

Talking Point



Local action for a global problem

When I was a child, our milk was delivered by an electric vehicle in glass bottles that were washed and reused, and we happily shared it with blue tits that often pecked through the foil lids for a sip of cream. Fast forward 40 years and observe the giant leap backwards for mankind: an unfathomable increase in the use of plastic to satisfy our hunger for a cheaper and easier lifestyle. It is ironic that we are destroying the natural world with a product we have manufactured from plants and animals that lived millions of years ago.

Plastic production gobbles a staggering 8% of annual global fossil fuel production. In 2019 that was 460 million tonnes of plastic, a figure that has doubled in the last 20 years. Half of it is 'single use' and less than 10% of the plastic that has ever been produced has been recycled. Little wonder that there are now over 50 trillion pieces of plastic and micro-plastic in the world's oceans. As UV light and wave action breaks it into ever smaller pieces, the Earth's Coriolis force and resulting currents gather the plastic mush into the five swirling 'gyres' located between our continents on either side of the equator. They are often referred to as plastic rafts but they are more like a plastic soup that is virtually impossible to extract from the water.

Plastic is not merely floating in the ocean; it has worked its way into all forms of life, with the average person eating about 5g of plastic each week. You can't see it or smell it, but you are consuming or inhaling the equivalent of a credit card in micro and nano-plastics each week. Inevitably some of this remains lodged in our tissue, particularly the lungs, liver and kidneys and little is known about the long-term health effects.

This is a gargantuan problem that can only be mitigated by mankind. I am a firm believer in 'every little helps', so a few individual lifestyle changes do make a big difference when the whole community works together. 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle' is already a common mantra for many.

This year, the village fete committee is introducing a small but significant change; it is an initiative that has been proven to work at many sporting events and festivals and we need your help.

You will still ENJOY a pint of fine ale, a chilled wine or a flute of fizz, but this will either be served in a compostable 'glass' or in one of our new 'St George's, Benenden' reusable pint glasses. A £1 deposit will be included in the price of your pint, so when you RETURN your glass at the end of the afternoon, you will receive your £1 back. The glasses will then be washed and RE-USED at next year's fete and other church events. Look out for the 'Enjoy Me, Return Me, Re-use Me' slogan and help our village make a difference.





Benenden Pre-School

Benenden Pre-School has entered the Wilder Kent Awards, run by the Kent Wildlife Trust. By entering, we are demonstrating our desire to connect children and families with nature and protect our planet for the future.

We already promote this in a number of ways, principally by spending time each day, whatever the weather, in our lovely garden where we grow fruit and vegetables. Each child has recently planted a sunflower and they are fascinated by the weekly progress of the plants. We have a recycling bin and a food waste bin in addition to a dustbin and we have a wormery in the garden to convert some of our food waste into compost.

Our daily 'stair leader' (the children take it turns to be the one who comes down the stairs first when we go outside) is now also in charge of turning the upstairs lights off to ensure we are not wasting electricity. We find children really enjoy this sort of responsibility.

Parents help us directly as well by, for example, avoiding single use plastics in lunch boxes and by walking, cycling or scooting their child to pre-school whenever possible. Parents who drive turn their engines off while dropping off in order to reduce unnecessary air pollution.





Topical health

As we enter barbecue season, one of the things those of us who follow trends in infectious disease expect to see is a decline in the incidence of Covid-19 infections but an upturn in reports relating to food poisoning. As with Covid, though, there are a few simple steps we can take to avoid the risks associated with barbecued foods, although unlike with Covid, we don't recommend you wear a mask when consuming your bangers and burgers.

Warm weather is the perfect breeding ground for bacteria like Campylobacter, Salmonella and E. Coli, which are often present in uncooked and undercooked meats. So here are three simple tips for staying food safe.

First, wash your hands between handling uncooked and cooked foods. Microorganisms can spread from one place to another on our hands, and in this case washing means with soap and water.

Second, defrost meat completely before cooking. You cannot guarantee to defrost meat during the cooking process, so don't even try. It is usually best to defrost items like sausages and burgers overnight in a bowl or on a plate in the fridge. If you are in a hurry, defrost food in the microwave before cooking and remember to cook what you have defrosted within 24 hours.

