Draft Parish Notes

Meeting of the Parish Council held at the Pavilion on Monday 26th September 2022 at 7.30pm. The meeting was attended by Cllrs S Harrod (Chair), W Fox (Vice-Chair), P Allen, D Harms, and M Horsley. Apologies were received from Cllr C Deacon and Cllr Caroline Newton (SODC). Chris Ashworth (Clerk) was in attendance, along with Tim Darch (Former Clerk), Cllr Freddie Van Mierlo (OCC) and 1 member of the public. No declarations of interest were received in matters on the agenda

The sad death of her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II has had a profound effect on us all. We all pass on our condolences to the family at this time.

The meeting opened with a commemoration and minute's silence in tribute to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, who sadly passed away on Thursday 8th September 2022.

The County Councillor's monthly report was received and reviewed and is available on the Parish Council website along with the District Councillor's. No correspondence was received in matters not otherwise covered on the agenda.

A consultation on proposals to introduce six trial traffic filters in Oxford will start on 5 September. Traffic filters are part of Oxfordshire County Council's central Oxfordshire travel plan.

Traffic filters are designed to reduce traffic, make bus journeys faster and make walking and cycling safer. When they are operating, private cars will not be allowed through the traffic filters without a permit. All other vehicles including buses, coaches, taxis, vans, mopeds and HGVs will be allowed at all times. Permits will be available for blue badge holders, health workers and professional and non-professional care workers.

The scheme will be enforced using automatic number plate recognition cameras. Residents in Oxford and some areas just outside the city will be able to apply for a permit to drive through the traffic filters for up to 100 days per year.

The consultation on the trial proposed will run for four weeks until 3 October 2022. Four traffic filters will be located on St Cross Road, Thames Street, St Clements

Four traffic filters will be located on St Cross Road, Thames Street, St Clements and Hythe Bridge Street and will operate seven days a week from 7am to 7pm. The remaining filters will be located on Marston Ferry Road and Hollow Way and will not operate on Sundays.

This item was raised by a member of the public. The councillors discussed the traffic filters, with points being raised that the surrounding roads and ring roads would become even more congested as well as forcing people who work or go to school in the centre of Oxford to use the park and ride even when not viable. A member of the

public raised the point that the filters would come in very suddenly and cause chaos for people, with no time to find alternative solutions once the traffic filters are in place. Cllr Harrod raised the view that the proposal hasn't been thought through adequately for people who live outside of Oxford itself, and it doesn't support people who have an absolute need to drive into Oxford City Centre. Cllr Fox raised the point of using cameras to target single occupancy vehicles rather than traffic filters, as reducing the number of single occupancy vehicles would help the area become more eco-friendly. The inclusion of Marston Ferry Road was raised as the biggest issue as that would likely cause the most disruption. It was raised to Cllr Freddie Van Mierlo that this road is excluded from the proposal. Cllr Van Mierlo asked for these points to be raised on the survey to help amend and improve the proposal.

A consultation link for people to air their views is also linked on the Parish website under News items, and the council encourages residents to complete this consultation. The Parish Council will also complete the survey.

Planning applications

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered:

P22/S0613/FUL (Bentley House, Milton Common) Demolition of existing car repair workshop and erection of replacement commercial building comprising 4 units, with associated works including access, parking and landscaping. Amendments to planning approval P20/S3158/FUL to reduce permitted eaves height to 5.4m and install a 1.8m high fence and landscaping enclosure to the front of the site. Details submitted to reword conditions 3,4,5 and 6 of P20/S3158/FUL to allow development to be undertaken in accordance with submitted details and to remove condition 11 relating to construction being undertaken in accordance with BREEAM excellent standard. Cllr Allen reviewed this application. The application was a small amendment from the previous application upon which the application was objected. After a discussion, it was agreed to unanimously OBJECT the proposal.

P22/S3280/FUL (Road Maintenance Depot London Road Milton Common) The erection of a single-storey office block, maintenance garages and salt barn at the western end of the existing depot site, and the creation of new access and SUDS pond. Cllr Allen reviewed this application. It was discussed, and as it is far away from any Milton Common residents. This Parish Council unanimously agreed to NO COMMENT on this proposal.

P22/S2619/HH (Hampden House Church Road Great Milton OX44 7PB) Replacement of existing greenhouse. Permission GRANTED.

Rector's Pint

It was inevitable that Her Majesty the Queen would die. We were all expecting it, yet it still came as a shock when it happened. I am sure that we are all very grateful to have celebrated the Jubilee celebrations to mark 70 years since her accession to the throne, which I wrote about only a couple of months ago.

As a member of the Clergy, I acknowledge the Monarch as the Head of the Church of England. Whenever I have been instituted as the Vicar, or as here, the Rector, one of my oaths has been to the Queen. A few days ago, a friend of ours contacted us to tell that on the same night that the Queen's death was publicly announced, a new vicar was being instituted in their church in Frome. Apparently, there was some hurried hunting for legal advice and half an hour after the death of the Queen was announced, this new vicar swore allegiance to the King. We think this might have been the first time any member of the Church of England has sworn allegiance to a King in over seventy years!

We were on holiday at our house in Newnham in Gloucestershire when the news broke. While we chose to remain there, we still had much to do, it was not a particularly restful holiday! I engaged in many emails between here and there. One of the issues we had was about books of condolence. Although we had planned, and even chosen, the books, we were caught by surprise and the order went in just a few hours before the Queen's death. After some negotiation with the company producing the books, we eventually received one book for each church, six days after the death, while the firm was still sending out hundreds a day to people who had also been surprised at the speed of Her Majesty's decline.

