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EXTRACTS FROM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING: 13th APRIL 2016

The Council meeting held on Wednesday 13th April was attended by five Council members, the County/District Councillor and the Clerk. There were three members of the public present.

BT pole transfer

The Clerk was delighted to report that the last remaining duplicate power pole was removed by SSE on April 1st 2016. He stated that it had been an exercise in persistence and patience and after about the three years he was happy the pole transfer project was completed.

Millennium Bench

The Clerk reported that he expected work to start at the end of the month on the replacement of the two wooden benches adjacent to the Millennium pump.

Community Transport

The Chairman stated that the new arrangements for Community Transport would start in late July after the schools broke up after the summer term. He emphasised that it was important that the new arrangements were supported as the service was now on a commercial basis and would reviewed after six months.

Kerbing: Haseley Road

The Clerk informed the meeting that he had received a further quote for three sections of kerbing on the Haseley Road. The quote received was more expensive than that received from the County Council. The Clerk reminded the Council that it had **RESOLVED** at its meeting in December 2015 that it would need to establish a criteria for prioritising any highway work in the village before any decision to fund future highway maintenance. However the Council **RESOLVED** that the Clerk should request that the County Council re-assess the HAMP that it conducted in 2015 as Cllr. Kate Daunt was concerned with the risk to pedestrians due to the erosion of the grass verges.

Gainsbridge Brook

The Chairman referred to the meeting held with Thames Water on 23^{rd} March. He stated there was a discussion on the proposed de-silting of the Gainsbridge Book adjacent to the pumping station. This prompted an inspection of the location and it became apparent that there was a need to progress the work on the culvert that fed into the brook at the same time as the de-silting work. The Thames Water representative took the initiative and liaised with the OCC Highways and agreed that the work would be co-ordinated. The Chairman expressed his delight that this ongoing issue was now being dealt with in a co-ordinated way between Thames Water and OCC Highways and was a major step forward.

Preliminary Investigation into replacement of current playground

The Chairman thanked the Playground Working Party for issuing a document for Council members to consider. The Chairman stated that there a number of key questions to be decided but it was not the purpose of the meeting tonight to attempt to decide on any specific detail. The Chairman expressed the view that in a climate where grants could be available it appeared the right time to be considering replacing the existing playground. The Chairman directed the Council to the key questions raised by the Working Party.

After some deliberation on the status of the existing equipment the Council RESOLVED that it should consider progressing the replacement of the current facility by conducting a consultation with the village now with a view to pursuing grant funding opportunities.

The Council RESOLVED to fund a questionnaire that would be distributed to the village at the beginning of May.

The Council RESOLVED that the MUGA and tennis courts would not be considered as part of the project.

The Council discussed the possibility of increasing the existing footprint of the playground and RESOLVED that a new playground could be larger. However any proposals would need to satisfy the Council that the requirements of other user groups had not been compromised and that the impact on the residents of Cremar Cottages had been fully considered. It was also the view of the Council that any new facility should be fenced.

The Council RESOLVED that the consultation should consider providing adult exercise equipment but its exact location was not agreed.

The Council RESOLVED that it did not support the introduction any water features as it considered them to add a degree of complexity that it felt was not supportable.

The Council RESOLVED that the height of any equipment should be within that which does not require planning permission.

The Chairman highlighted that a condition of the grant from WREN was the need for third party funding of £5,375 (10.75% of the total amount applied for). There was a discussion on future fund-raising activities as a way to contribute to this sum. The Council RESOLVED that it would, if necessary, underwrite the 10.75% for third party funding. The Clerk stated that the purpose of any fund-raising required some flexibility to allow for the monies raised to be spend on other amenities in the event that the grants for the project were unsuccessful. The Council RESOLVED that it would not seek to borrow any shortfall in grants but would seek to review the scope of the project.

Cllr. Elizabeth Collison explained that it was hoped to have a display at the village fete in June where illustrations of possible equipment could be viewed. The Council RESOLVED to fund any printing costs for the display.

