purchase the site for development.

These agreements are only associated with larger developments. Both the development of the Old Airfield (66 homes) and Butts Piece (40 homes) are covered by such agreements.

The agreement associated with the Old Airfield Site include the following when the development is complete:

1. 26 of the 66 plots to be developed as 'affordable housing dwellings', Cottsway Housing Association were party to this part of the agreement.

 Public space around the site along with foot paths was to be set aside, these areas will be maintained by the development
A children's play park within the Public Space area to be installed and maintained by the development

4. An education contribution of approximately £368,000 towards the expansion of Stanton Harcourt Primary school

5. A Public Footpath contribution improving the path from the site to the top of Steady's Lane.

6. The Guard Room will be transferred to the Parish Council along with the associated car park and garden, for use as a community facility. The Parish Council will also receive £5,000 towards the set-up costs. This facility will be available for hire on an hourly basis. The hirer fees will be used by the Parish Council to cover the running costs associated with this facility.

7. A Play & Recreation contribution of approximately £41,000 to a fund held by WODC on our behalf - for the enhancement and maintenance of existing play and recreation facilities in and around Stanton Harcourt

8. A Sport & Recreation contribution of approximately £114,000 to a fund held by WODC on our behalf - towards the

provision/improvement and maintenance of community sports and recreation facilities within Stanton Harcourt and surrounding area 9. And some smaller provisions e.g., litterbins picnic benches etc.

The agreement associated with the Butts Piece Site include the following when the development is complete:

1. 16 of the 40 plots to be developed as 'affordable housing'.

2. Primary School contribution of approximately £241,000

3. A Play & Recreation contribution of approximately \pounds 79,000 to a fund held by WODC on our behalf - for the enhancement and maintenance of existing play and recreation facilities in and around Stanton Harcourt

4. A Public Art contribution of approximately £6.500

5. Public open space and footpaths

WODC have created a process that enables the Parish Council to apply for a release of all or part of these Recreation Funds (£155,000 Airfield development & £79,000 Butts Piece Development), where we can demonstrate the value and the community benefit of each application. The Parish Council has already requested and received £31,000 towards the Village Hall Solar Energy Project. The Village Hall is all electric and to ensure the hiring fees for our community remain as low as possible and the facility remain sustainable it was important to reduce the cost of electricity used.

If you have any suggestions of any provisions, improvement and maintenance of community sports, leisure and recreation facilities within Stanton Harcourt you would like to see this money used for please contact Clerk@SHPC.co.uk with your ideas and their potential benefits and we will start to generate a priority list of possibilities.

Speedwatch

Speedwatch is changing. Thank you to all of you who volunteered and undertook Speedwatch patrols under the old scheme, they have been useful for the Police and we have had a speed trap on B4449. Things have changed though for Speedwatch. The old scheme has been replaced with a new scheme that has more teeth. Registered keepers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit are contacted – initially by letter but repeat offenders will get a visit from Police and potentially prosecution. This new scheme is more labour intensive than the old one and will require all volunteers to undertake online training before we can start up again. The main difference for volunteers is that speed information is now logged directly rather than by the Police. To do this, a coordinator would be needed.

At the moment we don't have a Speedwatch scheme in place. I'm once again asking if anyone would be interested in coming together to create a Speedwatch group for the village. If so, please contact me at <u>Rachel@shpc.co.uk</u>

Lexical Derivatives

What's up word nerds? We don't know about you, but we adore etymology. "What's etymology?" we hear you mumble: it's the history of a word or phrase shown by tracing its development and roots – like a treasure hunt, but with history and words: perfection.

20th March is Ostara; a wiccan festival celebrating the spring equinox/beginning of spring. It's not a coincidence that this sounds similar to the Christian festival Easter.

The word Ostara comes from the Anglo-Saxon goddess Eostre or Eastre, who represented spring and new beginnings (sound familiar?) Eostre is related to Eos, the Greek goddess of dawn.

The words Ostara, Eostre and Eastre are all cognates (lexical siblings), meaning they all stem from the same origin: several Proto-Indo-European root words meaning *dawn* or *to shine/glow*.

In Anglo-Saxon England, the month of April was known as Eostremonath. 200 years later, after Charlemagne converted the Saxons to Christianity, he gave Germanic names to the Latin months of the year, which included Ostarmanoth where the feast of Ostern (Easter) was celebrated.

Eventually the common terminology and celebration became known as Easter and was incorporated to the Paschal calendar for the Christian resurrection holiday.




