Grafty Garden Cuttings – June

I am extremely grateful to whichever agent or agents, be it human, feline or feathered, responsible for clearing away one of the major problems that has plagued our garden - rabbits. We have not seen one for months, so I have plucked up the courage to remove many of the wire surrounds from trees and shrubs. Not only has this improved the look of the garden, it has made mowing and weeding so much easier. Long may it continue.

Many birds have nested around the garden and all the usual suspects are busily feeding young. Unfortunately, magpies, cats and the Sparrow Hawk are much in evidence, preying on many of these, but plenty remain and we have heard the now rare Cuckoo on many occasions. We hope the birds continue to visit, unlike earlier in the year, although none have visited our feeders for months and in fact, for the time being I have even removed them altogether, for fear of the food going rancid. The Sparrow Hawk comes very close to the house and even escaped by flying right through our garage, which happened to be open, front and back, possibly because the pigeon it was after, did likewise.

After the most colourful and bloom filled spring for years, the winds during last month have done much damage, bringing down leaves, branches, beating new growth to death and flattening many plants. A little judicious staking will help, or for some, a prune back to encourage second growth may be needed.

Everything can be planted out, if not already in place, so the usual jobs will be needed; weeding, careful watering and a watch kept for pests and diseases. A few aphids or caterpillars can easily be picked off or blasted away with a hose pipe on full power, but a major infestation may take more than a few ladybirds or wasps to control.

I give my houseplants a rest by re-potting and placing them outside somewhere shady, for the summer months. The major problem with this is what they bring back in with them: slugs, ants, caterpillars and vine weevils being the major contenders. A thorough check-over is therefore needed, plus a treatment watered in, to deal with the latter.

Garden visits - Wisley again, to see the wisteria (there are both Japanese and Chinese varieties, one of which twines clockwise, the other anti-clockwise but which is which, I cannot remember!) and magnolias and Pashley Manor for the tulip festival and bluebell walk which are beautiful and worth making a date for in next year's diary.

Bulky Refuse Collections (Weekend Freighter Service)

As mentioned in last month's magazine Maidstone Borough Council has been reviewing this service and now have issued the new timetable up to 30th August 2009. The main difference is that all Grafty Green times will be on a Sunday and the freighter will only be here for 45 minutes – so get there early.

Additionally there will be no service for collecting electrical items i.e. no separate freighter to pick up items such as TV's, monitors, etc. They state it is against EU rules and they have to provide a separate freighter to do this. That may be true but isn't that exactly what they did before the review, so the truth must be they are cutting costs and reducing the service. This will only increase the likelihood of fly tipping.

The following information relates to the reviewed service:

Important Information

- Only freighter staff are authorised to load items into the vehicle. For your own safety you must remain outside the cordoned area, children must be kept away from the freighter at all times.

- In busy periods, it may be necessary to queue to hand over your bulky items; abusive behaviour towards staff will not be tolerated.
- Please approach the vehicle from the side and always be aware of moving traffic.
- Please do not leave items on the pavement or road before or after the freighter visits.
- Freighters have the right to refuse to accept waste particularly if it is hazardous, can cause damage to the vehicle or cause danger to the public, such as:
 - Flammables
 - Large quantities liquids/powders
 - Paints/Oils
 - Lighting tubes
 - Vehicle parts/batteries/tyres etc
 - Commercial waste
 - Clinical waste
 - Asbestos
 - *Plasterboard
 - *As of 1st April 2009, plasterboard can no longer be collected by the weekend freighter or household bulky collections; this is due to the acid produced when landfilled. Waste plasterboard should be taken to the Household Waste Recycling centre in Tovil.

Electrical Items:

We can no longer collect electrical items such as fridges, televisions, monitors and vacuum cleaners. Under European legislation we'd have to provide a separate vehicle to continue to collect these items.

We're sorry for any inconvenience this may cause. You can dispose of electrical appliances through our paid for [bulky collection service](#) or take electrical/hazardous items to the [household waste recycling centre](#) at Burial Ground Lane, Tovil, Maidstone.

