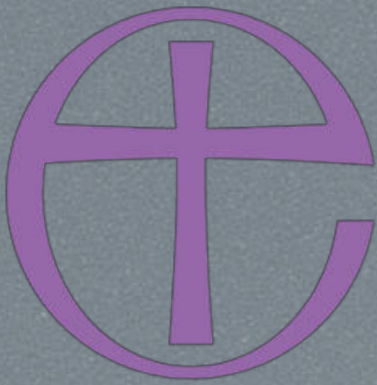

Good Shepherd Window Restoration

Our much admired "Good Shepherd" east window was professionally removed for cleaning and restoration during the summer. The window designed by renowned Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood artist Sir Edward Burne-Jones had been in place for 125 years. The artist was a very good friend of William Morris, and it is believed the original manufacture of the window was undertaken by the Morris factory.

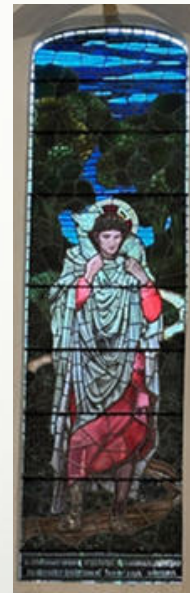
St Mary's PCC employed Glastonbury based Dan Humphries, a professional stained-glass restorer and conservator, to undertake the work following close collaboration with Dr Amy Lim the curator at Buscot Park. Indeed, the church is very grateful for the encouragement and support of James and Lucinda Henderson in helping the church realise the project. The window is now not only clean, restored but also protected externally with environmental protection glass.

We encourage all to come and view the window during the autumn and spring months when the sun is lower in the sky. The easterly morning sun makes the work of Burne-Jones sing. His representation of Christ as the good shepherd is at its most inspiring with the sunlight behind it mid-morning, about the time of Communion on a Sunday.

2025 AUTUMN LECTURES

The two lectures in St Michael and All Angels' church were well received. The first on 4th October was about The Faringdon Collection at Buscot Park, given by Dr Amy Lim, Curator, Faringdon Collection. This important and diverse collection, begun by Alexander Henderson, 1st Baron of Faringdon, comprising of fine and decorative arts, is privately run within the National Trust country house.



The second lecture on 11th October entitled “the Beauty of Bronze, was given by Jeremy Warren, Honorary Curator of Sculpture, Ashmolean Museum. This museum of the University of Oxford houses one of the world’s great collections of European small bronzes, including the fabulous collection of Charles Drury Edward Fortnum, bequeathed in 1899.

CONTEMPLATION GARDEN REVIEW

It is 4 years since we took a new direction in the garden of remembrance at St Giles. During the pandemic, mental wellbeing and the healing power of nature came into focus. The need for quiet reflection and an opportunity to be in nature was the focus for our garden design makeover.

The eastern boundary was strengthened and windows into the landscape beyond cut in the hedges to the south. A management regime aimed at encouraging the wildflowers was introduced and more wild plants added. The circular path was punctuated with 4 seats and some new trees.

Simple way-markers inscribed with words, including MEMORIES, LOVE, TRANQUILITY and NATURE, focus thinking or prayer. A box of handheld guides at the gate offers associated biblical texts if wished.

The space offers peaceful seclusion with opportunities to be in nature, calm the mind and seek spiritual uplift.

Friends of St. Giles Charity Could you become a Trustee?

This new Registered Charity was formed to raise funds and project-manage repairs and improvements to our historic 12th-century church. We need to raise £176,000 for the roof alone to prevent the building from falling into disuse. To date, we have raised £25,000. The immediate plan is to replace the leaky church roof, with longer-term plans that include upgrading the lighting and heating system, installing Mains water, constructing a small modern kitchen with a disabled and unisex toilet, and creating a "quiet place".