Planning

<u>P16/S0624/HH: Orchard House, Windmill Hill: Single-Storey front and rear extensions</u> Mrs Stevenson gave a brief planning history of the site and explained the rationale for the current application relative to the two Lawful Development approvals already granted. The Council considered that the new application was a better overall design that appeared to meet the needs of the applicant. The Council RESOLVED to recommend that the application should be approved by the District Council.

The application made no reference as to the status of the approved Lawful Development already approved if this application was approved not only for the current applicant but any future owners of the property. The Parish Council would seek specific clarification in respect of the approved Lawful Developments from the Planning Department if they decided to grant planning approval.

P16/S0822/HH & P16/S0823/LB: Wells Farmhouse Haseley Road: Proposed single storey extension and internal/external alterations

Mrs Jo Gaillard explained that the current application was a scaled down version of an existing Planning Application that had been approved. The Parish Council considered the application at its meeting on 13th April 2016. The Council RESOLVED to recommend that the application should be approved by the District Council.

Defibrillators

The Chairman confirmed that the 50% grant had been granted by OCC and the Clerk had placed an order for one defibrillator for the Pine Lodge. He stated that an AED training session was being held in the Pine Lodge on Thursday 21st April 2016. There was a brief discussion on the use of any funds in excess of the planned project for the installation of three defibrillators. The Clerk stated that any excess funds would be used to cover any future maintenance or replacement of component parts of the equipment.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Wednesday 11th May 2016 at 8.15p.m. in the Pine Lodge.

REPORT FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR

PROPOSALS FOR UNITARY COUNCIL

As reported last month, without consulting the public or the County Council, on Thursday 25th February a surprise announcement was made by Oxfordshire's District Councils and Oxford City Council. It called for the abolition of the County Council and the establishment of four district quasi-unitary councils, to include parts of Gloucestershire and Northamptonshire. (A unitary council combines the functions of a county council and a district council into one body.) In addition, the announcement called for the creation of an unelected quango to be known as a 'Combined Authority' to take on difficult areas of responsibility currently with the County Council, such as social care and major road projects. So, this would mean four councils spread across three counties, plus an over-arching unelected quango.

The Districts are now in the process of commissioning management consultants to produce a report to evaluate their proposals. Initially their brief to consultants stated: "The District Councils' view is that a single county-wide unitary authority is <u>not</u> the right solution for Oxfordshire". It went on to say that any finding suggesting a single county-wide unitary is best would not be approved.

The Oxfordshire County Council view was that a single county-wide unitary authority was an option that <u>should</u> be considered (along with the Districts' proposal and other options for two or three unitary councils), and had thus been forced to begin the process of commissioning a separate management consultant's report.

As a result of County and public pressure, District Council leaders have now agreed to commission a report covering all the options, although it still states that the objective is "to test the proposal for four Unitary Councils with a Combined Authority" and suggests that two alternative proposals for a dual- and single-unitary authority be used as a benchmark, rather than as real, viable options. It would appear that Council-Tax payers might now have to fund two separate reports, in order to obtain an open-minded, unbiased and transparent view of all the options open to the residents of the county.

RECYCLING CENTRES TO OPEN LATE ON THURSDAYS

Opening hours on Thursdays at OCC's Household Waste Recycling Centres will be extended from 7 April to 29 September. The sites will be open until 8pm on Thursdays in addition to the normal hours of 8am-5pm every day (including Sundays). The Household Waste Recycling Centres can accept a wide range of materials for recycling including garden waste, textiles and electrical items. Food waste should always be placed in the food caddies provided by the district council and collected as part of the kerbside collection scheme. KEEPING HGVS MOVING WHILE REDUCING THE IMPACT ON COMMUNITIES

A free online mapping tool has been launched to help freight and logistics companies plan their routes through the county. Oxfordshire Freight Gateway is linked to the National Freight Journey Planner and is designed to help logistics managers and drivers of large goods vehicles to select the most appropriate routes for their journeys in Oxfordshire. REPORT FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

It's official - South is best for rural dwellers!

