Parish Council Meeting, 7.30pm, Thursday, 13th June, 2002

Present: Mrs Herbert, Mr Brown, Mr Rickett, Mr Bust, Mrs Davis, Mrs Gathercole, Mrs Armstrong Kids' Club: Agreed unanimously to renew the contract for a further academic year

<u>Dog Fouling</u>: Eddie Howes, the dog warden for the area including Halam, will be patrolling regularly. Dog Wardens can impose fixed penalty fines on people who allow their dogs to foul public access areas and will pick up strays, requiring payment for their return. The Council is still considering provision of special bins.

<u>Footpaths</u>: It was agreed that Mrs Godber should be the official Footpath Officer for the village. It was agreed not to ask for a footpath sign at the end of St. Helen's Lane.

<u>Roads:</u> The Council will ask the Police to undertake regular checks on parking in Halam if the situation does not improve by the next meeting. It is illegal to park near a junction.

<u>Planter at Village Hall</u>: Mr. & Mrs. Stubbs were thanked for their efforts in installing and filling the planter. It was suggested it should be dedicated to Mr Bust, but agreed that a more permanent memorial would be found when work took place on the Village Hall.

Planning:

1. Manor Farm, Radley Road, new garage door - 3 letters received expressing concerns. Rejected 5 for, 1 against, 1 abstention - on the grounds of safety.

2. <u>Norwood Park, Directional Signs to golf course</u> - rejected 6 for, 1 against. 6ft by 4ft signs on Halam Hill and School Lane were considered too big. Signs similar in size to those indicating the Workhouse would be more appropriate.

3. Ford House, Turnpike, proposed two storey dwelling - accepted 6 for, 1 abstention on resubmission of plans with improved surface for St Helen's Lane.

4. <u>Blonds - proposed fencing and security gate</u> - rejected 5 for, 1 against, 1 abstention on grounds it is not in keeping with the area. Need for a boundary is recognised and alternative proposals will be considered sympathetically.

<u>Finance:</u> Money approved to pay for advertising acceptance of code of conduct, for insurance, for buying planter at front of Village Hall and for more gravel for the area in front of the Village Hall.



Parish Council Meeting, 7.30pm, Thursday, 11th July, 2002

Present: Mrs Herbert, Mr Brown, Mr Rickett, Mr Bust, Mrs Davis, Mrs Gathercole, Mrs Armstrong

Gravel for Village Hall: David Stubbs and working party were thanked for their efforts.

Jubilee Celebration: All those who helped to organise this marvellous day were thanked for their efforts. Eleanor Bust and Richard Brown were thanked for their gift of a mug for every child in the village.

Open Gardens Day: This raised over £1650, the best ever total, which will be split equally between the Parish Council, the Church and the PTA. Peter Thompson and all those who helped and contributed were thanked for their efforts.

<u>Village Plan:</u> 56% of villagers voted in favour of creating a plan, 33% voted against, 2% abstained, 7% were non voters and 2% of voters were missing. It was agreed 4 for, 3 against to proceed with the plan with the same committee and chairman. The next steps will be for the committee to identify examples of a plan from

other villages, put together a skeleton of the plan and devise a project plan to complete it, including any costs for which a grant may be available. Maurice Hinde and his committee were thanked for their efforts so far. Planning:

- 1. Chimney Pot Cottage, Back Lane: replacement window and door and roof lights to 1st Floor Study: Alterations to window and door unanimously approved. 1st Floor roof lights approved 6 to 1 on condition that they were non opening and opaque glass.
- 2. Golf Course: request to remove requirement for new footpath link: All agreed that requirement for footpath should remain. 5 to 2 agreement to wording of response: The application is a breach of the planning conditions and the footpath is an integral part of the agreement. The Council has no difficulty understanding the condition and has no objection to the path being fenced off, with openings at top and bottom. The planning officer should be consulted on the surface. The footpath should have been there before the golf course opened so the District Council is being asked to enforce this condition.
- 3. The Cottage, Gray Lane: Concern was expressed that a planning application for outbuildings may not have come to the attention of the Council. This will be taken up with Newark and Sherwood.
- 4. Goldhill Farm: Some new outbuildings have been seen at Goldhill Farm. The need for planning permission for these will be checked.

