GENERAL UPDATE

What a dramatic year 2022 was. No one could have predicted the events that have unfolded creating so much uncertainty and instability for us all. Learning to live with COVID, the war in Ukraine, a long hot dry Summer, turmoil in our national politics and the sad death of Queen Elizabeth II. Not to mention the escalating cost of living and rising inflation, the increase in mortgage rates, strikes, the ever-present climate emergency and the extreme flooding in the Autumn ending in snow and ice.

We began 2023 with spiralling flu and hospital admissions soaring and the on-going strike situation. 1979 was called 'The Winter of Discontent' but this Winter must certainly top that. In January we experienced more torrential rain, followed by bitterly cold temperatures culminating in potholes and more flooding (see article under Water & Drainage below). 2023 will certainly be another challenging year and let's hope there will be a glimmer of economic hope.

As ever the Parish Council tries to provide as much information as possible on what the Parish Council is getting up to and other parish news.

Parish Council Finances

The Precept is collected by Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) on behalf of the Parish as part of the Council Tax and the Parish Council makes every

effort to maintain the existing level of service as well as staying on a sustainable financial footing. We always strive to be prudent and diligent with our finances. Councillors have undertaken a thorough review but due to the rise in inflation and increase in the cost of various services, the Parish Council has made a slight increase which means the amount of money collected from residents to be spent in Marden in the next financial year from April 2023 for a Band D taxpayer will now be £80.28 per annum or £6.69 per month. This is an increase of £3.46 per year or 29p per month for a Band D property. We understand how difficult it is for residents in the current financial crisis and hope you understand our decision to make this slight increase.

Marden Annual Parish Meeting Tuesday 4th April at 7.30pm

This year's Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Tuesday 4th April at Marden Memorial Hall commencing at 7.30pm and all residents are welcome to attend. All village organisations will be contacted asking for a report on their activities over the past year and these will be available at the meeting and on the Parish Council website. Speakers this year will be Rachel and Gail from the Dementia Friendly Community Marden and Members of the Community Protection Team/Maidstone Task Force.

Marden Summer Play Scheme Under Threat

As reported in the last newsletter it is with regret that Jordan Manley is unable to work as Manager of Marden Summer Play Scheme this year and Marden Parish Council wishes to pass on their thanks for all the years and commitment Jordan has put into running the scheme. The Parish Council has been looking at options available to continue with the Play Scheme this summer. For the Play Scheme to go ahead we need a manager and staff; if we cannot find a manager then we cannot go ahead.

You will need to have NVQ Level 3 in Childcare or a teaching qualification together with current first aid and safeguarding certificates. You will need to be available for the first two weeks of the School Summer holidays and for several hours on the lead up to the scheme for planning purposes (assistance will be given with this if required).

Please note this is not a job application, but to give the Council an idea of whether we will be able to proceed. Closing date for details is Friday 31st March and a final decision will be made at the April Parish Council meeting.

HEALTH & WELLBEING

Save Marden Children's Centre – KCC Community Services Consultation

There are serious implications for Marden as the Children's Centre is recommended for closure by KCC. We would like as many residents as possible to try to help keep the Children's Centre open. It is an essential community service that many residents use, and it would be tragic if we lost such an important asset in the village. KCC is proposing that residents attend a Community Hub at Cranbrook Library which is 7.4 miles away or Greenfields Children's Centre in Maidstone which is 8.1 miles away. The Parish Council and Borough Councillor Claudine Russell are lobbying both our Kent County Councillor, Lottie Parfitt-Reid, and our MP Helen Grant about the proposals. The Marden Children's Centre is part of a nationwide programme of services for 0-25-year-olds and their families and is open on Mondays and Wednesdays. They offer information, advice and support to parents as well as integrated childcare and early learning, health services, family support and parental outreach.



Actively Involved



They want to tackle the root causes of ill health which can include isolation, loneliness and frailty. It's estimated that between 5% and 18% of UK adults feel lonely often or always and when we feel socially rejected, it triggers a response in our brain like one from experiencing physical pain.

Marden Community Warden

Community Wardens work flexible hours (mainly weekdays during normal working hours) but can work until 10pm and at weekends if there is an event or requirement to do so. Our aim is to:

- improve community resilience;
- support the elderly and vulnerable;
- foster community cohesion and wellbeing;
- assist with navigating community services.

