Hope Cove Independent Lifeboat

We are now back in service as the major repairs to the engine have been completed and the boat taken out for sea trials and testing.

We have had our first 'Shout' of 2026 which was to a surfer in distress off Bantham. We recovered him and his board and spent some time to confirm his brother had made it safely to the shore. The casualty was very hypothermic, so was brought back to the station in Hope where, with the aid of the coastguard, medics he was brought back to normal temperature and later picked up by his brother. One interesting piece of information about this was that the brothers have come here from Cape Town. While talking to them they said they never surf in South Africa, but decided to try it here. At least here while the water may be cold there aren't as many Great Whites!

We are now back to regular training on Tuesday evenings with the occasional launch at weekends. One of my personal annoyances is unnecessary sell-by dates. To comply with the Rescue Boat Code to be an on-service Life Boat, we have to make sure everything we use is checked and in date. This means we have to remove from our first aid kit sealed packets of crepe bandages and sundry other bits and pieces that are out of date. The other wastage is that our multiple fire extinguishers also have dates on and it is cheaper to buy replacements in some cases than paying a specialist to come out and check them, this cannot be good for our planet?

On one of our recent training sessions we decided to use 10 out of date parachute flares to let crew who have never used them learn what to do for their own and the other crew members safety. We duly called the local Coastguard headquarters in Falmouth and told them what we were about to do and also the exact location and times of start and finish of the exercise to make sure if anybody called 999 re: flares being let off out at sea they would be able to re assure them that no one was in trouble. We duly launched and at the appointed time started firing them in to the sky. Just as the second one was making it way majestically to sea level the emergency radio channel zero came to life with a local coastguard saying he had seen a flare off bolt tail. We quickly reassured them it was ok and let Falmouth know what had happened.

Hope Cove Weekend 2026

Hello! With signs of Spring all around us that can only mean Summer is just around the corner! So here at HCW HQ we have been cracking on with preparations for our much-loved Hope Cove Weekend for August Bank Holiday 2026.

This year we will open on the evening of Friday 28th August with live entertainment from the stage and finish the event with the Raffle, closing ceremony and music on the afternoon of Monday 31st August.

Our wonderful Committee of 11 started our Meetings in January as there is always so much to do behind the scenes to ensure everything runs smoothly at August Bank Holiday. Not only do we arrange the fun stuff, like a packed schedule of activities for families on the beach and bands etc for entertainment from the Stage, but we have to sort out the more mundane tasks like preparing an Event Safety Management Plan, ensuring we are adequately insured, sorting road closures and arranging the correct water safety measures for the sea-based competitions. This is not an exhaustive list of stuff we must do in advance but a lot of it costs money!

Our ethos has always been “family fun for free for all” and we still only charge for a couple of events to cover our costs, for example the Open Swim. However, we do depend upon the generosity of local businesses, individuals and holiday-makers to keep the event going year after year. Last year it cost us £17,000 to put on the whole event.

We raise funds through donations and sponsorship and fees from stall holders and businesses who advertise in the programme and on our website. Each year we set aside a fund from our income from the previous HCW to enable us to pay the expenses we must pay upfront, and we then donate the surplus between local charitable causes. This year this included the Hope Cove Life Boat, the Harbour Wall fund, Hope and Galmpton Village Hall, The History Group and Malborough school PTA.

As Committee members we find that each year brings new challenges and we cope with changes as best we can. We are all willing volunteers and give our time and skills for free to ensure that Hope Cove Weekend is a fun filled weekend for everyone. We also rely on a fabulous number of cheerful volunteers to help us set up and clear down and help with the many events and stalls where help is always needed. The Volunteers Meeting will be at the ever-supportive Cottage Hotel at 10.30 am on Sunday 23rd August in the Cove Room. We would welcome any new volunteers with open arms! We had a first recent positive and productive meeting with the National Trust about our wish to have a memorial to the 707 men who perished when HMS Ramillies sank below Bolt Tail in 1760. We are continuing to collect information and prepare to publish two more walking heritage walks, one a circular walk along the ridgeway and Beacon Lane, and one from Bolt Tail to Bolt Head.

Apologies for Absence

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr Jan Carter, Cllr Steve Pearson and Cllr Jo Hocking.

