Background: James Liley

James' parents were Henry Liley³ (1849 – 1935), a cottager, and his second wife Sarah (née Harvey) (1858 – 1943) of South End, South Collingham.

James was one of 6 children from the second marriage: Hannah, Lizzie, William, Nellie, James and Ethel Liley. Henry and his first wife, Maria (1849-1876), had four children⁴ but only two, Henry and Charles, survived childhood.

In 1911, James, aged 20 and single, was working as a **horseman** on a farm in Halam for Mr William Hazard. It would appear he was a farm labourer on the Welbeck Estate when he enlisted.⁵

James appears to have been close to his family, sending affectionate post-cards to his sisters from the Western Front throughout the war. Many of these can be viewed in Collingham and District Local History Society archives. His brother William also enlisted and survived the war.

Military History: Private James Liley

James enlisted in the army at Welbeck⁶ and served with the battalion in Gallipoli and Egypt. According to his medal index card his first 'theatre of war' was the Balkans prior to 31st Dec 1915.

9th (Service) Battalion Sherwood Foresters:

- Formed at Derby in August 1914 as part of K1 and came under orders of 33rd Brigade in 11th (Northern) Division.
- Moved initially to Grantham for training then on to Frensham Camp in April 1915.
- ➤ Sailed from Liverpool in early July 1915 for Gallipoli, landing at Suvla Bay 7 August 1915. Private Liley would have been involved in this disastrous campaign which claimed the life of Captain Percy Browne (6th Lincolnshire Battalion see profile).
- Evacuated from Gallipoli December 1915, moved to Egypt via Imbros.
- Moved to France in July 1916 and were on the Western Front (Somme) by 27th.

Historical Context at the time Private Liley was killed-in-action

Battle of Thiepval (part of The Battle of Somme) 26-28th September 1916

On 1 July 1916, supported by a French attack to the south, thirteen divisions of Commonwealth forces launched an offensive on a line from north of Gommecourt to Maricourt on the Somme. Despite a preliminary bombardment lasting seven days, the German defences were barely touched and the attack following the bombardment met fierce resistance. Losses were catastrophic (almost 60,000 casualties on the first day). At the end of September⁷, **Thiepval** was finally captured. The village had been an original objective of 1 July. Attacks north and east continued throughout October and into November in increasingly difficult weather conditions.

The Battle of the Somme finally ended on 18 November with the onset of winter.

The Sherwood Forester suffered particularly high losses during September. James Liley's Battalion, the 9th, was in the firing line on the 26th – see p 6 for the Roll of Honour from that day.

Report on James Liley's death in the Newark Advertiser:


Sunday 15 October 1916: Collingham discovered it had lost James Liley, 26, and William Henry Hammond, 19, who went to War early in 1914 and never had a chance to return home.

James's parents Henry and Sarah first heard of his demise on 26 September from a comrade in the Sherwoods, Private R Phillips; the pair had made a pact to carry out the 'melancholy duty' if the worst happened. But they clung to the slim possibility that it might just be a case of mistaken identity. Now official confirmed had snuffed out their final hope. Private 12602 Liley of the 9th Battalion Sherwoods is remembered on the Thiepval Memorial.⁸

The Thiepval Memorial, the Memorial to the Missing of the Somme

The Thiepval Memorial bears the names of more than 72,000 officers and men of the United Kingdom and South African forces who died in the Somme sector before 20 March 1918 and have no known grave. Over 90% of those commemorated died between July and November 1916. The memorial also serves as an Anglo-French Battle Memorial in recognition of the joint nature of the 1916 offensive and a small cemetery containing equal numbers of Commonwealth and French graves lies at the foot of the memorial.'9

WILLIAM LILEY (1885-1963)

James's older brother, William Liley, also volunteered. A farm labourer, he joined the Royal Field Artillery in 1915. He survived the war and was awarded the Victory Medal. In August 1918 he married Caroline Bunn. When their first child was born in December 1919 he called him James after his brother. William died in Bingham, Notts, in 1963, aged 78.¹⁰

There is a picture of William on p 8 of 'A Collingham Scrapbook'¹¹ in CDLHS archives along with other photos of the Liley family. The caption mistakenly calls William 'James'.