If you would like to join a local club or group – or set one up – give me a call. I can help you report an issue if you are not able to do or not sure who to contact. Doorstep traders and scammers can catch you off guard – never give in to on-the-spot pressure. You are in control of who you speak to and answer the door to; screen your phone calls and don't answer the door to anyone you don't know and aren't expecting.

If you start to feel flustered just put the phone down.

I can talk to you about phone call screening and devices such as video doorbells that don't need a smart gadget or the internet to work. For approx. £160, supplied and fitted, you can get a video doorbell connected by wire to a handset that has a video screen. When someone is at your door, you can see who it is and speak to them (if you wish) without getting up from your chair.

SUSTAINABILITY, BIODIVERSITY & CLIMATE CHANGE

The Queen's Green Canopy

As part of the Parish Council's biodiversity responsibility and to fill in various gaps, we recently planted several trees at the Playing Field and Rookery Path to help create a wildlife corridor. Unfortunately, one of the young oaks was uprooted, which was reported to the police. It was subsequently found in a neighbour's garden having been thrown over the hedge. Can we please ask that residents keep a beady eye on the trees and report any problems to the Parish Office? We have been offered some young oaks by a resident in Collier Street and a few members of Marden Wildlife will kindly be supplying us with some oak seedlings to place in various open space areas. The Parish Council has also applied for some more saplings which will be planted around the village at some point this Spring. Tree Warden Survey

Our Tree Warden, Charlie Edwards, undertakes regular tree inspections at the Parish Council open spaces and other areas in the parish including the new developments, Churchyard, Plain Road and Copper Lane. It is very disheartening that most of the saplings that were planted as part of the Queen's Green Canopy in 2021 at Windsor Meadows, The Parsonage and Highwood Green have either died or been destroyed.

Parish Council Environment Group Update

Amongst other things, the Environment Group is in the process of drafting and agreeing an Estate Management Plan looking at realistic and manageable ways in which the Parish Council operates such as recycling, energy, purchasing and travel etc. This will also incorporate a more sustainable mowing strategy etc.

We have also been investigating a Carbon Emissions Calculator to find out Marden's carbon footprint. It shows carbon emissions on a consumption basis (what people who live in the Parish use) in comparison with Maidstone Borough and the UK. It also looks at the information on a territorial basis which is all emissions that happen within the Parish e.g. any industrial/agricultural emissions that take place as well as emissions from vehicles that pass through the Parish (not just what our residents use).

Marden Wildlife Update

Members continue to record the Parish flora and fauna, with an autumn bat walk and two fungus forays, led by Simon Ginnaw and David Newman respectively. Bat highlights were multiple species caught on detectors and in torchlight, with Glow Worms included for good measure. Slime moulds (they solve problems - Google them) and some exceedingly rare other fungi were added to Marden's lengthening list - one being only the sixth UK record since 1897! Records such as these (and members' work in finding them) tempted the Trustees of Kent Wildlife Trust to spend a day in Marden discussing our work. This Spring, in conjunction with the Kent Weald Preservation Society, we'll be looking for Wild Service Trees

(commonly known as Chequer Trees) that have a stronghold (albeit weakening) in the Low Weald. At the same time, with Professor Rebecca Cassidy, an anthropologist at Goldsmiths, we'll be searching for old crab apple and apple species and rare, orchard insects. Demand increases for Marden Wildlife to talk about its work. The Kent Moth Group enjoyed an excellent account by Karen Latchford of our increasing 'moth-ing' membership and our contribution to the County's records of scarce species. Both are poised to expand with delivery of three portable traps to use on Marden Cluster farms in neighbouring parishes, with a KCC grant courtesy of Cllr Simon Webb.

Finally, thanks to the KCC grant courtesy of Cllr Lottie Parfitt-Reid, QR information signs can now be found in Southons Field, and by Plain Road winter birdseed field in that has been giving enormous pleasure to villagers, insects and birds alike since August.

Water Refill Station

The Parish Council has been exploring the possibility of installing a water refill station at the Public Toilets. After much investigation, the easiest and simplest solution is to install drinking taps in both the ladies & gents' toilets for people to refill their water bottles. Hopefully the taps will be installed in the next few months.

