Blackthorn area revisited.

Many are concerned about the area that we cleared back in 2011, as much of the blackthorn has regrown.

On closer inspection, a lot of the old stumps due to the very wet weather are rotting away. I cleared a large area of regrowth in a very short time and it also looks as if the deer like the tender new shoots, which also helps keep it under control.

Making a clearing

The beauty of this time of year is that when everything dies down you can clearly see the job in hand.

I recently walked down from the top of the hill, along what looked like a badger track. It ambled downwards gently zig zagging down until it reach the area behind the heeled in saplings.

Once you embark on this walk it makes you aware of how much empty space is taken up with bracken growth and very dead elder. So dead in fact it falls to pieces as soon as you touch it. Great news for making way for the new trees.

Creating a new habitat

This is a wonderful opportunity to create a new habitat. Trees will eventually block out light which bracken needs to thrive. In the meantime we will need to control the bracken growth and continue to manage the area.

With trees such as willow and dog wood which are hungry for water, it will help reduce the amount of run off from the hill.

The front area should also remain open. This has in general helped to keep this part of the path clear of mud.

Within a few years the area will cease to need our intervention and as Coopers Wood will be pleasant to walk through

SNOWDROP

ON ONE OF MY MANY PLANT SURVEYS I CAME ACROSS A SMALL PATCH OF SNOW DROPS GROWING WILD ON THE HILL. MOSTLY COVERED BY BRAMBLE AND IVY YOU WOULD HARDLY NOTICE THEM. LAST YEAR SEVERAL SMALL CLUMPS WERE SPLIT TO SPREAD THE FLOWER TO OTHER AREAS ON THE HILL. SEE IF YOU CAN FIND THEM.



VIOLET

THE HUMBLE VIOLET. NOT SO RARE ON THE HILL, BUT OFTEN OVERLOOKED. THIS IS THE EARLIEST I HAVE SEEM THEM IN FLOWER ON THE HILL. A VERY WELCOME SIGHT. THEY LOVE THE DAMP CONDITIONS, SO PERHAPS THAT IS WHY THEY ARE FLOURISHING AT THE MOMENT.

ASH DIE BACK

Only time will tell how Ash die back will effect the hill. During the winter months it has been impossible to tell how far the disease has spread.

The main concern has been where saplings imported from abroad have been planted in the countryside. We have no way of knowing if any have been planted in the local area on private land. The good news is that the trees introduced to the hill last year where grown from English stock and not imported from abroad. There were also no Ash trees amongst these.

There is though cause for concern. It has been noted that over the last three years, someone has been planting native and non native trees on the hill. We have dubbed them the “phantom tree planter”. They mostly seem to be planted in the same area.

We have no way of telling if they are trees imported into this country. The latest tree planted last year was an Ash

tree. In future any such trees that have not been sourced through the Woodland Trust will be removed, to protect the other trees from unknown viruses. It is not only the tree that could be harboring disease, but also the soil that it is grown in.

In the next few months we will be working closely with Jonathan to monitor the situation. If you are concerned about an ash tree on the hill, if possible mark it in some way, i.e. a piece of string or small label. Take a photo if you have a camera with you. Email details of where you have seen the tree, why you think it has ash die back and attach a photo if possible. One of the local volunteers will access the tree.

Please do not take it upon yourself to destroy the tree. Ash suffer from canker and many harmless fungi and lichens also grow on their bark. Sea salt burning leaves is also common on the hill and causes damage similar to the leaf damage seen with ash die back. The beech trees suffered badly last year after a south west gale.

Every report will be taken seriously but in the first instance with caution.



BRACKEN



MY FAVORITE SUBJECT! WE ARE IN THE PROCESS OF DOING SOME RESEARCH INTO USING SOME FORM OF MECHANICAL BRACKEN BASHER TO TRY AND CONTROL IT'S STRONGHOLD ON THE HILL. THIS WOULD NOT BE CHEAP, BUT WE JUST DO NOT HAVE ENOUGH FEET TO CONTINUALLY STAMP ON IT. JUBILEE WOOD

WHEN THE WEATHER IMPROVES (HOPEFULLY SOMETIME THIS YEAR) I WILL COMPLETE THE SURVEY OF TREES JUST TO MAKE SURE THEY ARE OK. SOME OF THE CHERRY TREES GREW TO A STAGGERING 5FT 6" IN THE FIRST YEAR. OTHERS DID LESS WELL, BUT HAD ALL SURVIVED. I AM A LITTLE WORRIED THAT THOSE THAT WERE STRUGGLING MAY HAVE NOT ENJOYED THE WET WEATHER, BUT TIME WILL TELL. MANY WILD FLOWER SEEDS WERE SOWN IN THIS AREA FOR HARVESTING SEED IN THE COMING AUTUMN. SOME WORK WILL NEED TO BE DONE JUST TO CONTROL THE BRAMBLE AND THE BRACKEN. IN YEARS TO COME THESE WILL NATURALLY DIE OUT WHEN THE TREES TAKE OVER.



MORE TREES TO PLANT



Alder

OUR ON GOING PROJECT FROM THE FIRST YEAR, WAS TO REJUVENATE THE PART OF THE HILL WHICH HAD BECOME OVERGROWN WITH BLACKTHORN. WE HAVE NEARLY 100 SAPLINGS BEDDED IN, READY TO PLANT OUT. THIS IS ONE OF THE JOBS THAT NEEDS DOING ON MARCH 17TH WHEN WE RELAUNCH OUR VOLUNTEER DAYS. THE TREES ARE GOAT WILLOW, RED AND GREEN DOG WOOD, ALSO ALDER. ALL THESE ENJOY DAMP CONDITIONS AND ARE IDEAL TO PLANT ON THE NORTH SIDE OF THE HILL. THE SLOPES ON THE NORTH SIDE ARE COVERED IN DEAD ELDER AND ONCE CLEARED THESE TREES WILL BE MUCH MORE SUITABLE FOR THE AREA. ALONG THE PATH EDGE WILL BE KEPT OPEN TO ENCOURAGE WOODLAND FLOWERS AND NOT TO SHADE THE PATH.

Steps fit for purpose

The Woodland Trust is a charity and has to share the funding out between all the woods that it owns. We can ensure that funding reaches Allington Hill, by applying for grants locally.

By also raising funds ourselves, we can raise enough money to pay for the best quality materials and improve the access to the hill, for those who find

the steepness of the steps and the hill a barrier to their enjoyment.

Evenly spaced steps of equal tread with hand rails where appropriate, will help the less able of us enjoy the hill. Better drainage will help keep the steps safe especially during wet periods such as now.

Many have concerns that we will spoil the natural feel of the hill. We aim to

ensure that the work will not leave a scar on the landscape.

Of course anything new sticks out a mile, but will quickly weather and blend in with the environment.. We aim to raise at least £10,000 to achieve this. It will take us a while and in the mean time the Trust will be repairing the steps where needed.

The weather

It is a little bit like stating the obvious. We have had a lot of rain. Some plants will really enjoy these damp conditions, others will suffer. The violets seem to be flourishing. Nature does have a way of bouncing back.

Hopefully the butterflies will do a lot better this year and the beech trees will not get such bad salt burn and lose most of their leaf in August.

At the time of writing, we have now had six days of dry weather. Last year there were only four months when we had more than six days in a row.

There was 123mm of rain this January. In 2012 we only had 40mm.

The good news is that since the 1st of January we have gained 1 hour 49 minutes of day light. Which means I no longer have to walk home in the dark after work. I can't wait until the summer evenings to walk the hill again.