South Oxfordshire has topped a list of the best places to live in the UK countryside.

According to a survey produced by the Halifax, South Oxfordshire has the highest living standards, with happy residents, high levels of satisfaction and low levels of anxiety.

We also scored highly for health and employment, with 97 per cent of adults saying they were in good health and 81 per cent in jobs.

What's more, we were pleased to find that the vast majority of South Oxfordshire residents are satisfied with how the district council runs things.

Just over 80 per cent said also that the council offered good quality services, and two thirds of residents agreed that they provided good value for money – the best result since surveys began in 2005.

Oxfordshire Vision

The seven Councils involved continue to work on our Devolution Bid for a better way for Local Government, and recently the Oxfordshire Growth Board urged our friends in the County Council to join our independent consultation on how this may look. Planning and Development

Since the last report, we have received two decisions on planning appeals, that for the Chinnor Gladman Appeal and the Wallingford Wates Appeal. It is disappointing to note that these two appeals have been up-held, and our Planning Team are reviewing the Inspectors' reports to determine what we will do about these decisions.

There are plans for major development at Princes Risborough in Buckinghamshire, which will doubtless have a knock-on effect on our communities, mainly in the Thame and Chinnor areas, and we are pleased to report that whilst this falls within the remit of Wycombe District Council, SODC has been consulted. Our District's response has been sent in and we now await developments.

FROM THE RECTORY

I have blundered badly in my planning. I will be in Scotland when I should be here for Ascension Day. Ascension used to be one of the biggies of the Christian year, now for many if not most, it has become relegated to a sideline, and unwittingly this year by me!

I look forward though to the week after Ascension when Little Milton School will be having their special Ascension service at St James, (I am so glad it has been planned for when I am around) followed by their annual picnic at the Rectory, weather permitting. I'll have to make sure the grass is cut!

In May 2010 I was fortunate to be able to begin a three month sabbatical break from parish duties. Parish ministry can take its toll with so much giving out and the opportunity to 'take in' was relished. I didn't do anything particularly worthy like writing a book or engaging in some deep theological research. Instead, I decided in part to retrace my steps, to visit people and places that had been influential both in my life and faith, and also to branch out and explore a few new places and open myself to some new experiences and people. So the sabbatical took the form of a tour around parts of Britain using my dependable old BMW motorbike to get me about. I called the trip 'Revd up Britain!' Amazingly the Diocese bought the idea and so I was off. I toured down to the West Country to visit family and friends, to Wales, where among other things I visited a biker's church in Swansea (yes indeed). I also headed north to spend time with a Christian Community in Northumbria. I also spent time in a monastery near Nunraw just to the south of the Firth of Forth before heading off for some walking and amazing biking in Wester Ross. I spent time with a friend of mine who was an Orthodox priest in Lincolnshire and also stayed at a friend's cottage near the North Norfolk coast. The cottage is few miles from Walsingham, a centre of pilgrimage for Christians, though probably of rather more Catholic persuasion than me. I thought that I had better go and have a look but I came away with very mixed feelings. There are actually two centres of pilgrimage, the Roman Catholic shrine just outside the village and the Anglican shrine in the village itself. I think the Catholic shrine is far better, it has an air of peace and prayer and worship. What though can one say about Anglican shrine? At every turn it seems intent on out 'catholic-ing' the Catholics! At the centre of the complex is the most extraordinary church filled with little individual chapels, one of them was chapel of the Ascension. I had heard about this and wanted see it for myself and yes what I had heard was perfectly true. On the ceiling of the chapel were a couple of plaster feet with nail marks, in relief, sticking through a plaster cloud. I didn't know whether to laugh or cry.

Is that how this thing the Ascension of Jesus is seen? A couple of feet sticking out of a cloud as he went ballistic? I don't want to trample on sensitivities here (I expect I will!) but I really can't get my head around why some people seem to believe that bad taste religious tat is reverential, it was all just too much.