PLANNING UPDATE

Maidstone Borough Council (MBC)

Local Review Regulation 22

MBC has received confirmation that the first stage of its Local Plan Review Examination has been completed. In a letter to MBC, the Government appointed Inspector confirmed that he believes the overall spatial strategy - which forms the basis of the plan and was very much the focus of the Stage 1 hearings is subject to modification but that he is happy to proceed to stage 2 hearings. As is standard practice in the examination process, the Inspector's interim letter highlights some specific areas within the strategy which will need further work to ensure they are made more robust between now and the second stage of the process e.g. at Heathlands and Lidsing sites. MBC will be working with the site promoters to make sure these are addressed.

The Stage 2 Hearing Sessions will take place in May and a more detailed programme will be published in March. MBC are hoping the revised Local Plan will be adopted in Spring 2024. You can check out the Local Plan Examination Process on the following link: <https://bit.ly/LPR-Reg22>

Marden Neighbourhood Plan (MNP)

As part of the ongoing process of neighbourhood plans, the Marden Neighbourhood Plan (MNP) was adopted in February 2020 following various consultations with residents and Maidstone Borough Council.

This forms a legal document and is part of the planning policies within MBC. Councillors refer to the policies in the document when considering planning applications to ensure they are compliant.

Due to the current review of the Maidstone Local Plan, the Steering Group decided it was time to review the MNP. In May 2022 the Steering Group held an Open Day and we have been reviewing residents' responses. We are in the process of amending/updating the plan and will shortly be asking residents for their feedback. Marden Conservation Area Appraisal Management Plan (CAAMP)

Maidstone Borough Council is finally starting to draft a CAAMP for the parish of Marden and they will consult with the Parish Council once the draft is completed. Conservation Area Appraisals give an overview of the history and development of each area and try to define what it is that makes them special.

They also identify specific features which contribute towards their character, for example, historic buildings and buildings which are locally significant.

PLANNING UPDATE CONTD

Reed Court Farm Proposed Chicken Farm, Hunton Road, Chainhurst

This complex application was submitted to MBC in December 2020 for the erection of a new free-range egg farm consisting of 3 hen houses with extensive outdoor ranges and fencing, formal vehicle access from Hunton Road and associated parking, landscaping, woodland and tree planting, drainage and other associated works. Additional information was received in January this year and discussed by Parish Councillors. Apart from one further point to their previous comments in March 2022 about water quality, the Parish Council continue to recommend refusal. The 'We Love Chainhurst' group have also scrutinised the additional information and submitted their analysis to MBC. This is likely to be discussed at the MBC Planning Committee in April. PROJECT UPDATE

Housing Needs Survey

If you recall in June 2022, a Housing Needs Survey was posted to all residents in Marden to assess whether there might be a need for local needs housing in the parish so that residents who cannot afford to buy or rent locally are not forced to move away.

High property prices and a predominance of privately owned homes means that some local people are unable to afford a home within the parish. It was also an opportunity to see if there are older people and/or residents with disabilities who would like to downsize and/or move to housing more suitable for their needs. Thank you to all those residents who completed the survey and the results have now been received. The Parish Council is in the process of arranging a meeting with a Maidstone Borough Council Housing Officer to review the outcome of the survey and whether the results reflect the needs of the village. The results will also be cross-referenced to the 2021 Census (see article below). The survey has certainly identified a need for more affordable homes for single, couples, families and other types of households all with strong local connections to Marden. It has also identified homes for older owner occupiers wanting to downsize or move to suitable housing to fit their needs. We will report further in the next newsletter.

Marden Library Footpath Extension

We are delighted that residents are pleased with the new footpath and flower bed at the library area which is owned by Kent County Council but the work has been undertaken and paid for by the Parish Council. The Parish Council would like to complete the final section of the footpath and this area is owned by Maidstone Borough Council.

PROJECT UPDATE CONTD

They have given their agreement we can go ahead with extending the footpath and this project has been added to our Infrastructure Spend Plan (ISP) and will be a high priority. Hopefully the work will be undertaken during the year.



Finger Posts

Unfortunately, prior to Christmas, the fingerpost sign at the junction of Plain Road and Thorn Road was severely damaged by a vehicle in the snow. Kent County Council no longer insure, repair or maintain cast iron signs but the Parish Council is currently liaising with KCC and hopefully this sign will be repaired soon.

The Parish Council replaced the dilapidated wooden fingerpost at Goudhurst Road/Sheephurst Lane junction last year as well as refurbishing the fingers and roundels on the cast iron fingerposts at the Howland Road/Battle Lane junction and Plain Road/Albion Road junction. There was an issue in removing the fingers from the post at Maidstone Road/High Street junction and a local contractor will undertake this additional work along with refurbishment of all three main posts on site in the Spring.

