



Thank you to all those that attended the Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) and Homes England community engagement event recently. A great big thanks to those who came along to our photo call too – it was a resounding message to MBC that the three events should have been in Lenham from the outset and that as a community, we are completely opposed to the Heathlands 5,000-home new town proposal

Many of you told us how underwhelmed you were with what was on display and what you learnt. Around 12 information boards formed the exhibition which lacked any meaningful detail. It was glossy marketing. There was no new information, there was no evidence to support their proposals. It seems no real progress has been made since their first community engagement (that we dragged them to) in January 2020 despite over £693,000 of public money being spent on it to date.

Representatives from MBC included William Cornall, the director leading the project and Leader of the Council, Cllr David Burton who turned up for the last two hours of the event. Questions put to MBC and Homes England often were not answered or entirely avoided.

SOHL maintains the view that this public engagement exercise was a waste of council taxpayers' money. SOHL has repeatedly called upon the Chief Executive, Alison Broom, to take responsibility for the leafleting fiasco which led to the majority of Lenham residents as well as those from surrounding villages simply not being made aware of the events. We strongly believe Alison owes the local community an apology on behalf of MBC. Her continuing delay and inability to do so further demonstrates her contempt for us.

A few points we took away from the engagement event:

- Heathlands is by far **not** a done deal. After almost three years, MBC and Homes England still do not seem to have a compelling case for the project nor have they overcome the significant constraints on the site and the development.
- There was some confusion over how the proposal was being funded. For weeks now, Cllr Burton and MBC have claimed that Heathlands had a £300m *grant secured* from HM Treasury. According to Homes England, this is not the case and instead the £300m would be a *loan* that the development would have to pay back. The loan has not been secured to date neither.

- Cllr Burton repeatedly told residents that Heathlands was not his first choice and instead his preferred option is the Leeds/Langley corridor. We ask why he hasn't pursued that option further, particularly given the 2017 Local Plan had a requirement to do so.
- Mr Cornall claimed that SOHL was spreading mis-information in regard to our Save Lenham Rail Station campaign. When we challenged him on this, he confirmed that they were having to look at options including moving/closing Lenham station but MBC's <u>preferred</u> choice was to retain it. Homes England admitted limited engagement with Network Rail to date. We asked Mr Cornall to retract and stop using his incorrect claims of 'mis-information'.
- Homes England did not believe a case could be made for the new M20 junction.

So what happens next?

Future Engagement Events: MBC and Homes England have suggested they would like to hold another community engagement event in May 2022 due to their failure to communicate last week's exercise and the leaflet fiasco. SOHL questions whether this is a good use of further public money if they will not be sharing any further detail on their proposals. What are your thoughts? Do you think there should be another event in May? Let us know so we can represent the majority view.

Grafty Gourmet

Get the great taste of rhubarb crumble with these individual muffins. Eat on their own or with a dollop of ice cream.

Rhubarb Crumble Muffins

For the muffin mix

175g of caster sugar
175g of rhubarb, halved lengthways
then diced
tablespoons of sunflower oil
egg
teaspoon of vanilla extract
125ml of buttermilk
200g of plain flour

1 teaspoon of baking powder 1 teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda

For the crumble topping

50g of light muscovado sugar 50g of plain flour 25g of porridge oats 1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon 50g of butter

1. Heat the oven to 220C (200C fan). Line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper muffin cases. Stir the sugar and rhubarb together and set aside while you make the crumble topping. Mix together the muscovado sugar with the flour, oats and cinnamon, then rub in the butter until clumpy with your fingertips.

2. Stir in the oil and egg, vanilla and buttermilk into the sugary rhubarb (don't worry if it's a little bit wet). Then, add the flour, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda and stir well.

3. Quickly spoon into the cases, then scatter each with a thick layer of the crumble mixture. Bake for 15-18 mins until golden and a cocktail stick poked into the centre of a muffin comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack.

59 BUS SERVICE UNDER IMMEDIATE THREAT ACTION NEEDED

Kent County Council is currently examining ways of reducing its financial support in 2022/23 for non-commercial bus services. To achieve the level of savings deemed necessary, KCC is proposing to cancel 48 contracts and a consultation process is underway. This closes on 20th April, with final decisions being made in May and withdrawal of services likely in August.

The 59 is one of the contracts on KCC's list of proposed withdrawals, despite the contract being awarded by KCC as recently as last October to Nu-venture to run the service until April 2023.

The 59 became primarily a feeder service to and from Sutton Road, Morrisons in February 2020 as one of a number of trials initiated by KCC and planned to run for a year with quarterly reviews taking place. Almost immediately after the 59-trial started, the first Covid lockdown was introduced and there have been various restrictions ever since until just recently.

All this means that the trial has not been a fair one and none of the promised reviews of the service have taken place. Yet the service is now proposed for withdrawal, with no accurate data to support that proposal, no opportunity for it to recover from the impact of Covid, or for examining ways to make the service more attractive and thus improve its financial performance. For example, one significant change which seems to be supported generally along the route is for the service to revert to running to and from the town centre rather than forcing people to change buses.

