Draft Parish Notes

Meeting of the Parish Council was held at the Pavilion on Monday 16th January 2023 at 7:30 pm. The meeting was attended by: Cllrs S Harrod (chair), P Allen, D Harms, M Horsley, C Deacon and Cllr F V Mierlo (OCC). Apologies were received from Cllr B Fox (Vice-Chair) and Cllr C Newton (SODC). Chris Ashworth (Clerk) and 1 member of the public were in attendance. No declarations of interest were received in matters on the agenda. There was no variation in order of business.

The County Councillor's monthly report was received and reviewed and is available on the Parish Council Website.

Cllr Mierlo reported as follows regarding OCC matters:

Reduced bus fares for 3 months, bus passengers can enjoy a £2 cap on bus fares. Pa Anti-sewage motion passes, and there is now a live Thames Water website that updates where sewage is being discharged.

Three in four street lamps are now LED. OCC makes sure we have the warmest possible LED lights. Streetlamps will also only be installed in places they are needed. Street lamps will be turned off at times they are not needed.

Over 450 trees are being planted over the winter period.

Successful bid for children's homes: OCC has successfully bid for a £5.2m grant to part fund four new residential children's homes. The homes would provide accommodation and support for children requiring solo provision or who can only share with one other child, children with autism, and children who have had adverse childhood experiences.

The budget for children's services is going to be increased above the inflation rate to help such areas as improving EHCP speed.

There is a new CEO Dr Martin Reeves of OCC, who has previously worked for Coventry City Council.

Some schools are replacing the Oxford School Bus Partnership with smaller partnerships.

Cllrs Harrod asked about the A329 near the Oxford golf club as the road is subsiding again, Cllr Horsley noted the road needs to be dug up and remade not just resurfaced. Cllr F V Mierlo will ask Cllr K Gregory about the road.

Cllr Harrod raised the issue regarding fixmystreet not allowing fly-tipping to be reported.

P22/S2220/FUL (Dodwells Solar Farm Land north of the A40 near Cuddesdon) Underground cable route to connect Dodwells solar farm to Cowley substation.

(as amplified by additional information received 21 December 2022). After due consideration, the Parish Council agreed to continue to OBJECT to the application.

P21/S3915/FUL (Dodwells Solar Farm Land north of the A40 near Milton Common) Installation and operation of a Solar Farm together with all associated works, equipment and necessary infrastructure (as amended & amplified by information received 8 July 2022 and 21 December 2022). After due consideration, the Parish Council agreed to continue to OBJECT to the application.

Both applications were discussed at length with input from the member of the public. It was noted that an additional area of solar panels (Field 9) was now added, and this would have a significant visual impact, including glint and glare on a nearby property, with no mitigation in place. The solar panels will be going over a large area, so any mitigation against the visual impact will be very difficult.

The viewpoints taken to consider the visual impact was noted by the member of the public to have been selectively placed and did not cover how properties would be affected.

The member of the public also raised the issue of the cable being laid for the solar farm and the potential damage and disruption to wildlife the cable would cause.

It was also discussed that the distance the cables would cover and whether there would be any loss of voltage over the proposed distance.

Cllr F v Mierlo noted that OCC's role is to require a traffic plan for the proposals, but they can't stop it from happening.

The minutes of the December meeting of the Parish Council, held on Monday 12th December 2022, were received, reviewed, agreed and signed as a true and accurate record of proceedings.

Rector's Pint

I was given a wonderful little book for Christmas 'Tales of a Country Parish'.

It is a beautifully written book, a series of daily reflections written by the Vicar of Savernake Forest throughout 2020, to stay in touch with his parishioners during the Pandemic. Reading it did make me feel a little inadequate, I find coming up with a suitable theme once a month for these pints enough of a challenge! But Colin Hever-Percy, when he is not being a vicar of four rural parishes in Wiltshire is a professional script writer, so I have forgiven myself for my lack of literary output!

He reflects on a sense of place, and the people who live there, and he brings a deep learning to his reflections, of philosophy, country lore, music of all kinds and a deep knowledge and application of the Bible and his own understanding of the

Christian faith, it is a delightful read.

Quite early in the book he writes something that really grabbed my attention. He talks about the incident when Jesus returns briefly to his hometown of Nazareth, where "he could do no deed of power there' (Mark 6:5). He was the Carpenter's son, the people there don't need to believe in him, they assume they knew him..... The people he is able to help need him, they can't afford to question him or dismiss him..... Faith is much closer to needing than knowing. At first glance this seems to put the religious believer fundamentally at odds with the scientist, but actually it draws them closer together. Like scientists, Christians are devoted to pursuing what they don't know. So, St Augustine warns us, 'If you understand it, it's not God'".

