The Parish Council will think about how we might respond and, Covid restrictions permitting, look to hold a public meeting towards the end of the month.

Stockbury Roundabout A Personal Perspective

For the avoidance of any doubt, this piece is my view on what has happened and what we might do about it. It in no way reflects the views of the Parish Council; it is the personal perspective of one resident.

Before going any further, I will declare an "interest": I am a member of the Conservative Party. Be that as it may, I am also what Andrew Neil refers to as "an equal opportunities attacker". When something is wrong, it needs to be called out and supersedes any other consideration, especially if it impacts on the lives and businesses of people I have come to know as friends.

In my opinion, the Secretary of State's decision has demonstrated that the lives and businesses of residents are of little consequence. The inspector recognised that those seeking to enter and leave Stockbury at the Church Hill junction will face a greater level of risk of coming to harm and that the cohesion of village life and the viability of village businesses will be put at enhanced risk but decided that this would be a price worth paying for speeding up the traffic on the A249. It seems to me that the demands of property developers and the ludicrous housing targets set for Kent are more important to the current Government. In short, we have been betrayed by the system overseen by a Government that claimed to care about rural communities. The hypocrisy involved is staggering.

I am not angry about the outcome; I am furious.

The Inspector might have said some nice things about Stockbury and commented that a bridge could be considered as a separate scheme but the fact remains that we have been "thrown under the bus" by the very Government that said it would support us.

As a citizen, I had been preparing for this eventuality for a while and a very murky picture emerges when one looks into who influences who at Government level. I shall be working over the next few months to investigate fully, and expose, what I and others believe may prove to be some very interesting co-incidences that involve Secretaries of State, property developers and a very strange connection through, of all places, Liberia. On the back of the recent by-election result, this is almost bound to attract national media attention.

Whilst I will do what I can with my limited skills, I would particularly welcome help from anyone with connections / abilities around journalism, social media, Freedom of Information requests and following paper trails. We might not be able to change the outcome, but by God, we can make a noise about it!

Gardeners are generally reputed to be very friendly and generous people and I really have not found, in my experience, any difference. They are prepared to be generous, giving away seedlings, cuttings and even closely guarded secrets on how to grow prize flowers and vegetables. They will even compliment you on a good exhibit and be forward in offering advice. This is evident at Stockbury Garden Society. The only exception to ALL the above is when the King of Vegetables are in season. He or she will not be generous with giving away any of those delicious asparagus spears. Why you ask? Well, it takes 4 years of waiting after sowing the seeds until finally being able to gather a full crop!!!!!! Can you really blame him/her for that?

The crop which has to be allowed to produce the "fern" after the 6th June, has a limited time for harvesting, however the season for harvesting in Stockbury starts later, thereby it finishes later so about now I will have had my final taste of the best vegetable in the garden.

My favourite dishes are prepared by walking to the raised bed, cutting the daily crop and then sprinting to the kitchen to prepare the dish.

The Gardeners had their first meeting in the village hall for over 18 months in June and the turnout was fantastic, showing the enthusiasm of the members. It was decided that this year the Sweet Pea & Rose Show will not go ahead but the rest of the years programme will. There will be a talk next month by Nikki Gammans on the humble bumble bee. I have seen Nikki's presentation before and it gives an insight to the 120 varieties of bumbles in the UK.

The talk starts at 8pm on Thursday 1st July.

Things to do this month: keep sowing batches of lettuce, spinach can be sown now too.

Keep a look out for pests and spray with SB Plant Invigorator which is bee friendly. Keep weeding now that finally we've received our dose of well-deserved rain, remembering every drop of rain has a weed seed in it!! (You're full of good news, Chris! - Ed)

Box hedges can be trimmed and again watch out for disease and pests, dead head roses and flowers.

A Soldier - Fond Memories Part Four

I returned from Nepal in early November hoping I might be able to take some leave over Christmas and New Year to visit my girlfriend who was teaching in Hong Kong. I broached the subject with the Adjutant over breakfast one morning doubting that it would be warmly received. He took note and the conversation around the table moved on. Some time later he informed me that he had arranged for me to travel to Hong Kong on HMS Bulwark, a commando carrier, that was sailing from Singapore to spend Christmas and New Year there.

