

In normal times, the Council meets on the second Monday of the month in the Thomas Hughes Memorial Hall, at 7.30pm. All residents are welcome to attend these meetings and raise any issues; we will make it easy for you by having an "open forum" session early in the meeting (normally 8.00 pm) at which issues may be raised and discussed. The agenda is published on the Parish Council website and notice board at least three clear days before the meeting. We particularly welcome residents with planning applications that are to be considered at the meeting, to come and tell us about the application and explain any specific points which they may wish to make.

Please note that public meetings will not take place until further notice, due to COVID-19. Instead, the Council is holding 'virtual' meetings using Zoom. The

monthly meeting is usually held at 6.00 pm on the second Monday of the month, and there is the same opportunity for members of the public to join the meeting; if you wish to do this please ask Julia (Clerk – as above) for a link to the meeting. The agenda is published on the website and the Notice Board, as usual.

CO-VID 19 (Coronavirus)

As we were going into the lockdown period in March, it became clear that quite a lot of residents were going to have to self-isolate for an extended period and would be in great difficulty if they did not have family members close by, to help with shopping, collection of medicines, and to provide a bit of contact with the outside world. The three parishes of Uffington, Baulking and Woolstone got together to form the UBW Support Group and it was a tribute to the great community spirit in our villages that within a very few days we had over 70 volunteers. About half of them were allocated a 'patch' of a small number of houses close to their own home to whom they have provided all the support that was needed by those unable to leave their homes. The Support Group included the Uffington Viral Kindness Group whose members delivered 130 packs of medicines around our villages in the period up to 1 June. THANK YOU ALL.

The UBW Support Group remains in place. Should you need assistance you should contact the person who gave you their details at the start of the lockdown,

Simon Jenkins or Mike Oldnall (see above), or the Vale District Council on 01235 422600.

However difficult the lockdown has been for those laid off work and for families struggling to keep children occupied, the Shop has remained open throughout, as did the School for the children of key workers, and all the essential services needed by modern communities have kept going for us – although there were some 'blips' in the early days caused by panic buying of a few items like loo paper and baked beans! THANK YOU ALL.

Luckily, we have been blessed with wonderful weather for most of the 15-week period to date. That meant that some could take advantage of a daily exercise period with walks on White Horse Hill and beyond; the clarity of the atmosphere was remarkable with much reduced pollution, and with very little traffic there were many fewer bottles and cans thrown onto the verges.

'Active Travel'. Looking ahead, as we gradually and hopefully come out of lockdown and back to a more normal life, we have been told the Government is committing a large sum of money (UK-wide) for local infrastructure improvements to encourage 'active travel' - that is their jargon for walking and cycling. In the hope of receiving some of that money, the Parish Council, Village Hall Committee, Vicar and Head Teacher of Uffington Primary School spent some time on a quick assessment and came up with a wish list of measures. In a few words, we came to the conclusion that the principal issues we face revolve around traffic - too much of it, speeding within the village, safety (especially in the area of Uffington Primary School), parking, and speeding on some of the approach roads to the village. Parking is a particular concern in the region of the school morning and evening, and also where it restricts footways; this links to our desire to reduce traffic and speeding, in order to encourage safer walking and cycling. People may not be parking illegally, but the number of parked cars in Broad Street and Waylands at peak times is a safety issue if children are trying to walk or cycle to school, and a major irritant to local residents and passing traffic.

What can we do about it – with or without extra money? Some of the measures are very simple and need only goodwill and understanding; we are encouraging residents very strongly to take up the following:

- 1. Parking. Please use car parks and driveways for parking, in order to get cars off public roads as much as possible, to make it safer for cycling and walking
- 2. Some of the footways / pavements around the village are very narrow, (non-existent in some places), and some are made very much worse for pedestrians by overgrown hedges and verges restricting the pavement width.

We would be grateful if all residents would please arrange for overgrown hedges and verges to be cut back to the property boundary by 30 August 2020. If you need assistance please ask the Parish Council. Enforcement action may be taken after 30 August

3. This will be a School-led initiative, but we hope very much that as many children as possible will walk or cycle to school; if cars are necessary, parents should use the village hall car park to off-load and then walk or cycle to School – it is only about 400m!

We have suggested a number of other measures to reduce speeding which will need money, and will be pressing the County for funds:

- 1. Introduce a 20-mph speed limit on the 'ring road' round the village, from Fernham Road junction at the Museum, via Woolstone Road, High St and Broad St back to the Museum
- 2. Introduce a 10-mph speed limit from the junction of The Green / White Horse to the end of the adopted highway on Lower Common
- 3. Install physical measures to restrict speeding on the Fawler Road and Fernham Road approaches to the village. We would also very much like to see a resumption of the Speedwatch initiative to measure actual speeds on Uffington roads; Thames Valley Police approval to use the equipment held by a number of local villages was rescinded in April 2019.