But it was a stab at depicting the 'un-depictable'. The account of Jesus' Ascension like so many things about Jesus is shrouded in mystery. We read in the Acts of the Apostles that Jesus was 'taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight'. What though might the Ascension might mean for Christians?

In John's Gospel in chapter 14 Jesus promised that though he was going away he would not in fact leave his disciples alone, "if anyone loves me, he will obey my teaching. My Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him." I love that image. The Ascension looks forward to the next great Christian festival, Pentecost, the promise of what Christians have called the Holy Spirit. In other words when Jesus promised the Spirit to his disciples he was actually saying to them that he would be with them in a whole new way.

What Ascension points us to is not a physical absence but a beginning of a new presence, available to his followers to carry on the work that was begun when Jesus was physically with them. That is actually what the Church is primarily about. No, we can't see or touch but for now we don't need to. I don't think that a plaster relief in ceiling is at all helpful. I am sorry to say that I have not found the great works of art that have sought to depict the Ascension helpful either, they just gives us the idea that Jesus was transported somewhere else and is separated from us. The Ascension of Jesus points us to a different possibility, that he has become available to us in whole new way, as close as breath itself.

On a couple of other matters. I am much very looking forward to the first of the three annual village fetes. The first of these, the Great Haseley Spring Fair I believe takes a different format from previous years and is to be held in the Great Haseley Village Hall on Saturday 14th May, beginning at 2.30 p.m. This year it is being organised entirely by the Church. They are scraping the barrel somewhat though as I have been asked to open it!

Finally......The new Diocesan Bishop of Oxford is to be the Rt. Reverend Steven Croft, presently Bishop of Sheffield. This is good news for the Diocese and it shows that those who were responsible for the appointments listened to what was wanted. Bishop Steven I think will carry on the direction set by our last Diocesan, Bishop John Pritchard, encouraging all churches to look at how they can engage more effectively with their communities with the Christian message. For those not in the know. Oxford Diocese is split into areas, we are in the Dorchester area and are ably looked after by one of the Assistant Bishops, Colin Fletcher. FRIENDS OF WELLS FARM

Last month I attended a Bumble Bee identification course in order to get a better idea of the species of bumble bees we have on the reserve. At first glance you would think it would be easy to work out, but actually this is not the case at all. Looking at the yellow bands and the red, white or buff tails is no guarantee of identification for most of the 25 species or so we have. So here are some quick facts: Bumble bees prefer cool weather and not really hot days. The males have no sting! Females have 12 segmented antennae but males have 13. There are cuckoo bees which take over the nest of other species. These have hairy thighs (not shiny) as they don't collect pollen. They tend to nest underground except for the tree bumble bees which are often found nesting in the roof of a house. And lastly, they are all pretty harmless and rarely sting.

The ponies should now be at Sydlings Copse and more sheep will have returned briefly for sheering during one of the days of the first week of May. No date is confirmed as it is weather dependant.

Last month we managed to take a look in the pond in the farmyard. We found 12 smooth newts of which two were adult male, 2 were immature (still with gills) and 8 were female. There were also larvae of dragon flies, damselflies and caddisflies as well as various water beetles and tiny daphnia. As we move into May the larvae will grow considerably, many preparing to turn in to their flying versions (Imago) in June and July.

I plan to do another Pond Dipping session on **Sunday 5th June from 2pm**, again meeting by the pond in the farmyard. If you want to come along please do. All ages welcome.

NEWS FROM THE PINE LODGE

It's great to welcome Stuart McGill back onto the Village Hall Management Committee as representative for the school. Stuart was on the committee for many years – he was much involved in the replacement of the old Village Hall by the Pine Lodge over 10 years ago – and it's good to have him back. Several village organisations – the Junior School, the Orchard Pre-School, the Parish Council, the Women's Institute, the Parochial

Church Council and the Little Milton Music Group – can appoint representatives to the Village Hall Management Committee and it helps greatly with the running of the Hall and coordination between the various village organisations that they do. Since the committee structure was set up the old Music Group has ceased to exist, but its seat remains ready for any new one.