Finance: It was agreed unanimously that Cedric Hallam would be the internal auditor.

Date of next meeting: Thursday 8th August at 7.30pm.


St. Michael the Archangel

The first phase of the restoration work described in last month's Halam News finally got under way on 22nd July. The cost of this work is to be met from awards promised or received from a number of charitable trusts and other organisations, including £10,000 from the Historic Churches Preservation Trust, a charity set up in 1953 to assist in the repair of churches and chapels in England and Wales; £5,000 from Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd. who distribute the Landfill Tax Credits of Waste Recycling Group Plc. through the Nottinghamshire Historic Churches Trust; £5,000 from the Whiteley Charitable Trust; £5,000 from the Veneziana Fund; £4,000 from the Council for the Care of Churches; £3,000 from the Garfield Weston Foundation and £2,000 from Newark and Sherwood District Council. I wish to acknowledge with grateful thanks the generous support of all our sponsors and a complete list of these has been placed on the Church notice Board. 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DOGS: MAN'S BEST FRIEND?

Man domesticated dogs many thousands of years ago, since when they have helped him to hunt animals for food, control pest species, herd livestock, protect property, and keep him company. These days most dogs are kept as pets, and in this role provide a rewarding friendship, and company to many who would otherwise live alone.

Kept responsibly, dogs should not cause serious problems to others: why is it then that many thousands of complaints are received every year by Council Dog Wardens across the country? As usual it is not always the dogs fault, but their owners. Everyone who owns a dog has a serious responsibility, both to the animal, to neighbours and others who may be affected by the dog's behaviour. So -what are the most common problems?

FOULING Dog dirt is unpleasant,

smelly and may carry diseases and parasites, which can affect humans. Many complaints are received about owners who allow their animals to leave their droppings in public places, and do not clean up the mess. THIS IS AN OFFENCE AGAINST THE LAW: anyone not cleaning up after their dog can be fined up to £1,000. You can buy purpose-made 'poop-scoops' to pick up your dog's mess, but a opermarket carrier bag will do just as well. Bins are provided in many parks and road verges for disposing of the mess, but if there isn't one near where you walk your dog, use an ordinary litter bin, or if there aren't any, take it home and put it in the wheelie bin. This law applies to almost all areas in the open air to which the public have access: farmland, moorland and marshland are the main exceptions. Our Dog Wardens are giving offenders Fixed-Penalty Fines: DON'T BE ONE OF THEM! Complaints are also received about householders who let their dogs foul their own garden, but never clean up the mess: if it accumulates it smells unpleasant and attracts flies, which carry diseases. The best way

to dispose of droppings is by using a 'dog-loo' sunk into the earth of your garden, which allows the waste

Alternatively bury it in an area of soil set aside for the

to decompose safely without causing problems.

purpose, but using a different area every time, working around the plot, making sure it is covered well. Councils have powers to compel owners to clean up their gardens if the state of the garden is causing a nuisance to others.

STRAYING If you allow your dog to wander in public places without supervision, the law regards it as a stray dog. Dog Wardens pick up strays, after which the owner is liable to a charge of nearly £50 before the dog can be returned. If unclaimed after a few days, the stray is taken to rescue kennels: if unclaimed after a week it may be found a new home, with a new owner. This new person becomes the legal owner.

If a stray dog carries identification, it makes the return to its owner easy.

Many dogs do not however, and are picked up and re-homed. THE LAW REQUIRES A COLLAR AND IDENTIFICATION TAG TO BE WORN BY ALL DOGS WHEN AWAY FROM HOME, and the owner risks a fine if the dog does not have it.

BARKING All dogs bark at times, but often dogs left alone all day are bored and bark for long periods of time, annoying neighbours. This is the biggest single cause of noise complaints made to Councils. The noise may be considered a nuisance in law. In such cases the Council has to give the owner a notice requiring the nuisance to be stopped, and may require various things to be done to achieve this. If the problem continues, the owner may face a fine of up to £5,000, and also risks having the dog(s) removed in order to stop the nuisance. If your dogs are making the neighbours complain, you may have a visit from the Dog Warden, who is also available to give you advice on ways of dealing with this problem.

When kept responsibly, dogs give many years of pleasure without causing problems to others, and indeed are 'man's best friend'

Finance: Agreed to buy copies of Standing Orders pamphlets for those who did not already have one.