Report from District Council

South Hams District Council (SHDC) - Cllr Mark Long and Cllr Sam Dennis

- Apprenticeships – 17 apprenticeships have been successfully filled in the South Hams District Council area. You can check the South Hams District Council website for available apprenticeships. Cllr Mark Long confirmed that the current apprenticeship scheme will be carried on after the reorganisation.
- Postal votes – these run for 3 years - all information has gone out regarding renewal.
- Business Rates – changes will run from 1 April 2026.
- Garden Waste – apply before 1 April 2026 for early bird rates.
- Open Spaces Officer checked location of recent cliff fall. He confirmed that this still looks stable but they have repaired some of the fencing in that area. Cllr Samantha Dennis suggested that we could have blackthorn bushes planted for safety purposes if we wish. We should let South Hams District Council know if we wish this to be actioned.

Public Forum

A parishioner complained that recycling lorries have little consideration for drivers. A parishioner had to reverse all the way back up Kerse Lane as the lorry would not move. It makes it difficult for some parishioners who are not confident on the roads.

Planning Applications

a. 0165/26/TCA, Orchard Cottage, Hope Cove TQ7 3HS, T1, T2, T3: Cedar – unsightly appearance, unions where new growth has sprouted will be weak, remove and replace with one or two broad leaf trees. T4: Sycamore – outgrowing its space and encroaching on property neighbour's land, reduction of approximately 2m, leaving tree standing around 4-5m, **12/2** (retrospective) – **on 17 February 2026 South Hams District Council confirmed that they have no objection to works going ahead within a 2-year period.**

b. 3623/25/HHO, Colliver Orchard, South Huish TQ7 3EH, Householder application for new timber cladding to existing building & new front porch, 26/2
It was unanimously **RESOLVED** to support this planning application.

c. 3611/25/VAR, Eldoret, Gampton Cross, Galmpton TQ7 3ET, Application for variation of Condition 2 (approved plans) of planning consent 2582/24/HHO, 05/03
It was unanimously **RESOLVED** to support this planning application.

d. 0347/26/VAR, The Banks, Grand View Road, Hope Cove TQ7 3HF, application for variation of condition 2 (Approved Plans) of planning consent 2711/24/HHO, 25/3
It was unanimously **RESOLVED** to support this planning application.

e. **Non-Statutory Application (there is no statutory consultation requirement on this application –for information only)** 3730/25/PAU, South Huish Farm – Cool Cow Camping – temporary campsite notification for a temporary pop-up campsite to operate from 05/06/2026-23/06/2026 and 26/06/2026-27/07/2026
No comments were made on this non-statutory application.

District Council Planning Decisions

a. 3306/25/CLE, Smilers Corner, South Huish TQ7 3EQ, Certificate of Lawfulness for Existing Use of land as domestic garden - **Certificate of Lawfulness (Existing) Certified on 16 January 2026.**

b. 3225/25/FUL, South Huish Farm, South Huish TQ7 3EH, application for proposed new agricultural building to accommodate a new milking parlour – **conditional approval given 3 February 2026.**

Enforcement

South Hams District Council are responsible for the enforcement of all planning breaches; the Parish Council have no authority to deal with issues of this nature. Please will all parishioners continue to report full details of any violations that do not adhere to the original application for which permission was granted. Business to be discussed

Parish pathways

Clive will take over some of the pathways work and we will look at getting quotes from some contractors and re-visit this at a later meeting.

Emergency Resilience Plan

The Clerk reported that she, together with several neighbouring clerks, will be attending a meeting next week to review and update local Emergency Resilience Plans.

A key difficulty identified during the recent gas emergency was the lack of up to date contact information for second homeowners, as well as the absence of a central, easily updated list of local churches, charities, and other support organisations. Cllr Dennis further highlighted that smaller parishes did not receive regular updates during the incident, which hindered communication and response.

Members agreed that the gas company's operational response had been very strong and that they had deployed significant resources to manage the situation. A parishioner suggested that the parish should maintain a confidential list of vulnerable residents, along with details of any local doctors, first aiders, or other trained individuals who could be contacted in an emergency.

Planters – ratification of Clerk's action

It was unanimously **RESOLVED** to ratify the Clerk's action in the purchase of planters (total cost £990 + VAT, £990 of which was received via a South Hams District Council grant), and to approve payment following receipt of the final invoice.

Enhanced Road Warden Scheme

It is currently anticipated that all parishes within the wider Salcombe area will look to share equipment obtained through a joint grant application. There are 16 parishes in the Salcombe Division, although our parish would share resources probably with Malborough, Thurlestone and West Alvington? South Milton preferred to remain independent as they had their own equipment.

A parishioner asked who would be responsible for training Road Wardens to use any new equipment. The Clerk reported that Modbury will be running workshops on effective pothole repair, which Road Wardens can attend. Additional volunteers will be required, and it was agreed that the Parish Council will advertise for volunteers via social media. At present, the parish has two Road Wardens, Sean Hassall and the Lengthsman, along with one local volunteer.