Marden at Christmas and Festive Lights

The Marden at Christmas event last December was another resounding success and the Parish Council received wonderful feedback. There was a great turnout at The Allens with carols led by Rev Nicky and music by East Peckham Silver Band followed by the excellent Morris Dancers. The Church had a lovely display of Christmas trees by the village groups and the Scouts had a roaring success with their smores. Lots of people visited the craft fayre and children loved Father Christmas in his grotto at the Memorial Hall. Children were excited participating in the Elf Trail and Father Christmas received lots of letters from them too. Well done to those residents and businesses who participated in the Festive Front Display. Needless to say, the Parish Council will be holding another event probably on Saturday 2nd December.

We hope you enjoyed the wrap around garland lights on lamp posts in the centre of the village and provided much more of a festive display than last year. At some point in the future and funds permitting, we hope to be able to place more garland lights on other lamp posts. Thank you to all those residents who erected the Christmas trees on the front of their properties and for all the wonderful displays around the village.

Marden Car Park – Results of Residents Survey

The car park behind the library is owned and maintained by Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) who work closely with the Parish Council on all aspects of management and maintenance. Some residents have reported they have difficulty in finding a space in the car park and we advised in the last newsletter that we were undertaking a survey to ascertain residents views on:

1. Whether to keep the existing parking restrictions between 7.15am and 8.15am Monday to Friday; or
2. Support a 2-hour parking restriction.

We really appreciate the feedback from those residents who responded to the survey (145) and there were some interesting comments. The responses have now been analysed and 108 residents were in favour of keeping the existing 7.15am-8.15am parking restriction (74.48%) and 37 residents (25.52%) supported a 2-hour parking restriction.

Councillors have discussed the results and decided to retain the parking restriction as it is, but we will discuss with MBC further. The main concern if we had a 2-hour parking restriction it would push people to park elsewhere on other roads which is already an issue and it could only really be enforced by issuing parking tickets on a regular basis. Most residents said they usually have no problem finding a space to park in the car park. There was comment about the cyclists parking in the car park, but it is generally felt they attract business to the village by supporting the shops and cafés and we want to encourage people to use the facilities in our parish. Please note that MBC will not issue parking permits in Marden. If we had more than one parking restriction e.g. 5.15pm-6.15pm MBC would not have the resources to enforce two restrictions and it is felt that the car park is too small to charge for parking.

Infrastructure Spend Plan (ISP)/Parish Wish List

An initial consultation was held in 2019 and the feedback received by residents was incorporated into the parish wish list document. We have recently added the extension of the footpath at Marden Library to the list and will be adding a footpath link at The Parsonage and Windsor Meadows developments once we have heard from the developers. HIGHWAYS & PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Community Speed Watch – Keep Your Speed Down!

The Maidstone Community Safety Unit have been operating in Marden regarding speeding motorists and mobile phone use and several drivers have been dealt with for offences and vehicles seized for no tax as well as drivers warned regarding their driving skills or lack of them.

The Parish Council along with residents is very concerned about the amount of traffic and speeding which are causing so many problems in the village and we understand how important it is to start up the Speed Watch scheme. We have the necessary equipment and are in the process of the sites being re-evaluated to meet the criteria.

Parish Council Highway Improvement Plan (HIP)

Councillors met with the Kent Highway Improvement Team last December to review the top five priorities for Marden and to see what is feasible.

Kent Highways explained their financial constraints and only have a budget of £60,000 across all the West Kent districts which includes 129 parishes. The top five priorities discussed were:

- Goudhurst Road Parking – the Parish Council will undertake an informal consultation with residents before a formal consultation takes place on single yellow line restrictions.
- Pattenden Lane/Church Green Junction – looking at various options such as the possibility of a small island, dropped kerbs, a 'visual' island or widening the kerb.
- High Street/Maidstone Road Junction – Kent Highways looked at crash data but there is no pattern of accidents. However there has been various incidents such as a lorry hitting the lamp post on the corner. Kent Highways have raised a case to see if bollards can be installed on the eastern footway although they do not promote bell bollards only wooden ones.
- Albion Road/Stanley Road Parking – the Parish Council to carry out an informal consultation with residents regarding double yellow lines as some houses do not have off-road parking.
- Gateway in Maidstone Road – possible provision where the 30mph limit begins or at Church Farm corner near the flower trough but this may encroach on the footway.