Dog Bins: The Council would like to know villagers' views on the need for dog bins and the locations where these might most be needed - bearing in mind that each bin would cost £100 to buy and £1.10 every time it needed emptying. Please contact any councillor.

<u>Village Plan:</u> Mr Hinde produced a document outlining the headings under which the Parish Plan would be arranged: History and Nature of the Village, Transport, School, Church, Clubs etc., Planning, Working Life, Village Hall, Shop and Post Office, Village Pub. He outlined the likely cost, including an independent survey of the thoughts and wishes of parishioners. Most of this could be funded by a grant which the Parish Council agreed to apply for, by services in lieu of cash and by fund raising activities for the remainder (a maximum of £335).

<u>Traffic Calming:</u> A letter was received from the PTA supporting the Council's desire for traffic calming measures. It was agreed that the Council and the PTA should write a joint letter to the

County Council to get a senior Road Safety Official to visit the village at an appropriate time to assess the most effective measures. Further action could be taken to obtain these once identified. The owner of the hedge on Halam Hill is to be contacted regarding the poor visibility for road users.

IT Training - "Bringing IT Home": Newark and Sherwood College will arrange for 3 hours of computer training for groups of 6 people in a home setting. Karin Davis agreed to host such a session. Villagers should contact Karin on 815854 if they are interested in attending (or hosting another such session themselves).

<u>Planning:</u>

1. <u>Village Hall Modifications:</u> Martin Hubbard has been looking at a range of possible alterations to the Village Hall with two of the councillors. These include a possible extension, stage, compulsory disabled facilities, better acoustics etc. It was agreed that he will shape these into three alternatives with rough costings and circulate these to councillors in advance of a future meeting and then a Parish Meeting will be convened to obtain parishioners' views.

2. St Helen's Croft, The Turnpike - Modification of Condition 4 of permission FUL/990961 - removal of permitted rights An earlier planning application had a condition attached which removed the rights to modify the property which would normally have been allowed without planning permission. It was agreed 5 for, 2 abstentions to allow this condition to be modified.

3. St Helen's Croft, The Turnpike - proposed extension to form domestic stables It was agreed to approve the application to extend an outbuilding for this purpose - 5 for, 2 abstentions.

<u>Disabled Parking:</u> Agreed to ask if a disabled parking space could be created in front of the Church Date of next meeting: *Thursday 14th November at 7.30pm*.

Finance: Agreed to pay the auditor fee of £158



From the Parish Plan Committee:- Halam Parish Plan Update

By now you will be aware that the village voted with a large majority to produce a Parish Plan. We would like to bring you all up to date on the progress so far.

- 1. The Parish Council has applied for a grant from the Countryside Agency to cover the cost of consultation, independent advice, village meetings and discussions, and producing the Parish Plan in the form of a report and action plan.
- 2. The Parish Plan committee will be compiling a questionnaire with advice from the Rural Community Council requesting your views on a number of issues including:

Transport: public transport needs; traffic and parking problems; road conditions

School: its future; access and parking problems; community use and involvement; (including direct liaison with school, its staff and governors).

Church: services; associated clubs and groups; maintenance and viability; its contribution to village life now and in the future.

Planning: examination of current local plan; future development; designated open spaces; guidelines for future development and standards of construction and design, so protecting the character of the village; development of a Village Design Statement which could be accepted as subsidiary planning by Newark & Sherwood District Council.

Working Life in the village: farming and its changing circumstance; businesses, and professionals operating from home; The Village Post Office & Shop, its viability and future use; the Waggon & Horses, its involvement in the community and associated groups.

Village Hall & Other Public Facilities: future developments; improved usage; need for other facilities; street furniture; phone box, etc.

So what's next? - Our aim is to keep the parish involved in the process of putting together the Parish Plan with close liaison with the Parish Council. Over the next few months there will be:-

Information and Discussions

- Circulating information leaflets on various topics ensuring that people understand the terms and phrases being used.
- village meetings with speakers and opportunities for discussion

Asking Villagers their Views:

- circulating questionnaires
- collating and publishing responses

Developing a Parish Plan

- creating a Parish Plan and an Action Plan for the future acceptable to the people of Halam
- adopting the Parish Plan as a Supplementary Planning Guidance by Newark & Sherwood District Council which will be used as input to the review of the local Plan currently being undertaken by Newark & Sherwood District Council.