S,106 Project - South Huish Parish Circular Walk

Members noted that this is the second proposal for the use of the S.106 funds, following the earlier beach shower project which did not proceed. The Clerk had circulated an outline of how a heritage-focused walking route and associated information boards might be developed.

It was suggested that the Parish Council work closely with the History Group, who already have a short local walk mapped out. There are however several other boards that could be replaced or added as part of this scheme. Cllr Dennis also confirmed that replacing the Hope Cove and Galampton road signs would not fall within the scope of this project.

The Clerk reported that the South Hams Ramblers had also expressed interest in contributing and would be willing to attend a meeting to offer suggestions. Cllr Rundle advised that the National Trust is planning to create additional inland footpaths, and that these should be considered when designing the route. Members discussed the possibility of replacing stiles with gates to improve accessibility. It was felt, however, that traditional stone stiles should be preserved, with gate access added alongside where appropriate.

Kingsbridge Estuary U3a

Looking across the Tamar Estuary today one can still admire the imposing Mount Edgumbe on the other side. Our guest speaker at the end of February, Clive Charleton, told us about the noble family whose home it was for many centuries and in particular Ernestine Edgumbe who was born there in 1843. Her father was Earl of Mount Edgumbe who was aide-de-camp both of King William IV and Queen Victoria.

Remaining unmarried, Ernestine had a lively interest in the world around her and the changes brought about by the industrial revolution and especially in any developments in the Royal Navy. When her brother became Earl she moved with her mother to their house at Cotehele which was enhanced with the addition of the east wing. From there, of course, transport was mainly by boat and she writes in her diary about the river traffic, being highly amused when boats got stuck on the mud.

Ernestine travelled widely, both westwards into Cornwall and north as far as Alnwick in Northumberland where she enjoyed galloping round the grounds of the castle with the Duke. She was obliged to enter into the social life in London during "the season" mixing in royal circles, but this she detested. As railway travel developed it became easier to travel round Europe and she even made it across the Atlantic to St Vincent, later speaking of her sight of the Soufriere volcano before it erupted. Back at home Ernestine was involved in local politics. Leading up to the 1st World War she was a moving light in the Primrose League, a grassroots association supporting traditional patriotic and conservative values. She was very active in her local area until her death in 1923.

Nature Note April – May

Sad news, a cow, a sheep and a dolphin were washed up on the beach during the recent storms. One wonders what happened; were the cow and sheep chased off the cliff by a run-away dog? Clearly this is not the case with the dolphin. It is not uncommon for dolphins to be washed up either dying or dead; sometimes in a collective 'mass suicide' appearance. Not quite sure why. This is not the case for sheep and cows unless the sheep have been chased off the cliff as in the excellent film 'Far from the madding crowd' starring Alan Bates and Julie Christie based on the book of the same name by Thomas Hardy. In fact, the phrase 'Far from the madding crowd' is a line from Gray's magnificent poem 'Elegy in a country churchyard'.

Still I digress but we cannot overemphasise the dangers of the cliffs despite being formed from very old rocks. The rocks are from the Devonian, an age around about 400 million years ago. They are a bit of a mixture of land sediments with volcanic debris, lavas, lake and marine deposits (reefs). There were no cows, sheep or dolphins. There probably were cliffs but not the same ones as those of today.

The Devonian is one of 15 geological periods of which 4 are named from British locations. This is befitting as by far the most advanced study of geology was conducted in this county. We should be proud.

Following the Devonian is the Carboniferous (~325 million years ago) which we all know from the vast deposits of coal that helped fuel the industrial revolution. The vegetation was predominantly lycopods (now tiny plants). No coal down here however there was the stirrings of the Dartmoor granite slowly bubbling up but never exposed at the surface.

The Permian and Triassic (often linked as one – Permo-trias ~240million years ago) are poorly represented this far west. But what there is, is well represented on the east coast of Devon as massive red sandstone dunes at Dawlish – just like the Sahara! Oh and there is a volcano or two.

We are now into the Jurassic and Cretaceous (~ 150 million years ago) – the age of dinosaurs and conifers. No sheep or cows or dolphins. And anyway there are no deposits of this age preserved locally. Uplift during the alpine mountain building phase caused what were shallow marine sediments to be eroded off the top of the granites.

Oh, there are some isolated younger sediments that are preserved near Bovey Tracey with lots of mangrove seeds (tropical sea indicators) and many other plant fossils!