Third, don't cross-contaminate uncooked and cooked foods, so store them separately, use different utensils and crockery - oh, and did I mention, wash your hands?

It is important that any meat is cooked thoroughly. Remember burnt on the outside does not mean cooked on the inside. It is important to cook food evenly by turning it frequently so it is cooked from all sides, and while it is okay to serve steaks rare or pink, this is never the case with chicken, pork or sausages. Any cooked leftovers should be refrigerated as soon as possible and consumed within 48 hours. Here's to a tummy bug-free summer.

Benenden Hospital

As June sees the celebration of our Queen's Platinum Jubilee, I thought it would be the perfect time to revisit the past royal patronage at our hospital. In 1906, Her Royal Highness Princess Christian (daughter of Queen Victoria), laid the foundation stone that you can see in the Pavilion restaurant today.

In 1950, the Benenden Healthcare Society was honoured when Queen Elizabeth, Consort to King George VI, visited Benenden Sanatorium (our hospital) for the first time. In the early 1950s, the Society was looking for a way to increase its profile. The Queen Consort, who had since become the new Queen Mother, had shown interest in the work of the sanatorium, so she was asked if she would become the society's patron. To everyone's delight, she agreed.

Society secretary Joe Fountain asked if it would be possible to have the cover of the Bible in the recently refurbished St Margaret's Church embossed with the Queen Mother's coat of arms. To his surprise, Her Majesty's Private Secretary called on her behalf, agreed to the embossment and even signed it. The original Bible and pen are safely stored at Benenden Hospital.

1965 marked the Society's Diamond Jubilee year and this occasion was the Queen Mother's third and final visit to the recently renamed Benenden Chest Hospital. Her Majesty wrote in the visitor book: "This sanatorium is held in the highest regard and this is a great tribute to those far-sighted men who started this hospital as the Post Office Sanatorium Society."

On 30 March 2002, Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother passed away at the age of 101. To honour the Society's beloved patron, flags flew at half-mast at York and the hospital.

The Society's Royal patron is an important part of our hospital's history and as we celebrate our Queen's Jubilee, it is very special to remember our connection with her family. Jane Abbott, Hospital Director and Chief Nurse

Charlie comes home in a first-class Carriage

Ruth Clark talks to the owner of Benenden's new hair salon

It's full circle for Charlie Cox, the owner of The Carriage hair studio that opened in the village last month. The daughter of David Hulme, who many will remember as our local policeman Charlie lived here in the 90s, subsequently married in St George's and then christened her two children in the church.





Bike to Hike charity challenge

As our friends will testify, we love a challenge. In the past we have climbed Kilimanjaro, done crazy one-day challenges in the Lake District, and last year James walked the Pennine Way. However, this year it



may be that we have bitten off more than we can chew with the Bike to Hike Challenge. This madness was initially proposed when we were still in our 50s but delay due to COVID has nudged us over a significant threshold, and it remains to be discovered if we are still as young as we feel.

So, this summer we will cycle down France from coast to coast and then a few weeks later hike across a good part of the Alps. By the time you read this we will hopefully have just finished the ride, which follows a meandering route from St Malo to Nice, covering 1,000 miles - 70 miles a day. Just for fun we are throwing in an ascent of Mont Ventoux, the famous Tour de France climb, on what could have been a rest day. If you are interested in looking at or doing the route, then there is a great book called 'France En Velo'.

Then a few weeks later we will return to France and walk across the Alps for two weeks on the GR5, starting in Chatel and finishing in Modane - almost another 200 miles. As you can imagine, both routes are quite up and down, and by the end we will have climbed over 30,000m. To put that in perspective, on the walk every day we

will go up and down the equivalent of Scafell and more whilst averaging over 15 miles.

To keep us going, we have lots of friends joining us along the way, including some other Benenden locals. William Casement is doing the whole cycle and Giles Clark, who runs the Bike Workshop, is driving the van and supporting us on the ride.

The pain will all be worth it if we can achieve our fundraising target of £30,000 for our two charities:

Chalkdown Group Riding for the Disabled Association supports local people and has been operating for over 30 years. Gill was until

recently a trustee and still volunteers every week. The project we are supporting is 'A Stable Roof' which will rebuild some essential stables that were already in a poor state when Storm Eunice finished them off.