I really like that sense of faith described as need. Some might see need as a weakness. But we all have needs and I reflect that Jesus talked in terms of needs being met in him. For instance, in the beatitudes, a part of the wider sermon on the Mount, he tells his listeners "Blessed are the poor in Spirit for theirs is the Kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 3:1), which could be understood as meaning blessed are those who know their need of God. In John's gospel he is recorded as saying "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will not be hungry, and he who believes in me will never be thirsty." (John 6: 25). Relationally, few people would have the personal resources to survive, let alone thrive, if they were living an existence of total isolation, there is something fundamental in the need for relationship and the lack of this and the loneliness that results is a real problem in our modern theoretically inter - connected world.

Paradoxically I know that I am most spiritually alive when I am aware of a deep hunger and thirst, when I know my need for God, and I am spiritually dead when I ignore that need. So here, at the beginning of a New Year (which is when I write this) I have a single, simple prayer, 'Lord, may my need for you increase, satisfy that need in the year ahead.' Amen.

View from Views

I don't think we realise how lucky we are in this part of the country, being in the centre we are isolated from some of the extremes of weather, being shielded by the Chilterns Cotswolds and the Berkshire downs. Our average rainfall is around the 25inches mark ,last year I recorded only 19.2 inches; in the 11



years I have been recording rainfall the highest was in 2014 (33inches) however this month (as I write in the middle of the month) already we have had about the average for January. And yet again we are encountering more flooding than is commensurate with the rainfall we have had. I mention this because I think it also applies to wildlife, it cannot have escaped anyone's notice that we have an epidemic of bird Flu (Avian Influenza or AI (not to be confused with other issues that are referred to as AI)). The fact that around here it does not seem very prevalent, we've only had one gull that must have died of AI, on the farm this winter. Talking to a friend of mine in Framlingham, Suffolk, who says he hardly ever sees birds on his bird table. nowadays I can only assume this because most migratory birds land there first and only infect the local population so it doesn't get this far.

Regarding birds, contrary to East Anglia, we seem to have an abundance around here, and most of our winter visitors have arrived great flocks of Fieldfares, AI does not seem to have affected them, even seen more Woodcock than usual, with many others I cannot identify. When the river first flooded there were a multitude of waterfowl present but they have not been seen since which seems odd, maybe it is that these species suffered more than any other. The farm seems have had the right conditions not only for breeding but also holding Partridges, as there are several good coveys around. Other wildlife seems to be flourishing Hares and Deer hardly a day goes past without seeing some of them, unfortunately Rabbits are beginning to pose a problem in one area of the farm,

It is fantastic to see how good the crops are looking after the very cold period we had in the run up to Christmas; this will have killed a lot of diseases that would otherwise have been a problem. This followed suddenly by a very mild early January has given them a real boost making them look healthy, just waiting for something else to hit them. Pigeons have just started to find the Rape so we must keep a continual lookout for them, this crop has not recovered quite so well as other crops but hopefully this will not present a problem, as it has plenty of time to recover, or at least I hope it will.

A new year in the farming calendar always brings the "Oxford Farming Conference" (OFC), which has been going since 1936, now joined by the "Oxford Real

Farming Conference" (ORFC), in its 16th year. The difference between these two is that the "OFC" is of a more Political, scientific, and business orientated, whereas the "ORFC" tends to be more down to earth and appealing to the more practical Organic side of farming and, attracting the smaller mixed farmer, was thought of originally by the delegates of the established "OFC" as the sandal brigade, however now both conferences complement each other and share delegates.

Usually the environment minister attends, usually invited by the "OFC" as it is the most important independent farming conference of the year, this year though the environment minister decided it was more important to attend the inauguration of the Brazilian Prime Minister/President. I do not think that the farming industry took very kindly to this attitude that the minister in overall charge of this area of expertise was not present at this important time. The Farming minister did attend but, listening to him I do not believe he, or his predecessor, both of whom are farmers in their own right ,did not seem to know much of the subject or, the necessity to push their department "DEFRA" to decide on measures that need to be taken after leaving the EU, none of us have any more of an idea what the future may or may not hold for us or the direction the Government wishes us to take.

I was horrified to read that our local MPs seem to think that the water companies are only letting raw sewage into our water courses when there is excessive rain fall not sure where their information comes from, as it is made quite clear in the press that this is not the case and that it is continually in the press both locally and nationally. This is just not good enough and has to be stopped as the committed 2035 target for it is far too far in the future to be acceptable, and if nature is to survive. What must happen is an embargo on all house building until this problem is solved and, those that are profiting from development should help foot the bill as it is not fair on the taxpayer or, the water companies.

An exhibition of diverse, original artwork, all produced during, and depicting scenes from the Second World War, will go on display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock, from 25th February to 7th May 2023.