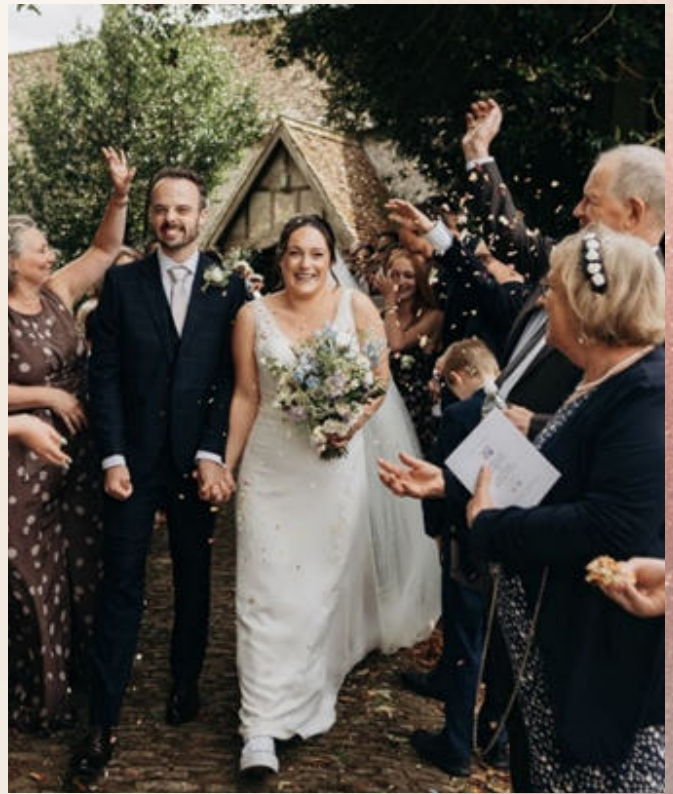
These extra facilities will make the church building more appealing, relevant and accessible for group activities and individuals of all ages, as well as being more comfortable for the congregations attending services. 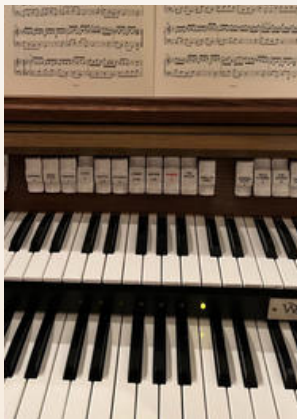

Organ playing in the Badbury Group of churches

As distinctive as the four churches themselves, the four instruments that are used to provide musical accompaniment for regular Sunday services in the Badbury Group of churches each have their own unique character and idiosyncrasies. This makes playing them such a pleasure (and challenge!) where even hymns that are familiar to all of us can sound quite different depending on which church you are in.

The pipe organs at Eaton Hastings and Coleshill could not be more dissimilar, the former is limited in its range but has a chamber music quality and came into its own supporting the Shrivenham choir earlier this year. One of the biggest challenges with the Eaton Hastings organ is fitting pieces of music, and even some hymns, onto the short keyboard where I often run out of keys and have to quickly improvise the bass notes. It contrasts well with the larger, but still only single manual (keyboard), organ at Coleshill.



I've known this instrument since I first started playing there 27 years ago and feel at home playing hymns and other music, almost as second nature now. The electronic organs at Buscot and Great Coxwell also provide variety, the Buscot instrument being larger with a wide range of stops and sounds possible. Both organs have two manuals giving opportunities to play a broader repertoire and to provide more varied accompaniment to hymns.

Having taken on playing the Great Coxwell instrument more recently it's fair to say that I am still getting used to it.

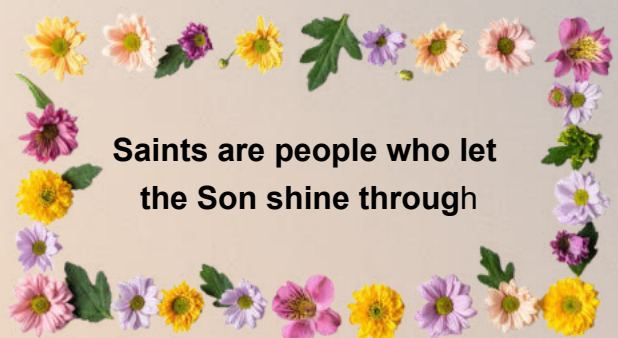

Coleshill Reordering

Plans for All Saints Church are under consideration with alternatives to include the provision of a lavatory, a small kitchen facility and the creation of a space for meetings, events, activities or just a quiet space, for example, by removing the pews to the rear of the church or the area of the box pews which are seldom used and also using the existing vestry for storage (and the loo). We will need the approval of the Diocese and have already had a meeting with the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC). Progress is slow but we are confident we will achieve our aims in the near future.