The day came to depart; my driver drove me down to the dockyard in Singapore in the CO's staff car. We arrived at the gangplank, Sapper Omprasad Pun got out of the car to open the door for me and get my luggage. The young naval rating at the foot of the gangplank asked him who was coming aboard and he told him Captain Kerr. I was piped aboard and met as I stepped onto the ship by the Duty Officer. He was not impressed when he discovered I was Acting Captain Kerr, Royal Engineers not Captain RN! I had to buy a lot of drinks in the Ward Room that evening; as it turned out not too expensive as gin was about a penny a tot. The tonic was more expensive!

The passage was uneventful. I had suggested to my girlfriend that she did not try to meet the ship as I did not know when we would arrive and I would ring her once I was ashore. I was apprehensive. When we had last seen each other I was sure I wanted marry her. That had been a year ago. Would I still have the same feelings for her? I walked down the gangplank, stopped to chat to a Royal Signals Officer I had been to university with and then set off to find a phone, in the process walking straight past her! She was with a group of naval wives who had flown up to Hong Kong to join their husbands. How embarrassing for her and for me. Half an hour later we were enjoying morning coffee in the Hilton Hotel overlooking the harbour and within the hour we were engaged. There followed a great Christmas and New Year holiday period during which I met many of her Hong Kong friends and a good time was had by all.

All too soon it was time to rejoin the ship for the return trip to Singapore. The word had got out that I had become engaged so I had to host another Ward Room party. This time Champagne was the drink, just a tad more expensive!

Soon after leaving Hong Kong the ship was diverted to Kelantan, a province on the east coast of Malaya to assist with severe flooding. The ship's helicopters and Royal Marines were deployed to help with people stranded. Some 20% of the population had to be moved, not all by the HMS Bulwark crew. The Captain sent me ashore to act as Liaison Officer between the ship and the local District Officer. I was installed in his office and although he was Muslim and it was Ramadan he kindly arranged for a case of Anchor beer to be left under his desk for my sustenance.

It had been an eventful year, joining the Regiment in January, learning the language, an operational deployment to Borneo, trekking in Nepal and Christmas in Hong Kong to say nothing of getting engaged to the girl I have now been married to for nearly 54 years.

Patrik Says ...

Planning Reforms Blamed for Tory By-Election Loss

After the Conservatives lost the Chesham and Amersham by-election with a 25 percentage points swing, Cabinet Ministers and senior party members have told Boris Johnson to rethink planning reforms that have been blamed in part for the result. One minister told *The Times*: "We need to tread carefully on planning. We say that communities will be involved but then they're not ... The Party knows we need to build more homes in this country. It's about how you take forward that shared vision with your communities".

Maidstone is currently in the final stages of its Local Plan Review; The Local Plan should give us a sound tool to manage development. The key word is "manage". It is not the first time that I refer to my job as an *elected administrator*. Central Government tells us, by their magic formula, how many houses we should build. Our MPs then tell us that we ought to use brown-field sites and, in any case we should not build here ... nor there ... nor ... best not at all in her constituency ...

Well, it may have escaped your notice that Maidstone's brown-field sites were used up years ago and there is only so much housing which we can push into the town centre. We must build houses by our masters' dictate. The Local Plan should give us some safeguards. If we promise to build 30,000 homes in the **least worst areas** then we have the tools to stop additional development in even more unsuitable areas – for now.

This strategy only works if we actively fulfil our annual housing supply target; if we don't, the Planning Inspectorate will ignore our fine Local Plan.

-----Please keep this brief explanation in a safe place I shall return to it over the coming months -----

Bottom line, you may have noticed, your elected administrator's options are a fine balancing act between fail and fail. What my formidable opponent at the last local election needs to realise is, had he won the count, he would have found himself in exactly the same position. There is little wiggle room for your locally elected administrator. The message needs to be taken to our MPs .. and here my argument closes its circle: The Chesham & Amersham by-election is No Surprise.