This document tries to clarify some of the terms you may come across during the development of the Parish Plan. This is the first of an on-going list aimed at ensuring the village is kept informed. Please let us know of any other words we could add to the list.

Halam Parish Plan - Glossary of Terms and Phrases

Parish Plan – a document written by all the parishioners describing the parish development and current challenges to the parish, looking at such matters as transport, planning, schools, churches, shops etc. The plan can then be used by the local government as guidance as to the wishes of local residents and the way those residents see the future of their parish. It is a proactive document seeking to shape and guide the future of the parish

Action Plan - This will be the last part of the Parish Plan. It is a written document outlining the next steps in a project, or hopes and aspirations for the future; things to aim for.

Affordable Housing – housing specially built and maintained for lower income families. Usually the building is part funded or subsidised and the properties are then owned and run by housing trusts or associations. Not to be confused with 'Starter Homes'.

Conservation – preservation of any aspect or character that is thought to be important; keeping intact essential heritage so that it can be passed on to subsequent generations.

Conservation Area – a legal status given to any area of a town or village considered special enough in terms of historic significance, architectural merit or character to be worth protecting. Such designation is usually recommended by the District Council and included in the Local Plan. 43 villages in the Newark & Sherwood District already have conservation areas.

Countryside Agency – the agency responsible for advising government and taking action on issues affecting the social, economic, and environmental well being of the English countryside. The Countryside Agency resulted from the merger of the Countryside Commission and the Rural Development Commission.

Current District Local Plan (Local Plan) – a comprehensive document produced by the District Council (Newark & Sherwood D.C. at Kelham Hall in the case of Halam), which is used as the guiding policy document for all planning and development decisions in the District. It has a powerful legal status and is used in cases of planning dispute or appeal as well as in day-to-day planning application decisions. The current Local Plan was drawn up in the early 1990s (came into full force March 1999) and is currently under review with a new plan to be released about 2004. It is intended that our Parish Plan will input into the new Local Plan.

Designated Open Spaces – open areas of land (playing fields, gardens, paddocks etc.) that have an important role in a village and should be kept open and free from development. These can appear in Local Plans, Village Appraisals and Parish Plans.

Envelope – usually a "village envelope"; these are lines drawn on a map to define the main builtup area of the village. Building outside a village envelope is restricted to protect the character and setting of the settlement, and to protect the countryside. Halam does not have a village envelope.

Essential Services – necessary facilities for a community to survive and thrive. Such as water, electricity, regular bus services and a village shop, IT infrastructure and telecommunications etc.

Green Issues – anything that touches on conservation, especially of the natural environment e.g. recycling, protection of the natural environment, pollution reduction etc.

Listed Buildings – a legal status, with different grades given to any building of architectural or historical importance. Alterations cannot be made without specific permission and guidance.

Public Facilities – all amenities available generally for anyone to use (free or at a charge) e.g. phone box, Post Office, public conveniences, car parks, village hall, etc.

Rural Community Council (RCC) – an independent voluntary organisation, which seeks to promote the social and economic well being of rural communities. Funded by the Countryside Agency and local authorities, the RCC works with local communities to improve services such as transport, village halls, retail and economic services etc.

Subsidiary (or supplementary) Planning Guidelines – These can be either guidelines produced by Central Government, such as guidelines covering conservation areas and Listed buildings, or they may be locally produced documents such as Village Appraisals or Parish Plans. The main document used by the District Council in deciding planning applications is the Local Plan

Tree Preservation Order (TPO) – a legal status given to significant trees, which prevent them from being, cut down. Pruning and lopping have strict guidelines.

Village Appraisal – this is part of the consultation process of the village as it is today. Aspects such as the environment, development and transport as they stand can be included. The people living in the village write it. People in the village contribute their views through questionnaire and open meeting.

Village Design Statement – a document put together by the village residents, which looks at the character and present architecture/design of a village. It provides guidance to planners and developers as to the type and style of new building that the village would like to see being built in that village. It can be used as a guidance document by the District Council when deciding planning applications. This can form part of the Parish Plan.