There seems to be a presumption in Government policies and initiatives that our working and leisure patterns will change as the coronavirus pandemic gradually and hopefully eases. The above measures begin to reflect the anticipated changes and also the Government's policies on climate change – overtaken by the pandemic. This is an opportunity for residents to suggest to the Parish Council any other ideas they might have for (similar) improvements.

Some personal reflections of the lockdown

It's an ill wind... Walking around Uffington has been particularly enjoyable because of meeting so many villagers doing the same thing, with lots of impromptu natters. A simple pleasure, much enjoyed. Related to this I've seen lots more people, compared with normal times, including families, using the field paths that radiate from the village. Let's hope that will remain the case when the lockdown is but a memory. Another unexpected pleasure has been the peace and quiet. Apart from the deafening bird song.

<u>UFFINGTON ALLOTMENTS — RE-INVIGORATED</u>

There are 28 plots available to tenants at the Uffington allotments, on the Fernham Road out of Uffington, and 23 of them are now occupied. The site has been a hive of activity in the last 3 months, with a surge of new tenants brought on by the lock down and the wonderful weather, and all occupied plots are looking healthy and productive. Mr David Coxhead has very generously placed two 1,000 litre water tanks on the allotments; these will make it much easier to keep your produce watered in dry spells.

There are still a few spare plots which are available to all residents and also to others outside the village in the event of lack of internal demand. The terms are that you get an initial 12-month free period before the annual rent (currently £25 per annum) kicks in. (The free period is not on offer to non-residents of Uffington).

Hedges, Verges and Ditches

Hedges. A reminder that householders are responsible for ensuring their hedges and verges do not overhang pavements, footpaths or roads beyond the boundary of their property. We would be grateful if all residents would please arrange for overgrown hedges and verges to be cut back to the property boundary by 30 August 2020. If you need assistance please ask the Parish Council. Enforcement action may be taken after 30 August.

Parking on Broad Street - around Uffington School and Church

It is well known that parking spaces in this part of the village are in short supply. It has been drawn to the attention of the Parish Council that vehicle access to the properties in this area is regularly blocked by inconsiderate parking on the hard standing, verges and gateways around the former telephone box. This is a particular problem at school drop-off and pick-up times and during major events in St Mary's Church.

It is an offence to park on the yellow zig zag lines outside the school which are there to protect children. If you block pedestrian access to the telephone box, you may prevent emergency pedestrian and/or vehicle access to the defibrillator or telephone exchange.

All those visiting the School or attending St Mary's Church are urged to be considerate to others when parking their cars, for however short a period. The obvious alternative is the village hall car park, or, if you live in the village, to walk.

As part of the planning approval for the development of Jacksmeadow, certain sums of money were required to be paid to the parish, district and county councils as contributions towards the additional infrastructure and facilities required to support additional residents. These facilities may be located within Uffington parish (e.g. Public Art) or further afield if shared (e.g. Secondary Schools or Swimming Pools).

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A LETTER TO ALL CONSTITUENTS from

DAVID JOHNSTON MP

I spent lockdown in the constituency, in the home we got in the Didcot area in February. Whilst none of us have enjoyed lockdown, it was nice to spend an extended time in our new home. Having lived in Oxford for 6 years I was already somewhat familiar with Didcot, but spending an extended period here – rather than just the Friday-Sunday as is usually the case when parliament is sitting normally – helped us to get to know it better still.

Virtual parliament was smoother than I had expected – despite me thinking it would feel strange speaking into a webcam and having it beamed into the House of



Commons. You get used to asking questions and even giving speeches from your desk, as I did on legislation such as the Domestic Abuse Bill and the Agriculture Bill.

But parliament has now returned. We still can't have more than 50 people in the House of Commons at any one time and our staff are not allowed to return yet. Some of you will have seen the very long queues when we first had to vote, but they have now come up with a much better system. Our staff can't return yet and like a lot of people they miss being in a different environment to home and seeing their colleagues, but for MPs it has been nice to be back for the same reasons.

There is plenty on our plates. We have been debating a number of pieces of legislation, including the Counter-terrorism and Sentencing Bill, designed to prevent the sort of attacks we saw at the end of last year and beginning of this year. There are ongoing debates both in the House of Commons and in the Education Committee (I am a member) about the reopening of schools. I am firmly on the side of seeing all schools open for all children as soon as possible; the Children's Commissioner told our Committee that we are on course for 8 million children to be out of school for 6 months which will be damaging to all children and the most disadvantaged will suffer most.

