Ongoing	Septic Smart	Various areas - initially Cheriton/Alresford	This project will be launching in the new year and focuses on raising awareness/encouraging positive behaviours around off-mains drainage systems. We are seeking volunteers (initially in the Alresford and Cheriton areas) to support this project. This could involve lower commitment activities like helping to deliver leaflets to houses, or more in-depth involvement such as speaking with local residents and businesses about the topic. April (online intro in March)	Open Chalk Stream events	Various areas	During April, we will be running our extremely popular and well received Open Chalk Stream events. This is where some of the landowners open up their land and access to the chalk streams for small groups of visitors for walks and talks from our team and other professionals. These will take place across the catchment, with details currently just bring finalised. The schedule will be available soon. We will be calling for volunteers to help us run these events on the day. There are several roles, depending upon the site, but it would mainly

			involve assisting the participants, helping the event leader, taking photos and of course, joining the walk too! They generally last for 2 to 3 hours and can be either a morning or an afternoon.

Launching May (online intro 12 April)	Invasive non- native Floral surveys	Catchment wide	This spring, we are launching the Floral Survey project. The focus will be to identify invasive non-native plants in designated areas across the scheme catchment, which will include all seven chalk streams. These surveys will provide an update to those initially completed several years ago and will help us to identify the key target areas. This will involve walking along accessible footpaths, with the maps provided, to look for any invasive plants that we have highlighted. This can be an opportunity for an enjoyable walk out with a friend, family or other volunteers with the added interest of looking out for the identified plants. You'll be able to log any findings as you go, either on the survey app (details will be provided) or on paper forms. We are assigning the whole month of May for these surveys to take place, with special focus from the team during the week of 15- 19 May. We do need to request that you register your interest with us for the floral surveys as we will need to section the maps according to the number and location of those who wish to participate. To get us started, Maggie will host an online introductory session on Zoom on the evening of 12 April to go through the project, the plants, maps and how it will all work. A link to the online session will be sent out to those who are interested.
May to Sept	INNS (Invasive non-native species) removal	Various areas	The INNS programme, the removal of invasive non-native plants, will run from May to September. On the whole, it involves removing Himalayan Balsam from identified sites as part of a group of volunteers, but also can involve removing other non-native plants from the streams themselves e.g., parrots feather and monkey flower. This work is ongoing and a schedule of sites with dates and times will be sent out soon so that volunteers can let us know if they are interested in joining any of the sessions. Each session lasts about 3 hours. No action needed yet. Further information to follow.
Ongoing	Education Volunteers	Various areas	<ul> <li>Tracy, our W&amp;W Education Officer works with small numbers of volunteers in various locations delivering educational sessions for children and young people. These include activities such as river dipping, identifying invertebrates and wildlife near our chalk streams, a river's journey from source to sea, water conservation and local heritage.</li> <li>Sessions are mainly with school groups during the day in term time and with youth groups and uniformed groups such as Brownie/Cub groups in the evenings.</li> <li>Tracy is looking to increase her education volunteering team, so if you are interested, please get in touch and we can let you know what is planned.</li> <li>N.b.