HIGHWAYS & PUBLIC TRANSPORT CONTD

Parish Council Highway Improvement Plan (HIP) Contd

The Traffic Regulation Order for single yellow lines in Pattenden Lane was published in the Kent Messenger prior to Christmas but unfortunately it had been advertised as double yellow lines. This has now been downgraded to single yellow lines with restrictions. At the time of publication of the newsletter Marden Parish Council had not been informed of the outcome.

A number of residents have raised their concerns about speeding in the village. A 20mph speed limit within the built-up area has been added to the HIP document which you can find on the Parish Council website:

Marden Railway Station

The 'Access for All' programme was launched in 2006 to address the issues faced by both disabled and passengers with mobility restraints when using railway stations in the UK, but all the funding has been allocated to projects until 2024.

The Department for Transport requested industry nominations for more stations to be considered should they be successful in securing another round of funding and received over 300 nominations. SouthEastern Rail nominated Marden for potential step-free access installation and these are

currently being assessed with Network Rail, but no funding has been guaranteed. The Parish Council has been chasing for a meeting with SouthEastern and Network Rail for some time as there are a number of issues to discuss such as the poor lighting, state of the pavements and potholes, cost of parking at the station.

Visibility Along Country Lanes

It's so great to see so many residents walking, running and cycling around our country lanes, but to help other road users to see you, please wear something light, bright or fluorescent especially in poor daylight conditions. When it's dark, please use reflective materials which can be seen by drivers. It is also advisable not to wear earphones so you can hear approaching vehicles.



Most country lanes have no pavement, and the new Highway Code advises to keep to the right-hand side of the road so that you can see oncoming traffic, take extra care and be prepared to walk in single file especially on narrow roads or in poor light and keep close to the side of the road. It may be safer to cross the road well before a sharp right-hand bend so that oncoming traffic has a better chance of seeing you than cross back after the bend.

Can we also put a shout out to drivers, especially larger vehicles, to take care especially around bends. Walkers, runners and cyclists have every right as drivers on the roads. You can check out the new Highway Code at:

Kent County Council's highway crews are busy repairing potholes across Kent which includes individual pothole repairs as well as resurfacing larger sections of road to improve quality.

OPEN SPACE

Open Space Update:

The Parish Council will be replacing the missing piece of equipment in the play area at the Playing Field.

In the Napoleon Drive play area, the picnic table that was damaged has been reported as a crime. We will be looking at replacing this with another piece of equipment once we have heard from our insurers. Additional CCTV cameras are to be installed shortly at Marden Playing Field. In Southons Field, two QR information codes have been installed by the Marden Wildlife Group explaining the wildlife, trees, wildflower meadow etc.

In the Spring, two new picnic benches will be installed to replace two of the old ones which have been removed - one has wheelchair access and the other a children's picnic bench.

A sign is being installed at the beginning of the permissive path in Maidstone Road (by the bend exiting the village) leading to Marden Cemetery. The Parish Council will also be creating a Scattering of Ashes section at the back of the new Section 4 around a tree.

The Cockpit Play Area

The Cockpit Play area is the responsibility of Maidstone Borough Council who has recently upgraded and extended the play area and a few new pieces of equipment have been installed. The cost of these works has come from S106 money collected from Russet Grove and Vicarage Field developments.

Marden Playing Field - Changing Room Public Consultation

The Parish Council still has S106 monies left to spend at the Playing Field which cannot legally be spent elsewhere. We have already installed various pieces of equipment, benches, bins etc and we are now undertaking a public consultation for residents to consider whether this money should be spent on the changing rooms.

The current changing rooms at the Playing Field are no longer required by Marden Minors Football Club and we are proposing refurbishment of the existing building with a small extension. We would like residents to vote for one of the following options using the link: <https://www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/MX55S3> or email Rachel: deputyclerk@mardenkent-pc.gov.uk The deadline for responses is 14th April 2023.

The Options are:

- (1) Use as a dedicated youth facility with controlled supervision.
- (2) Demolish the existing building and replace with a small building for storage.
- (3) Any other suggestions from residents.

We are very conscious that Marden does not have a dedicated youth facility and the continual expansion of the community means this has become increasingly important. According to the 2021 Census 10% of Marden's population is aged between 9 and 19 demonstrating that youth facilities are needed in Marden and a youth club and activities are vital for making young people feel supported within their community.

