The battle goes on.....

We hope everyone has been keeping safe and well during these uncertain times and have been using the time in lockdown to get out and explore our beautiful local countryside.

SOHL has continued to work behind the scenes, albeit virtually, on the campaign to stop the Council's plans to build a garden town at Lenham Heath.

Obviously, we were disappointed when the council agreed in April to waste a further £100,000 of taxpayers' money to continue with the exploration of its garden community. Then in June, we heard that the council had whittled down nine of the garden community submissions in its 'call for sites' to just three which included the Heathlands scheme, without any evidence published to back up its decision.

But SOHL remains undeterred and has pledged to continue to represent the views of local residents in the campaign to stop the council's plans to concrete over our beautiful green heath lands.

We would like to thank residents for all their emails and messages of support over recent months which have been heartening. As one resident so aptly put it 'we might have lost the fight, but we will not lose the battle'.

We have taken the time during lockdown to start preparing a persuasive and evidence-based case to oppose the council's garden community proposal, ahead of its formal consultation in October, when the call for sites submissions will be appraised. The key areas we are focusing on include planning, infrastructure, environment and archaeology.

Already three of the eight landowners have pulled out of negotiations with Maidstone Borough Council and as a result, the council has been forced to review its master plan. We were hoping to have had more detail of what is included in the revised masterplan at the council's Policy and Resources Committee on 24 June, but unfortunately, this was not forthcoming. All this

work continues to be conducted behind closed doors and without public scrutiny.

The next Key dates are the 21st July when the officer for the proposal is due to provide additional details including a high-level financial model for the scheme. After this it will be October 2020 when Maidstone are due to have a Public Consultation on the Preferred approach (Regulation 18b).

SOHL continues to work hard to call the council to account on these issues by raising them through the local media, via Freedom of Information requests, by lobby councillors and asking pertinent questions at the council's committee meetings. We believe this work is beginning to pay off as some councillors seem to be getting to grips with the issues facing this scheme, which is positive.

Grafty Green Gardening Club - update

Outing to Doddington Place Gardens - 4th August, meeting at 6.00pm. The address is Church Lane, Sittingbourne, Postcode: ME9 OBB. We plan to use own transport for this trip but if you need a lift call Sue Birch to see if something can be arranged. We are apparently the first group to visit the gardens since shutdown and they are looking forward to welcoming us in.

The outing last month to Sandown Community Garden in Deal was very much enjoyed by about a dozen of us. It was a calm and mild evening which prompted some to stay longer or arrive early to make the most of our visit.

Meanwhile - in our gardens we can look forward to harvesting our vegetable crops now and enjoy them full of flavour. Keep an eye out for apples and pears that are beginning to drop as these will be ready very soon for eating. Watering might need to be done more than once a day if the weather is very warm and feed needs to be added when watering container plants. Deadheading, and the pruning of woody plants, especially roses can be undertaken too.

Grafty Gourmet

This is a great barbecue recipe. Cooked on kebab skewers this chicken with a spicy, sweet sticky glaze are sure to go down well.

Oriental Barbecued Chicken

12 Chicken thighs, boneless and skinless
2 tablespoons of soy sauce
1 tablespoon of sesame oil
1 thumb-sized piece ginger, grated
4 Spring Onions, sliced

For the glaze
4 tablespoons of Korean chilli paste (gochujang)
2 tablespoons of clear honey
Juice of ½ lime
1 tablespoon of soy sauce
1 teaspoon of sesame oil
2 tablespoons of sesame seeds

- 1. Mix the chicken in the soy sauce, sesame oil and ginger. Thread each thigh on two long metal skewers, so that each skewer pierces one side of the thigh. Keep threading the chicken, making sure it's packed onto the skewers tightly. Chill until you're ready to cook. Mix the ingredients for the glaze.
- 2. Heat the BBQ. Cook the kebab for 5-8 mins on each side (depending on the heat). Once nicely charred but not fully cooked through, start painting on the glaze. The honey will catch if cooked for too long the key to nice sticky chicken is applying the glaze in layers, turning the kebab often.
- 3. Once the glaze has been used up and the chicken is cooked through (about 20 mins in total), transfer to a plate and leave to cool for 5 mins before serving scattered with spring onions.

Music Notes for August 2020

August is always a month when it is difficult to find local concerts, so this year with nothing local will not be so very different from usual. As virus restrictions continue to relax (I hope writing that doesn't bring on a "second wave" and a new lockdown) more professional orchestras are managing to put something on the airwaves or internet. The amateur however remains stifled. It looks as if we still won't be able to sing together – no hymns in church – and even looking ahead to September, when all schools are expected to be back, the government instructions say "Singing, wind and brass playing should not take place in larger groups such as school choirs and ensembles, or school assemblies,".

So, what can we offer? On the radio Classic FM has its new Alexander Armstrong Show at 9.00am on weekdays. Many of us only know Armstrong as an actor and as a presenter to the TV series "Pointless", but he is a skilled musician. As a boy he was a chorister at St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral in Edinburgh and he went on to Trinity College, Cambridge on music scholarships. He played the piano and the cello, the latter of which he dropped in favour of the "much more masculine" oboe. So, his music choices and coverage of the selections should be much better than the offerings of some presenters in the past.

BBC of course has The Proms every day this month – but not as we know it! Until 27th August they will be archived Prom recordings. It is planned that for the last two weeks of the Proms, that is, starting 28th August, they will be live concerts from the Albert Hall, but exactly how it will be done is still to be determined as we go to press. In the same way, the Edinburgh International Festival has been cancelled but daily at 11.00am in August BBC Radio 3 will be broadcasting some of the best performances form recent festival history.

A browse through the offerings of U-tube will also turn up lots of interesting possibilities. Try exploring!

The female equivalent is any dress, kneelength or longer, which is vaguely black (i.e. black, grey, brown, blue, purple, chartreuse, etc.).