Power for the People is a small charity that invests in communities living in extreme poverty in East Africa to help them build a bright sustainable future. lames has been the chair of Power for the People for the last five years. The project we are supporting is 'Window in



remote teaching and the rest of the world.



Fighting with lockdown in luxury lingerie

Benenden is a hub for enterprising companies who have decided to base their

operations here, and Intimates Lingerie is one of them. They invited Ruth Clark to visit them at their UK HQ on Apple Pie Farm recently to talk about their business on the occasion of their 25th anniversary, and it was fascinating. Sarah and Andrew Charlesworth in 1997 had both been working in the luxury cosmetic fragrance and hosiery industries before deciding to start their own venture. They founded Intimates in 1997 to introduce premium brand lingerie, swimwear, nightwear and loungewear from Europe and America into the UK. "It was a big step for us," says Sarah, "but we had so much experience working with high-end brands and retailers that we thought 'why not do it ourselves', and we haven't regretted it since."

Sarah and Andrew were joined by Andrew's children, Ben in 2009 and Sophie in 2010, and today the family business represents some of the world's leading names, including DKNY, Ralph Lauren, Hanro, Commando, Ginia, Kate Spade and Donna Karan. They work closely with these brands and import their products into the UK, managing onward distribution to small independent and large retailers across

the country including Next, John Lewis, Fenwicks, Marks and Spencer, Selfridges, Harrods and Hoopers.

While the company employs about ten in London at their sales room, in their dedicated Hanro shop on South Molton Street and at their concession in Harrods, 19 are based in their Apple Pie Farm HQ, which is boosted by casual labour during the summer when shops stock up ready to meet higher demand for lingerie products at Christmas.

Not surprisingly lockdown had a significant

effect on retailers and, as a result, on Intimates. "The retail industry was already changing rhythm as consumers were shopping less and less on the high street and increasingly moving online," explains Sarah.

From the Himalayas back to Kentish beer roots

The Benenden Village Wine Society has enjoyed a few triumphs in recent years. As one of the organisers, I shouldn't really say that, but we've had some great tastings, introduced a lot of people to a lot of wine and raised a fair few quid for charity along the way. Even by our high standards, though, the last one was a step up the ladder.

With the massive help of Jo Thornton, from luxury brand retailer LVMH, and with the usual generous hospitality of Samantha Price at Benenden School, my colleague Alfred Nicol and I brought 30 lucky ticket holders into a

We've called on one of Kent's best small breweries - Old Dairy from Tenterden - to visit us at Benenden School on Friday 8 July (7pm for 7.30pm) and take us through their range of excellent brews.

The exact line-up is yet to be finalised, but there will be eight beers, from light, summer types to full-bodied best bitters, and the tasting will be completed by two barrel-aged specialities, which to a lifelong ale enthusiast sound very exciting indeed.

For a slender ticket price of just £15, you'll receive a welcoming bottle on arrival, before we're talked through the beers by an Old Dairy expert. The plan is to enjoy some of the evening



beautiful room and treated them to a gourmet supper accompanied by some quite astonishing bottles, topped by a once-in-a-lifetime Chinese wine produced by the Ao Yun winery in Yunnan province.

It crossed my mind at the time that only a tiny percentage of people in the entire world would ever taste this exclusive concoction - a Bordeaux blend made in the foothills of the Himalayas - and Benenden was now probably, in percentage terms, the best represented community in the entire world.

We raised £700 for Porchlight - the Kentbased charity helping the homeless and vulnerable - and then we sat down and wondered how on earth we could follow such a night.

Well, the answer is that we're going back to grass roots. Or rather to the hop fields upon which Kent founded its alcoholic reputation before sparkling wine came along. Yes, due to insatiable popular demand, we're having a beer tasting.

in glorious summer sunshine, with food that has yet to be decided upon, due to uncertainty over kitchen arrangements, and will have to be bought and paid for separately once all becomes clear. Sorry for the vagueness, but this is slightly new ground for the committee and we're winging it, I confess.