We are keeping our books open, until our local service of Thanksgiving and Commemoration for the Departed, at which point they will be closed. The service this year will be held at St Peter's, Great Haseley on Sunday 6th November at 4.00pm. The books will then be kept locally as a historical record for future generations. There is still plenty of opportunity to write something should you choose to, and at the same time take a small part in a significant historical event.

On the Sunday after the Queen died, we went to a local church in Gloucestershire where we learnt that one of the Queen's favourite hymns was 'Praise my Soul the King of Heaven'. I talked about this at our local schools when I took the assemblies on my return. I said that it was a wonderful thing that Queen Elizabeth II, probably one of the most recognised people in the world, the Queen of the United Kingdom and Commonwealth nations, still held to the belief that there was another higher and greater King. Many people have talked about her faith and how it was an inspiration.

I don't think it matters if we are ardent royal followers or rather distant from issues of the Monarchy, there is no doubt that on the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, something changed. Singing 'God Save the King' the following Sunday was the moment that I realised this for myself.

View from Views

I would like to pay tribute to our late Queen someone who was a great supporter of our Countryside, Agriculture and, Farming, something I am sure King Charles will continue. Both have shown over the years how important these issues are and, have in their way influenced some important decisions. As a self-confessed Marmalade aficionado I mourn her passing.



Since I last wrote we have completed one of the easiest harvests I can remember, except 1976, and am now in a position to inform readers of our estimated and, dismal results. All crop yields were down between 10 & 20%, this is in spite of the fact that I had given the impression that, I was fairly optimistic. This mainly due to the fact that it appeared that all our crops had what appeared to be large ears, being the born optimist that I am, I forgot the fact that they all suffered through last winter followed by a cold dry spring and, a summer we will never forget. It is always easy to forget how crops looked early in their growing season when they look good later, but eventually all the hens come to roost, shattering all illusions. I think that as it was continually dry all plants put down deeper roots early on, which I am sure helped a great deal as hardly any showed signs of dying through drought, it was in my mind more likely due to the weather effects of winter & spring.

Before the rain early on in September we were thinking that we would not plant our Oil Seed Rape (OSR) later than 10th September. In the event it was just suitable to plant on the 8th and after a great deal of pros & cons, ifs & buts, it was decided to go ahead, then it rained in the afternoon stopping the process and, of course the 10th was getting closer, with many nails bitten, however after slight rain over night the ground dried off enabling the planting to be completed on the 9th. Had we not decided to leave the straw on the ground, done to increase the soils capability to sequester carbon, we could have drilled (planted) direct into the previous Barley stubble but, as Barley straw is difficult to chop there were places where the straw was laying too thick to allow a growing crop to survive, so a light cultivation was needed this then meant that the ground became wetter than if we had left well alone, these are the things we have to weigh up all the time, should we shouldn't we?. Having just cut the Lupins I have spoken so much about, we reaped about a 1/3 of an average crop, this will not necessarily put us off as the weather has had most effect on his crop and we have to start somewhere with a new crop.

Regular readers will know I am a great advocate of having solar panels on the roofs of buildings, not great arrays on land. Recently we looked into a prospects of

some panels on roofs of our apartments, only to discover that it is only worth doing when you can actually use the electricity when the panels are producing, as this is residential most of the time when we are producing everyone is out so not using the power we are generating, for anything produced that is not consumed at the time, the payment is 7p a unit (some difference to the 27p we are charged as consumers), this means we would earn something in the region of £210 per annum, so not much encouragement to spend £10,000 on the installation.

In the last month or so we received a news sheet from our South Oxfordshire County Councillors stating their aspirations and achievements, my views on are slightly different, just to point out the reality of the facts. Firstly, needless not mentioned in their newssheet, they are still advocating that all CC functions should only use plant based foods with no accounting where these plants are grown or their carbon footprint, ignoring the fact that meat products produced in this county do not necessarily have an environmental impact, a fine example of supporting local produce!!. They seem to be saying they are curbing development I must say I hadn't noticed the evidence. They do need to take note of this factor as we cannot, as I have said many times before, continue to allow so many bodies in this small island of ours as all our rivers are polluted. No one seems to be prepared to get this corrected or to manage all this waste, it is getting to a critical stage and we the public will have to foot the bill as the developers will not I doubt.

I cannot get my head round the public's attitude to litter, I recently did a pick on about ¼ mile from our house towards Little Milton and collected 12 feed bags of rubbish. Walking around the nature reserve at Lt Milton where BBOWT and volunteers keep it beautifully maintained for the use of walkers I counted 39 instances of dog fouling. What are we thinking about there has been enough publicity about litter and dog fouling, that we must all be aware of what we are doing we just don't care if we are not directly affected. Electronic Prescribing Service (EPS)

On 29th September 2022 Morland House will move to electronic prescribing. Most prescriptions are now prepared this way. You have two choices for how this works:

- You can choose a pharmacy or dispenser to dispense all your prescriptions. When
 you are issued a prescription, it will be sent electronically to the pharmacy you
 have chosen. You can collect your medicines or appliances without having to hand
 in a paper prescription.
- You can decide each time you are issued a prescription where you would like it to be dispensed. When you are issued a prescription, you will be given a paper copy that you can take to any pharmacy or other dispenser in England. The paper copy will contain a unique barcode that will be scanned to download your prescription from the secure NHS database.

Paper prescriptions will continue to be available in special circumstances, but almost all prescriptions will be processed electronically.

Remember, for the quickest and safest way to order your repeat medication, please set up an NHS Log In. Download the NHS App on your smartphone or open the NHS website in a web browser to set up and log into your NHS account. 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

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
