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Council News

Highways England has published its preferred scheme for the M27 junction including improvements Windhover Roundabout. The proposals for both Junction 8 and Windhover include widening the carriage way on the slip roads, signal improvements and better paths for pedestrians and cyclists, with crossing facilities at Windhover. It is anticipated that construction work will start in spring 2020. A brochure about the preferred scheme is available from Pilands Wood Community Centre or on Highway England's website.

In conjunction with this, the County Council is developing a scheme for Hamble Lane, as improvements to the lane will be essential to Highways England's proposed improvements to the Windhover Roundabout and Junction 8. The scheme will initially focus on the northern end of Hamble Lane and construction work is likely to commence in winter 2020/21.

Following the second consultation, a few modifications are to be made to the County Council's preferred scheme, the most notable being the proposed u-turn adjacent to Tesco to include a third lane on Hamble Lane northbound. It is stated that work will continue to seek to progress the delivery of a new car park and dropoff facility at Hamble Rail Station on land owned by the County Council, working with key stakeholders. These improvements are reliant on a successful bid for funding. As is common in a community, and social media, there have been rumours relating to the Coronation Parade refurbishment. In response, the Borough Council has contacted the shops and residents in the area updating them on the work to be undertaken to complete the project; a copy of this has been shared on our website and Facebook page. The contractor had been waiting for the public art railings etc to be provided so it could complete the surfacing and other associated work. This

work was scheduled to be carried out over night to ensure the Parade remained open during the day.

The Council has agreed to give £10 book vouchers to the winners of the school poster competition. Children designed posters on topics such as picking up litter, cleaning up after your dog and looking after the environment. Signs will be made from 10 of these posters to be used around the village in the most appropriate locations. The Hamble Conservation Volunteers and Parish Council have decided to hold Village Spring Cleans on the mornings of the 3rd and 17th April, as part of the Keep Britain Tidy campaign. On these mornings, the office will be closed so that the Council's staff can participate. Please support this initiative to make our village better - more details are available further in the Magazine.

In previous Council News vou have been informed that a number of local authorities have been working together to overcome the unacceptable anti-social behaviour that occurred last year at Hamble Foreshore. The Borough Council is now seeking a Public Spaces Protection Order to tackle the anti-social behaviour around Hamble Jetty and a consultation is now being undertaken to seek residents' views. The order will give police officers, community support officers and some Council officers additional powers to tackle anti-social behaviour. The area will be restricted to around the jetty and pontoon. Please view the Borough Council's website under 'Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) for Hamble' for more details and to give your views.

The Parish Council has been approached by Natural England regarding the possible route of the England Coast Path through our area as part of its landowner consultation process. The Council has responded that as the ferry is only available for limited hours that an 'Alternative Route' should be provided for the Hamble River section via the A27 road bridge similar to those provided on other parts of the proposed coastal path. A Natural England representative said he would be staying with his original decision to use the Hamble-Warsash Ferry as the path's crossing point. There will be a public representation stage later when further comments can be made.

The Council has agreed to look at a workstream that focuses on the Foreshore. The WeRHamble survey shows how popular the area is with both residents and visitors and ensuring that people can continue to come to walk, crab, sail or simply to sit and admire open views of the river are at the heart of the Foreshore and the work of the Council. There will be more news on this over the coming months.

Finally, following on from the evaluation survey, Neighbourhood Planning will be the main focus of the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on Thursday 4th April, 7pm, at the Primary School. Everyone is welcome to attend to hear about this and the work of the Parish Council over the last year and have the opportunity to give your views.

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Message from the Clerk

Each year, the council holds an annual parish meeting which usually has a theme to it; last year we had speakers from a range of backgrounds raising the profile of plastics in the environment - this year we want to focus on the merits of producing a neighbourhood plan.

You should have seen postcards or flyers around the village as well as posts on social media about the plan. At the Annual Parish Meeting, which will be held on 4th April at the Primary School from 7pm, the focus of the evening will be on the merits of a neighbourhood plan, answering questions about it and giving feedback which the Parish Council will consider when they meet the following week to consider the outcome of the engagement exercise. Please come along and get involved. We have run a number of public meetings recently where turn out has been poor but on subjects that we know are important to residents. We try to cover all communication channels using the website, social media and the magazine as well as our scheduled meetings and public meetings when needed, but if we are missing a trick get in touch and let me know. If you haven't already done it, go to our website and sign up for our email alerts. I am delighted to confirm that we have had some good news about services for young people. Youth Options, who ran the outreach programme last year, will be continuing with the work this year. The scheme will be largely funded by Hampshire County Council, with a top up from the 3 parish councils in the peninsula and Eastleigh Borough Council (EBC). Following feedback, we have been able to secure a change of night from Monday evening so from April there will be outreach services on the Peninsula on Tuesday, Wednesday

and Thursday. It is likely that they will be in Hamble on Thursday and we have offered the use of either Mount Pleasant or The Roy Underdown Pavilion as a base on those evenings. During the year, the team have been talking to young people about a raft of subjects, from applying for jobs to sexual health and dealing with social media to acceptable behaviour. They have also been to areas when requested when we have been aware of specific issues to try to provide help and support.