The East of Maidstone Transport Group and Boughton Malherbe Parish Council will be making their own representations against the proposed withdrawal but THE HELP OF INDIVIDUAL PARISHIONERS IS ALSO NEEDED THROUGH PARTICIPATION IN THE CONSULTATION.

There is a very real danger that Grafty Green will lose the 59 service in August, and if it does it will be forever. So please,

The schooldays only services, the 0643 service 89 from Grafty Green to Maidstone and the 1612 return 59 service from Maidstone, are set to continue to be operated by Arriva and are not part of KCC's consultation.

Sue's Nature Notes

A couple of notes on how you can start the spring/summer season and enable the wildlife to prosper:-

There is a trend now known as '**No Mow May'** (or maybe only mow once a month through the growing season!) to allow the grass to grow longer, which will give cover to many small creatures, and for a variety of wild flowers to flourish; the insect life will increase and they are at the start of the food chain. Another upside to this is saving on fuel and your energy.

Nesting birds; you may well have seen the signs in your garden of the birds that like to nest in shrubbery/hedges but some birds nest on the ground in woodland and open fields and they will be vulnerable to being disturbed by walkers and dogs. Locally there are skylarks, meadow pipits, in woodlands nearby - woodcock, pheasants and partridge. Further afield you could come across lapwings, nightjars and a variety of ducks.

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Have a say on South East Water's draft 25 Year Environment Plan

A unique draft 25-Year Environment Plan written by South East Water now needs feedback from local residents on its strengths and weaknesses before it is published.

South East Water is the first UK water company to produce such a plan, following an intensive period working with its customers, employees and other environmental organisations to shape it. The appeal for feedback from local communities is the final stage before it is published in summer-2022.

Not only does the plan set out how the company will limit its own impact on the environment, but more importantly, how it will improve the overall health of the environment and increase its resilience to the effects of drought, flooding and growing demand for tap water.

Supplying drinking water to 2.2 million customers across the south east, the company maintains 83 water treatment works and 9,000 miles of underground pipes, as well as 33 Sites of Special Scientific Interest, two local nature reserves, Lullington Heath National Nature Reserve and numerous Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The water supplier also works with farmers, landowners and other water users to protect the quality and quantity of the rivers and underground aquifers which are used to produce an average of 520 million litres of tap water each day.

The company is now looking to expand the work of its in-house team of environmental experts to work with other local companies and individuals to improve the environment within a generation.

Christian Message April 2022

As I write this is February Storm Eunice is in full swing outside the window and Lenham has just lost internet, electric and telephone line

You will read this in April when we hope for clear skies, warmth, extreme growth in the gardens and hedgerows, baby birds, Easter eggs & bunnies, resurrection and summer within sight...

But right now a 'storm of a storm' rages across a bright sky



with menacing fast scudding clouds.

Storms hit our lives in a myriad of forms. An accident, a sudden bereavement, redundancy, a relationship breakup, an angry encounter, a torrid discovery, an unexpected illness and so on.

Storms of life happen. They cause us anxiety; we cannot settle or focus. We may hide under the duvet enveloping the problem in excess sleep. Conversely, we may not sleep a wink as we relive the dilemma repeatedly. De- stabilised some seek the help of friends or family, or a counsellor; others run to remote places to try to figure it all out on their own. Sometimes we are dumbstruck and other times we need to talk endlessly about the problem. We respond according to our character and life experiences. Few of us show no signs of strain whatsoever in a storm of life. Even those highly trained to cope with trauma and calamity will likely experience post trauma effects, bodily or mentally.

But what if the Holy Spirit of Jesus was present with us as the trauma or storm erupted? How might His presence help?

Jesus is known for the calming of a storm on Lake Galilee on at least 2 occasions. Once asleep in the hull of the boat whilst the disciples grappled with the raging waves, unbothered He is surprised when they wake Him asking for His help – he speaks to the storm and peace descends. On another occasion he walks across the water to Peter and friends in the boat equally showing His fearlessness in the face of the storm. The presence of Jesus changes storms. I will say that again: the presence of Jesus changes storms.

Those who watched Him die in a storm of political upheaval and religious betrayal then met Him in a resurrected state, alive, conquering and overcoming death and were changed forever for the experience of the first Easter– as He breathed His Holy Spirit upon them and gave them His peace – the very events from which the church is birthed.

It would be a lie to say that the presence of Jesus makes everything alright. We may still have to go through that surgery, divorce, redundancy, court case, bereavement. But with Christ – the anointed one - beside us we can know He will comfort, protect and guide us. His presence strengthens us to bear the storm, as we receive the Prince of Peace. The storms surrender to His authority and in His hands, they ease; we trust His wise accompaniment. For all wisdom's ways are perfect and all her paths are peace....Proverbs 3:17

Next time we hit a life-storm let us make sure, metaphorically, we have Jesus in our boat with us and with even a little faith we shall fare much better, I am confident. Every blessing, the summer is coming!