The hearing loop system at the Pine Lodge is to be replaced – a more powerful loop amplifier and new loop cable has been ordered. This should be an improvement on the old system, which was always a bit intermittent and has now stopped working completely. The Hall also now has a new good quality hand-held radio microphone system and microphone stand. The aim is to provide sound reinforcement and a loop system without too much set-up complexity and without any trailing wires.

We are also upgrading the lavender plants in the garden outside the Pine Lodge this spring. The existing ones have done great service but have got rather large.

VIEW FROM VIEWS

It seems to me that yet again as we are waiting for the better weather to appear that the wait is far longer than we would wish in fact after a somewhat mild winter spring seems to be late, everything is just waiting for some warmer weather. On the very rare warm days most plants put on a vain attempt to burst into life then stop when it gets cold again, this is not to mention the rain that never seems to be able to let things dry up. I think now the days are getting warmer, which should buck things up a bit. Spring Barley planted early March took 3 to 4 weeks to show thro' the ground, in very warm times can be as little as 10 days, which illustrates how cold the average temperatures have been. I have though heard it said this is not a bad thing as the longer it takes to show through the ground the more roots it is putting down which has to be a good thing.

By the time you read this I think probably the daffodils will have eventually stopped flowering, just amazing what nature will do under extreme conditions, who would have thought they could bloom for practically 5 months, not a bad showing. In spite of everything said spring is not far away and things must surely start to warm up, we saw our first Swallows on the 13th April. Spring also brings my annual Tractor run (15th May) through the Chilterns for which I hope all readers will sponsor me, last year we managed to raise just under £1,000 for the Air Ambulance, let's try and make that a little more this year. I am proposing to drive there and back in the day, as Fingest is some 25 miles from here and the course is 25 miles makes 75 miles all told, a long way if it is a cold wet day, and on a bone shaker to boot. I hope there will soon be a sponsorship form in both Little & Great Milton post offices, as they say please give generously, with gift aid as well.

Most wildlife seems to have come through the winter well which, (apart from the "B" Pigeons) a good thing for them. I think the feeding of the small Farmland birds has proved the point, as the result seems to be more of them around and I believe it has been noticed in the village as. Let's not count our small birds before their hatched, as it could be due to the mild winter. We had a walk around the RSPB Otmoor reserve a few weeks ago and that seems to have been a great success apart from a wonderful place to walk around, there is a great variety of species to be seen. Not sure how many in Great Milton are aware of a slight connection between us and there. In the late 60's this area was purchased as a farm, at that time the purchaser was paid by the Government (you and I) to drain the moor and bring it in to Agricultural production, about 10 years ago his son one Austin Righton (of the "Bull") was paid to turn off the pumps, wonderful how things

and thoughts change. I can remember his father Harold being very proud of what he had done and that we all thought how innovative it was, we'd not dream of doing now.

As we get to the middle of April the Oil Seed Rape is just starting to flower, this is rather late, it is often in full flower by the end of March, and even earlier some years, just how much difference this makes remains to be seen, I always reckon the longer it is in flower the more seed it will produce. This lack of growth is particularly worrying in the case of Rape as allows the marauding pigeons easy access to hold it back even more. There has been some criticism in the Gt Milton Bulletin about bangers, I have to say first not guilty "m'lud", we only put out bangers on a daily basis and not every day, as we are not sure how effective they really are. It must be hard for those not involved to understand how frustrating it is to watch your livelihood disappear up the beak of a pigeon, and in the desperately feeling the need to do something to deter them, there is though, an NFU code of practice which members are encouraged to follow. Not an easy problem to tackle but if there are complaints would it not be a good idea for the Parish Councils to write in the New Year to local Farmers asking them to consider the NFU code.