To complement the outreach provision, EBC have been successful in securing funding for Friday Football at Hamble School. A similar scheme has been running in Hedge End for a number of years and is really popular with those that play and those that go along to watch. We hope that the package of measures will be well received and used by young people, though we are still open to further suggestions about what else could be provided. There has been some talk about youth clubs for younger children and we are happy to work with any volunteers that want to get a club up and running. The Mercury is now available for booked events and a regular youth club there would provide an opportunity for younger children in the village.

Recognising the problems that took place down at the Foreshore last summer, with regular incidents of swimming in dangerous areas around the pontoon and damage to property, EBC have published a consultation on the introduction of a Public Spaces Protection Order. The purpose of the order is to identify a specific area where types of behaviour will not be tolerated and set out options for dealing with breaches. The area identified in the consultation is a 10-meter exclusion zone around the

pontoon. The types of behaviour that it is looking to prohibit includes:

- Jumping from, climbing upon or hanging from the Hamble Pontoon or aiding, abetting, counselling or procuring such an act by another
- Swimming
- Removing, displacing or otherwise interfering with any lifesaving equipment, except in the case of emergency where the equipment is required
- Depositing or throwing into, or onto, the water any object unrelated to water activities that the person is reasonably undertaking
- Interfering with, climbing onto or entering any boat or vessel without express permission of the owner of said vessel
- Using foul and abusive language or behaving in a way that causes or is

- likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any other person
- Causing an obstruction or leaving items that are likely to cause an obstruction, trip hazard or generally make the area less accessible for others that could expect to use the area.

Any authorised person may require a group to leave the restricted area where they reasonably suspect that any person within that group to be causing or is likely to cause nuisance, alarm, harassment or distress to any other person.

More information can be found on Eastleigh Borough Council's website and searching 'Public Spaces Protection Order'. The Parish Council will be discussing the order at its meeting on the 11th April. It will also be looking at the local crime stats for the last quarter. Please come along if you want to have a say.

HAMPSHIRE SUPERFAST BROADBAND

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AVAILABILITY

Currently it's available to 95% of the region, and that number is on target to reach 97.4% by the end of 2019. However, many people don't know whether they can get superfast broadband or not, or believe it is more expensive than their current package – which is not always the case.

Hampshire County Council's role is to provide the infrastructure to enable as many people as possible to access superfast broadband (not to sell the service). We have a postcode checker that will tell you if its available where you live, and what to do next if you want to find the right package



for you. You can also register with us to be told when superfast broadband is coming to your area.

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if you can access superfast broadband, you won't automatically get the faster speeds. Our project provides the technology and infrastructure that will allow local residents and businesses to sign up for the service via a choice of Internet Service Providers. To upgrade to the new speeds you need to order it from an Internet Service provider. For more information: www.hampshiresuperfastbroadband.com

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
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HAMBLE CONSERVATION VOLUNTEERS



Many of you will already know about the Great British Spring Clean that is organised annually by Keep Britain Tidy (KBT). This year the clean ups will fall between 22 March and 23 April and KBT are calling on all #LitterHeroes across the country to help improve the environment on their doorsteps with the aim of reaching a national turnout of 500,000 people.

After discussions with Hamble Parish Council we have decided to redirect our routine beach and Common clean up efforts within the Spring Clean period towards tidying up Hamble village itself.

The Mercury Library & Community Hub

The Mercury has been hosting several events over the last few months and people have been in to look around and meet some of the volunteers that have been really generous with their time in getting the facility up and running. From April people will be able to drop into the Library in the morning from 10am—midday, use the book exchange and register to join The Mercury in order to use all the facilities - workstations, printer and photocopier. Refreshments will be on hand too.

Unlike most other libraries this is going to be run by members of the community for the community. Although some of the team have experience of working in Libraries, The Mercury is different in that it is a facility that will providing much more than access to books and resources. The ambition is for it to be at the heart of village life, with people popping in as much for a chat and company, as catching up on the latest read.

We hope that, over time, we will have monthly talks on issues of local interest, a regular Saturday morning with story-time and a host of regular users throughout the week. The space is great for hosting community groups that need a home, home-workers that need a bit of company, businesses that need training space or want to run a breakfast meeting or even a budding entrepreneur that could organise and run courses from the building. Whatever your need pop in and have a look round and chat to the team.

We are, with Eastleigh Borough Council, exploring several external grant funds to provide further equipment for the hub and in particular to purchase pre-school



children's books, which remains a gap in the book offer. If you have got any good quality early years books that your children or grandchildren have grown out of, get the spring clean bug, make some space and donate them to The Mercury. You may well find other books from the book exchange to replace them!

We are also keen to receive good quality jigsaw puzzles, either for use in The Mercury or to exchange and take away.

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
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

100 YEARS AGO - Land for Cottages The Chairman reported that subject to the approval of the Housing Committee 3 acres of land had been purchased in Sydney Field for the erection of Workman's Cottages, possession to be given on Sept 1st.