POLICE & CRIME UPDATE

Crimestoppers - Reporting Crime Anonymously

Information from the community is vital for the Police targeting criminals, it can assist in tackling key concerns identified by residents, such as drug dealing, cultivations, possession of offensive weapons etc. However, they understand that reporting someone to the Police can be stressful and concerning and not always an easy decision to make. Crimestoppers is a charity that allows the public to give information 100% anonymously. Maidstone Task Force (MTF)

Have you seen any anti-social behaviour in Marden or do you have an issue to report?

The Maidstone Task Force has been very active out and about in our village identifying problems and they want to hear from residents to help identify new issues in the community. It's a multi-layered team with representatives from Kent Police, Maidstone Community Protection, KCC Early Help, PCSO's and Community Wardens. MTF will relentlessly pursue outstanding offenders to bring them to justice. Contact can be made via the Community Protection email on the next page.

In liaison with Kent County Council, MTF have been engaging with young people and taking part in activities including basketball, football and boxing. There was a good turnout at these events which help to break down barriers between the police and young people as well as providing things for them to do (see further info under 'Youth Provision' below).

DRAINAGE & WATER

Flooding

There is a complex network of rivers, streams, ditches, drains and ponds in our parish and when we have excessive rain, we experience flooding.

Responsibility for flooding falls to a number of different authorities depending on what's flooding and where it is. Trying to resolve a flood issue isn't a simple matter of one call to one number.

DRAINAGE & WATER CONTD

Flooding Contd

One of the main problems we experience when we have excessive rainfall is sewer overflowing on the path which connects Maynards with Goudhurst Road and sewer flooding in Roughlands Lane. This is the responsibility of Southern Water.

Another problem we experience when we have excessive rain is road flooding. Depending on what the problem is it might be Kent Highways, or the Environment Agency (EA) or the Upper Medway Internal Drainage Board (UMIDB).

The Environment Agency is responsible for the Rivers Teise and Beult. UMIDB is responsible for the other key watercourses in our area not covered by the EA. Flooding commonly occurs in Plain Road and Hunton Road, the rivers there are the responsibility of the UMIDB. Sheephurst Lane and Green Lane flood when the River Teise bursts its banks, which is EA responsibility.

The EA website has a lot of information about flooding and you can sign up for flood alerts so that you will know if there is a risk that roads will become impassable. <https://www.gov.uk/check-flooding>

UMIDB also has a website which shows which water courses they are responsible for and gives details of their maintenance programme. <https://www.medwayidb.co.uk>

Kent Highways have a responsibility to keep gullies clear so that the roads don't become unreasonably flooded. The main pinch point here is Pattenden Lane bridge which flooded badly in early November.

Highways did an emergency gully clean and it is apparent that the gullies are not cleared often enough. Blocked gullies and other highway issues can be reported to Kent Highways <https://bit.ly/KHReportAProblem>

Network Rail also have an impact as they are responsible for keeping ditches on their land clear, some of which can cause road flooding if not properly maintained. Finally, landowners have responsibility for keeping ditches on their land clear.

We have a network of volunteer Flood Wardens in the Parish who put out flood warning signs when roads become dangerous due to flood water.

Please do not ignore these signs they are there for your safety. Excessive rainfall is becoming the norm and we will continue to have road flooding in the autumn and winter.

Work out your alternative routes when we have heavy rain, the best advice is to stick to the main roads i.e. A229 and B2079, they might be wet, but they don't flood. Its better to take longer to get to your destination than get trapped in flood water.

A big thank you to our Chairman, Cllr Kate Tippen for spending so much time keeping on top of the flooding situations and organising our emergency response with the Flood Wardens.

The Parish Council has recently held meetings with Southern Water and UMIDB, which we report on below. The message from both is that climate change is here, and winters are going to get wetter, so flooding becomes an inevitability. The best advice is be prepared.

Southern Water

As a result of the flooding in November and the issues in December, Parish Councillors met with Southern Water representatives who explained the impact of the prolonged wet weather on the foul-only sewer network and the operational plans that are in place to help mitigate those impacts. The flooding issues experienced in November were the result of surface water inundating the foul-only sewer network and there are multiple stakeholders responsible for the whole drainage system around Marden. Southern Water is only responsible for the foul-only sewer network. The Roughlands Pumping Station was working at its design capacity and the same with Pattenden Lane and Sovereigns Way pumping stations. However, the amount of water had been overwhelming where Sovereigns Way became overloaded.