The last Local Plan Maidstone relied on the option of dispersal, thus enlarging little villages and disturbing settled communities, let alone over stretching the existing infrastructure. Given the ever-increasing volumes of housing requirement, dispersal is not working. Another alternative would be to build one or two brand new garden villages from scratch with fresh infrastructure and maybe even their own motorway exit.

That's where the proposal for a Lenham Heath Garden Village comes into the equation. I mentioned this in my previous newsletters.

If Lenham Heath should fail, the next site in line will be Marden, which has no feasible road infrastructure, or a site near Detling Aerodrome (Binbury Park). A developer has already a shovel-ready project lined up there, only waiting for MBC not to fulfil their housing quotas. This will be inside the AONB! Planning permission there by default or

otherwise would set a huge precedent for everybody in the North Downs.

The Detling proposal is only half the size of Lenham Heath. It is no alternative because it would still require a huge element of housing dispersal. But most of all: If the AONB outside Stockbury is no longer safe, then neither will be Frinsted, Wichling, Bicknor, Wormshill, Hucking nor Otterden.

Maidstone will end up with 30,000 (thirty-thousand) new houses in its next Local Plan period. Only 12 (twelve) houses of these are planned in my ward, and none of them in the AONB. That was my election promise, which I will do my best to keep; but this is only possible if Maidstone's politicians are brave enough to embark on the concept of a new garden village in the least worse location.

Nobody is greatly in favour of any major development in Maidstone. Unfortunately the country is facing a housing shortage and Boris pledged to build 300,000 homes per year.

If you put in for planning permission recently you might have noticed that I lodged a conditional call-in to your application. There is absolutely nothing to worry about !!!!!

You may remember that I've been campaigning for a while against people installing cheap bright floodlights in the AONB. I note that many of those people are new arrivals from London who have no concept of the beautiful dark skies in the AONB.

I queried this issue with our Head Of Planning and he told me that there is no law, which we could employ to stop generally installations of unsuitable lights. The only way to place restrictions, is to attach conditions to new planning applications, if and when they come in. So whether somebody bolts on a satellite dish or rebuilds their whole house I now routinely seek to impose lighting conditions for any planning applications within the AONB outside those villages, which have street lights. To force the officer's hands, I will do it by a conditional call-in, meaning that if the officer won't attach conditions, the application must go to committee.

The conditions in my objections sound rather complicated and technical. Essentially the nationally-recognised guidelines for AONBs say that anything stronger than an old-fashioned 100W halogen spotlight is too bright. There is nothing to stop you installing a few of them or equivalent LED, as long as they are pointed downwards - as long as you are not suddenly planning to turn your yard into a football-stadium there shouldn't be any issue for you.

If you have any problems with your application(s) please let me know. I can also call-in applications in support, when the officer is minded to refuse but I must do so within 21 days of the validation date.

A Prayer for Owen Meany by John Irving

"Eleven-year-old Owen Meany, playing in a Little League baseball game in Gravesend, New Hampshire, hits a foul ball and kills his best friend's mother. Owen doesn't believe in accidents; he believes that he is God's instrument. What happens to Owen after that 1953 foul is both extraordinary and terrifying. At moments a comic, self-deluded victim but in the end the principal tragic actor in a divine plan. Owen Meany is the most heartbreaking hero John Irving has yet created."

Stockbury & Hartlip Cricket Club

Slightly chastened by our game against Holborough, we next entertained Old Gravesendians on a wicket that had had plenty of rain ,however with Oscar and Henry back in the fold we had high hopes.

Deciding to bat we proceeded to score at 2 an over for 15 overs losing Paul for 1, Oscar 13 and John for 3 so I was thinking we might have made a mistake.

After pushing a couple of singles and being joined by Enrique who hit 11 off of his first four scoring shots, Henry decided the pitch was not as bad as he thought it was. The pair of them put the change bowlers to the sword with Henry making 115 not out and Enrique 65 not out. Apparently after last seasons run total of 19 with an average of 4 and his duck at Woodcombe Enrique was encouraged enough to buy a new bat. Seems to have worked!! We finished on 225.
