

THIS Church, in which many of the most interesting features have been carefully restored, appears to have been originally built towards the close of the twelfth century, on a cruciform plan, with a tower at the intersection, but without aisles.

1. Welcome congregation and hand out books. Put out books for latecomers.
2. Check offertery servers are present. If not, arrange alternatives.
3. Check lesson reader is present. If not, inform vicar or curate:
4. Arrange collection of offerings.
5. After the PEACE,
  1. Welcome Sunday School and hand out books.
  2. Take collection.
6. After service.
  1. Return books to shelve
  2. Count collection, fill in form, hand collection to treasurer or place in safe.
  3. Ensure preacher has signed in "Record of Services" book and enter amount of collection.

1936 – 1963**

**1938**

Uncertain the fete would go ahead.  
154 names on the register.

**1940**

Services held at 3.30pm instead of 6.30pm due to the blackout.  
Tower was used as an observation post.

**1945**

Archbishop Lang funded the bells to be re-hung and put in order

**1946**

Mrs Allen and her sister paid for clock face to be gilded in memory of Mr. Ryman.  
A small fete was held.

**1947**

A fete and gymkhana were held on Bishop's Field.  
A set of handbells were a gift from Mrs. Mortimore.

**1949**

Fete held Bank Holiday Monday at the Palace by kind permission of the Bishop.

**1950**

The College students paid 2/6d a term for practicing on the Church bells.

**1958**

Fete held at the College.

**1960**

Water to be extended to the churchyard when building the bungalow.

**1962**

New bell ropes were hung.  
Mr. Arthur Smith funded the gilding of the weather cock.