Tickets will be on sale at the village shop very soon. Cash with order, please, and it would help if you could provide us with your email address so we can contact you regarding the

Last Word

A caring man and a true friend to Benenden

Tracy Claridge 8 April 1956 - 22 April 2022

On April 22, the village lost one of its greatest friends, Tracy Claridge, taken from us far too soon at the age of 66. Tracy was involved in

just about every organisation in the village that sought to work for the good of the community, and he was tireless in his efforts: St George's Church, the village fete, the Christmas lunch and Christian Aid: not to mention dragon boat racing, the primary school, the Hello! How are you? Club and the Benenden Action Team; as well as Nourish, Catching Lives and the bowls club; and

we'll have missed a few out by mistake.

Here we've gathered a few tributes from across Tracy's wide range of activities, hopefully to give an idea of how much he was appreciated and how sorely he will be missed.

Tom Dawlings, lifelong friend

I first met Tracy in 1974 playing cricket at the Woodford Wells Club in Essex, shortly after we left (different) schools - he was five days younger than me. Tracy had been at Chigwell School and was a formidable young cricketer. Having played football at school, he also joined Woodford Rugby Club where he learned to play a game to which he was ideally suited, but basketball apart (which he played for England), learning about wine was more important for Tracy at that time than club sport and he spent time abroad in Europe and Australia grounding himself in the wine business.

In 1981 many Woodford Wells cricketers joined a tour to South Africa - a touring party which included former England and Kent captain Mike Denness and Peter Parfitt (Middlesex and England) - at a time when South Africa were banned from international cricket because of the apartheid regime. For most of the tourists this was a great experience, less so for Tracy, who was very troubled by the apartheid

system he witnessed.

After his time in Australia, Tracy based himself in Kent. He set up Claridge Fine Wine and then made the career move to join Maison Sichel, for whom he worked for the rest of his life. He played cricket for Sevenoaks, Ashford and Hawkhurst but his main sporting focus for some years was playing rugby for Cranbrook. He was also a fine 'occasional' golfer. To Tracy, I say thank

you for your friendship over many years. We shared a 60th birthday party, we holidayed with our young families in Spain and I particularly remember a wonderful few days' wine tasting in Bordeaux. Happy memories and lots of laughter.

Thank you, too, for all you have done for Benenden. I thought you were indestructible. Rest in peace my friend.



David Commander, fellow church family

I first met Tracy nine years ago at the social lunch on 'interview day' for a new incumbent at St George's. I am so grateful that he became a good friend and a great support in all things church and community.

He often told me the reason he came to St George's in the first place was that he used to live right next to the church and "the bloody bells would wake me on a Sunday morning, so I might as well get up and go and join them!" I'm so grateful for those "bloody bells"!

Tracy was a Parochial Church Council member for the whole time I have been incumbent, and for six years a churchwarden. He wanted to help me achieve things at church and in the community, but he kept apologising that he didn't think he was supporting me very well. But that was Tracy. He had no idea just how much he was helping so many other people, or how much good he was doing.

He would also say to me quite often, over a beer: "I don't understand God or this

Christianity thing; I wish I had your faith." But he did understand it; he just didn't know it. He lived this Christianity thing. He was Catching Lives for us, and Nourish and Christian Aid, and Mr Fete. He started the Christmas Day

lunch when I suggested it over a beer one time; he started the Hello! How are you? Club. We just need to recruit a battalion of helpers now to carry on the work of this one man.

It was a privilege to be with Tracy and Deborah through the last days and weeks of Tracy's life. I have lost a great churchwarden, a drinking buddy after PCC meetings, a supporter, an encourager, a doer. I have lost a dear friend. God bless, Tracy. The church family and the community will miss you.

Sam Andrews, team mate from his Cranbrook rugby and Hawkhurst cricket days

Well, what a completely rubbish year. First, we lose the world's greatest leg spinner and now we lose quite probably the worst. For all his skill, I don't think Shane Warne was ever able to impart the same degree of mental disintegration on batsmen as Claridge - I make no bones for calling him that, he suited his surname. It wasn't just the shameless smirk that accompanied yet

another non-spinning loopy pie, but his conviction that the poor sap at the other end would fall for it. And they did. Time after time.