The Grafty Gourmet

This recipe comprises of chicken dredged in Cajun spice, served on a bed of pasta and cream sauce, complimented with the bright colours of red and green peppers. I have adapted this recipe, and made it recently for the first time. I will certainly put it down as one of my favourites. Take care not to over cook the chicken; otherwise it will lose its moisture and flavour. Spaghetti or any pasta of your choice can be used in place of linguine.

Pollo di Principessa

Serves 2

4oz Linguine Pasta	1 Cup of Double Cream
2 Skinless Boned Chicken Breasts	¼ Teaspoon of Dried Basil
1 Medium Onion, finely chopped	¼ Teaspoon of Salt
1 Red Pepper, sliced	¼ Teaspoon of Ground Black Pepper
1 Green Pepper, sliced	½ Teaspoon of sugar
2 Tablespoons of Butter	2 Cloves of Garlic, crushed
Olive Oil	A Good Squeeze of Fresh Lime Juice
2 teaspoons of Cajun Seasoning	¼ Cup grated Parmesan Cheese

1. Melt half the butter (1 Tablespoon) and add 1 crushed clove of Garlic. Brush the garlic butter over each chicken breast. Then dust the top of each chicken breast with the Cajun spice. Wrap each breast in tin foil and place in a pre-heated oven at 180° for 20 minutes, or until juices run clear from chicken when pierced with a fine skewer.

2. After about 5 minutes, place the Linguine in a saucepan of water and bring to the boil, then simmer for about 12 minutes, until al dente.

3. Whilst the pasta and chicken are cooking, melt the remaining butter with the olive oil in a frying pan and sauté the onion for 2-3 minutes. Then add the sliced red and green peppers and simmer until soft and tender.

4. Add the cream together with 1 clove crushed garlic, basil, salt, black pepper, sugar and lime juice and stir the mixture with the onions and peppers until warmed through.

5. When Linguine is cooked, drain and add to the cream and pepper mix in the frying pan. Stir into the sauce so that the pasta is even coated, and simmer on a very low heat, to keep warm, stirring occasionally.

6. Remove the Chicken breasts from the oven and place on a chopping board. Slice each breast diagonally into strips. Serve an equal mix of the pasta and cream mixture onto plates, and place the sliced chicken breast on top. Sprinkle with grated parmesan cheese.

Citizens Advice Service in Maidstone

The need has never been greater for sound, practical advice to help people through these difficult times. As the recession bites, Bureaux in Kent have been experiencing an unprecedented increase in demand for employment, welfare benefits and debt advice. Falling interest rates, banks calling in their loans, companies having to make redundancies and businesses folding seem to be in the news every day. Good quality advice is a key element in helping people, who are finding themselves without work, needing help with debt and other money issues, to get back on their feet.

Maidstone Bureau opened on 1st January 1940. Maidstone Borough Council funds the Bureau's core services, which allows the organisation to provide advice and assistance to the community of Maidstone with the help of volunteers. The Bureau is one of busiest in the County and in 2008/9 our advisers dealt with 8,000 new people, raised 27,000 contacts on behalf of their clients and dealt with 58,365 issues. Evidence shows that this year Bureaux in the South East have dealt with 27% more debt issues, 26% more welfare benefits issues and 24% more employment issues than last year.

The Bureau employs 23 paid staff and has 50 volunteer advisers, 7 trainee advisers, and 13 volunteer admin workers. The five major areas of our work are Welfare Benefits—28%, Debt—34%, Employment—9%, Relationship—7% and Housing—7%. Other areas of work are Education, Finance, Health, Immigration, Tax, Legal, Travel, Utilities and Signposting.

The Bureau is also able to provide specialist advice in Debt, Housing, Benefits, Employment and Family Law to clients who are Legally Aidable. This work is funded through a contract with the Legal Services Commission. For clients who need advice in basic legal problems we are able to offer 15 minutes free appointments with Legal Advisers every Wednesday. These sessions are supported and run by local Solicitor firms. Local Accountants also offer similar once a month free appointments for clients with accounting problems.

In addition to all the various local authority and government departments in Maidstone, the Bureau has very good working relationships with a large number of local charities and other organisations, which can be a source of additional specialist help and advice for our clients.

The amount of Debt matters dealt with by our advisers increased from £7 million in 2007/08 to £9.6 million in 2008/09. The average debt of each client was £20,403. 93 clients with a total of £147,492 rent arrears and 53 clients with £167,887 mortgage arrears. 63 clients were prevented from becoming homeless. The figures for the current year show that there is a 37% increase of debt within the space of the last 4 months.