Touring Thespians Visiting Village Save the date - Friday 24th June 2022

The Watermill Theatre are returning to the garden of Stanton Harcourt Village Hall for another outdoor summer performance of Camp Albion. Tickets will be available from the end of May.

Camp Albion - Newbury, 1996. Nine miles of ancient woodland under threat, and the local community bitterly divided over the proposed route of the new bypass. When Cassie returns home for the university holidays, she meets Dylan, a beguiling road protester who draws her into a world of rickety treehouses, lentil stew, druidic rituals and stoic resistance. But her mother has other ideas, and as battle lines are drawn, Cassie must face the personal cost of activism.

In a time before smartphones, Twitter, Greta Thunberg and Extinction Rebellion, the 'Third Battle of Newbury' was one of the definitive environmental campaigns of the 1990s. A new play with music, Camp Albion explores the heroism, humour and heated debate of this extraordinary moment in the town's history.

Page 3 Bird: Sparrowhawk



Meet Jack Sparrowhawk – our friendly neighbourhood bird of prey. Jack enjoys reading adventure books next to a cosy fire, with his favourite tipple: a flaming rum punch. Jack can usually be found in woodlands and likes the open countryside to spread his wings (don't we all?!); he also enjoys visiting some of the gardens in the village and is particularly partial to a good scone.

You'll find Jack and other members of his family dotted over most of the UK, in cities as well as rural areas.

Sparrowhawks play a vital part in our local ecosystems and generally the birds they hunt are numerous and conspicuous, or are sick, old, weak or injured.

The numbers of sparrowhawks are currently relatively stable, but they have suffered in the past from trophy hunting in the 1840s, until birds of prey were legally protected in 1961. The use of pesticides in the 1960s & 1970s also threatened Jack's ancestors; thankfully the ban on such chemicals is finally beginning to have positive effects, although there are still traces of the chemicals in some of the sparrowhawk population today.



When Jack isn't busy searching for lost treasure or dreaming of a life on the high seas, he's in charge of hunting to provide food for his partner, Jacqueline, and their chicks. Admittedly, Jack does tend to get carried away with his imagination, so Jacqueline often has to do the job instead!

Sparrowhawks are able to fly at up to 50kph; making them a top predator, but travelling at such high speeds can often result in collisions, especially when they are focused on their task. Jack likes to pretend his eye patch is the result of some daring deeds, but in reality he accidentally hit a cow when hunting last May.

Trains on the horizon?

Witney Rail project, February 2022 update

Witney Oxford Transport Group is a cross-party, voluntary organisation which is seeking to develop fast, reliable, sustainable transport solutions along the A40 corridor. Our primary focus is on restoring the rail link between Oxford, Eynsham, Witney and Carterton. This rail line would revolutionise travel in West Oxfordshire, with Oxford reachable from Carterton in 22 minutes, from Witney in 16 and from Eynsham in just 9.

Economically, it would encourage highly skilled employers to locate here, delivering high paying jobs. Environmentally, it would materially reduce West Oxfordshire's greenhouse gas emissions, roughly a third of which are generated from road transport. Socially, well, I don't need to tell anyone reading this of the frustrations and unreliability of the A40.

Our near-term goal has been to get the feasibility study done, so we all have hard data to review. To achieve this, we proposed a route; won support for the study from many parties including RAF Brize Norton, Oxford University, GWR, Carterton and Witney Town Councils and Eynsham Parish Council; and commissioned two projects. The outcomes of these projects gave the County Council sufficient comfort to fund the feasibility study. We hope the results of the feasibility study will be available by the summer.

Eggs-actly what mum ordered

Shakshuka

MOUNTAINS!

Try serving this delicious breakfast alternative with warmed pitta and a glass or two of mimosa as a treat for hardworking mum's on Mother's Day (27th March, in case you'd forgotton!)

Ingredients (serves 2)

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 2 red onions, chopped
- 1 red chilli, deseeded and finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, sliced
- small bunch coriander stalks and leaves chopped separately
- 2 cans cherry tomatoes
- 1 tsp caster sugar
- 4 eggs



1. Heat the oil in a frying pan that has a lid, then soften the onions, chilli, garlic and coriander stalks for 5 mins until soft. Stir in the tomatoes and sugar, then bubble for 8-10 mins until thick.

2. Using the back of a large spoon, make 4 dips in the sauce, then crack an egg into each one. Put a lid on the pan, then cook over a low heat for 6-8 mins, until the eggs are done to your liking. Scatter with the coriander leaves and serve with crusty bread.