Sewerage is collected in Marden and pumped to Horsmonden Wastewater Treatment Works for treatment. With the new developments in Marden (approved by MBC the Local Planning Authority), it is Southern Water's responsibility to provide capacity and they are currently undertaking a study that will allow them to develop solutions to accommodate the growth as well as options to reduce the flood risk currently experienced in the Parish. Their network programme is designed to deliver a solution in 2025, but this date is provisional and will be determined by design and construction complexities etc. Southern Water is also reviewing the performance of Horsmonden Wastewater Treatment Works and is building a proposal to OFWAT (the regulator) to reduce the number of spills from the Sovereigns Way overflow in Marden.

Southern Water are also very aware of the number of flooding and raw sewage occurrences along the footpath between Maynards and Goudhurst Road.

The Parish Council continues to keep a written log of all flooding issues within the parish.



Upper Medway Internal Drainage Board

A meeting took place with the Upper Medway Internal Drainage Board in February.

UMIDB is working with other stakeholders such as the EA, other Internal Drainage Boards, The Rivers Trust and KCC to establish potential sites which can offer flood alleviation solutions. However solutions are costly and take time to implement and due to climate change flooding will only get worse in the short term.

South East Water Resources Management Plan

As many residents will know, Marden has been suffering from both a lack of water pressure and burst pipes. South East Water, who supply our drinking water, recently held a public consultation on their Water Resources Management Plan which sets out how they will provide a reliable and resilient supply of drinking water for the next 50 years.

Their ability to supply water is under increasing pressure due to a growing population, changing climate and new laws to protect the environment.

They are working hard to create a regional solution which strikes a delicate balance between those pressures whilst also protecting and enhancing the environment and adding value to society.

The plan outlines how they intend to invest £2.2bn during the next 50 years building a range of new infrastructure and a further £2.1bn reducing leaks and customer water use by 2050. You can find out more info: <https://bit.ly/SEWInvest>

Festive Tractor Run and Christmas Tree Recycle - Weald of Kent Young Farmers Club

Despite the appalling weather conditions before Christmas, the Festive Tractor run organised by the Weald of Kent Young Farmers Club was brilliant and many people came out to watch it in Marden. They raised £1,230 with bucket donations from the four villages they travelled through, and the Christmas tree recycle at Marden Memorial Hall also raised £271.15 which will go to Marden Food Bank.



The overall total raised for the tractor run was nearly £7,000 and Kent Air Ambulance will receive £5,300. There were no traffic incidents or concerns on the way around.

Everybody seems keen to do it again this Christmas and they had about 4000 visitors to their web page - they usually have about 4! The run has appeared on Kent Online, and in various farming press including the South East Farmer magazine. The Christmas tree recycle also seemed to work quite well and they hope to organise another one next January.

2021 Census

Some of the Census data has been received and a survey is being undertaken to see how the demographics have changed in Marden over the last 10 years. Not surprisingly, there has been a population increase of 35% to 5,027 and there are now 2,061 households which is an increase of 33% since the last Census in 2011.

The Borough of Maidstone's population has increased by 13.3% - from 155,143 to 175,800 and the number of households has increased by 12.2% from 63,447 to 71,200 since the last Census in 2011.

Marden Pre-School

Marden Pre-School is situated in the heart of our community and we aim to provide a secure, caring and happy environment where children can flourish. We care for children aged 2 years to 5 years and they are welcome whether they are funded or non-funded.

We accept Childcare Vouchers and 30-hour funding and open 27 hours per week Monday to Friday. We have an amazing staff team of 9 dedicated Qualified staff who love their job and are here each morning greeting the children with a smile and a warm welcome.

Marden Pre-School continues to grow year on year and this year is no exception. As we enter the Spring Term 2023, we as a Pre-School are coming to grips with the fine balance of servicing our ever-growing community, and ensuring we meet the needs of the children in our setting and the staff team. 2023 will continue to see financial struggles across the sector with underfunding and increasing overheads.

With these challenges we are so proud that we can offer a wonderful environment for the children of Marden and surrounding villages. Children that attend make such tremendous progress from their starting points, and by the time they leave us, they are very ready for school.

Our programme of talks for the first half of 2023 is as follows:


