

Hampshire County Councillor Update 47

Dear All

This should have been my final councillor report for this term of office, but as you know our elections were postponed to allow for the completion of Hampshire and the Solent's devolution deal, so therefore another 12 months before County elections will be held.

So a further year of updates from me at least.

Here's my latest County Councillor update:

Highways Information



M27 Junction 10 Scheme Update

Hampshire County Council, in collaboration with National Highways, is delivering the M27 Junction 10 scheme to support the development of Welborne Garden Village, a new community of up to 6,000 homes near Fareham, Hampshire. This project aims to provide easier access to the M27.

Upcoming Works:

Sheet Piling Installation: From Wednesday, 9 April to Friday, 25 April, we will be installing sheet piles adjacent to junction 10 of the M27. Working hours will be 8 AM to 6 PM, Monday to Friday, and 8 AM to 2 PM on Saturdays. This process can be noisy due to the heavy machinery involved.

Lane Reductions: The number of lanes on the motorway has been reduced from four to three, with a 50mph speed limit in place until the scheme's completion in late 2026.

Guide Slab Formation: A complex operation involving 1,000m³ of concrete, cast in three phases during February and March, will ensure the underpass can slide accurately into its final position.

Construction Notice: Over the next few months, work on the "box" next to and north of the motorway will become more noticeable, with the base, walls, and roof being created in preparation for the sliding of the concrete box into position beneath the motorway during Christmas this year.

Christmas 2025 Closure: The new underpass will be installed beneath the M27 between Junction 9 and 11 over the Christmas 2025 and New Year period. This will require a full closure of the M27 during the school holidays when traffic volumes are lower. Closure dates and travel advice will be provided in advance.

Upcoming Night Works: Night works are programmed for summer 2025. The A32 Junction with the western end of Pook Lane will be closed, but access to Pook Lane from M27 Junction 11 and the eastern end will be maintained. The new A32 Broadway roundabout is currently being built, leading to changes in traffic management measures on the A32 north of the M27.

Uneven road surfaces

I've had a number of emails with people concerned that the road repairs on Rownhams Lane and some other local roads appear unfinished. They have certainly been left uneven and unsightly as in the photo below.

I hope I can reassure you that this is only the first part of work to resurface the roads in questions.

The uneven surface is as a result of 'crack sealing', which is undertaken to seal any cracks identified in the road, most particularly along the joins of previous utility repairs.

This is preparatory work for resurfacing of the road, the principle being that by sealing the cracks in the current surface then once the new surface is laid then it makes it less likely that there is damage to the undersurface of the road due to water ingress or movement during cold weather. This therefore reduces the likelihood of potholes forming in the new surface and thereby elongates the life of the road surface.

The new surface for Rownhams Lane was laid overnight on the 26th and 27th April (so the weekend after Easter). This might be subject to change dependent on the weather, but that change should be no more than a few days at most. Other local roads will continue from there, including Stanbridge Lane, Awbridge Hill, Tanners Lane and Romsey bypass.

Greater powers to tackle fly-tipping

I strongly welcome the Government's announcement of a new crackdown on cowboy waste operators to tackle fly-tipping and clean up our streets, lanes, and rural areas.

Key Points:

- Councils will work with the police to identify, seize, and crush vehicles of waste criminals.
- Drones and mobile CCTV cameras will be used to identify and destroy cars and vans belonging to fly-tippers.
- A rapid review will slash red tape, allowing councils to seize and crush vehicles more easily. Fly-tippers will cover the costs, saving money for councils and taxpayers.
- Waste criminals will now face up to five years in prison for illegal operations.
- The Environment Agency will conduct identity and criminal record checks on operators, with increased resources and powers to revoke permits, issue enforcement notices, and impose hefty fines.

As you know, Test Valley Borough Council have for many years been at the forefront of the fight against fly tipping in Hampshire. I really hope these new powers are brought in quickly and are used by all Hampshire local authorities to tackle the criminals who blight our beautiful county with their selfish, greedy and thoughtless behaviour.

Myths about animals in Hampshire's countryside

The British countryside is steeped in centuries of myth, superstition, and storytelling — and we're here to share some of the most fascinating traditions with you!

From bees to butterflies, mice to rabbits, each creature was once believed to carry hidden meanings, omens, and even magical powers.



Mice: If mice invaded your home, it was seen as a bad omen, a warning of illness or even death. But don't worry — folklore offers a humane solution! Simply ask the mice politely to leave, explaining that your home is not convenient for them.



Eels: It was once believed you could create an eel by tossing horsehair into a running stream! Eels were thought to cure deafness and rheumatism, though many people were wary of eating them.



Bees: Bees were considered sacred and wise. Tradition says you must always speak kindly around bees, inform them of major family events like weddings or funerals, and even feed them cake from these celebrations to keep them happy and loyal.

Connect Transport on Demand - Northern Test Valley

The Andover area is the first in Hampshire to trial HCC's new demand responsive transports system which, I hope, will begin to provide connectivity for our rural areas where bus services are so few and far between.

Where does it run?

Transport on Demand operates to and from various bus stops in the Northern Test Valley area. The service covers most bus stops with postcodes SP10 and SP11 and the Wallops, Stockbridge, Chilbolton, and Barton Stacey areas.

The service covers four zones:

Zone 1: The service can pick up and drop off passengers at Andover bus station, Andover train station, and Andover War Memorial Hospital

Zone 2: Specified bus stops in the SP10 Postcode area south of Weyhill Road and London Road, where other buses don't run

Zone 3: Specified bus stops in the wider SP11 postcode area

Zone 4: Specified bus stops in the Wallops, Chilbolton, Stockbridge and Barton Stacey areas

When does it run?

7am to 7pm Monday to Saturday, excluding bank holidays. All journeys must be completed by 7pm.

How do I book?

Journeys can be requested up to three days in advance using the Book a Journey app. Children under 16 and those without app access can call 0333 015 1271 to book. Phone lines are open 9am to 4pm, Monday to Friday.

How much will it cost?

Single tickets range from £2 to £5. See ticket prices below. Up to two children under 5 years travel free with one farepaying passenger. Concessionary and scholar bus passes are not accepted on this service.

Accessibility

Minibuses are wheelchair accessible and folding pushchairs are permitted. Please book a wheelchair seat when booking.

Urban Meadows 2025

Spring is here, and the first wildflowers are blooming across our nature reserves and green spaces!



Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) is excited to announce this year's Urban Meadows season.

In response to the Climate Emergency and to make our green spaces more wildlife-friendly, TVBC will be relaxing grass cutting schedules across several sites from May to September. This initiative will create urban meadows, providing vital havens and wildlife corridors for insects, including butterflies, which have seen a long-term decline. Including the wonderful meadows cape at Romsey Abbey's north garth.

Since 2021, we've been increasing our urban meadows each year. In 2025, over 42 hectares in Andover, Romsey, and Valley Park will grow wilder – that's more than 82 football fields of grass left unmown until September!