His teammates at Hawkhurst couldn't believe it either. Every time he took a wicket, we would throw our caps to the floor and stamp on them in rage that the batsman could be so stupid. "What?" Claridge would say with a mischievous smile. "That was a perfect length!"

He loved the counter-intuitive impact of crap leg spin on human psychology, as he did making a new friend from a chance encounter or a new

> experience or taste. Life to him was a series of adventures that would lead to greater knowledge.

I first met Claridge when I narrowly avoided a jet of red wine that shot out of his front door in Cranbrook. I had just bought a terraced house next door to

house next door to the man who at that time looked like a vast Viking warrior, a modern-day Eric Bloodaxe. "Come in," he said, "I'm blending a red wine for Morrison's, try this." I have no idea if Chateau Waterloo Road was ever stocked at Morrison's, but after several litres of blending, we began a firm friendship that was only briefly tested when

his stereo was destroyed on my stag night.

Over the years, we played lots of sport together: cricket, rugby, golf, and one lamentable attempt at basketball, at which he was really good and I was appallingly short. It wasn't all testosterone, though. We would swap books we liked and music was always a constant. We did occasionally disagree - I failed to persuade him of the joy of Cajun music and Staffordshire Bull Terriers, he failed to get me to like Leonard Cohen and Australian wine - but he was unfailingly generous in company and a passionate pursuer of all things that made life fun.

Of course, the fire of youth was tempered by the passing years but the glow was always there. ___



Last Word

In his later years, he found faith. He was always going to, in my mind: he wanted to find a serenity that his early family life had not delivered, and the passion for Leonard Cohen was a sure sign of that yearning for meaning.

We never imagine friends like him will leave us before their time, but we now know that even the mighty Eric Bloodaxe is not immortal, and we should all do our very best to reconnect with our friends before they cut a new star in the sky on their way to the afterlife.

Goodbye, Claridge, I shall miss you very much. Rest easy and I shall stamp on my cap in your memory.



Paul Hewitt, charity fundraiser

I knew Tracy to be a deep thinker and an early riser. Many mornings, I would get a ping, well before 6am, to see a message penned in the distinctive franglais we both adopted: "Salut, mon brave ..." followed by a comment on a shared interest, whether it was the homelessness crisis, inequitable student loan policies or Brexit causing havoc on wine imports. Tracy was interested in everything, particularly where he felt a person or a group were being treated unfairly.

When I picture Tracy, I have images of him striding around The Green organising tents, stallholders, and total strangers. I see him

dressed as a shepherd at the crib service or having a pint at the Bull with friends.

His charm and convictions meant I (and most other people) could rarely say no to him. He coerced me to run a stall at the village fete for at least five years longer than planned and I always marvelled at the size and diversity of his network, and how he seamlessly connected the personal with the professional. A classic example would be Tracy going out of his way to mentor our daughter and help her launch her career in the wine industry.

We will all remember him for his neverending generosity and support of many charities. He organised a popular annual lunch in a City wine bar in aid of Catching Lives, an independent charity in Canterbury for the homeless. It was a cause he was passionate about, and it was through him that I started volunteering there.

Tracy's own introduction to Catching Lives was through James Duff, a valued friend who sadly died earlier this year. Tracy and James were fine men and did much in their lives to help others. I hope many in the Benenden community will join me in my determination to continue raising awareness and funds for the charity that meant so much to them both.

When the pandemic hit and the vision of David Commander's volunteer support network evolved into the Benenden Action Team, we spent many hours reviewing the various village groups that were already established, and one name kept appearing. Mr Claridge was everywhere, a constant energy. Some say that he had the ability to get into places where water couldn't. His wine certainly did.

To me, the man was the biggest heart in an equally enormous frame and that heart opened doors that I simply couldn't even see. When the inevitable introduction had been made, his ability to hold me accountable was ever present and there was something almost old fashioned in his ideology that resounded in me. If you have the ability to help someone in need, why wouldn't you?

When I think of him now, I think of the smiles of others I met, once they had met him. The relationships I now have with the people he introduced me to, will anchor my own heart deeply within this amazing village. He was the easiest man to follow but almost impossible to thank. He did so many things for so many people just because it was right to do them. Not for

awards or thanks of any kind, but for the simple pleasure of helping someone in need.