The CAB service is Free; there is no charge or cost to our clients. It is Independent and although we are funded by MBC we are empowered to dispute their decisions or policies fairly where necessary. Our advice service is Confidential and we do not contact any person or organisation without our client's authorisation and consent. It is also Impartial as we do not take sides but will negotiate with third parties on behalf of our clients. The CAB service aims to make this service available to everyone, no matter who or what they are.

Advice and assistance is provided to our clients every Monday to Friday, 10am till 4pm from 2 venues. Our main office is at 2 Bower Terrace on Tonbridge Road and the second venue is at the Maidstone Gateway in King Street. Advice is also provided to clients who contact us by phone, letter or e-mail. Outreach sessions are held on a monthly basis in Parkwood, Shepway, Lenham, Headcorn, Staplehurst and Marden so that local people have the benefit of our service without having to travel into town. Clients do not need to make appointments at any venue, as we operate an open door system whereby they are given as much time as the matter requires.

Our Advisers are trained to take a holistic view of advice giving and not deal with problems in isolation – e.g. we do not deal with debts individually, if there are mortgage arrears with other debts we will deal with all of them as well. Our experienced advisers will investigate their client's problem and look at the root cause of each situation. They will then review the options available to the client and the likely outcomes of each option. Clients are then presented with a set of options and empowered to make their own decisions on which option to take. Our advisers have been very successful in securing additional financial support for many of our clients from various trusts and charities. Information and advice is given to all our clients using an Information system called AdviserNet, which is on the Citizens Advice intranet and kept up-to-date by our national association. A very brief version is available to the public on www.adviceguide.org.uk.

All our Volunteers work on a one-or-two day's per week basis and some who are unable to do a whole day can give us half days instead. Advisers are trained to competence level through an adult learning based initial training programme, which takes 6-8 months. Active training support is available every day. This training is mostly completed in the Bureau although some of the training packs can be taken home. Advisers are also able to research some of the information on our website from home. In order to complete their learning the final 4 days external training is taken at venues either in London or around the county. Once this programme is completed advisers are then fully supported and supervised to see their clients in order to help them with their problems.

The CAB is not where you go to find out where to go; it is where you go for advice. The CAB can and does advise on all legal aspects of daily life.

June Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Taurus at the beginning of June, and moves into Gemini, reaching its most northerly point on 21st June, which is the Summer Solstice, (the longest day). I have a little more about the Sun later on.

Full Moon occurs on Sunday 7th June, when the Moon is in the constellation of Ophiuchus, between Scorpius and Sagittarius, and New Moon on Monday 22nd June.

Mercury is at its greatest elongation westward from the Sun on 13th June, but as it is rising less than an hour before the Sun we are unlikely to see this planet in June.

As Venus rises a couple of hours before the Sun, you should easily see the brilliant “Morning Star” very low in the east at dawn.

Mars appears very close to Venus this month, but as it is much further away, it looks much fainter. We must wait until later this summer to get good views of the Red Planet.

Jupiter is rising in the southeast around midnight, and it is well up in the southern sky at dawn. Relative to the stars, it is moving very slowly south westwards in Capricornus. Saturn is in the western sky at dusk, and does not set until well after midnight. It is moving slowly southeast in the constellation of Leo. Again with a telescope you should be able to see the rings and many of its moons.

June is the best time of the year to see Noctilucent (“Night-Shining”) Clouds. These are high altitude clouds, (over 80 km above the ground), which are still in the sunlight even at midnight. The best time to look for them is around 1 am.

Now back to the Sun. Scientists have unveiled ambitious projects to learn more about our star. Two space probes are to be sent in an attempt to get closer to the Sun than any previous mission. The spacecraft will travel more than 70 million miles to one of the least hospitable regions of our solar system. Scientists hope that the missions will help them answer a long list of questions, including why its outer atmosphere is hotter than its surface, and what causes solar wind, sunspots and flares. The two spacecraft are called Solar Probe Plus and Solar Orbiter, and will be launched in 2015 and 2017 respectively.

Christian Message – June 2009
