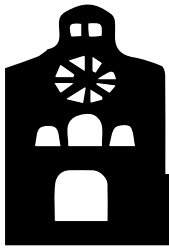

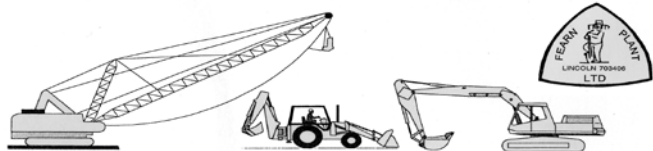

Go again

As I have written the last **Look two, one's going, one's gone**'. (the call, the treble ringer makes when commencing the ringing at the hand stroke) I thought I'd tell you what it meant

"Look two," Holding the sally. Treble tensioning the rope, getting ready to ring

"One's going," Bell beginning to move towards top dead centre (inverted vertically)

"One's gone." The bell beginning to 'fall' (rotate) with the appropriate pull(enough to bring it to the inverted vertical position) during this rotation the clapper hits the side of the bell, hence the strike. At this point when the ringers in turn will now be holding the end of the rope (ready for the back stroke) with this second pull the bell returns back from where it commenced ready for the continuation of the ring. If all goes well and a change ring is then rung without any problems, then the conductor may shout "Go Again" on completion of the change, hence the new title.

'Go Again' will be written as and when something out of the norm happens. On Sunday 24th August Amy Cook from Spalford was married to Lee Rayney from Norton Disney. A hole in the clouds was created by the sound of the bells for this special occasion, The ringers were Lorraine Dickinson, Philip Thomas, Derek Watson from Spalford, Sue Pendleton from Eagle, Victoria Jenkinson and Roy Chapman, both from Thorpe on the Hill.

We in the belfry wish them all the best wishes in their married life. Thank you, Jayne for organising the ringers.

The following day we had the pleasure of Mr.Chris Bennett from Sheffield and along with about ten Associates from the Sheffield and Rotherham area to ring for approximately 40 minutes

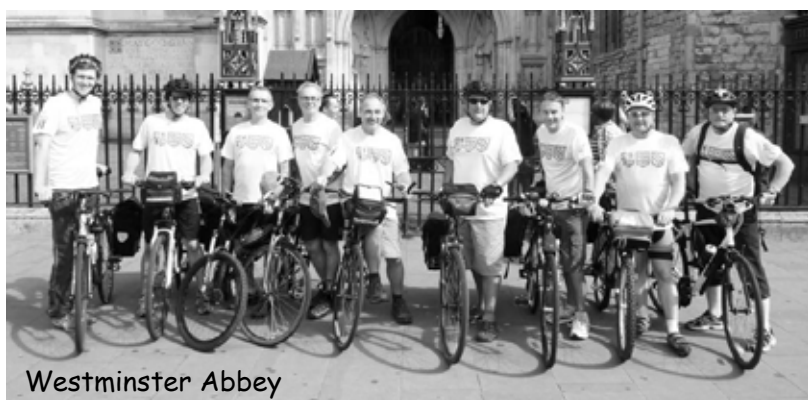
HARBY MOUNTAIN RESCUE TEAM

Westminster Abbey to Harby

Eleanor Crosses Adventure, 3rd to 7th September 2014

The eighth annual Harby Mountain Rescue Team Adventure saw a reprise of the original 2007 Eleanor Crosses cycle ride from Westminster Abbey back to Harby via the three surviving crosses and the nine cross sites. Keith Ely made a welcome return and freshers Pete Merrick and Clive Thompson joined the veterans for the five day 246-mile adventure.

Westminster Abbey

Eight starters cycled to Newark Northgate station and travelled by train to muster at Kings Cross, where our great friend David Holtam from St.Martin-in-the-Fields guided us to **Westminster Abbey**. After a brief photo stop we negotiated London traffic via the sites of **Charing Cross** and **Cheapside Cross**, followed by a

more sedate rumble along the Regent's Canal towpath and Lee Valley to Enfield where we said farewell to David and welcomed Mike Lloyd. Day 1 finished with a stop at the restored **Waltham Cross**, an excellent curry and overnight stay at the Marriott Hotel in Cheshunt.

Matthew Tucker arrived for the start of day 2 as ten cyclists enjoyed a morning sortie through rolling Hertfordshire hills to St.Albans and the site of **St.Albans Cross** by the Clock Tower. Broken spoke repairs delayed departure to allow a visit to the Abbey and shrine of St.Alban before more hills, the long climb up the infamous Dunstable Downs and a precipitous descent to the site of **Dunstable Cross**. We briefly lost Phil Ely on the way out of Dunstable, though a rendezvous and hops-based recovery beverages at the Five Bells at Stanbridge reunited the team for the last leg to the site of **Woburn Cross**, overnight stay at The Woburn Hotel and dinner at the Black Horse.

A fantastic breakfast and early departure started the longest day, negotiating commuter traffic for a few miles before Paul Nolan navigated us through Milton Keynes along the Grand Union Canal towpath, route 6 and the Ouse Valley Way to a plaque on a rather ugly building on Watling Street marking the site of **Stony Stratford Cross**. More Northamptonshire villages and hills took us

to **Hardingstone Cross** where George Dickinson and Phil Thomas joined the fray and Mike Lloyd repaired a persistent slow puncture. John Howard guided us through Northampton bandit country and north on route 6 to a late lunch by the Northampton and Lamport Railway at Brampton Halt. A further ten miles on the route of the former Northampton to Market Harborough railway line took us through the 520-yard Kelmarsh Tunnel before heading east through Desborough to complete a 63-mile day at Geddington. After dinner at the White Lion, we joined the Geddington Volunteer Fire Brigade for a brigade meeting, refreshments and presentations before adjourning to The Star for further refreshments, karaoke and traditional frivolities. Richard Willows and Matthew Tucker made history by becoming the 8th & 9th men to successfully reach the shield in the ancient and noble sport of bar diving, achievements celebrated with more refreshments and singing.

After a late finish the night before, industrial portions of full English breakfast at the White Lion got the team going again for a muster at **Geddington Cross** and a hazardous ride on a rough track to Brigstock. Following a sightseeing stop at Fotheringhay, we enjoyed a pleasant run to Stamford and the site of **Stamford Cross** at the Clock House. After lunch, everyone worked up a thirst climbing the six hills en-route to Grantham quenched at the Fox & Hounds at Old Somerby, before the rapid descent of Somerby Hill to Grantham.

As intrepid travellers have done for centuries, we stayed at the historic Angel & Royal Inn where we were joined by the President of Harby Mountain Rescue Team, Brian Rippard. Evening refreshments at The Blue Pig and a visit to the site of **Grantham Cross** on St.Peter's Hill were followed by a marvellous Italian dinner at Piccolo Venezia.

Mike Evans arrived on Sunday morning as triskaidekaphobic Phil Thomas failed to notice that there were 13 of us for the ride to Lincoln, visiting the **Lincoln Cross** site at the foot of Cross-o-Cliff Hill, before ascending Beaumont Fee and Spring Hill to **Lincoln Cathedral** and rendezvous with Mervyn Wells. The home straight on route 64 was punctuated by a stop at the Pyewipe before family reunions and more substantial refreshments at the Bottle & Glass.