As shops start to reopen, I'll be returning to spending at least every Friday visiting local businesses, charities and, if we can make it work, schools – keeping my distance, of course. I'd encourage everyone to try and support our local shops if they can, so they can hopefully survive what has been a very tough time. I recently invited people to nominate their volunteer hero – the individual or organisation they feel has really made a difference lately. I was pleased to see such a huge range of people and organisations nominated. The top 3 were the Ray Collins Charitable Trust, Helping Hands and Maymessy – congratulations to them all.

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A New Greenhouse for the Community Garden

In late 2019 the Community Garden group put together a joint bid to the White Horse Show Trust and the Parish Council for a grant to construct a new greenhouse and water collection system at the garden.

We had two main aims for the project: the toughened glass greenhouse will give a safer working and learning environment, especially for children, and will allow us to build on the strong links that we have already established with local children's groups, and the Primary School. Having another large water tank will make

the garden much more resilient to summer water shortages.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the White Horse Show Trust and the Parish Council for their enthusiasm and generous financial support with this project, and particularly Simon Jenkins who navigated our application through the system at VWHDC.

Although the project was delayed by COVID-19, we were delighted to take delivery of the new greenhouse and water tank in late May. Thanks to Alan Soper and Steve Harris, who spent many days preparing the base and erecting the greenhouse, the project is nearly complete, and the greenhouse will soon be full of

tomatoes and cucumbers, and even (fingers crossed) a melon or two.

This has been a difficult spring for everyone. We have had to communicate via email and Whatsapp to stagger our visits in family groups, and we were really disappointed that the activities we had planned with the Brownies had to be postponed for this summer. But despite the lack of rain the vegetable beds are now beginning to reward everyone's hard work!

With the greenhouse project complete, and

thanks to the persistence of Krista Soper in negotiating the agreement of a new 5-year lease, we now have an opportunity to develop new priorities for this brilliant community asset. THOMAS HUGHES MEMORIAL HALL Douglas Dalrymple, (01367) 821063

With great regret, but with no other option, the Management Committee closed the Hall as the authorities required back in March. Keen as we are to re-open, regulations remain many and demanding, and as they currently stand potentially expensive. Ask any small business manager.

The good news is that we have been putting the intervening time to purposeful use, so that when we do re-open users will find an excellent new audio-visual facility available, which will make it possible to widen the range of presentations that can take place – eg film evenings – and greatly improve the quality of both sound and vision for, say, talks or lectures, on up to stage productions.

Considerable research was carried out before selecting the system that will have been installed by the time you read this, and alongside that the raising of the necessary funds to pay for it all had to be undertaken and achieved: think c. £17,000.

The Hall is much indebted for generous assistance from the White Horse Show Trust; the Doris Field Trust; the Charitable Settlement; and also for valuable practical advice and fund saving aid from the Parish Council. Our most appreciative thanks go to all these bodies. The balance required, somewhat over one quarter of the total, came from the Hall's own reserve funds, built up over a few years. The Committee would also like to salute the tremendous time and hard work put in by Geoff Rumble and Paul Armishaw, as the lead figures of the project.

Alongside this major enterprise, several important, though much less expensive, minor matters have been dealt with during the enforced closure, though the most noticeable one of these – the repairs to the outside steps behind the stage – may still be a work in progress after this edition of the Courier reaches you.

The Committee is very keen to re-open just as soon as sundry levels of authority permit. How soon this might be we do not yet know. However there are signs of bureaucracy of various flavours warming to the theme, with advisory pamphlets, containing lists of requirements, beginning to wing their way over the wires. To the leaders of clubs and societies, who regularly use one or the other Hall, and to those who had been hoping to have a one-off private event, we are sorry we have not been able to help for the last three months: may it not be as much as

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

A final word about maintenance

To make sure we keep our courts in tip-top condition please de-tension the net when you have finished your game. This will to prevent any damage to the surface around the posts. The tension in the wire at the top of the nets is really significant and other clubs have reported damage to post fixings from over tensioned nets, and from nets being left tensioned all the time. There is a measuring stick on court to ensure the net is at the correct height before play, but please then release it afterwards.

Please remember to bring your hand sanitisers and/or wipes to clean the net winders and gate before and after use.

Great fun and very affordable

Our courts represent a fantastic facility for the village so please do use them. The membership fees are modest and designed to cover essential repair and maintenance and a few admin costs, so they are very affordable.

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
