

Bookings are still going OK. The W.I. asked if it would be possible to provide some form of microphone/speaker for the hall. Chris Bevans reminded all that a microphone & speaker system is available for use in the village hall on request (from him).

Costings for lowering the ceiling along with acoustic improvement will be obtained, along with the cost of installing a "hearing loop" for use with hearing aids. Grant funding may be available.







Allotments

The rent for the allotments was discussed; as there is now a water tap at the allotments it was proposed that rents should cover the cost of the water, rather than trying to charge allotment holders separately for water. A rent of £1 per week was discussed.

Open Meeting

District Councillor Penny Rainbow reported that there is a training session for planning for parish councillors. Date and location TBA.

A recent survey by the District Council indicated that residents would appreciate a kerb-side collection of glass for recycling. Cllr Rainbow explained that this would be very costly to carry out. The biggest cause of contamination in the current grey recycling bins is glass. This can contaminate a whole lorryload of recycling. If you can't get to recycle your glass it must go in the green, general rubbish, bin, NOT the recycling bin. Parish councillors pointed out that more glass recycling collection point would help, along with more frequent emptying of the collection pods.

Correspondence

A letter regarding a Civility and Respect project had been received. This was discussed and it was decided that no further action was needed.

<u>Planning</u>

Land Off Nottingham Road, Southwell: Erection of a new food store (Use Class E) and associated new access, parking, servicing, drainage, landscaping and highway works

The parish council has responded to this application previously, stating that they do not support the application. In response to this revised application, the parish council's previous comments still stand: while the parish council support the idea of a new supermarket in Southwell, they believe that the proposed location is unacceptable, mainly on road safety grounds and erosion of the surrounding countryside. The parish council would prefer an application on one of the brown-field sites in the town.

Barn Cottage Radley Road Halam: Single storey garage extension

Unanimously agreed not to support the application. These revised plans will be even more overbearing and increase overshadowing of the neighbouring property than proposed previously. Overall the proposed extension is considered too long and too high.

Unanimously agreed to pay for the dog bin emptying



Village Hall

Hearing loop – still waiting for further information. Sound baffling/acoustic insulation – agreed unanimously to order sound baffles. Installation to be arranged once they have arrived.

Table and new chairs – it was decided that the fabric chairs are impractical for the village hall use (to susceptible to dirt and damage). Sample of new version of the current plastic version chairs to be ordered. The old grey chairs

will be disposed of. The W.I. will be asked about the number of smaller "card" tables are required.

It was agreed to obtain two new overhead electric heaters for the hall, and to replace/fix the light over the main door along with a PIR motion sensor.

Quotes are still awaited for the boundary wall.

Chris Bevans (Chair of Halam School Parents, Teachers and Friends Association [PTFA]) and Andrew Paris (Halam School Governor) both declared non-pecuniary interests in this subject.

It was unanimously agreed to donate \pounds 1,500 of the CIL money (given to the parish council by district council from recent planning developments in Halam) to the Halam School PTFA to support fund raising for the outside classroom for the school.

Open Meeting

County Councillor Bruce Laughton stated that the

county council are facing a difficult time budget-wise and it was likely that they would be seeking a minimum of 2-3% council tax rise this year.

Cllr Laughton was asked to arrange removal of all the road works signs, cones and associated barriers etc. from the roadworks in Halam back in May.

District Councillor Penny Rainbow reported that the possibility of a kerb-side glass collection scheme will go out for public consultation shortly.

There has been an increase of rural thefts in the area. Thieves have been using drone to locate potential trailers and other farm equipment to steal. Keys have been stollen when backdoors have been left unlocked. Everyone is asked to be vigilant, report and suspicious activity, and to ensure doors and windows are secured.