He has left me with a very bright and clear moral compass, that I will use throughout all I do in this community and in all aspects of my own life, that I will happily pass onto my own children. I thank him for that most of all.

It was the dreadful lime green hoodie that gave him away. At about ten feet tall he was a hard man to miss at the best of times, but in that hoodie he was probably visible from space, so you could spot him coming your way from about 100 yards, often towards the village café, where he'd say hello to seemingly everybody, wander out the back to check the wine supplies, then sit down, cadge a cappuccino and chat for a while before striding off to busy himself somewhere else,

or badgering people to get involved in his latest venture; but for my part it was the wine that formed the focus of our friendship.

I started off picking his brains and showing enthusiasm, but before long I'd been seconded on to what became known, jokingly, as the Benenden Wine Committee. This was an august body intended to organise the village wine tastings that had become Tracy's social

trademark, but invariably it involved Tracy, his beloved Deborah and our compadre Alfred Nicol rocking up on my doorstep, eating quite a lot and 'tasting' even more, to the point where we had to get Alfred to take notes so the next morning we'd have some idea what high-level decisions we'd made the night before. I never remember seeing Tracy drunk, though, quite possibly because this man built like a giant redwood would always get marginally less the worse for wear than normal-sized people.

He was an infuriating man to organise an event with, mainly because while the rest of us were still going over the fine detail of what we'd discussed, he'd already made several unilateral decisions and was ploughing on, head down, to his next project.

That was the way he was: the kind of man who would rather do stuff for the common

good right away than sit around deciding when to do it. He was compassionate, charitable, caring; a great friend and ally for an incomer to the village; and such a lovely man.

Thinking outside the book

During my earlier years as a horticultural student, we had a number of modules relating to plant care, establishment and maintenance. Progressively so, we were never issued with 'checklists' or 'calendar notes' to carry out plant care duties and this has dutifully stuck with me ever since. I say progressively, because in a day and age when our seasons are increasingly out of kilter, a seasonal 'to do' would be worthless, so for that I salute Hadlow College.

Plants are genetically modified to wake up each spring, come into leaf and flower then return to dormancy. The cycle remains, well, cyclical, but what has changed is our seasonal weather patterns. Too cold in spring, too warm in winter, low or no rainfall or with seasonal floods and parched summers. Quite a challenge for a plant and the same for a gardener.

I have just one book in my possession relating to month-by-month care: 'The Gardener's Year' by Alan Titchmarsh, published in 2005. I only ever bought it as an aidememoire for tasks that needed doing whenever I thought the plant was ready or, most usually, when I was ready. I had friends at the time questioning why I was digging up a flowering

clump of astrantia in July. "But they're in flower!" they would shout. I would shout back that I needed the space to plant out the huge dahlia someone had just given me, and in any case, I needed to divide this astrantia up into, say, I5 or 20 small plants, pot them up and in a few weeks have new top growth and a saving of 200 quid!

There are some tasks I would most definitely do only at certain times of the year: fruit tree pruning, specifically prunus, which must be carried out after flowering, usually in April to avoid 'silver leaf'. This is a condition that gradually kills a tree and can also spread to neighbouring trees, and the spores are more abundant in winter, less so in spring. Pruning in spring when

the tree is putting on strong growth means the bleeding sap fights off any lingering spores, and the knowledgeable Mr T dutifully mentions this, but on every month are lengthy checklists, which I have to admit I have never ever read.

My very first gardening book was 'Gardening Made Easy' by Jane Fearnley-Whittingstall - published in 1995. Even back then she was very loose about what to do and when, and even had a page on the 'no-dig' approach.

What a visionary! I must add, though, that this was a period when I had yet to touch a book by Christopher Lloyd or Beth Chatto, whose work I subsequently read dating back to the 1970s, and not a checklist in sight.

With our current climate, we have lavender flowering in December, bees circulating in January, the tulips cannot go in until the first frosts (sometimes in January) and blossom can be fleeting in a dry April. As gardeners, we need to thoughtfully consider how we care for our plants. Good husbandry helps ward off pests and disease, nurtures our soil and conserves moisture in the ground, all of which proactively helps our gardens find balance in this changing world.


