History of the Village

There have been people living in this area since pre-historic times and there have been finds from the Roman and Ironage periods. The first recorded mention of Gretton is in the Doomsday book of 1086 when the village consisted of about 400 acres of land including meadow and woodland. There were some 22 families and a priest. A manor house existed in Hall field, with its own fish ponds, and there was a watermill on the Welland.

The village has been much rebuilt over the years and has many fine stone houses dating back to the 17th century or earlier. The church as we see it today dates back to the Norman period with many later additions and changes. Until the coming of the railway in the 1870's, the village had always been dependent on agriculture. However, when the rich seams of ironstone were discovered the men were taken away from the fields and into the quarries and steelworks of Corby.

The War Memorial on the village green is unusual, though not unique, in that it records the names of all the men who served the Great War of 1914-18, with those who lost their lives being picked out in gold. It was erected, paid for public subscription, in 1925.

Local Attractions

Corby is the nearest large town to Gretton situated approximately 5 miles away. It is a fast growing town and has an extensive shopping centre, restaurants, cinema, an international swimming pool and the Corby Cube, which houses the Borough Council and also a theatre

Uppingham is a market town 4 miles north of Gretton. With a wealth of history and a range of speciality shops and traditional retailers. The town's weekly market is held on a Friday morning.

Rockingham Castle is an amazing Norman Castle built under the instruction of William the Conqueror. Great for a family day out 3 miles from Gretton.

East Carlton Country Park situated 6 miles from Gretton and makes a lovely day out for the whole family with its nature walks, cafe and special events

Stamford is 12 miles away on the river Welland. It was proclaimed by Sir Walter Scott as "the finest stone town in England". It has over 600 listed buildings of mellow limestone in the town centre including five medieval churches.

Kirby Hall is an Elizabethan country house located 3 miles away but still within the Parish of Gretton. The buildings and gardens are owned by the Earl of Winchilsea and managed by English Heritage.

Rutland Water is one of the largest man made lakes in Europe situated 10 miles north of Gretton. It is truly a beautiful location with a full range of water sports, cycling and pleasant walks with cafes and restaurants

Eyebrook Reservoir is 5 miles away and specialises solely in fly fishing with no other water users, offering a haven of peace and tranquillity.
