Halam. Standing in a valley, five miles from Southwell, is the village of Halam, whose church tower still keeps the pyramidal roof despite modern restoration. When the new aisle was made to that building, a row of pillars was discovered. The village school, a barn standing in School Lane, had as mistress Miss Butler, who was ruthless in her discipline. She introduced for the excessive talkers 'tongue bags', which, made of linen, were fastened round the ears, and contained flour. There was no playground, and as a result, no organized games. Instruction was limited to the three R's, and the scholars, who numbered between twenty-five and thirty, paid twopence or threepence a week for the privilege of being taught. There were two shops in the village, one of which is now a private house. That kept by Mr. W. P. Richardson is still functioning but is not now the post office. The Manor House with its whale bones forming the entrance, still stands. There was a water mill as well as a windmill in Home Lane. The tradespeople included a huckster, a shoemaker, who made boots for the county and had several apprentices, a joiner, a blacksmith, a tailor who lived in a poor house, and farmers who left money to be distributed. The village boasted a pinfold and a stocks near to the poor houses of Mary Lamb. There were three of these poor houses, which were of the one room up and one room down type, the upper room being reached by a ladder.

The Feast was celebrated in October, and there was a May Fair for two days and a Plough Monday celebration. Features of these festivities were Betty Gilbert's butterscotch, a magic lantern, and occasionally a dancing bear. A famous nursery for larch and spruce was maintained here, and Samuel Bradley raised the Paxton strawberry; and still the tradition goes on. In the olden days it was a place of longevity, for in 1775 two folk died at the age of ninety-two years.

The meeting house of Nonconformity was the building in Church Street now used as a school canteen. Persecution abounded here in the seventeenth century, for there are records of Mary Dring being fined £10 twice for holding peaceable meetings at her house, and on another occasion, in 1670, goods to the value of £16 were forfeited. The Methodist church in the early days was in Back Lane, the old building being now a bungalow. The leaders were A. W. FitzHackler, W. P. Richardson, Robert Dixon, John Cook and George Hallam. The Society, now numbering twenty members, is meeting in a modern building, and has the distinction of including the Southwell circuit steward, Mr. G. Hoggard.

2. Village Notice Board – the notice board is in a poor state and needs urgent work to prevent it becoming an eyesore. The Clerk will speak to the contractor who made it to have repair work done as soon as possible.

Village Hall

The outside doors have now been repainted (black) by the decorator. PAT testing of the hall appliances is now due Mrs Godfrey to talk to Andrew Godfrey about the testing. The fire check has been completed (and passed). Chris Bevans to investigate updating and adding to the pictures in the hall, possibly from the "village archives". Bookings are reasonable going forward.

Fund Raising

The village quiz in November raised £200 towards village hall funds. A Facebook chat-group has been formed to discuss and plan future village events.

Roads and Hedges

Radley Road was closed recently while Highways drilled into sections of the road to assess the road for suitability of resurfacing. Holme Lane has been marked up ready for pothole repairs. The Footpath Office has been made aware of the fallen tree on the footpath above the Church Field. Some of the village signs are in a poor state – to be discussed with County Cllr Laughton at the next meeting.

Defibrillator

Now in situ outside Halam Salon and about to be connected to the mains electricity.

Allotments

Further ideas and discussions are ongoing.

Coloured Glass Windows

These have been sold to the owner of the old Methodist church in Edingley; awaiting collection.

Open Meeting

Matters discussed:

1. Speed humps on Halam Hill – discussed on many previous occasions and always refused previously by County Council Highways.
2. Community Speedwatch – the scheme will be restarted in the Spring. Anyone interested in heading up this initiative should contact Andrew Paris. Further volunteers will be welcome.
3. County Council Consultation on Unitary Authority – further discussions are on hold at present.

Planning

None this month.

Finance

Unanimously agreed to pay hall cleaners, the fire-check and the hall decorator. The budget for next year was discussed in detail and it was resolved to keep next year's precept at the same level as this year.

Matters Arising from Previous Meetings

Last year the bus timetable through the village was greatly reduced but after lobbying, the original frequency of buses was reinstated. However, this was a temporary measure supported by the County Council which is due for review this month. County Cllr Bruce Laughton had stated that the parish council would be consulted regarding the future of the bus routes prior to any decision being made – there has been no consultation to date. The Clerk will contact Cllr Laughton to find out what the current situation is regarding this promised consultation.

Village Hall

PAT testing of the hall appliances will be done by volunteer, Andrew Godfrey.

Outstanding maintenance required: 1) toilet seat to be fixed, 2) door lock on ladies' toilet, and 3) door lock on gents' toilet

A discussion was held regarding a request by a religious group to hire the hall for three days, including over-night payer meeting(s). Subject to the group agreeing to ensure any disruption or disturbance to neighbours (and the wider village) is avoided, then it was resolved 5 for: 2 against, to offer the use of the hall.

