The Glorious 12th ... or Carmegeddon?

As has been well publicised, National Highways will be closing the Stockbury roundabout slip roads on and off the eastbound carriageway of the M2 on 12th September for 4 months. There will be well signposted diversions on all the major routes in order to minimise the impact of the closures.

The exact numbers are still uncertain but modelling carried out by a Parish Councillor indicates that the volume of traffic on the northbound carriageway of the A249 is likely to increase by between 50% and 60%. As queues of traffic on the A249 will be more extensive and last for significantly longer throughout the day, the number of vehicles rat running through the lanes could increase from an average 350 to 600 - 700 vehicles on a daily basis and up to 1,000 whenever there is an accident or broken-down vehicle on the A249.

The Parish Council expects that a considerable number of drivers will <u>not</u> follow the diversion routes but will instead use the M2J4 and M2 Farthing Corner Services. Whilst this alleviates some of the pressure on the northbound A249 and thereby reduces the potential rat running, it creates another issue in that Matts Hill Rd will quickly become blocked by traffic heading towards the village or more likely towards Hartlip and Newington. It is conceivable that 2,000+ vehicles may take this route and this will ultimately result in gridlock in the surrounding area on a daily basis.

The Glorious 12th cont'd ...

The Parish Council has asked both National Highways and Kent County Council Highways to design ways in which we can keep as much additional traffic as possible out of the lanes with as little disruption to Parishioners as possible. Both have assured us that they will take this seriously and look at what mitigations can be put in place.

At the time of writing (22nd August), we have been told by KCC that they will push for a few signs to be erected but nothing else as we are not the only small community that has problems. NH have assured us that they are looking at physical ways of preventing increased rat running but cannot yet confirm their plans.

If things go well and the lanes remain relatively free for residents to carry on with their daily routines without too much disruption, it would be a nice gesture of appreciation if you could email the people with overall responsibility to express thanks. They key people are:

Obviously, if things do not go well, you should write to the same people. But before judging whether whatever the plans turn out to be are working, I would urge you to give things a week or so to settle down. What may appear good on day one might deteriorate and what might seem a disaster on day one may turn out to work well.

Speeding Drivers / Blaring Car Horns

Stockbury Parish Council has had a number of complaints about a small number of cars driving through the lanes in and around the village at speed, while continuously sounding car horns instead of slowing down, especially at corners.

This is not only distracting and upsetting to people in their homes, some of whom may be sleeping after a night shift or be unwell but it's also a danger to other road users including walkers, cyclists, other motorists and especially horse riders whose horses might be spooked by the noise of a blaring horn and throw the rider off. What do the drivers of these vehicles think a horse rider or cyclist can do when they hear the blaring horn of a speeding on-coming car, jump into a hedge?!?

SPC has spoken to the police about the problem of misuse of car horns which can constitute a criminal offence and offenders can be fined. In addition, the local authority can prosecute for noise pollution, again punishable by a fine. If you are one of those drivers referred to we would ask you to drive with consideration for <u>all</u> other road users.

1979

Allie Burns and Danny Sullivan are junior reporters working for a Glaswegian newspaper during the winter of 1979. They are intent on hunting down story scoops which will further their careers and working together they discover a tax evasion fraud and a terrorist plot. They make many enemies on the complicated road to exposure and eventual publication of these stories.

Following threats and blackmail, a murder occurs and the last third of the book is spent with Allie tracking down the killer. This final third is where the pace of the story picked up but a couple of us did find that the storyline at the beginning didn't seem to have much connection with this section. A Local Historical Figure



This is the late Mr. Norman Brown, former landlord of our pub, who ran it with his wife Pat, 1964 – 1983. A real gentleman of the oldfashioned kind. He always greeted customers, suited immaculately in a collar and tie and was

rarely seen without his jacket. He would greet you most politely and expected manners in return. No matter how diverse your interests or hobbies he would be sure to introduce you to a relevant snippet of information or newspaper article the next time you went in for a drink. If he had heard an interesting viewpoint on the radio, it was a chance for him to introduce it into the conversation. There was never a dull moment.

He and his family became part of the village at a time when inns were always centres of social activity. Alcohol was not yet supermarket cheap, television channels were not numerous, box sets weren't there to distract and mobile phones, Twitter, Facebook – what were they?

During his watch the public and saloon bars were amalgamated, the one-arm bandit machine disappeared, and theme nights crowded out the pub through all the seasons. Customers jostled with each other, smoke curled up and painted the ceiling a dull ochre and at the centre of it all remained Norman, totally in charge and calm as you like!

M2 junction 5 Stockbury interchange improvement scheme

In September, we'll be closing the M2 eastbound (towards the coast) slip roads on and off the motorway from Stockbury roundabout. This means you will not be able to access Stockbury roundabout from the eastbound M2, or join the M2 eastbound from Stockbury roundabout at junction 5.

The slip roads will be closed from 12 September 2022 until 13 January 2023, at which point both slip roads will re-open. However, access from the M2 eastbound to the A249 northbound will temporarily be via Stockbury roundabout, until the dedicated slip opens in March.

We know there's never a good time to complete this kind of work at a busy junction like this, and understand these closures will cause disruption to journeys, for which we apologise.

Oad Street closure

We'll also be closing Oad Street between the A249 and Woodgate Lane from 5 September for five weeks to finish our widening work that we started in the Spring. All businesses remain open as usual.

OPERATION BROCK

The Council is calling for change in the way that Op Brock is implemented on the M20 due to the amount of disruption it causes to residents and businesses in Maidstone. As I explained before in this space, MBC is not a Highways Authority but Operation Brock affects the economy of the Borough, we therefore have a responsibility towards our citizens. We need to build an evidence base in order to take our concerns forward to Government and the relevant Highways Authorities. We therefore ask local people impacted by Operation Brock how it affects their daily lives.

Operation Brock is not a long-term solution for the border control issues. We cannot tolerate this becoming the 'new normal'. The government needs to look at alternatives now – not later.

Preserving Cucumber Pickle - a simple recipe!

As the vegetable growing season draws to its conclusion, do you have a glut of cucumbers? Don't know what to do with them? Why not turn them into a pickle? Some of you may have already sampled Cucumber Pickle at The Harrow's recent Family Fun Day barbecue.

This recipe was originally produced in The Observer as 'Bread & Butter Pickle' and is not credited. Over the years I have altered the original recipe slightly, as one does.

You will need:

- 2 pounds/1 kilo cucumbers
- 1 large onion peeled, quartered and cut into 1/4 inch slices
- 2 flat tablespoons salt
- 900ml cider vinegar
- 2 teaspoons yellow mustard seeds
- 1 heaped teaspoon dill seeds
- 9 flat tablespoons sugar

To make:

- Wash cucumbers and remove ends; cut into 1/4 inch slices.
- Mix with the onion slices in a colander and sprinkle with the salt.
- Cover and leave to drain for 4 hours or in a fridge overnight.
- Combine the remaining ingredients in a large saucepan and bring to the boil.
- Add the vegetables and bring back to boil.
- Remove from heat.
- Loosely pack into sterilised jars and ensure there is at least a ¹/₄ inch gap at top of jar and vegetables are covered with the liquid and seal with new sterilised lids.
- Leave to mature for at least a couple of days before eating.

It keeps well and is best kept in the fridge after opening so as to remain crisp and green. It is truly delicious!