Still concerned that we have not got anywhere with having some sensible discussion about the bus service, I had hoped the Parish Councils might have done more about this but I guess this is because like me most Councillors have their own transport are perhaps not aware how important it is to maintain a reasonable service. I think it is very hard for those of us with our own transport to understand how difficult it is to get about without a bus, for instance how do we get to the Doctors and back again without having to wait hours for a return bus, and many other likewise instances. I did attend a meeting that was arranged by Wheatley PC this was very disappointing as there were far too many present to have a sensible discussion the result being that we were presented with a new Timetable take it or leave it. I have made certain mad cap suggestions to try and encourage a discussion but nothing. This I know has no easy answers but surely we

needed to have a reasoned discussion amongst ourselves, as our needs are different to those in Wheatley.

LITTLE MILTON ALLOTMENTS

Those April showers and the ground warming up seemed to have got things bursting into life on the allotment. Now that May has arrived there are only about seven weeks to the longest day of the year, so the priority this week should be to get your remaining seeds into the soil and growing as soon as possible. Most seeds take from one to three weeks to germinate, so those sown the first week of May might still be caught by one of these late frosts, whereas seeds sown the second week should still be safely under the soil until all danger of frost is past. It is better to wait until mid-May before planting out beans, sweet corn, celery, less hardy cauliflowers or any plant of the marrow family.

Now is the time to earth up any potatoes that have shoots appearing above the surface. The main purpose of this is to produce a heavier crop and to prevent the new tubers breaking the surface and becoming green. If the plants are kept well earthed-up, with only the very tips exposed, a frost may blacken the tips, but the plants will recover after about three weeks.

By the end of May the tomatoes and cucumbers will be growing strongly in the greenhouse and should be kept well-watered and well fed. Give tomatoes enough water without overwatering; just enough to keep the top inch or so of soil moist, but not more. As the flowers open, spray them with water two or three times a day to help pollination (in an ideal world). I have to say most of my tomatoes and cucumbers are grown outdoors and seem to do as well as those in the greenhouse. They can take a bit of a battering if it is windy but should be safe if they are well staked.

In general the rule is never to allow any plant to be hampered by lack of water. However you must avoid overdoing the watering with certain plants. If growing in fine soil, parsnips and main crop carrots will probably do better without extra water. They will then send down long roots to find whatever moisture there is deep in the soil, and long roots are what you want in parsnips and carrots. "Cucurbits" such as cucumbers, marrows and courgettes require plenty of water at the roots, but not on the leaves.

If you fancy producing your vegetables for consumption later this year whilst getting some exercise in the fresh air then why not apply for a plot at Little Milton Allotments. You can contact me by email or phone for further details.

We are hoping to hold a BBQ up at the allotments in May, if you are interested you are very welcome to join us. The date has yet to be confirmed but if you would like to come then drop me a note or call me to find out the finalised date.

Let's hope that May will bring plenty of sunshine and enough rain (preferably overnight) to boost our crops. Talking of the wet stuff, when does it rain money? When there is "change" in the weather of course.

GREAT HASELEY AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

There has been a definite feel of spring in the air in recent days. Having had a mild winter, it has been unseasonably cold, windy and damp in recent weeks so I have found that some plants seem to be very late in coming in to flower. Particularly noticeable have been the various Osmanthus plants. If you are not familiar with these, they are small leaved evergreen shrubs which can grow surprisingly big over time and have beautiful fragrant white flowers in March; these have only appeared in the last week or so being around a month late in our garden. In recent years we have started to cloud prune the two largest specimens to give interesting shaped plants. However this has been a compromise of pruning and flowering as the plants currently look rather shaggy. We will prune them back to 'clouds' after flowering has finished to give a well-shaped plant for the next few weeks; the problem is that really to get a good shape this pruning needs to be repeated during the summer, but that would remove the wood which will carry next year's flowers.

The first florets of Wisteria are just opening alongside the outlet from the central heating - these are always the first bits to open as they are kept so much warmer. We also have an olive growing there and any branches which extend close to the outlet get scorched while branches extending too far from the house or too high are frosted. We therefore prune the olive to a spherical shape and are astonished at its ability to survive in the Oxfordshire cold and wet; this is due to the poor, free-draining soil it is growing in and the micro-climate produced by the house and the surrounding walls in that area.