Events & Fund Raising

The events group is working towards holding a village fete on 6th July. Possible events for the day include a duck race, scavenger hunt, stalls, dog show, and a tug-of-war. In the evening there could be a BBQ or hog roast and a Ceilidh. The whole day should be self-funding but in order to be in a position to start putting the event together, the group has requested that the parish council under-write the event to the value of £400. As the day should be actually a zero cost for the parish council, it was unanimously agreed to under-write the event to a maximum of £400.

Roads and Hedges

The road between Halam and Edingley will be closed from the Halam crossroads to Station Road, Edingley all day Sunday 20th and Sunday 27th January for "carriageway patching works".

There will be allowed access to the Waggon and the houses along the route.

The flashing speed sign on Halam Hill isn't working – clerk to contact County Council.

There is a tree leaning across the "Windmill Lane" footpath which may fall and block the track – clerk to contact County Council.

Please note: - all highways issues – potholes, condition of roadside furniture, street lights etc – can be reported directly on the County Council website - www.nottinghamshire.gov.uk – or by calling the council on 0300 500 80 80. The more people that complain about an issue, the more likely the problem is likely to get resolved.

Matters Arising from Previous Meetings

The poor state of the village notice board – this is to be taken away and refurbished imminently.

Village Hall

PAT testing still outstanding – to be done very soon.

The official re-opening of the hall and requirement for WREN publicity was discussed. Agreed to hold to do this on the same day as the planned summer event in July.

Agreed to support the village hall/village website at a cost of £30 a year.

Events & Fund Raising

The events group is organising a village fete on 6th July. Planned events for the day include a duck race, stalls, welly-wanging, and a tug-of-war. In the evening it is planned to have a BBQ or hog roast and a Ceilidh. Anyone who would like to volunteer to help in any way should contact Chris Bevans on 07967 132014.

Roads and Hedges

The verges on School Lane and Radley Road are in a poor state – churned up and muddy. This is due in part to the recent closure of the Halam-Edingley Road. It was agreed that these should be left to recover in the Spring rather than getting the County Council to repair them with road chippings/gravel.

There is water running down Mansfield Road near Littledale again – Simon Bust will be asked to investigate.

Village Hall

Bookings are running satisfactorily

The hall official re-opening and WREN publicity will be held at the same time as the village summer fete.

The gents cubicle needs the lock repairing and some light bulbs are needed. A £30 budget for repairs was agreed. The ladies toilet makes loud noise when flushed – Clerk to investigate.

Events & Fund Raising

The events group has the organising of a village fete on 6th July in hand. There will be more publicity nearer the time. Anyone who would like to volunteer to help in any way should contact Chris Bevans on 07967 132014.

It is planned to hold another village quiz night in the pub in early June – date to be confirmed.

Roads and Hedges

County Councillor Bruce Laughton stated that the poor state of School Lane had been reported to County Highways. It was pointed out that Holme Lane and Radley Road edges/verges are also in a poor state. Much of this will recover as the weather improves, but Cllr Laughton will arrange a Highways inspection of these problems. Some repair work has been done round drains and manhole covers, but this was reported as being poorly done.

The non-working state of the interactive speed sign on Halam Hill has been reported.

Highways are aware of the issue of water on Mansfield Road by Littledale House – further investigation is needed.

The cut-backs to nos. 28 & 29 busses will come into effect meaning that Halam will get a two-hourly bus service in future rather than the hourly service as at present. Cllr Laughton is trying to publicise bus use – “use it or lose it”.

Some funding may be available for replacement “Halam” signs – Andrew Paris to look into this further.

Litter-Pick – Sherwood MP Mark Spencer is organising village litter-pick for Friday 10th May. The parish council are very grateful to the current litter-picking volunteers but hope that there can be a good

turnout of volunteers of 10th May. Mark Spencer's team will be providing equipment, but village volunteers will be needed please. More details next month.

Some interest has been expressed if the allotments were sited somewhere more centrally in the village. Consideration is ongoing.

Debut novelist will share book's secrets

Chairman's Report

The Chairman Simon Bust reported that much of the parish council's time and effort over the past year had been the upkeep and running of the village hall. The external work on the hall has been finished and the interior of the main hall has been redecorated. The hall is now in a much better state than it has been for many years. There is further decoration required, and in fact much more money could be spent on the hall if the demand is there; there certainly seems to be more enthusiasm for the hall now that it has been improved. The Chairman thanked Sarah Godfrey for her hard work in raising the grant money, Chris Bevans for the ongoing lettings management, and Andrew Paris for raising hall funds.

The parish council has made recommendations and comments over the year on the various planning applications received. In general, the decisions of the District Council planning department have been in line with the views of the parish council.

The parish council has lobbied the County Council regarding roads, street lighting, and hedges, pushing for remedial works and improvements where needed in the parish. County Cllr Bruce Laughton has supported us and helped get various works done where possible from limited funds.

Unfortunately, there has been little progress with improving or relocating the village allotments. The matter is still firmly on the agenda and further consideration and discussions will be ongoing.

A successful Harvest Supper had been held last October and the Chairman thanked all involved in making the event such an enjoyable evening.

