



A message from your MP – Helen Whately

Now the summer has come, the last thing most of us want to be thinking about is Brexit. Sunshine and sand are beckoning, and we would probably all benefit from some time away. I know that's true for me and my fellow MPs in Westminster anyway.

But while MPs are in their constituencies, Boris Johnson's new team will be working away. Whatever your views about the new Prime Minister, he has brought energy and a fresh sense of purpose particularly to getting Brexit done. I'm well aware he divides opinion, but the most divisive thing of all is Brexit. Only once that is done will we be able to reunite as a country.

In my first question to the new Prime Minister in Parliament, I asked him - as a Kent MP - to make sure we are fully prepared for Brexit so that freight will keep flowing through Kent's ports. Kent MPs have met regularly with ministers, Highways England and Kent County Council over the last 12 months, but as October $31^{\rm ST}$ approaches I want to be sure everything possible has been done.

I know there are many other things that people care about. I expect three of the new Prime Minister's commitments will be particularly welcomed by people in our area; speeding up the delivery of full-fibre broadband, boosting school funding and increasing police numbers. All three address concerns that people often contact me about.

A new Prime Minister with a new Cabinet is a chance to reset the agenda. I'll be writing to all the new Ministers to make sure they are on the case with the things we care about locally, like investment in Kent's roads (along with electric charging points) and making sure our fruit farmers can get the workers they need. Boris's determination to make sure the extra money for the NHS gets to the front line is also a chance to push for the investment our hospitals and GPs need.

We now need to move forwards, get Brexit done and tackle the things that matter to people like housing, healthcare, and crime.

Stockbury could be cut in half by motorway improvements

Cars bombing over the flyover at 70mph could make it difficult, even dangerous, for people living in Stockbury to get about. People have told me they could face a 10 mile detour to avoid the planned works on the M2 Junction 5, which would blight the thriving village economy and, in effect, cut the parish in half.

I have written to the Secretary of State for Transport to say that the flyover must be accompanied by a bridge across the A249, large enough for farm vehicles and HGVs to cross. Otherwise, local people won't be able to get to the village from the closest junction and businesses could have to move. That is an unacceptable price to pay for an "improvement" scheme.

Children in child care are waiting too long for mental healthcare

Children are waiting up to two years for mental healthcare they need. The target is 18 weeks - so this simply isn't good enough.

I organised a meeting with local healthcare providers and MPs from across Kent to get the bottom of what's gone wrong. Part of the problem seems to be that we have a lot of children in care in Kent, who have particularly complicated needs. Another is an increase in demand for assessments for conditions like ADHD.

I wrote a letter to KCC and the Health Secretary, signed by other Kent MPs, calling for health and education services to work together to tackle the rise in children seeking help for their mental health. I'll also be having regular data briefings and meetings with the local NHS and others until we get this sorted.

What is your experience of your local GP?

People often tell me they have to wait ages to see a GP, and I have been shocked to hear stories about people queuing outside their surgery to get an appointment. This is simply not good enough.

I know many practices have made huge efforts to improve their services and I have benefited from this myself. More money is being invested in the NHS and surgeries are coming up with creative ways to ensure people receive the right health care — whether that is a physio, pharmacist, or nurse — when they need it.

I've launched a survey on my website to find out more about your experiences at your local surgery. Please take the time to visit my website and tell me your views so I can help improve healthcare in our area.

Grafty Gourmet

Cool off this summer with this delicious chocolate tart, topped with fresh strawberries.

Frozen Chocolate Tart

375 g of dark chocolate 100 g of caster sugar 6 tablespoons of water 4 egg yolks 2 tablespoons of brandy 600 ml of double cream

To decorate: icing sugar, sifted 12 large strawberries, sliced single cream, to serve (optional)

- 1. Lightly grease a 20cm loose-bottomed cake tin and line with cling film.
- 2. Break the chocolate into sections and drop into a food processor. Process for 1 minute, or until just a few pieces remain in the otherwise powdery chocolate. Alternatively, you could finely grate the chocolate.
- 3. Place the sugar and water into a small pan and heat gently over a low heat, until the sugar has dissolved, stirring occasionally.
- 4. Increase the heat and boil briskly for 3-4 minutes, until the mixture becomes a light syrup.
- 5. Set the food processor running and pour the hot syrup through the funnel onto the chocolate it should melt, but add a dash of boiling water if the chocolate hasn't completely melted.
- 6. Drop the egg yolks into the melted chocolate and process for a few seconds before adding the brandy. If you are not using a food processor, beat the ingredients together with a wooden spoon.
- 7. In a separate bowl, whip the cream until lightly thickened.
- 8. Fold in the chocolate mixture and then spoon it into the prepared tin, levelling the top with the back of a spoon.
- 9. Cover with cling film and transfer to the freezer for a minimum of 4 hours, or until it has frozen.
- 10. To serve, remove the torte from the freezer, release it from tin and transfer to a plate. Leave to soften for about 10-15 minutes before dusting with icing sugar. Decorate with fresh strawberries and serve with single cream.

Christian Message September 2019 by Pamela Cuerden

"I'm not so much losing a son as gaining a daughter."

Aah the old clichés are the best, but sat here two days before my youngest child gets married, is a very strange feeling. It's a mixture of excitement and joy, and yet regret that all of family life seems to happen too fast and that when we are blessed with children, before we blink they have grown up and flown the nest. Even though none of our offspring have lived at home for the last two years, the last wedding of the last child feels as if it is sealing the end of an era. We not only need to "suffer the little children" (Matthew 19:14) but savour every privileged moment in the up-bringing of those in our care, whether personally or professionally, and more widely, all those living in our community.

As for wedding preparations: whilst we have been busy gardening, our neighbour has kindly been helping with the land and road nearby to make it nice for guests, and the bride's family have been busy making decorations and wine. For all the lists and attention to detail, there have been a few last minute items we have been asked to find from our house, which we have gladly done, only too happy to play a small part on the day. It just proves that there is often something unexpected at any event.

At the wedding in Cana (John 2:1-12), it was wine. Mary's friends would have prepared carefully for the whole village and just before the day, no doubt, there seemed to be plentiful supplies. In those days, it wasn't just a question of asking to borrow a forgotten item: to run out of anything would have brought shame to the family. Mary knew this and, wanting to save her friends from disgrace, turned to her beloved son who obliged by asking the servants to fill six large stone jars with water before famously turning it into a delicious wine. The master of the feast, who knew nothing of what Jesus had done, assumed that the hosts had unusually, left the very best vintage until last.

This story highlights a turning point in John's Gospel:

Mary showed that she now recognised instinctively what Jesus was capable of;
Jesus started his ministry with a marvellous miracle and
the servants and disciples, could surely, have been left in no doubt about His holy heritage
and ability.

Whether preparing for an event, or going about our everyday lives, there will be times when we miscalculate something seemingly important. Like Mary, we can turn to God in the certain knowledge that he answers our requests, albeit often very differently from our desires. This can be very hard when the answer seems to be a firm 'No'.

Our challenge is to recognise his work in our lives, often through others; to trust his greater plan and to do so without fear or doubt.