If you have a greenhouse it is definitely time to be growing on plants to fill your summer pots and hanging baskets. You could also do this on a sunny windowsill as long as you turn the plants daily to encourage even growth. Do not be tempted to buy tender plants from garden centres if you have no way of protecting them. I have noticed over the last couple of weeks that such plants are widely for sale and mostly without warning to keep them frost free, although in one garden centre a member of staff did warn me as I picked up some tiny marguerites. If in doubt then ask. I do not have hanging baskets as I find they get progressively more difficult to water as the season goes on and the basket becomes a mass of roots; the water tends to just run through. Using pots if I have difficulty wetting the compost I sit them in saucers from which they can soak up water. This problem can be reduced by having an irrigation system, of which there are a number for sale, or by including water retaining granules in the compost; these little grains absorb an amazing amount of water and become gelatinous masses from which the plant roots can extract moisture. My experience with them has been mixed so I no longer use them; I think there is the potential for keeping the root environment too wet and producing rot. Do try it for yourself.

John Howell MP writes...

Mid-April

It is almost impossible to be unaware of the forthcoming referendum on our membership of the EU which will take place on $23^{\rm rd}$ June. It is perhaps much more possible to have entirely missed the fact that our Police and Crime Commissioners are up for election on $5^{\rm th}$ May and in some parts of the constituency there are local council elections too.

Many people have written to me on the EU Referendum wanting me to vote in line with their preference. Given that there are only two options I am destined to have to disagree with a proportion of those voting. However to even suggest that I need to vote the same way as another is to entirely miss the difference between a referendum and an election or indeed a Parliamentary vote.

A referendum is a direct vote in which everyone who is registered to vote can have their say on whether to accept or reject the proposal or question before them. In this case it is a question of whether or not each individual voter wishes to remain a member of the EU. My vote is just one vote and counts for no more and no less that the vote of every other person who exercises their right to vote.

An election is a process by which voters elect someone to be their representative to a particular body and the person who gets the most votes wins. In the case of the forthcoming elections we will elect the person to be our Police and Crime Commissioner or our local Councillor where council elections are being held. Once a person is elected they then fulfil the role as they have set out to do so in their election manifesto and use their skills, experience and judgement to do so in the years of their term of office.

The decision on who is elected to take up a role is made for a 4 or 5 year term of office and if the candidate chosen turns out not to perform as voters had hoped there is a chance to elect a different person next time around. With a referendum the decision itself will have long-term influence on the future and the key question is perhaps more critical. Whatever decision is made in June it will be set in our country's history and will influence our future. We do indeed need to be informed but it will be almost impossible for each of us to work through the nuance of every argument that is being put forward. In the end I suspect we will make our decision on how to vote based on a more simple view of how we want to see our relationship with Europe in the future and what matters in our individual or family lives.

The most important thing in any election is that those who are entitled to vote exercise that right. Only when we get a good turnout at elections can we really know the mind of the population as a whole. The biggest news item following the last (and first) Police and Crime Commissioner elections was not the actual results but the fact that the number of people who turned out to vote was disappointingly low. Overall only about 15% of those register to vote did so.

I would expect that the turnout for the referendum will be high and for my part I am doing my best to steer people to robust information on the issues to help them decide how to cast their vote. I would similarly encourage voters to exercise their right in the election on 5th May. Our Police and Crime Commissioners are responsible for our policing which I know is important to many people. Their task is to cut crime and deliver an effective police force for the area they represent. They do not get involved in the operational independence of the force but do work to ensure that the force work in an effective and efficient way. If the Chief Constable does not perform well the Commissioner can remove them from post.

I hope that all those who are eligible will exercise their democratic right and vote both in the upcoming elections and the referendum. Trends show that younger people often do not exercise their right to vote. I hope that we can all encourage them to see the importance of doing so and to make their voices heard alongside all other generations in these forthcoming elections.
