
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We All Loved Alfie

Coronavirus Update

We continue to work hard to keep our patients as safe as possible, along with our staff and the community by managing the majority of medical care remotely. This way of working has proved very successful and is reflected in the very low number of Covid-related illnesses recorded in our area.

Access to any Granta site continues to be by invitation only, following a prior telephone assessment and only when the clinician feels that it is essential to see you in person. You will be asked to wear, and will be provided with, a mask when entering any of our buildings.

'Flu Vaccinations

We are currently planning our 2020 flu clinics. In the face of coronavirus it is more important than ever to have your flu vaccination if you are eligible.

Having your flu jab done at your GP surgery is quick and convenient - you will be given a time slot so you can arrange your day, and your medical records are available to the nurses / doctors which means no form filling for you.

The Society's website has been expanded to include a new series of interesting walking routes. The website already has 20 walks that start and finish at railway stations but their attraction has been severely reduced by the advice to avoid public transport during the coronavirus pandemic. Now the Walks area of the website has two sections: Station Walks and Other Walks.

The new walks are all 'circular', starting and finishing at a location where there is normally space to park. The routes have been chosen for their attractiveness and level of interest, something which is not too difficult within the Hundred Parishes. The number of Other Walks is increasing all the time; in due course we hope that each of the hundred parishes will feature in at least one walk.

All walk descriptions can be downloaded and



printed. Each includes clear instructions to help you find the way and there is also an outline map of the route. Within the description there is a short introduction to some of the places you will pass. The new walks range in distance from 1 mile to 10 miles.

We hope you will be able to try them out and we would be pleased to receive any feedback. If you particularly enjoy a walk, do please encourage others to enjoy it too. Please bear in mind that the usual pubs and tea rooms may not yet be open or may offer only a limited service. Walking boots or stout shoes are generally encouraged, although during dry periods they may not be needed.

Now that most of us can get out, please take the opportunity to explore new parts of our attractive countryside, villages and small towns. There is so much to appreciate in the Hundred Parishes.

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

Postponing any visits to pubs on 4 July, as the Covid-19 restrictions were eased, two small, dauntless, socially-distanced teams of volunteers renewed the **CVF attack on Himalayan balsam** along the **lower Bourn Brook**: cohabiting couples cocooned in canoes (photograph on left), and loners (in loose pairs) scrambling along the banks. The following Saturday a group in chest waders, also organised by the driven, strategically-minded Mike Foley, tackled the even more challenging and potentially serious, recently-discovered outbreak of **Floating Pennywort** in the **Great Shelford Award Chalk stream** immediately behind Scotsdales garden centre and the Camping and Caravanning Club site.

On the other hand the **Environment Agency (EA)** itself is responsible for a serious threat of a very different kind which is easily controlled, given the will. As reported on our website, in early June we were shocked to discover

that the EA was planning, once again, to **blanket spray glyphosate along various lengthy stretches of the Cam and its tributaries**. The stated reason for this is "to maintain sinuosity within the channel to help reduce flood risk". The EA's proposals, and our highly critical response, are on our [website](#). We are recommending that their funds should instead be used for habitat improvement, which will often bring significant flood attenuation or alleviation benefits, thereby meeting the EA's objectives in a much more positive and less harmful way. There can be times when herbicide use is justified, for example to tackle persistent infestations of non-native invasive species, but any such treatment must be highly selective, pinpointing individual plants for treatment. So far we have had only a most unsatisfactory response from the EA.



Though eating a plastic bag killed a Cambridge bullock this summer, the exquisite photograph on the left, of **The Rush on Sheep's Green**, presents an alluring pastoral vision of harmony between landscape, humankind, and beast.

Cambridge is unusual as a city in having such green spaces at its heart - many of them on the floodplain of the Cam. These Commons and riverside Local Nature Reserves include **grazing as an important conservation technique** to maintain the historic landscape and our riverine biodiversity.

The City Council holds the grazing rights for these public free-access spaces and advertises each year for local graziers to obtain a licence to graze them. Most people are heartily in favour of continuing this practice on these meadows. Apart from the joy of seeing the humanely-treated animals, and their useful grazing of the grass, many of us also value the meat they eventually afford. If you mind your step there is nothing much to object to. Cowpats are rich habitats for insects, such as flies, and without them there would be even fewer swallows and swifts visiting in summer.