The Chairman thanked the parish councillors for their input and support in running what has been a successful year. The commitment and efforts of the Clerk, Pat Rickett, and Financial Officer, Mandy Rickett have been invaluable and greatly appreciated. Chris Bevans was thanked for his work as editor of the village hall website, village Facebook page and the village newsletter.

In summary, the Chairman stated that the parish council had done what it could with its limited powers and the funds it has available, and he now felt that the parish was now in a better position than 12 months ago.

Matters Arising

The notice board has been removed for restoration – waiting for the costings for this.

Village Hall

The village hall has been booked for the elections on 2nd May, and a theatre group has reserved the hall for two weeks in July.

The official re-launch of the village hall will be timed to coincide with village fete in the summer with maybe strawberries and Prosecco available in the hall. It is proposed that parishioners who had subscribed to the refurbishment will receive a special invite nearer the time.

Events & Fund Raising

County Cllr Bruce Laughton has offered funding for banners and publicity (£300) for the summer fete. The issue of insurance for the event was discussed; this could be quite expensive. Various insurance options are being explored and Chris Bevans will report back once this is sorted.

Roads and Hedges

The interactive speed sign on Halam Hill has been fixed, and some major potholes have been filled. Cllr Bruce Laughton stated that £20m of extra funding had been made available for Nottinghamshire roads, but that there was a backlog of work needing doing of around £90m - £100m. Part of Radley Road will be re-dressed in the near future. The parish council made it clear that they didn't want Radley Road or School Lane widening – this could bring an unwelcome increase in both traffic speed and quantity.

Allotments

A new enquiry for an allotment has been received. Consideration on the long-term future of the allotments is ongoing.

Open Meeting

1. A parishioner raised the issues of: the state of the roads and hedges in the village; the poor state of village signage; the badly filled potholes; drains not cleared, and; the lack of speed bumps. These issues were discussed, and Cllr Bruce Laughton will address where possible.
2. Best Kept Village – Janet Simmonds requested that residents should be reminded that we are entering this again this year, and that a reminder should be put in Halam News.
3. Parish Council Elections 2nd May 2019 – Carolyn Todd has decided not to stand for re-election to the parish council this year. The Chairman expressed his thanks to her for her involvement over the past years in the parish councillor.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

The minutes were signed as a true and accurate record of the meeting.

Matters Arising

- 1) Agreed to have a second oak post replaced as part of the village notice board restoration
- 2) Defibrillator on the hair salon needs connecting to power – this is required just for the heater in the unit, not for charging. The defibrillator will be connected shortly.

Co-option of Councillor

Currently the parish council is short of one councillor. It is planned to fill this vacancy at the next parish council meeting. This vacancy will be advertised on the notice board and in the village newsletter as well as the Halam Facebook page. Anyone interested in becoming a parish councillor should contact the Clerk, Pat Rickett on 813181 or rickett@live.co.uk, or they may attend the next parish council meeting on Thursday 13th June for an informal interview.

Village Hall

The village hall bookings are steady with a couple of good potential enquiries pending.

Ganesh Subramanian asked about improving the acoustics and heating of the hall – this may be financially possible once the current mortgage is paid off later this year. County Councillor Bruce Laughton stated that there may be some funding available for this under the county's Local Improvement Scheme (LIS).

Events & Fund Raising

Plans for the village fête on 6th July are generally progressing well. The village hall re-opening will be on the afternoon of the event with prosecco and strawberries available in the hall. It is planned to send out personal invitations to all those who financially supported the hall's renovations.

Roads and Hedges

Cllr Bruce Laughton stated that a reorganisation of the maintenance of the county's roads is underway and it is hoped that this should see an improvement in the roads generally.

There is still a problem with water on the road outside Littledale – county are aware of this and are working towards a solution.

Some of the "Halam" signs are in a poor state. It may be possible to request new ones at no cost to the village. This will be discussed further.

Ganesh Subramanian raised the issue of the poor state of the verges and road edges in the village, especially along School Lane. Cllr Laughton said that this would be looked at, but the parish council made it clear that filling holes with road stone or crushed road stone would be an unacceptable "urbanisation". There will be a certain amount of recovery by the verges over the next few months.

Please note: - all highways issues – potholes, condition of roadside furniture, street lights etc – can be reported directly on the County Council website - www.nottinghamshire.gov.uk – or by calling the council on 0300 500 80 80. The more people that complain about an issue, the more likely the problem is likely to get resolved.

Allotments

Nothing further to report at this stage. It was said that both Edingley and Southwell have vacant allotments at the moment which may be a reflection of the current demand for allotments generally.

Open Meeting

1. A parishioner raised the issues of: the state of the roads and hedges in the village; the poor state of village signage; the badly filled potholes; drains not cleared, and; HGVs passing down narrow lanes, and the speed of vehicles through the village. These issues were discussed and as these are generally all County Council issues, they will be raised with Cllr Bruce Laughton to address where possible.
2. Best Kept Village – Janet Simmonds requested that residents should be reminded that we are entering this again this year, and that a further reminder should be put in Halam News. Mrs Simmonds asked if any funding could be made available to help keep the village tidy; this will be considered later in the year when the village hall loan has been cleared.