The exhibition first went on display at the museum in March 2020, but was open for less than a week before national lockdowns were put in place in response to the COVID-19 pandemic - meaning many will now get the opportunity to see these historic pieces for the first time.

The Art of World War II exhibition has been curated from John Noott's personal collection of artwork, gathered together during his career as an art collector and dealer for over 40 years. Drawn together, the art forms a history in pictures of the Second World War while showcasing incredibly personal perspectives which reflect a varied range of experiences before, during, and after the conflict. Through the work of artists of the time, visitors will see the war unfold 'as it happened'.

Visitors to the exhibition will be able to see a view of Dunkirk as troops are evacuated, painted by a nephew of Winston Churchill, John Spencer Churchill, a reflection of what he had witnessed during his own army service. The artist would return to England to inform his uncle personally of the need for boats to assist in rescuing the troops there.

Elsewhere, the plight of both evacuees and refugees is seen as artists of the time depict the many people displaced by war, such as those coming to Britain as part of the Kindertransport rescue programme in the build up to the Second World War.

The artists whose work is included in the collection range from skilled amateurs to professionals, from those already renowned at the time to those who would go on to make a name for themselves in a post-war world. A sketch by Eduardo Paolozzi, better known as a pioneering pop-artist, contrasts newly arrived American troops with a typical Oxford scene of a student cycling through the city with the famous skyline as a backdrop. The artist faced discrimination and later internment under the Enemy Aliens Act, along with many of his family, when they moved to Britain from Italy.

The exhibition also features art from Vogue fashion illustrators forced to flee Paris, and Beano cartoonists that turned their hand to cartography to aid General Montgomery in North Africa.

Collector John Noott also knows how wide-reaching the impact of the war was on a personal level, having grown up in wartime Britain. He was seven years old in 1939, and remembers clearly many nights in air raid shelters and his father's service with the Local Defence Volunteers after work (later to become the Home Guard, or 'Dad's Army'). These lived experiences inspired him to gather the collection throughout his own career. Following this first exhibition since the pandemic, John will make the collection available to hire for exhibition at museums and venues around the country as we approach the 80th anniversary of the end of WW2.

The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum is open from Tuesday-Saturday 11am-5pm and Sunday 2pm-5pm. The county's own military history museum is located in the gardens of the Oxfordshire Museum, Park Street, Woodstock, on the doorstep of Blenheim palace.

John Howell MP writes...

I agree with the Prime Minster when he said that New Year should be a time of optimism and excitement and yet many look ahead to 2023 with apprehension. There are indeed many concerns at home and abroad. The concerns that dominate for each of us will vary according to our own circumstances and needs. Over the Christmas and New Year holiday period I had several conversations on the fallout from the pandemic with many people feeling that the negative effects, particularly in relation to mental health and well-being, are still taking their toll. The nervousness at the news that China would reopen its borders is an example of the fear that lingers, not only in relation to physical health, but also over the dread that life could be restricted once again. However we must remember that we are in a very different place to where we were at the start of the pandemic with knowledge, vaccines and medicines available to help prevent such devastating measures being taken again.

For those concerned at the continued cost of living issues I was pleased to see the Government announcement of further support this year for pensioners and those on low incomes. It is also good to see the continued support in relation to energy costs for business and non-domestic customers. This is subject to on-going review in a fast-changing situation.

I know that many constituents are concerned over issues relating to Thames Water. I have written previously on my concerns on storm discharges. I have also raised a number of other specific concerns with the company over time. I was saddened, although not entirely surprised, to read in the Ofwat annual assessment of water company performance that Thames Water fell amongst the worst performers. I am in touch with the Chief Executive of Ofwat on this. He has confirmed that they are very concerned over this and advised me that Thames Water have committed to spending an additional £2bn in the 2020-25 regulatory period on top of the £9.6bn final determination to turnaround their performance. He acknowledges that there is much to be done and has confirmed that they are monitoring the situation closely. We will be keeping in touch on progress.

Another concern that also tends to arise with the new year is changes to bus services when timetables are reviewed. I fully appreciate that when bus companies make changes some people will be inconvenienced having got used to services running at particular times. Although buses are run on a commercial basis there are some subsidies available to support services in specific circumstances. These are administered by the County Council. Having investigated some of the concerns I understand that for bus companies there are many issues to consider when looking at the sustainability of services. In some cases it is simply a matter of low passenger numbers that makes a route unsustainable, and the companies need to divert resources to other routes where there is greater usage to keep these running. However sometimes the issues are wider. For example on one route up for change the bus company wanted to use double decker buses across the whole route and some of the rural roads included in the journey were not suitable for such vehicles. Whilst the Government does have a National Bus Strategy the challenges in rural areas are many. As we know all too well some routes are simply lost altogether due to lack of use.

There are, of course, many big issues which affect us all which are will rehearsed in the national media and which the government is already working to address. If there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts.
